

Four Of County's Basketball **Teams Playing In Bi-District**

Tahoka, Wilson and O'Donnell boys and New Home's varsity girls all qualified for basketball playoff games this week and next week, with Wilson boys winning district and the other three teams all in runner-up positions.

Coach Hunter Cooley's Tahoka Bulldogs, who advanced to the final round of four at Austin last season, draws a tough assignment facing District 6-AA winner Stanton, who lost just one player off last season's team which barely was beaten by Tahoka in the playoffs. Stanton this year is 10-0 in district play and 15-1 for the season, shortened by the fact that the Buffaloes' football team won state.

Tahoka is 7-3 for the district and 18-11 for the year. The Bulldogs are runners-up to Shallowater, Dist. 5-AA winner. Leading scorer for Tahoka is Rocky Moore, averaging 22.1 points per game.

The bi-district playoff game will be at Lamesa High School gymnasium at 7 p.m. next Friday, Feb. 27. The gym faces east and is located in the 600-block of N. 14th St. in Lamesa. Tahoka will be the home team. Tickets are \$4 for adults and \$2 for students.

Tahoka will play a practice game at 7 p.m. this Thursday in Forsan, against Bronte.

Moore has scored 641 points this season. Brad Pebsworth has scored 340, an average of 11.7 per game, and Adrian Graves has 271 points and a 9.3 average. Moore also leads rebounds with 7.9 per game, followed by Pebsworth with 6.3, Graves with 6.1 and Sedrick Williams with 4.7.

O'Donnell and Wilson boys teams will play each other, at 7 p.m. next Tuesday, Feb. 24, in Lubbock Cooper High School gym. The Wilson boys, coached by Bruce Hirt and led in scoring by Karl Platte with 21 points per game, was unbeaten in Dist. 10-A, winning all six league games, and has posted a 25-3 record for the year so far. Steve Johnston, a junior, and his brother, Michael Johnston, a senior, each is averaging 15 points per game, and Steve averages 8 rebounds per game, as does Casey Donald.

The Eagles of Coach Kevin James at O'Donnell won the right to get into the playoffs as the runner-up in district play by beating Smyer 57-51 last week. Both those teams had 3-3 district records prior to the Eagles' victory. O'Donnell is now 4-3 in district and 14-13 overall.

Coach James, in his fourth year at O'Donnell, said his team is well balanced, with all players fairly equal in scoring and rebounding. Leading scorer is junior guard Manny Gutierrez, averaging 14 points per game. Senior post Cody Dorman averages 12 points per game.

New Home girls, coached by Treasure Thaggard, were ousted from the playoff picture Tuesday night as talented Whiteface beat New Home 90-54 in a bi-district game at Seagraves. The Lady Leopards were co-champions of Dist. 10-A with Meadow, which won a playoff game to determine No. 1 seeding in the playoffs, 48-36.

Against Whiteface, Misty Swartz scored 21 points for New Home, while J'Lynn Clem had 12 and Jami Burrow scored 10. New Home finished the season with a record of 16-11.

In Lynn County, candidates filing for local offices have all filed on the Democratic Party ticket, with no local races in the Republican Primary election.

The only contested race in Lynn County will be for the Justice of the Peace Precinct 1 position, where four candidates have filed, including Theresa (Terri) Walker, Mary Beth McKibben, Donald (Shorty) Williams, and Larry Monk.

All other local races are uncontested, with incumbents seeking re-election. They include: George H. Hansard, District Judge, 106th Judicial District; Sandra Laws, District Clerk; J.F. Brandon, County Judge; Susan Tipton, County Clerk; Janet Porterfield, County Treasurer; Wayne Noland, Justice of the Peace,

Early voting for the Republican Pct. 4; Mike Braddock, Commissioner, Pct. 2; and J.T. Miller, Commissioner, Pct. 4.

In a larger scope, State Rep. David Counts is seeking re-election, uncontested in the Democratic Primary, but he is expected to face Republican candidate Scott McLaughlin in the general election. U.S. Representative District 13 seat has two candidates in the Democratic Primary, Mark Harmon and Ed True, and on the Republican Party ticket incumbent Mac Thornberry faces candidate Richard Amon.

Garry Mauro is uncontested on the Democratic ticket for the Governor seat, and should face incumbent Gov. George W. Bush in the November general election. Bush, however, faces candidate R.C. Crawford in the Republican Primary.

There are also three Propositions on the ballot, regarding health maintenance organizations, sales tax on food and medicine, and a plan to etter recruit/retain qualified teachers in Texas classrooms and comuter accessibility for public schools.

Administrative Contracts Renewed; **School Trustee Election Set May 2**

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met Thursday night in a 6-1/2 hour meeting, renewing administrative contracts and employee health insurance, contracting with a new school attorney, setting the school trustee election date, and conducting other routine business for the school. Prior to the 7 o'clock meeting, trustees and school officials met with State Representative David Counts and visiting superintendents, Larry Coffman of Borger, Paul Smith of Quanah, and Bob Pheil of Haskell, in a dinner meeting.

Rep. Counts spoke briefly about the importance of having west Texas delegates in Austin, noting that the rural representatives worked hard together to do what's right for rural communities, regardless of party lines, especially regarding education issues where what's good for big cities is not necessarily what's best for rural communities.

"You have something worth fighting for here," Counts told the group. "I grew up in a rural community, and was educated in a small school, and I believe that the school districts in the rural counties I represent are doing a very good job of educating our children," he added.

The three visiting superintendents also spoke briefly to the group, saying they were impressed with the district after visiting with TISD Superintendent David Hutton during the day. Hutton and the other superintendents were all chosen to attend the

Superintendents Academy, and visiting the campuses of each others' districts to share problem-solving techniques and solutions is one of the benefits of the academy. At the board meeting, adminis-

trative contracts were extended by one year, giving two-year contracts to all three campus principals and the athletic director/assistant principal. Salary increases for the next school year were also approved unanimously by trustees, including a \$3,000 pay raise for high school principal Jimmy Parker, making his salary \$53,500; a \$3,000 pay increase for elementary principal Ronald Roberts, making his salary \$47,500; a \$4,000 pay increase due to the certification of middle school principal Glo Hays, making her salary \$43,000; and a \$3,000 pay raise to Athletic Director/Assistant Principal Troy Hinds, making his salary \$43,000.

After some discussion, trustees went with the recommendation of an employee committee on employee health insurance, renewing the current policy with Blue Cross/Blue Shield and raising the deductible from \$500 to \$750. The district will absorb the premium increase for employees, amounting to approximately \$10 per month per employee, but employees are responsible for dependant coverage premiums, which will increase about \$16 per month.

Trustees voted to contract with local attorney W. Calloway Huffaker to represent the school district on legal issues, unanimously approving a monthly retainer fee of \$750. In discussion prior to the motion, trustees cited the advantages of having a local attorney, including having Huffaker attend several board meetings as needed during the year, unlimited local access, and the fact that a local representative would be privy to local political issues and concerns. Currently, the district contracts with an Austin legal firm, Schwartz & Eichelbaum, P.C. Huffaker's contract will begin March 1.

The school trustee election was set for May 2, to elect trustees to places 1, 2 and 5, and the board appointed Jackie Stephens as election judge, Dean Bartley as alternate judge, and Jerry Webster as early voting judge. Trustees whose terms are expiring include Juanell Jones (Place 1), Joe Calvillo (Place 2), and Carmen Chapa (Place 5).

Candidates interested in filing for the election should contact the School Business Office in the Harvick Educational Building, 2129 N. Main. The filing period opened Monday, Feb. 16, and closes March 18. School trustees are not required to live in the district precinct which they represent, but only those residents who live in those precincts may vote in the

Several routine agenda items were approved by trustees, including an agreement with the Education Service Center for telecommunica-

tions transmission capabilities; appointment of Ken Eudy as the School Lunch and Child Nutrition Program Director; and permission for the sale of used school equipment through a public auction after a public notice is published.

Rev. Mary Gregory and Ron Fant addressed the board, presenting information on a "Character Counts": seminar which will be offered locally on Feb. 21 at the Life Enrichment Center. They encouraged board members and other civic leaders to attend ? the session which would provide practical applications for building good character traits in community mem-Tahoka Police Officer Larry

Dodd presented his monthly report to the board on school-related issues, reporting one arrest of a high school student on assault charges, four criminal contacts with no charges filed, ic. and 12 non-criminal contacts on disciplinary issues. He reported one traffic violation contact (no ticket issued), and one information report each on a narcotics violation, and an assault. He estimated 53 other nonconfrontational student contacts during the month, and reported attending 16 athletic events.

Currently, he said he is establishing a list of students who are interested in attending a teen citizens police academy, which will be held at a later date. Officer Dodd also noted that the police department will have a new narcotics-search dog in approximately two weeks, and said future K-9 narcotics searches at the school will be coordinated with other law enforcement agencies and several K-9. units will assist in the continued search for illegal substances.

Business Manager Loretta Tekell reported an account balance in allfunds of \$2,563,713.13, and monthly bills were approved as presented. Campus principals presented monthly reports, as did Athletic Director Troy Hinds and Counselor Sherri McCord, as well as Supt. Hutton.



"Character Counts," a free seminar which will offer practical ways to teach the six basics of character, will be presented in Tahoka Saturday, Feb. 21 at the Life Enrichment Center. DPS Not Associated With Fund-Raisers

Although some law enforcement associations may claim to be raising money on behalf of the Texas Department of Public Safety, they are not affiliated with the agency. The DPS does not benefit from funds the groups and their professional telemarketers raise.

"Over the years, we have gotten numerous questions and complaints from Texas citizens regarding telephone solicitations by law enforcement associations," said Col. Dudley M. Thomas, director of DPS. "The DPS does not solicit financial contributions from private citizens. We receive our funding from the Texas Legislature."

Some organizations solicit funds using names similar to those of the DPS, including "Texas Rangers," "State Troopers," "Texas Highway Patrol" or "Department of Public Safety." While some DPS officers may be members of these organizations on their own time, these associations are not affiliated with the DPS, Thomas said. They raise money to fund their own programs, some of which may benefit officers and fami-

The 75th Texas Legislature enacted a law that requires these organizations to clarify that they are not part of the DPS and prohibits them from implying that the money they raise will go to the DPS. In addition, solicitors cannot use names, symbols or statements that are similar to those used by the Texas Department of Public Safety or the Texas Rangers to confuse or mislead someone who is being asked to give money.

DPS has created an informational brochure about law enforcement solicitation for Texas citizens and has established a recorded information line on this topic (512-424-5588).

January Warmer, **Drier Than Usual**

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of January was significantly warmer and drier than normal, according to information from the National Weather Service in Lubbock.

Temperatures averaged 4.9 degrees above normal and ranged from 3.2 degrees above normal at Spur to 6.2 degrees above normal at Brownfield.

Precipitation averaged 0.431 inch below normal and ranged from 0.7 inch below normal at Post to 0.55 inch above normal at Snyder.

The only snowfall reported for the month was 0.25 inch at Paducah on Jan. 8.

Tahoka's average temperature for January was 44.7 degrees. No precipitation fell during the month.



Sharp Delivers February Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered a total of \$290.5 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,090 Texas cities and 118 counties, and noted that holiday shoppers kept cash registers ringing steadily for most retailers across the state.


This month's payments to Texas cities and counties include sales taxes collected by monthly filers at the height of holiday shopping in December, and reported to the Comptroller in January, plus quarterly returns for sales in October, November, and December, and all yearly filings for 1997.

Lynn County received a total of \$15,919.00 this period as opposed to \$11,058.28 for the same period last year, for an increase of 43.95 percent.

Tahoka received an increase of 38.14%, receiving \$11,192.34 this year versus \$8,101.68 last year. O'Donnell showed a gain of 62.78%, receiving \$3,598.23 this year as opposed to \$2,210.40 last year. Wilson received \$1,128.43 this year versus \$746.18 last year for an increase of 51.22 percent.

TDA Warns Parents, Pet Owners Of Poisoned-Laced Baits In New Home

The Texas Department of Agriculture recently warned parents, pet owners and homeowners in the New Home area of Lynn County to be on the lookout for illegal meat baits laced with pesticides. TDA issued this warning following several animal deaths that have occurred in and around the New Home area over the last few months.

Recent necropsy results of two cats revealed traces of Aldicarb, the active ingredient of a cotton insecticide known as Temik. The pesticide is apparently being put in meat as bait for animals. However, the poisoned meat has also been left in areas where children could have access.

TDA is currently conducting an

investigation to determine the person or persons responsible for these acts. All findings in TDA's investigation will be shared with local law enforcement officials.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is the lead state agency responsible for enforcing federal and state pesticide laws in Texas. Using a pesticide in a manner inconsistent with the label is illegal. In addition to any criminal penalties, violators can

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge.

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential customers and \$7 per line for business customers.

Southwestern Bell estimates that the 26 cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does



Air Bags Could Pose Dangers For Children

Air bags are standard equipment in almost all new cars and are designed to supplement the protection provided by safety belts in frontal crashes. Federal safety standards require that all new passenger cars and light trucks be equipped with both driver and passenger-side air bags by 1999. While air bags have a good overall safety record and have saved more than 2,000 lives as of the end of 1997, they pose several risks for chil-

An infant in a rear-facing safety

seat must never be placed in the front seat of a motor vehicle with a passenger-side air bag. During a forward impact, the rapidly inflating air bag could strike the safety seat with enough force to seriously injure or kill the infant. Infants under the age of 11 months and who weigh less than 20 pounds must ride in a rearfacing safety seat placed in the back seat of the vehicle, especially if the vehicle is equipped with a passengerside air bag.

Forward-facing safety seats, as used with toddlers and older children, typically place children several inches closer to the dashboard than the normal adult seating position. Therefore, the safest practice is to place all child safety seats in the back seat of the vehicle. If it is absolutely necessary to place a forward-facing safety seat in the front of a vehicle with a passenger-side air bag, the

vehicle seat should be adjusted as far back as possible from the dashboard.

Air bags pose special hazards: for any children who ride unrestrained or incorrectly restrained in the front; seat. Like all occupants, children should always be properly restrained in safety seats or safety belts. Unfortunately, surveys indicate that as many as 35 percent of young children ride unrestrained. Pre-crash braking may throw an unrestrained child against the dashboard at or near the passenger air bag location. When this happens, the inflating air bag and its casing cover can violently impact the out-of-place child with such force that it can injure or even kill the child. The safest place for all children is correctly restrained in the back seat of the vehicle.

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To ensure that your children ride safely, remember these rules:

. The back seat is the safest place: for children of any age to ride.

· Never place an infant in the front seat of a car equipped with a passenger-side air bag.

· Infants must always ride in the back seat facing the rear of the car.

· Make sure everyone is buckled up. Unbuckled occupants can be hurt or killed by an air bag.





Crop Insurance Closing Dates Approaching Fast

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman recently reminded producers of spring-planted crops that the deadline to buy federal crop insurance is fast approaching. Producers must decide which crops to insure and which level of coverage to ob-

tain, before this date; which is Feb. 28 in some areas and March 15 in others.

"Knee-deep snows in the south and flooding in the west are vivid reminders of the unpredictable weather risks farmers face each year," said Glickman. "USDA's ability to help farmers following a crop loss depends entirely on the choices they make prior to the sales closing dates. Most need crop insurance. In fact, I have just written a letter to former policyholders asking them to reconsider their choice to not insure."

Producers interested in buying crop insurance should contact a crop insurance agent. A listing of crop insurance agents is found in all local USDA Farm Service Agency offices. Sales closing dates vary by crop and location.

Even with satellites, radar and computers, Mother Nature still slips things by us – like El Niño. Some scientists who spend their careers tracking this type of elusive weather system admit they missed the early signs of El Niño. This has the climate research community taking a hard look at the models it uses to predict weather because some of the most reliable totally missed the event.

If there's indication an El Niño is on the way, then climatologists have the challenging task of predicting how it will affect global weather patterns. This is particularly difficult because scientists don't completely understand all the complex interactions between the ocean and the atmosphere that create climate in an El Niño year. To top it off, each year brings different interactions so each El Niño doesn't behave like the one before.

Scientists are confident that with better weather pattern observation and improving technology, their ability to predict the development and outcome of an El Niño will continue to improve. And because history – and weather – repeats itself, scientists will have a chance to prove that. An El Niño occurs about every seven years.

Of course even with better technology, folks in agriculture know it's best to remember the words of one very humble climatologist who admitted, "there are limits to prediction no matter how smart we are."

Redwine Murderer Captured, On Trial Biggest Man-Hunt In Plains History Follows Up Slaying

Jury Completed Thursday For Trial of Elmo Banks; Big Crowd Throngs City Thursday; Taking of Evidence Will Be Started Friday Morning at 9:00 O'clock.

Elmo Banks, 43, charged with the murder of Deputy Sheriff F.E. Redwine on Friday night of last week, went to trial in district court shortly after 10 o'clock Thursday morning, a little less than six days after the alleged crime was committed. The entire day was spent in the selection of a jury. A venire of 100 men had been summoned and more than half of these were questioned before a jury was procured.

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The jury consists of the following named gentlemen: G.G. Aycox of Tahoka, Ed Cook of Wells, Otis Harris of O'Donnell, Douglas Finley of near Wayside Station, Robert Hagler of Southland, Geo. Ingram residing west of Tahoka, Jim Burleson of Tahoka, L.F. Craft of Tahoka, Lee Short of Dixie, Anton Ahrens of Wilson, Brooks Smith of Petty, and T.I. Hammonds of Edith.

Judge J.E. Garland of Lamesa is presiding in the absence of District Judge Bordon B. McGuire, who is sick. The State is represented in the trial by District Attorney Truett Smith and County Attorney C.H. Cain. The Court appointed Hon. Tom Garrard and Hon. B.P. Maddox to represent the defendant.

The taking of evidence will begin at 9 o'clock Friday morning. Crowds jammed the court room all day Thursday, while scores of others, unable to gain entrance, milled around the corridors and up and down the stairways, eager to gain every iota of information as to the progress of the proceedings. Many officers were present to guard against any possible demonstration.

When arraigned in court the ... accused of the crime pleaded not guilty, and he has sat stolidly in his place all day listening to the proceedings, after which he was carried back to Lubbock, under heavy guard for safe-keeping during the night.

Banks' crime was the most heinous and dastardly ever committed in Lynn county.

When Mr. Redwine went up to the jail, which is on the fourth floor of the courthouse, to transfer the [accused] and two other prisoners from the "run-around" to the cells, the ... fiend watched his chances, caught the officer off his guard for a moment, wrested the pistol from Redwine's pocket or his hand, and began firing into his body.

No Eye-Witnesses

Mr. Redwine had just locked two ... men in their cells when the assault was made. The cell walls cut off their view and no eye saw the murderous attack except the eyes of the murderer and his victim, but the other prisoners heard the struggle and then the several pistol shots as

other prisoners heard the struggle and then the several pistol shots as they rang out in rapid succession. They heard, too, Mr. Redwine beg the [accused] not to shoot, even while the firing continued....

Clyde Jones, the janitor, was the only person in the court house when the tragedy occurred. Hearing the shots while down in the

when the tragedy occurred. Hearing the shots while down in the basement, Jones ran up the stairs, evidently about the time the [accused] came down another flight of stairs, and approached Redwine just as he was in the act of falling at the foot of the stairs that lead from the jail down to the hallway adjacent to the district courtroom. While Jones was rendering such assistance as he could, others who had heard the shots, began to arrive and the news spread rapidly.

Accompanied by Brown Bishop and C.R. Riley, Borden Davis took the wounded man to the Lubbock Sanitarium in the Harris & Applewhite ambulance.

There the many wounds were treated and dressed and everything possible was done to save his life, but he died soon after 3 o'clock Saturday morning. He was conscious almost to the very end and made brief statements to several respecting the... murderous attack.

Posse Formed Early

As soon as the news of the ... assault and escape spread over town, excited crowds gathered and soon an organized hunt for the criminal was begun. Peace officers all over this section of West Texas were notified, news of the crime and description of the killer was broadcast over longwave and police short-wave radio, and in a few hours the town was full of officers. Sheriff Parker himself was on the way to Huntsville to deliver four prisoners to the penitentiary. He was intercepted at Fort Worth and notified of the crime by telephone, and he hurried back to Tahoka. Sheriff W.F. Cato of Garza county and Jack Reeves of the State Highway Patrol directed search for the fugitive until Parker's arrival.

Search Is Thorough

All night long, and all day Saturday, and far into the night again, grim-faced men hunted for the fugitive. The man-hunters got on his track Friday night just south of town, but a light rain greatly hampered them in the search. Saturday, fresher tracks were found down at Guthrie Lake, and in the afternoon bloodhounds were put on the trail, which led westward, but another shower and hail storm obliterated the tracks to a great extent. Hundreds of men continued the search, however, but progress was slow and clues as to the fugitive's course were of doubtful value. Center of the late afternoon and night search was the Three Lakes community......

[The accused] appeared at the home of W.B. Cook at Wells about fifteen miles southwest of Tahoka and called for matches and cigarettes. Mr. Cook accompanied the [accused] to the store, which was only a short distance away, and procured for him the desired articles, whereupon the [accused] left. Cook then telephoned to Deputy Sheriff John Johnson at O'Donnell and Johnson with two companions hastened to the Wells store. There they were joined by Cook, and the four men located the [accused] beside the road a mile east and a quarter mile south of the store. As the party approached, the [accused] threw up his hands and surrendered without offering any violence or resistance. In his possession was Redwine's pistol, containing three shells...


