

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# **Cotton Workshops Offer Farmers Help In Managing Price Risks**

A farmer may not be able to control price, but he can control how and when he prices his crop, say agricultural economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The cotton farmer can take advantage of profitable pricing opportunities only if he is prepared to evaluate the various alternatives," said Dr. Jackie Smith, professor and Extension Service economist.

To help area farmers evaluate such opportunities, the Extension Service will hold a series of one-day, in-depth introductory cotton marketing workshops. The programs will be March 30 at Plainview, April 1 at Levelland, April 2 and Friona and April 3 at Seminole.

These educational programs support a statewide risk management initiative funded by the Texas legis-

Topics which will be covered in each workshop are an overview of price rick management, introduction to futures, localizing the futures-basis, introduction to options, estimating costs of production, comparison of pricing alternatives, developing a marketing plan, the cotton situation and outlook, and organizing a marketing club.

# Ag Day Is March 20th

On March 20th of this year, America will celebrate Ag Day. Ag Day is part of the Agriculture Council of America's celebration of National Agriculture Week, March 15-21. Organizers are using Ag Day to make the American public more aware of the enormous contributions of the U.S. agriculture industry.

"The United States is at the top of the worldwide agriculture market," said Bob Stallman, President of the Texas Farm Bureau. "Ag Day is an opportunity to make the public aware of the incredible impact agriculture has every day in our society, as well as celebrate the outstanding achievements of American farmers and ranchers."

Ag Day's 1998 theme is "Growing Tomorrows." This theme points to the increasing demand that will be placed on agriculture in the future. With the world's population at 5.5 billion today, it is expected to soar to 7.9 billion by the 2020. Agriculture's ability to produce more and more food will be critical for this growing population.

Fortunately, America's farmers and ranchers have already made great progress in increasing productivity. For example, in 1960 the average farmer fed 25.8 people. By 1994, however, the average American farmer has increased his productivity five times, feeding 129 people both in the U.S. and abroad.

"Despite the booming population, American agriculture is up to the task," Stallman said. "Modern farming practices and state-of-theart technology have allowed American farmers and ranchers to produce more food than ever before on fewer

Recent advances such as precision farming are playing a big role in increasing farm productivity. Sophisticated Global Positioning Systems help reduce waste by using satellites and computers to map out a field and let the farmer know exactly where and when he needs to plant seeds, apply fertilizer and crop protection chemicals. This not only increases crop yield, but saves money and protects the environment.

Biogenetics have also increased the amount of food that each plant produces. Geneticists isolate desirable plant traits (such as disease resistance) and incorporate them into new plants, resulting in much higher crop yields.

Ranchers have also used technology to produce leaner cuts of beef. Today's beef has 27 percent less fat than in 1985.

Farmers and ranchers have also worked hard to preserve the land. Farmers have employed contour farming (planting crops around hillsides rather than up and down) and reduced tillage practices to prevent erosion. Ranchers have addressed erosion by making use of sod waterways, diversions, and catch basins.

Technological advances have helped boost agriculture to become America's top export, with average sales of \$52 billion annually. In addition, the agriculture industry employs over 22 million Americans who produce, sell and trade the nation's food and fiber. By the year 2000, agriculture is expected to generate one-quarter of the U.S. Gross Domestic Product.

Precipitation averaged .88 inches above normal and ranged from 0.3 degrees above normal at Jayton to

2.26 inches above normal at Dimmitt. Snowfall averaged .64 inches across the South Plains and ranged from 3 inches at both Silverton and Tulia to a trace at several locations.

Tahoka's average temperature for the month was 44.2 degrees, with no snow and total precipitation of 1.26 inches.

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above named City of Tahoka has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (P.L. 91-190). The reason for such a decision not to prepare such Statement is based upon the fact that all environmental concerns could either be minimized or mitigated.

An Environmental Review Record for the proposed project has been made by the City of Tahoka which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the office of the City Administrator, City of Tahoka, 1612 Lockwood, Tahoka, Texas 79373 and is available for public examination and copying upon request between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

**Public Comments on Finding** All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City to the address set forth above. Such written comments must be received at the address specified within sixteen (16) days after this publication. All such comments so received will be considered and the City will not request the release of funds or take any administrative action on the project prior to the date specified in the

preceding sentence. The City of Tahoka will undertake the project described above with Community Development Block Grant under Title I from its program year 1998 under grant numbered 717230/ 718230 from the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Tahoka is certifying to TDHCA that Mike Mensch, in his official capacity as Mayor, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been

satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Tahoka may use the Block Grant funds and it will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. TDHCA will accept an objection to its approval only on one or more of the bases and the procedures described in 24 CFR Part 58.75. Objections are to be addressed to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, P.O. Box 13941, Austin, Objections to the release of funds on bases other than one of those stated above will not be

considered by TDHCA. No objection received later than thirty-three (33) days after this publication will be considered by TDHCA. The Chief Executive Officer of the City of Tahoka

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
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# Circus Shows **Set Here Next Thursday**
