Vehicle Burglaries, Vandalism Reported

Three incidents of criminal mischief and two vehicle burglaries were among reports investigated by law enforcement officers in Lynn County during the last week.

J.B. Sepeda told police that his vehicle, otherwise not identified, had been burglarized Friday while it was parked in the 1800-block of Ave. O. Stolen were a Sony CD stereo adapter, Sony headphones and a wallet containing \$3. Total value of the missing items was set at \$60.

Tahoka High School student Kristi Calvillo reported that her billfold and some change had been stolen from her 1984 Ford while it was parked at the school Friday evening. Value of the missing items was estimated at \$20.

A driver's side window on a 1989 Dodge pickup owned by Leighton Knox was broken, possibly by an air rifle, it was reported Saturday.

All headlights, tail lights and signal lights and six windows were broken on a 1977 Oldsmobile owned by Trena Herrera at a location on S. 6th St. in Tahoka Tuesday, sheriff's officers were advised.

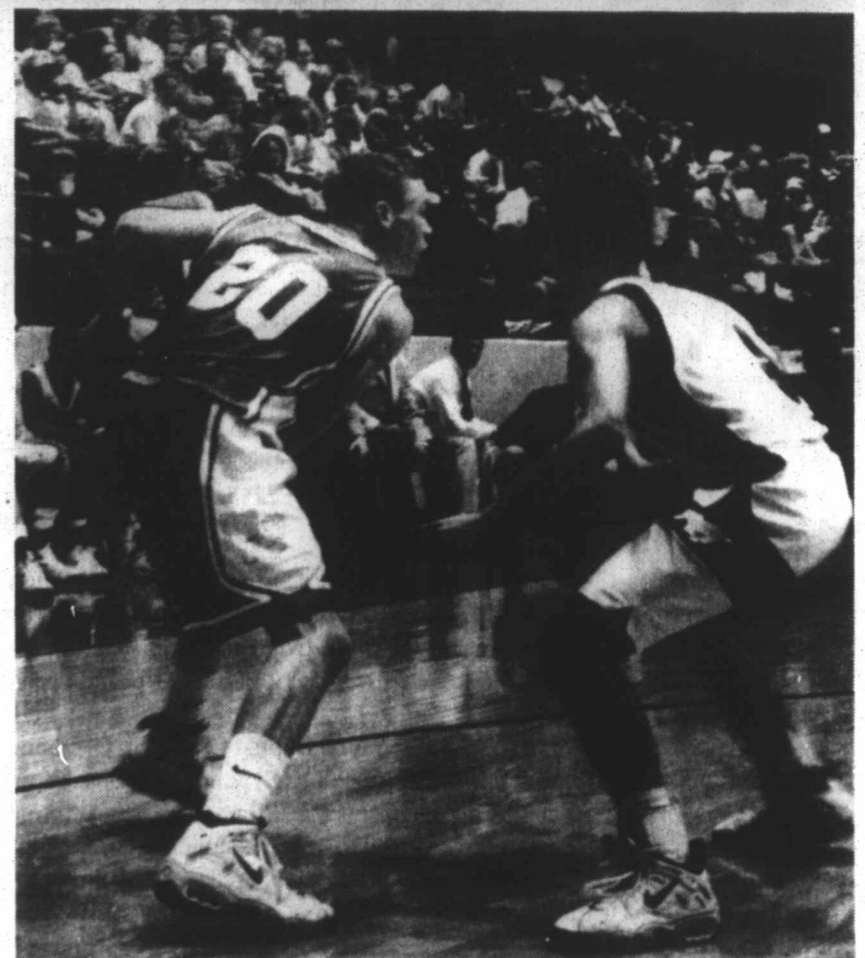
D.J. Sims told Tahoka Police that

the passenger side window of his 1996 Chevrolet pickup had been shot out while it was parked at Tahoka High School Friday evening.

Tahoka Police arrested a Tahoka High School student who reportedly struck another student in the face last Friday. The 17-year-old youth was fined \$225 in city court and suspended from school for three days.

In jail during the week were two persons for driving while license suspended, two for possession of marijuana and possession of narcotics paraphernalia, and one each for forgery (Hockley County), failure to appear on charges of physical assault and speeding, driving while license suspended plus speeding, driving while intoxicated (DWI) plus no valid drivers license, DWI first offense and DWLS plus no liability insurance.

Sheriff Charlie Smith reported that his office dispatched 255 phone calls during January, including 114 for the county, 102 for the City of Tahoka, 13 for the City of O'Donnell, 14 fire calls and 12 ambulance calls.

"Character Counts" Seminar To Be Presented Here Feb. 21

"Character Counts," a free seminar which will offer practical ways to teach the six basics of character, will be presented in Tahoka Saturday, Feb. 21 at the Life Enrichment Center. Lunch will be provided, and pre-registration is needed by Feb. 20 in order to provide materials for all participants. The seminar begins at 8:30 a.m. and concludes at 3 p.m.

The "Character Counts" program is designed to show communities practical ways to implement teaching the six basics of character, which includes trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. It is not a religious program, so it can be presented in schools and government settings, and seeks a broad-based community support in that the city, county, school, civic organizations and faith communities can work together in an attempt to teach, model and promote character.

Guest speaker for the "Character

Counts" seminar in Tahoka will be Nat Cooper, Director of the Center for Character Development at Lubbock Christian University. Originally from Northern Ireland, Cooper has lived in Lubbock for many years, and was the minister for Monterey Church of Christ, and an instructor at Sunset International Bible Institute.

Cooper has done extensive mission work in Siberia, where he encountered the need for a character development program. With the downfall of communism, the people were left in a moral void, he says. The minister of Education for Siberia asked him and others to develop a program to fill that void. As a result, the "Character Counts" program is now taught in 45,000 schools in Siberia.

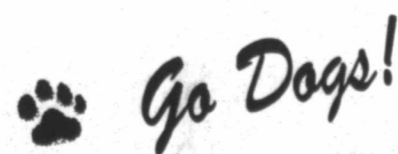

If Not Local, Don't Buy Adv., Says Tahoka A.D.

If it's not one of the Tahoka coaches asking for advertising for school athletics, don't buy it, says Tahoka I.S.D. Athletic Director Troy Hinds. He warns area businesses that it is now the athletic department's policy not to use outside companies who sell advertising for posters and other items for athletic schedules, etc.

"We use our local businesses for our athletic schedule posters, and one of our coaches will come to area businesses asking for sponsor advertising. This is what we are asking our area businesses to support, because all of the money stays home that way," Hinds explains.

"If you get a call or visit from someone other than our coaching staff asking for sponsor advertising, you should know that the school is not supporting that endeavor," he added, noting that this time of year is when other companies sell such sponsorships.

"If in doubt, call any of our coaching staff or myself," Hinds said.

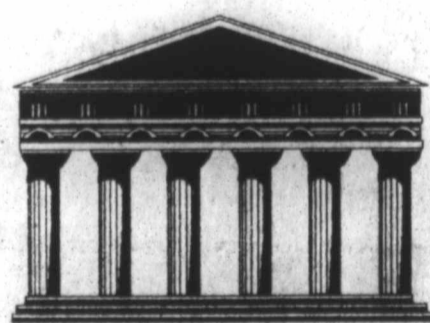

Lynn County Commissioners met in routine session Monday morning, approving a motion to finance a motor grader for Precinct 2 through Wilson State Bank, and granting permission for Larry Schram to meet with county employees about joining PEBSCO, a public employees benefit services corporation. Schram will meet with employees on March 13.

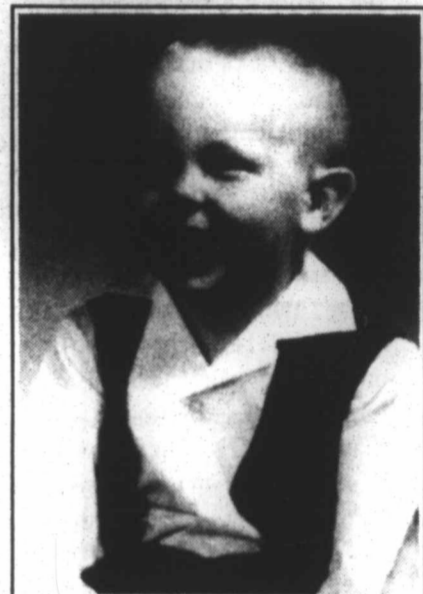

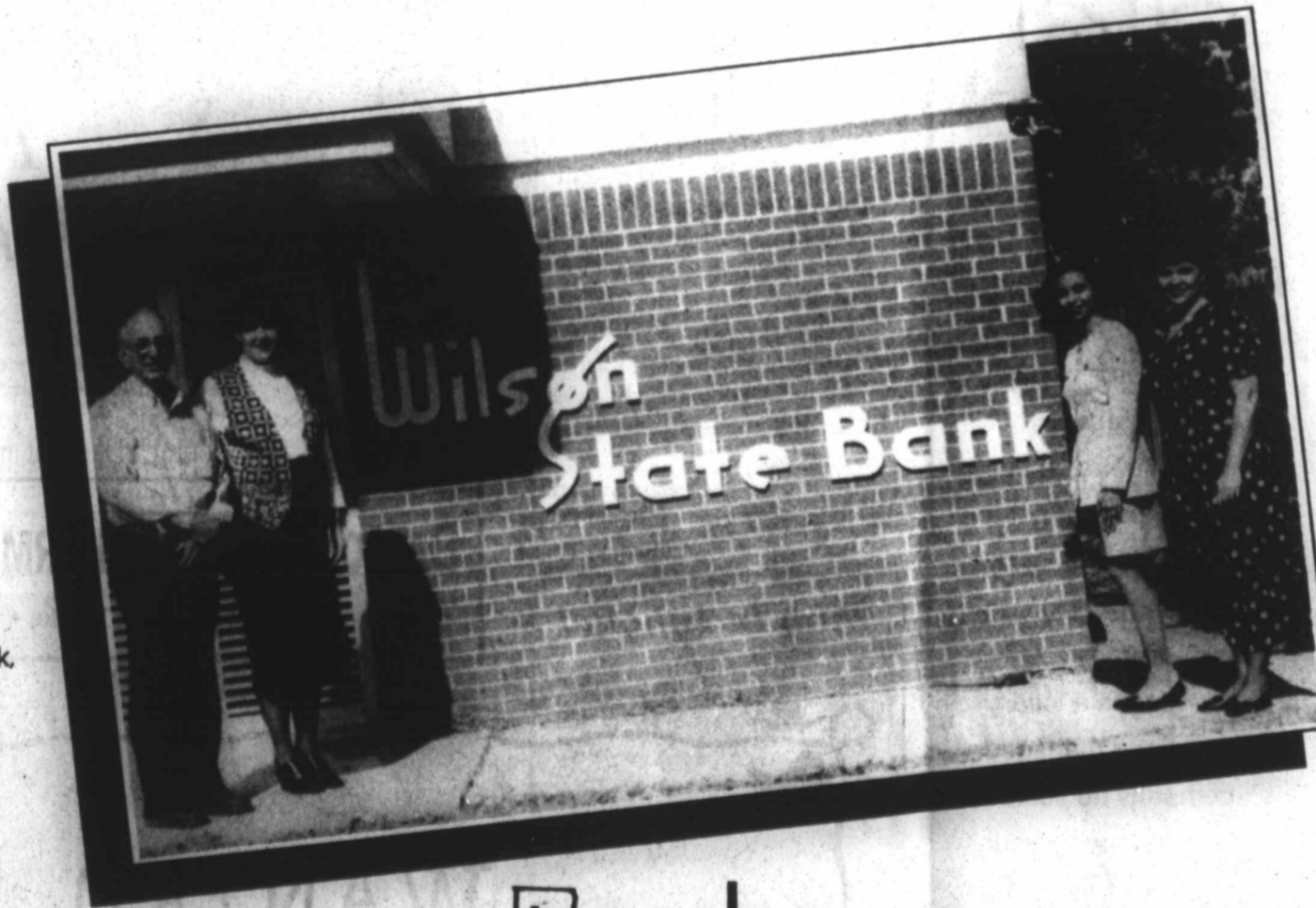

I had the privilege today of being allowed to spend about two hours in the Tahoka High School visiting with Coach Hinds, Mrs. Stennett, and Mrs. Ehlers concerning some computer and multimedia equipment. I say privilege because I was amazed by the dress and the conduct of the students in Tahoka; students of which you should be exceptionally proud. My company works extensively with schools of all sizes throughout west Texas and seldom have I ever felt compelled to make an effort to praise any of them, but

Tahoka impressed me more than words can say.

There were three things that really set your school apart that I saw in the short time I was there. First, a large number of students were dressed in either slacks and a tie or a dress/skirt of some type. I was told that this was due to it being the day of a basketball game and that the coaches required it. Still, I found it very sharp and I know from a similar experience that it builds a sense of respect and self esteem.

Second, the students seemed to respect themselves, others, and their surroundings. With this in mind, please consider this a compliment to yourselves as parents, the staff (from the school board to the custodians) who are helping to build higher standards, and the students themselves. I would be proud to be a part of a community such as yours and sincerely hope that my children will one day honor me as yours have you.

Child Safety Seat Questions Answered

Child safety seats really do work. Children, especially those under the age of 5, are vulnerable in collisions because of the size and shape of their bodies. Safety seats are designed to spread the forces of a crash over more of the body for front-facing toddlers, and cradle the fragile neck and back of rear-facing infants.

Child safety seats are the most effective occupant-protection devices used in motor vehicles today. If used correctly, they are 71 percent effective in reducing fatalities in children under the age of 5 and 69 percent effective in reducing the need for hospitalization. Unfortunately, parents often do not know the basic WHO, WHAT, WHERE, WHEN, WHY, and HOW of child safety seats.

WHO should use a child safety seat? Texas law requires all children aged 2 and under be restrained in a child safety seat or in a seat belt.

A parent may ask WHAT kind of safety seat should be used. All children should be restrained in a safety seat that is appropriate for age and weight, and also meets federal safety standards. Infants up to 20 pounds should ride facing the rear of the vehicle in infant-only or convertible seats. Children weighing about 20-40 pounds should ride facing forward in convertible safety seats. Children who have outgrown their convertible seat should ride in a belt-positioning booster until adult belts fit them properly. Older children wear vehicle safety belts and keep the lap belt low and snug across the hips. The belt must not ride up over the abdomen, and the shoulder belt must not cross the face or front of the neck.

WHERE should a child safety seat be placed in the car? The back seat is the safest place for all children to ride. Never place a rear-facing

infant seat in the front seat of a vehicle with a passenger-side air bag. A passenger-side air bag could strike the back of the seat and seriously injure or kill a baby. If a toddler convertible seat must be placed in the front seat of a vehicle, move the seat position back as far as possible from the dashboard.

WHEN should a child safety seat be used? Use a safety seat every time on every trip. Do not make the deadly mistake of using a car seat only on freeways or for long trips. Most car crashes happen within 25 miles of home. If a child rides with friends, relatives or babysitters, be sure the driver has correctly installed the safety seat and that it is used properly every time the child is in the car. Older children will likely have the habit of buckling up on every ride if this has been expected from birth.

Many parents often ask WHY should safety seats be used. It's the law in Texas for children under 4 to be restrained. Motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of death and injury for children ages 1-5 in the United States. Correct use can save lives and injuries. In a crash or sudden stop, an unbuckled adult holding a baby can crush the child into the windshield or dashboard.

There are many different types of seats and they all seem to install differently. It is important that parents know HOW to properly install child safety seats into motor vehicles. Parents must read their vehicle owner's manual and child safety seat use instructions very carefully. A special locking clip may be necessary to hold your vehicle safety belt in place so you can anchor your safety seats properly.

Save Labels For Tahoka Elementary

Tahoka Elementary students will be learning their ABC's with the help of Campbell Soup Company in the Labels for Education program through the PRIDE Corps and coordination by teacher Kathy Druessedow.

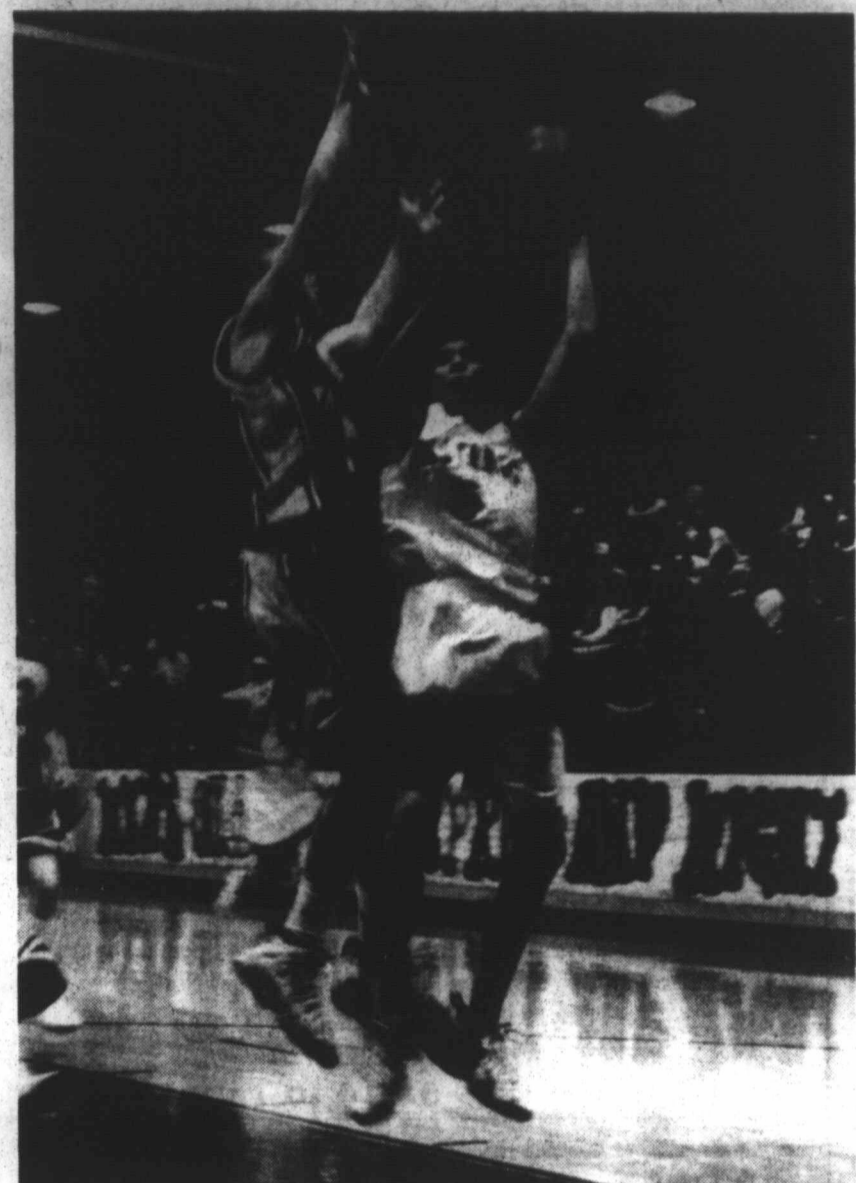

PUBLIC NOTICE

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge.

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential customers and \$7 per line for business customers.

Southwestern Bell estimates that the 26 cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does not approve it.

The PUC assigned Docket Number 18513 to this proceeding. The deadline for intervention in this matter is March 31, 1998. Esta ley permite que las compañías telefónicas recuperen los costos no pagados mediante cargos a clientes, a través de un cargo a todos los demás clientes en el estado que no reciben el servicio ELC o que no pagan la tarifa máxima del servicio ELC. La tarifa máxima mensual permitida por la ley estatal es \$3.50 por línea para clientes con servicio residencial y \$7 por línea para clientes con servicio comercial.

Southwestern Bell calcula que los 26 centavos al mes por línea cubrirán los \$27 millones del costo anual del servicio ELC que no está cubierto por las tarifas de ELC.

Si la PUC autoriza el cargo mensual estatal de 26 centavos al mes por línea éste comenzará a partir de los ciclos de facturación de abril 1998, con el acuerdo de reembolsar todo o parte del cargo si la PUC no lo autoriza.
