Thefts, Vandalism, One Traffic Accident Reported

Thefts, vandalism, family violence and a traffic accident in Tahoka headed the list of incidents investigated by law enforcement officers in Lynn County during the last week.

On Tuesday a 1985 Pontiac driven by Cutberto Flores Lopez, 32, of Tahoka and a 1996 Chevrolet S-10 pickup driven by Gloria Santos Murillo, 29, also of Tahoka, collided at the intersection of Ave. L and S. 2nd St. No injuries resulted.

Ima Robinson reported that a storm door glass had been broken out with an unknown object at her home on N. 4th St. between April 6-9. Damage was estimated at \$300.

A gray toolbox and socket wrenches valued at \$55 were stolen from a pickup owned by Rafael Resendez while it was parked at his residence on S. 1st St. Thursday.

A license plate and holder valued at \$40 were stolen off a 1992

Oldsmobile owned by Maurio Maurez, he told sheriff's officers.

No charges were filed in two domestic incidents. In one, the husband reportedly damaged a dresser and knocked a hole in the wall in the bedroom because he wanted some cigarettes and his wife told him she "wasn't going to support his habit". In the other incident, a woman who allegedly had been drinking struck her husband in the face several times and "busted his lips." Victims in each case declined to prosecute.

In jail during the week were two persons for public intoxication, and one each for interfering with the duties of a public servant, application to revoke probation on drunk driving charges, theft by check (for Dawson County), DWI third or more offense, injury to a child, driving while license suspended.

Fun/Food Festival Set This Saturday

Looking for somewhere to go this Saturday night? Area residents can have fun, food and fellowship all under the same roof while helping raise funds to buy equipment and make improvements at the Lynn County Hospital.

An all-you-can-eat fish fry and auction top the list of activities at the 18th Annual Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary Fun and Food Festival. The activities begin at 5 p.m. at the Lynn County Showbarn, located two blocks west of Avenue J on South 9th Street.

Several organizations have volunteered their assistance with this year's event, including Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department, whose members will once again roll up their sleeves to cook lots of fish and fries which will be served by Lynn County EMS and Hospital Directors/Staff. The All-You-Can-Eat Fish Fry will cost \$4.50 per person, available throughout the evening.

Phebe K. Warner Club is providing homemade ice cream for the evening, and Lynn County 4-H, Tahoka Boy Scouts, and the Baptist Young Women of First Baptist Church will be providing brownies, cookies, coffee, tea and soft drinks at the concession stand. O'Donnell EMS will provide popcorn, as well as giving free blood pressure checks.

All proceeds earned by these volunteer groups are donated to the Hospital Auxiliary.

The hospital also extends their appreciation to the Tahoka High School Agriculture Department for their assistance in setting up for the auction, as well as clean-up afterwards.

Grace Huffaker, an auxiliary member and volunteer since the first festival, said the event is a family affair. "We want everyone to come. It's a fun time," she said.

A Silent Auction table will showcase smaller items in the auction, with paper and pen available for bidders to write their bids. The big event of the evening, of course, is the auction which features items of all kinds which have been generously donated by area residents and merchants. Mrs. Huffaker said a bid of \$215 has already been submitted on a Princess Diana Beanie-Baby. There is also a

mystery box, an original Robert Chennault painting, and entertainment packages such as "A Night To Remember" and a "Mothers Day Gift" package.

The "Night To Remember" package which will be auctioned offers a suite for two at the Barcelona Court in Lubbock, where after complimentary cocktails are served in the evening, a limousine service will transport the couple to Harrigan's for a meal, and then to the Cactus Theatre for a night of entertainment. The couple will then be returned to their suite at the Barcelona Court where roses, champagne and a set of champagne glasses have been donated, and in the morning the couple will be treated to a breakfast cooked to order.

The "Mother's Day Gift" package includes a ladies two-tone Seiko watch, flowers, and dinner for two at the Cattle Baron Restaurant in Lubbock.

Mrs. Huffaker said the festival has grown in attendance and made more money every year. "The first year we made around \$9,000 and last year the festival made approximately \$14,000," she said.

She explained that the auxiliary is trying to bring in more people from around the area by making television appearances to advertise the event. Mrs. Huffaker said people from Wilson, New Home, O'Donnell and Tahoka are usually in attendance.

Betsy Pridmore, hospital auxiliary president, has been requesting donations of door prizes and auction items. She is accepting baked goods, crafts and handmade items among other donations.

A Blood Drive will be held through the evening, with Texas Blood Institute (TBI) personnel on hand for the process. All blood donors will receive a free "Donors are a Work of Heart" t-shirt from TBI, as well as a free mini-physical including blood pressure, temperature, pulse rate, iron and cholesterol level. Written cholesterol tests results will be mailed by TBI within two weeks of the donations.

TBI also offers men prostate-specific antigen (PSA) testing for a nominal fee of \$15 for blood donors or \$25 for non-donors.

New Hours Scheduled For City-County Library

The City-County Library, located in the Life Enrichment Center at 1717 Main Street in Tahoka, will have new expanded hours of operation beginning May 2.

The library will be open Mondays and Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. (closed for lunch from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m.); Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m.; and on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

The expanded schedule will allow residents in Tahoka, O'Donnell, Wilson and New Home to have better access to library facilities.

Currently the library is in the process of their "Tahoka Daisy" contest for Lynn County students in kindergarten through sixth grade. Contest forms may be picked up at the library.

This summer, the library will have their first summer reading program in the Life Enrichment Center. The program will run through the month of June, with the theme "Furry Tails-Funny Tales."

"We are pleased to bring the community these new expanded hours. We encourage Lynn County residents to access the library," said Tahoka City Administrator Jerry Webster.

Earlier this year, the city worked to expand the hours of operation at the Tahoka Pioneer Museum, which is now open Tuesday through Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Admission is free.

Board Approves Asst. Band Director, School Calendar Set For 1998-99

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees in their monthly meeting Tuesday night approved several agenda items, including the creation of a new position at the school for an assistant band director, the school calendar for next year, a resolution canceling the election for the unopposed candidates in Districts 2 and 5, a budget amendment, and other routine business.

The band/choir program in Tahoka is growing with increasing numbers of students, according to Band Director Carroll Rhodes. This year's programs included 6th grade band (70 students), 7th grade band (40), 8th grade band (32), high school band (38), high school choir (18) and music appreciation (5), for a total of

203 students. Rhodes expects next year's program to see an overall growth of 30 students. Trustees unanimously approved the new position of an assistant band director, and applications for that position will be sought for the next school year.

The 1998-99 school calendar was approved as presented to the board, with no changes to the proposed calendar which was previously printed in *The Lynn County News*. Starting date for students will be Aug. 17 and high school graduation on May 28, with major holidays including Labor Day on Sept. 7, Thanksgiving on Nov. 25-27, Christmas Break Dec. 18-Jan. 3, County Stock Show Jan. 29, Spring Break Mar. 15-19, and Good Friday, Apr. 2. Bad weather days will include the Monday after Easter, Apr. 5, and Friday, May 7.

Trustees approved a resolution canceling two of the trustee elections, District 2 and District 5, where Joe Calvillo and Carmen Chapa are each running unopposed, and declaring them the winners. The election in District 1, where there are two candidates running for the seat, will be held as scheduled. New trustees, including Calvillo and Chapa, will take the oath of office at the May board meeting following the May 2 election.

Other routine agenda items approved by the board included a student transfer for next year, a request for a waiver from the Texas Education Agency to again teach Algebra I over a two-year period, and a request for a waiver allowing three additional staff development days. A budget amendment to purchase new football helmets for the middle school program to meet safety code standards was approved, and the financial report and monthly bills were approved as presented.

One resignation was noted, that of special education aide Helen Fuentes. Supt. Hutton and district administrators presented reports to trustees.

The next meeting of the board will be noon Monday, May 4 to can-

Continuing last week's bloopers supposedly collected from actual papers of students in high school and college:

During the Renaissance America began. Christopher Columbus was a great navigator who discovered America while cursing about the Atlantic. His ships were called the Nina, the Pinta, and the Santa Fe.

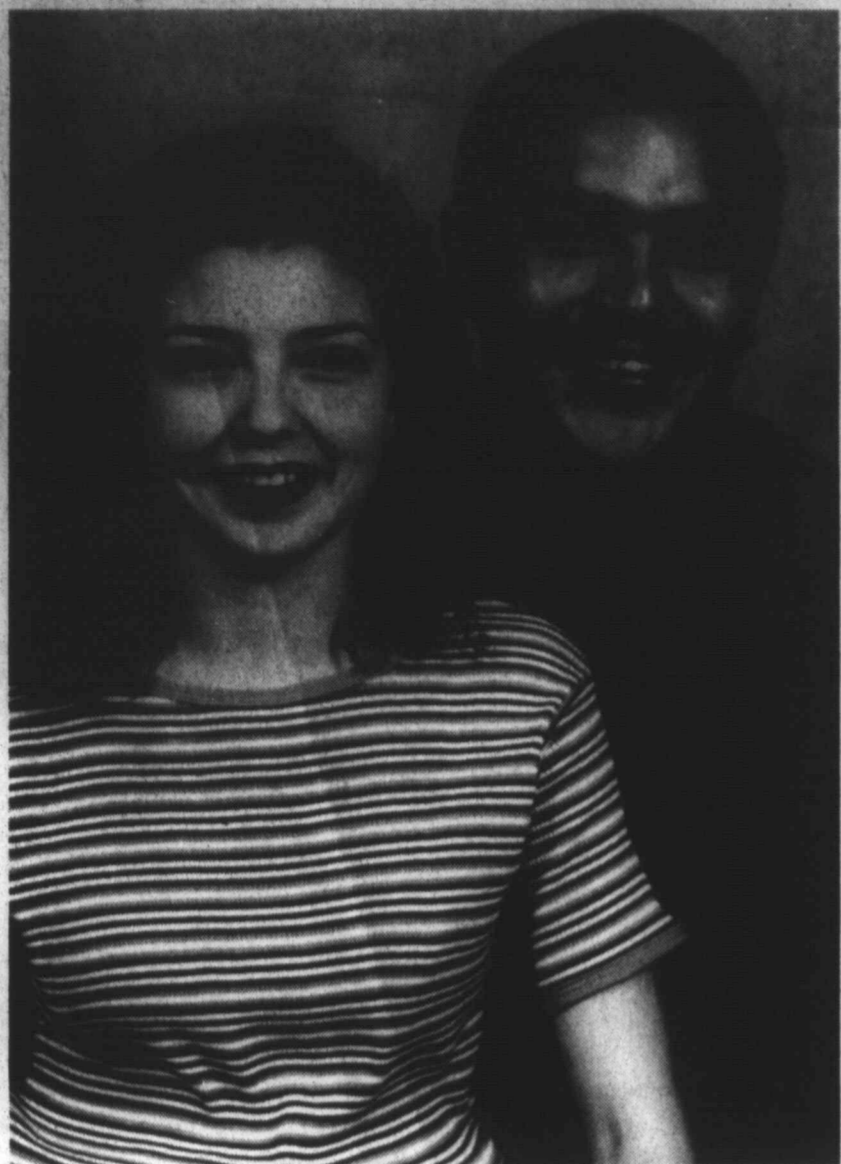

National Volunteer Week Spotlights Senior Companion Services Here

April 19-25 is National Volunteer Week, a time to recognize the efforts of two Senior Companions who serve with the South Plains Community Action's Senior Companion Program in Lynn County.

The Lynn County Companions are Audelia Casarez and Buelah Hubbard. These companions are active in the communities of O'Donnell and Tahoka. Most companions are working with at least two clients, homebound senior citizens, for twenty hours each week. They provide companionship, run errands, do meal preparation, and light housework for the client or in some cases he/she provides respite for spouses or families that have the 24-hour-care of a homebound adult. The companion is often supplementing the services of a Home Health Agency or DHS provider service. There is no charge to the client for the service of a companion. The program is run through grant funds and donations.

"As government programs at all levels are cut back and problems in our communities continue to mount, our Senior Companions are a fresh resource for solving problems and a smart investment in our future," says Patty Hartin, program director. The Lynn County Companions volun-

teered over 2,088 hours during 1997 — to have hired the companions for what they do would have cost family and the supporting communities over \$28,396. There is the need to expand services in Lynn County, so any senior over 60 and classified as low income is encouraged to contact this office at 806-894-6089 or the center workers at Lynn County Multi-Service Center.

"There is a special urgency to National Volunteer Week," says Harris Wofford, chief executive officer to the Corporation for National Service. "To solve our country's problems, we need to unleash to full power of citizen service and make service the common expectation and common experience of every American."

The South Plains Senior Companion Program is supported by the Corporation for National Service, which administers AmeriCorps, the domestic Peace Corps, with 25,000 members; the National Senior Service Corps, which includes 24,000 Foster Grandparents, 12,000 Senior Companion volunteers and 450,000 Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) volunteers; and Learn and Serve America, which involves 500,000 school and college students in community service.

Funds Sought For Scholarships Here

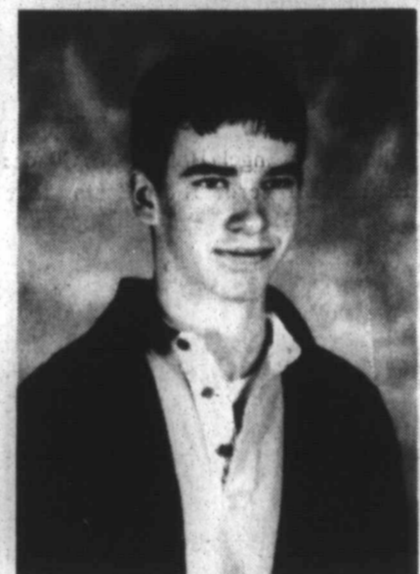

Currys Named Award Winners

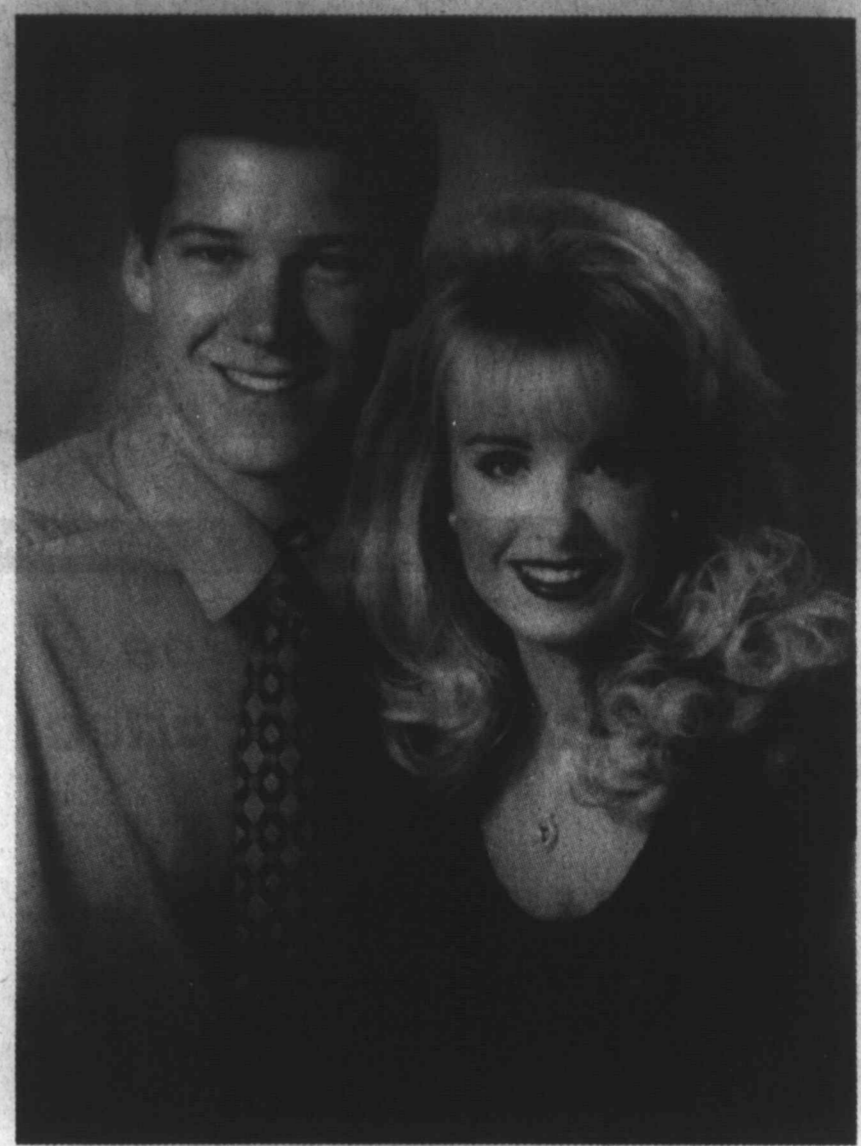
The United States Achievement Academy announced recently that Rebekah and Ryan Curry, from Tahoka, have been named United States National Award Winners in Foreign Language.

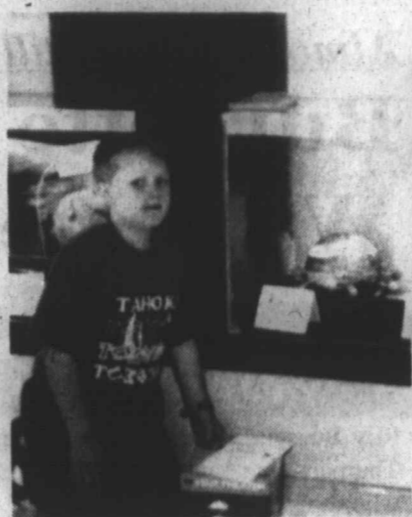

Hospital Doing Well: Lynn County Hospital Is One of Few Independents Left

The Lynn County Hospital District is one of the few remaining independent hospitals in West Texas not affiliated with a larger network — and it plans to stay that way. Operated under the auspices of the Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors, the hospital district is also not affiliated or under the management of Lynn County officials or commissioners.

"Many people assume that because of the name — Lynn County Hospital — that the hospital is under county authority, but that's not so. The Hospital District is completely separate from the county, and the board makes their own decisions about hospital management," says Hospital Administrator Louise S. Landers.

"The hospital is doing well," Landers said, noting that total assets at the close of the 1997 fiscal year were over \$2.1 million. When she joined the hospital in September of

1988, the hospital's assets were considerably lower, at \$600,000.

The current operating budget of the hospital is approximately \$2.8 million. The hospital employs approximately 50 full-time and 20 part-time employees, and last year's payroll totalled over \$1 million.

Last year, the hospital received \$500,000 in property tax revenue, which funds about a fourth of the annual budget, and a \$10,000 ambulance subsidy from county funds. The hospital generated most of its revenue from Medicare and self-pay with the remaining 25% coming from commercial insurance and Medicaid. Charity care totaling approximately \$76,000 was provided to those who qualified.

Mrs. Landers said the communities in the county are very supportive of the hospital. She said over the years, the Hospital Auxiliary has raised approximately \$175,000. The money raised has aided in the purchase of a newer EMS ambulance, therapy equipment, treatment tables,

cardiac monitors and defibrillators, other hospital furniture and the enclosure of the breezeway to the clinic.

In other improvements over the last few years, new heating and air conditioning systems have been installed throughout the hospital facilities. The hospital has modernized its equipment in its lab and computer service has been supplied to all hospital areas.

In the past year, the exterior of the facility has been repaired and new insulated windows have been installed. The parking area was enlarged and paved as well, and a sprinkler system installed on hospital grounds. The installation of a new telephone system is currently near completion.

The hospital provides numerous services including inpatient and outpatient services, emergency room service, home health service and ambulance service.

In addition, a primary care clinic is attached to the hospital and is staffed by two board-certified family practice physicians. There is also a family wellness clinic staffed by a family nurse practitioner, and a part-time primary care clinic in O'Donnell.

The hospital has numerous diagnostic and treatment capabilities available to patients. Monitored cardiac telemetry was recently installed and enables patients to walk throughout the hospital. The hospital also provides physical therapy, ultrasound, nuclear medicine scans, Doppler studies and computerized tomography scans (cat scans).

All of these services mean that Lynn County residents have local access to quality medical care, through home-owned facilities.

Almost 80 and Still Going Strong...

Burdette Remembers 40 Years With Sheriff Departments

Sitting in his deputy car fiddling his thumbs after a day's work, Roy Burdette is ready to go home. The part-time Lynn County deputy who turns 80 years old this month is in typical garb — including a cowboy hat and suspenders.

"The first time I came to Tahoka (I) was on a bale of cotton," he recalled.

That was when his father traded in Tahoka and he, as a young boy, would tag along on the trips from Borden County. Now Burdette lives in Tahoka since moving in 1988 from Lamesa, where he lived from 1955-1988.

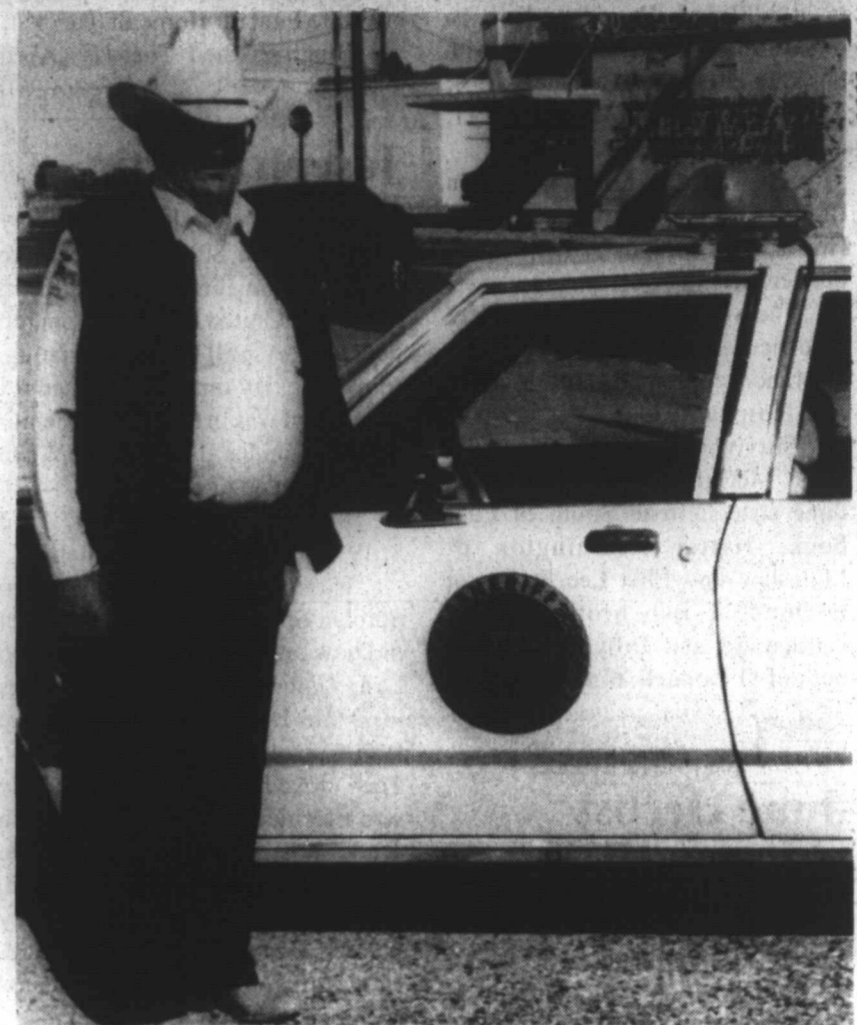
He originally handled federal prisoners and worked highways for the county, but now he mostly transports prisoners and buys groceries for the jail.

"You don't know what you'll do. Don't ever plan nothin'," Burdette said about his less-than-routine job.

Sheriff Charles Smith said there is no word to describe the work Burdette does around the department.

"He knows little things and has been a great asset. I just can't say enough good about Roy," Smith said.

Smith threw a surprise party recently for Burdette honoring his 40

years of service in law enforcement. Burdette said Smith really fooled him. Smith provided cake and ice cream, but Burdette was most impressed with his gift of new leather suspenders.

Burdette reminisced about his early days as a deputy, beginning in 1958. The United States Federal Communications Commission (FCC) issued Burdette a restricted telephone operator permit March 19, 1958. The permit was required then for anyone to use the radio. Although no longer a requirement, Burdette still carries that card in his wallet. It was that card, in fact, which Sheriff Smith recalled seeing that prompted the surprise party for the deputy.

Over the years, Burdette has worked in various counties under five

different sheriffs. He said they've all been good.

He recalled chasing bootleggers in Dawson County in his early days.

"They had beer, wine and whiskey on a grain truck. That was the most that had ever been caught down there!" Burdette remembered, saying the truck load of beverages was worth about \$2,400.

Burdette worked for Sheriff Henry Mayfield in Lamesa and later became a juvenile officer there. After that job, he has been a part-time deputy ever since.

There were two or three years when Burdette was without a law enforcement commission. He worked as a mechanic, was a ranch hand and sold tractors. But he said he enjoys his job as a deputy the most.

"This is something I wanted to do and I enjoy it," he said, adding with a smile, "I've been 'the old man' around the Sheriff's department for years!"

Burdette is especially proud of his family. He has two daughters, Peggy Jolly of Tahoka and Patsy Wyrich of Big Spring, and one son, Mike Burdette of Carson City, Nev.

He has nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. His late wife Betty passed away in 1995.

He has fond memories of his years as a deputy, but he especially remembers when his wife surprised him with a new sport coat on about the third day of his job as a deputy in 1958.

"She came into the room just as I was about to leave the house, and tossed this package at me, saying, 'If you're going to go out there and die [on the job] you're going to look good doing it,' and I opened it up and there was this beautiful new sport coat. I wore it a long time," Burdette reminisced.

He says he never got hurt on the job during the past 40 years in law enforcement.

Forty years and still going ... and going — it's a little like the Energiser bunny that never stops. For Burdette, that's just the way he likes it.

Happy 80th birthday, Roy.

9-1-1 Operators Commended During Public Safety Telecommunications Week

Over 200 calls a month are answered at the Lynn County 9-1-1 Emergency System, a program which is managed through the Lynn County Sheriff's Office, where one of six dispatchers is always on hand to dispatch the appropriate emergency response team 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Luis Vasquez, Freda Harper, Pam Ashcraft, Lena Cloe, Cheryl Estrada and Michelle Bertreaux handle the 9-1-1 emergency calls at the Sheriff's Office, joining communications personnel throughout the state in providing fast, accurate responses to protect people and property.

In Lynn County, Vasquez says the 9-1-1 operators answer calls pertaining to area fire departments, ambulance services, city and county law enforcement, wrecks, and domestic disturbances.

The Honorable, Governor George W. Bush has proclaimed April 11-18 as Public Safety Telecommunications Week in Texas to urge the appropriate recognition of these communications operators, and the South Plains Association of Governments' emergency communications staff extends great appreciation to the communications personnel of all the 9-1-1 agencies throughout the South Plains area.

An official memorandum from governor's office reads, in part:

"Every day, Texans throughout our vast state are served by thousands of dedicated public safety telecommunications personnel who answer their emergency calls for police, fire or medical services.

"Whether responding to a car accident or a tornado, communications operators must get accurate information about the problem, deter-

"I urge all Texans to recognize with appreciation the contributions of public safety telecommunications personnel to the safety and well-being of their fellow residents."
