
D.J. Sims told Tahoka Police that

Tahoka Police arrested a Tahoka High School student who reportedly struck another student in the face last Friday. The 17-year-old youth was fined \$225 in city court and suspended from school for three days.

In jail during the week were two persons for driving while license suspended, two for possession of marijuana and possession of narcotics paraphernalia, and one each for forgery (Hockley County), failure to appear on charges of physical assault and speeding, driving while license suspended plus speeding, driving while intoxicated (DWI) plus no valid drivers license, DWI first offense and DWLS plus no liability insurance.

Sheriff Charlie Smith reported that his office dispatched 255 phone calls during January, including 114 for the county, 102 for the City of Tahoka, 13 for the City of O'Donnell, 14 fire calls and 12 ambulance calls.


Says Tahoka A.D.

If it's not one of the Tahoka coaches asking for advertising for school athletics, don't buy it, says Tahoka I.S.D. Athletic Director Troy Hinds. He warns area businesses that it is now the athletic department's policy not to use outside companies who sell advertising for posters and other items for athletic schedules,

"We use our local businesses for our athletic schedule posters, and one of our coaches will come to area businesses asking for sponsor advertising. This is what we are asking our area businesses to support, because all of the money stays home that way," Hinds explains.

"If you get a call or visit from someone other than our coaching staff asking for sponsor advertising, you should know that the school is not supporting that endeavor," he added, noting that this time of year is when other companies sell such sponsorships.

"If in doubt, call any of our coaching staff or myself," Hinds



I had the privilege today of being allowed to spend about two hours in the Tahoka High School visiting with Coach Hinds, Mrs. Stennett, and Mrs. Ehlers concerning some computer and multimedia equipment. I say privilege because I was amazed by the dress and the conduct of the students in Tahoka; students of which you should be exceptionally proud. My company works extensively with schools of all sizes throughout west Texas and seldom have I ever felt compelled to make an effort to praise any of them, but Tahoka impressed me more than words can say.

There were three things that really set your school apart that I saw in the short time I was there. First, a large number of students were dressed in either slacks and a tie or a dress/skirt of some type. I was told that this was due to it being the day of a basketball game and that the coaches required it. Still, I found it very sharp and I know from a similar experience that it builds a sense of respect and self esteem.

Second, the students seemed to respect themselves, others, and their surroundings. It is rare indeed when you can walk into a restroom and not find the walls littered with graffiti as I did there, but to find students who are helping with the installation of systems beneficial to the school is extraordinary indeed. I know the students aren't angels, but most assuredly they are quite exceptional.

Third, and closely related, was the conduct of the students. I was there during two class changes and was not trampled, yelled at, or knocked aside. Additionally, one of the students walked into class with a snack, was reprimanded by the teacher, and instead of becoming surly or arguing, quietly corrected the situation and even apologized.

To quote from an old song, "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle Rules the World." With this in mind, please consider this a compliment to yourselves as parents, the staff (from the school board to the custodians) who are helping to build higher standards, and the students themselves. I would be proud to be a part of a community such as yours and sincerely hope that my children will one day honor me as yours have

## **Child Safety Seat Questions** Answered

Child safety seats really do work. Children, especially those under the age of 5, are vulnerable in collisions because of the size and shape of their bodies. Safety seats are designed to spread the forces of a crash over more of the body for front-facing toddlers, and cradle the fragile neck and back

of rear-facing infants. Child safety seats are the most effective occupant-protection devices used in motor vehicles today. If used correctly, they are 71 percent effective in reducing fatalities in children under the age of 5 and 69 percent effective in reducing the for hospitalization. Unfortunately, parents often do not know the basic WHO, WHAT, WHERE, WHEN, WHY, and HOW of child safety seats.

WHO should use a child safety seat? Texas law requires all children aged 2 and under be restrained in a child safety seat. Children 2-4 years of age are required to be in a child safety seat or in a seat belt.

A parent may ask WHAT kind of safety seat should be used. All children should be restrained in a safety seat that is appropriate for age and weight, and also meets federal safety standards. Infants up to 20 pounds should ride facing the rear of the vehicle in infant-only or convertible seats. Children weighing about 20-40 pounds should ride facing forward in convertible safety seats. Children who have outgrown their convertible seat should ride in a belt-positioning booster until adult belts fit them properly. Older children wear vehicle safety belts and keep the lap belt low and snug across the hips. The belt must not ride up over the abdomen, and the shoulder belt must not cross the face or front of the neck.

WHERE should a child safety seat be placed in the car? The back seat is the safest place for all children to ride. Never place a rear-facing

infant seat in the front seat of a vehicle with a passenger-side air bag. A passenger-side air bag could strike the back of the seat and seriously injure or kill a baby. If a toddler convertible seat must be placed in the front seat of a vehicle, move the seat position back as far as possible from the dashboard.

WHEN should a child safety seat be used? Use a safety seat every time on every trip. Do not make the deadly mistake of using a car seat only on freeways or for long trips. Most car crashes happen within 25 miles of home. If a child rides with friends, relatives or babysitters, be sure the driver has correctly installed the safety seat and that is is used properly every time the child is in the car. Older children will likely have the habit of buckling up on every ride if this has been expected from birth.

Many parents often ask WHY should safety seats be used. It's the law in Texas for children under 4 to be restrained. Motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of death and injury for children ages 1-5 in the United States. Correct use can save lives and injuries. In a crash or sudden stop, an unbuckled adult holding a baby can crush the child into the windshield or dashboard.

There are many different types of seats and they all seem to install differently. It is important that parents know HOW to properly install child safety seats into motor vehicles. Parents must read their vehicle owner's manual and child safety seat use instructions very carefully. A special locking clip may be necessary to hold your vehicle safety belt in place so you can anchor your safety seats properly.

Producers in Lynn County need to be aware of not only the danger but the liability incurred when burning CRP grass, according to information released from the local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office.

"A large percentage of the CRP grass in the county was burned this past spring. Some of the burning was planned, but the majority was burned without the landowner's permission under less than ideal conditions," noted a NRCS representative.

At a time when much is being written and said about individual property rights, producers are reminded that CRP owners have property rights also. Producers are encouraged to talk to their neighbors about the boll weevil problem, before going out and burning their grass. If a producer has the CRP owner's permission to burn their grass, they should consider the following points:

1) Many acres planted to grass are on very fragile soils and burning in February is too early. The grass can be burned in March, before the grass comes up, and still kill the boll weevil without causing any damage to the grass or creating a blowing problem.

2) CRP owners and producers are

reminded that if the grass was burned this past spring. The grass needs more than one year to produce enough litter for the boll weevil to

3) CRP owners should get a death, or damage to houses, barns, fences, utility poles etc.

4) Producers who have permission to burn CRP grass must be aware of wind direction and speed. Burning grass in a high wind is unsafe and also the grass burns too fast to kill the boll weevil. If the wind is out of the wrong direction, the producer could put smoke on a road

6) CRP owners should take appropriate action to protect their property from loss. A fireguard may need to be established and maintained around buildings. If the grass is shredded around buildings, it will give the fire fighters a better chance at protecting the endangered property from a wildfire.

statement from their neighbor releasing them (CRP owner) from liability, if they allow their neighbor to burn their grass. The liability agreement should be in writing and address at a minimum, who will be responsible if the grass stand does not recover after the burn and needs to be reestablished. Additionally, who will be liable in case of injuries,

and cause an unnecessary tragedy.

5) CRP owners who wish to burn their grass should contact the Farm Service Agency first. CRP contracts must be modified prior to a prescribed burn, but the Farm Service Agency must request the modification from the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

7) Think safety — fire is very volatile and unpredictable even under planned and controlled conditions.

## Construction of \$145 Million Gas-Fueled Power Plant At Denver City Set For March

Construction of a major new electric power generating plant near Denver City is expected to begin in mid-March, Golden Spread Electric Cooperative and two business partners announced recently.

The plant, to be called Mustang Station, will be fueled by natural gas, and will generate 488 megawatts of

The plant is expected to begin service in late spring, 1999.

Mustang Station was developed by Denver City Energy Associates, a partnership of LS Power, LLC, of New Jersey, and of Amarillo-based Quixx Corporation, an affiliate of Southwestern Public Service Company.

When Mustang Station is complete, Golden Spread will purchase a 50 percent interest in the plant. Quixx and SL Power will own 25 percent each.

The primary customers for Mustang Station will be the 100,000 retail member/consumers served by 11 Golden Spread member cooperatives in the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas and in the Oklahoma Panhandle.

"We are pleased to join LS Power and Golden Spread in a project that will provide a highly reliable and cost-effective source of electric power to Golden Spread and its members," said Louis Ridings, president of Quixx.

Executive Vice President of LS Power Clarence Heller added, "This generating station will offer superior value to Golden Spread and its

"Golden Spread has spent several years seeking the most competitively priced future electric supplies available for our eleven cooperatives," said Robert W. Bryant, president of Golden Spread Electronic Cooperative. "Mustang Station will provide that competitively priced power, to the benefit of our cooperatives' members/ customers throughout the region."

The three partners also announced that Gilbert Industrial Corporation, a subsidiary of Gilbert Southern Corporation of Omaha, Neb., will be the engineer/procure/ construct contractor for Mustang

The plant will be brought on line in two phases. The first phase, which will produce some 285 megawatts, is expected to be in service beginning in late spring, 1999. The secondphase addition will begin in production in winter, 2000.

Employment at the Denver City site during construction will peak at about 250 persons. Approximately 21 persons will be required to operate Mustang Station on a day-to-day

The natural gas-fueled plant will use two combustion turbines, manufactured by General Electric Corporation, that later will be complemented by production from a single steam turbine, manufactured

Electricity produced by Mustang Station will be moved to Golden

Spread's member cooperatives on Southwestern Public Service high-voltage Company's transmission system, Bryant said. Today, SPS provides more than 95 percent of Golden Spread's power requirements, and Golden Spread will continue to purchase a large

block of power from SPS, he added.

Golden Spread's member systems are Bailey County Electric Cooperative (Muleshoe), Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative (Hereford), Greenbelt Electric Cooperative (Wellington), Lamb County Electric Cooperative (Littlefield), Lighthouse Electric Cooperative (Floydada), Midwest Electric Cooperative (Dalhart), South Plains Electric Cooperative (Lubbock), Swisher Electric Cooperative (Tulia) and Tri-County Electric Cooperative (Hooker,

Quixx Corporation, like its affiliate Southwestern Public Service Company, is a New Century Energies Company based in Amarillo. Quixx's focus is on the non-utility power generation market, including investment and operation opportunities in cogeneration facilities, independent power projects and other non-utility operations. Quixx's expanding portfolio includes energy projects in New Jersey, Kentucky, Jamaica, and

Culberson and Hutchinson counties in Texas.

LS Power is an independent power producer that develops, finances, owns and manages nonutility power projects.
