Man Hurt In Chase **As Gunshots Fired**

Gunshots were fired and a 28year-old Tahoka man was injured in a chase between two vehicles carrying persons involved in an altercation in the south part of town around 2 a.m. Sunday.

Ricky Barrientez, driver of one of the cars, identified in the police report only as a blue Chevrolet Chevelle, was treated at Lynn County Hospital and later moved to Lubbock University Medical Center after his vehicle overturned at S. 3rd St. and Ave. L, allegedly after it was struck from behind by a pickup driven by a 29-year-old Tahoka man.

No arrests had been made by Wednesday, and police are continuing to investigate the incident. Barrientez apparently was not critically injured in the accident, but reportedly had a broken jaw and broken collar bone.

W.H. Eudy told police Thursday that someone took a battery charger and smoke detector from his garage on S. 1st St. The stolen items were valued at \$42.




The couple plans to marry June 27 in the First Baptist Church of Abernathy.

A salary increase for the Lynn County Hospital Administrator was approved by the Board of Directors at the Lynn County Hospital District's monthly board meeting last Thursday. Directors approved a \$2000 pay raise for Hospital Administrator Louise Landers, an action which raised her annual salary to \$50,000.

In other business, directors discussed the possibility of implementing a cost of living adjustment for employee salaries, but took no action, deciding to continue using the merit system for determining employee pay increases.

Discussion was continued on physician recruitment opportunities for the hospital, and directors instructed Mrs. Landers to concentrate on searching for a Board Certified Family Practice physician for the hospital. Previously, some physicians being reviewed for recruitment by the board had specialized training fields. The two physicians currently on staff at the hospital, Dr. Donald Freitag and Dr. Griff Thomas, are Board Certified Family Practice physicians.

Present at the meeting were all seven directors, including Virginia Griffing, Peggy Morton, Billy Tomlinson, Jimmy Dorman, Norman Ledbetter, Mike Rivas and Jerry Ford, as well as Mrs. Landers.





Something old and something new - when it comes to computers, there's new, there's old, and there's obsolete. Tahoka Middle School is using every computer that still has life in its microchips as they enter into a new lifelong commitment computer literacy.

The school is keeping both old and new computers in use as they focus on expanding technology instruction this semester. Computer literacy is becoming a top priority for Tahoka Middle School students. Every computer will serve a purpose in the curriculum where there is about one computer to every four students.

Glo Hays, middle school principal, said the school is using every ble resource to keep all ce ers in use. She said it is important for students to be able to see both newer

and older technology. "We're not throwing away computers that are slower in relation to the newer computers," Mrs. Hays

daily. They work on a variety of programs including accelerated reader tests, SkillsBank to improve math and language arts skills, keyboarding, research projects and other classroom assignments.

Another Macintosh lab was recently developed utilizing computers from the elementary campus and networking accessories from a previous high school computer lab. The only expense in opening the lab was buying furniture for the computers, the principal explained.

Administrators say the keyboarding lab will enable every middle school student to enter high school with essential technical skills.

In addition to the two compute with a computer. Math, language arts and social studies classrooms have access to class-specific software to enable students to extend specific lessons. Journalism classes use the computers to make a school newspaper. Teachers use their computers for classroom management including calculating grades and making les-

Joe Hays CPA firm donated six, personal computers to the science. departments. Administrators and teachers have utilized previouslyused equipment and software from high school science classrooms. They, also used monitors from storage to complete the systems. The science labs are now up to date with minimal financial investment.

The middle school also has three laptop computers that are easily rotated from classroom to classroom.

High school computer teacher, Angie Ehlers, worked in coordinating the systems. A high school technology class is doing all the wiring to connect the middle and high school into a network. When networked, students will be able to access their files the hard drive on all com in the school without using a disk.

The high school computer lab! will soon open for high school curriculum and access to community members. Mrs. Hays said that in time teachers and parents could exchange electronic mail (e-mail) in tracking; student progress, among other others.

Computer technology is here to stay... and it's expensive. But by utilizing past and present computer purchases, Tahoka I.S.D. is aiming to: keep its student population in touch with the ever-changing world of microchip technology.

Jana Nafzger of Tahoka and Glen Phipps of Lamesa were named Conservation Teacher of the Year and Absentee Conservation Farmer of the Year, respectively, at the 18th Annual Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) Awards Banquet held last Thursday.

Phipps, who owns 553 and operates an additional 933 acres in the Wells area, lives in Lamesa. He was selected for the award of Outstanding Absentee Conservation Farmer of Lynn County by the Lynn County SWCD because he incorporates many conservation practices in his farm-

ing, and is an avid believer in conservation of the land and water.

He was raised on a farm in the Welch community in Dawson County. After graduation from Dawson High School at Welch, he earned a Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Education from Texas Tech University in 1977. In 1973, he started farming with a quarter of a section at Wells in Lynn County.

Following graduation from college, Phipps initiated a full-time farming operation in Dawson County. He also continued to farm the quarter at Wells. In 1992 Phipps increased the acreage he farmed in Lynn County when his uncle retired.

He and his wife, Velda, live in Lamesa, where they are members of the First Baptist Church. They have two daughters, Tandi, a student at South Plains College, and Traci, a student at Lamesa High School.

The SWCD named Jana Nafzger

as Outstanding Conservation Teacher of the Year because of her philosophy about natural resources and promoting conservation education and awareness in the classroom. She has been a teacher with the Tahoka Independent School District for seven years, teaching in the second, third, and fourth grades.

She has a background in farming, as she was raised on a farm in Olton, where her parents owned and operated 1200 acres of cotton, corn and soybeans.

"Our natural resources are of utmost importance to the welfare of our children and their children," says Ms. Nafzger. "The land itself is one of our most valuable resources. This is much more evident here in the South Plains of Texas where we are so dependent upon what the land gives us.

Sharp Delivers Sales Tax Rebates Totaling \$163.3 Million

State Comptroller John Sharp recently delivered a total of \$163.3 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,090 Texas cities and 118 counties, an 8 percent increase over the \$151.2 million allocated to cities and counties in March 1997.

"Texas continues — for the fifth consecutive year — to experience strong economic growth, while consumer confidence remains the highest in the nation," Sharp said. "Sales statewide for the past several months have surpassed earlier expectations and far exceeded sales in the previous year."

Sharp delivered monthly sales tax rebates totaling \$147.8 million to Texas cities, 7.1 percent higher than last March's payments of \$137.8 million. Rebates of \$15.5 million to Texas counties were 16.5 percent higher than allocations of \$13.3 million in March 1997. Another \$4.3 million went to 30 special purpose districts around the state. As a whole, Lynn County expe-

rienced an increase of 16.18 percent over last year's payment for March. The county received \$6,835.99 this period compared to \$5,883.52 for the same period last year. Tahoka received the majority of the increase, receiving \$5,906.52 this year versus \$4,238.15 last year, for an increase of 39.36%. O'Donnell received \$929.47 this period as opposed to \$1,258.59 last year for a decrease of 26.14 percent. Wilson showed a loss of 100
