## **Burglary**, Wrecks **Are Investigated**

Two traffic accidents in the city of Tahoka and a burglary of a house at New Home were among incidents reported to law enforcement officers in the county during the last week.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin Gill were in the process of moving from their residence in New Home to a Lubbock address, and while they were away from the New Home house, someone forced entry into it between 9 p.m. Thursday and 7:30 a.m. Friday and took several valuable items which had not yet been moved.

## **Head Boys Basketball Coach Hired; Now Seeking Head Girls Coach**

It was a strange Friday last week for Tahoka Independent School District administrators and trustees, who met at 7:30 that morning in a called meeting to discuss hiring a new head boys basketball coach after the unexpected resignation of Hunter Cooley in that position. Trustees took care of that situation, however, with a sigh of relief that Athletic Director Troy Hinds had found a qualified applicant for the position (a feat in itself, because mid-July is a difficult time to find professional teaching staff, most of whom have contracts by June). They ended the meeting on a positive note, directing Superintendent David

Hutton to fill one more teaching vacancy, a high school math position, which Coach Cooley's wife, Carla, had taught.

The day took a strange twist, however, because by Friday evening there were two more resignations in the district - that of head girls basketball coach David Brewer and his wife, Kandle, who taught Special Education on the middle school campus. The Brewers resigned to take positions in Oklahoma, unofficial sources

The double whammy in the head basketball coaching positions has left school officials somewhat dazed, although the athletic director has already focused his attention on filling the girls coaching position, and trustees have scheduled another called meeting for this morning (Thursday) to consider personnel.

Last Friday morning, an assistant basketball coach for 5A Midland High School, whose 1998 varsity boys were State Champions, was hired as the Head Boys Basketball Coach for Tahoka I.S.D. Rusty Frazier has four years coaching experience, at San Jacinto Junior High School and Midland High School, where he worked with the sophomore, junior varsity, and varsity boys basketball programs. While he was assistant varsity coach at Midland, the boys team claimed two district championships and had four playoff appearances, and were the 1998 5A State Champions, Frazier was also assistant coach for the 1998 TABC All Stars in San Antonio.

A graduate of Midland High School in 1989, Frazier attended Howard Payne University and Midland College, and graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mathematics from the University of Texas of the Permian Basin in 1994. He will be teaching math as well as his coaching duties at Tahoka High School.

He and his wife, Mysti, have a 19-month-old daughter, Erica.

"I am very excited about coming to Tahoka because of the history they have had over the last couple of years," Frazier told The News. "I have been watching game films and am looking forward to this season. We're going to speed the pace up, press and run and trap, and play an exciting game that people will like to come watch," the coach said. He said he expects to begin meeting his team members

"I am very pleased to get Rusty Frazier for our boys basketball program," Hinds said. "We're working very hard to make the best possible programs for our kids here, and I believe he will be an asset to our district," he added.

Hinds also said that in spite of the time constraints, he expects to have a good applicant to present for the board's consideration for the girls head coaching position.

Six of seven trustees were present at last Friday's called meeting, including Greg Henley, Joe Calvillo, Carmen Chapa, Leighton Knox Jr., Ty Askew and Ginger Henry. Trustee Brad Hammonds was absent.

#### Athletic Physical Exams Scheduled

Athletic physicals will be offered for Tahoka Independent School District student athletes July 30-31 at Dr. Freitag's office at the Lynn County Hospital-Clinic. Physical examinations are required for all athletes entering seventh and ninth grades at Tahoka ISD, according to UIL rules, says Athletic Director Troy

Physical exams for female athletes entering seventh and ninth grades (or for any female athlete who has not participated in athletics before at Tahoka) will be offered beginning at 4 p.m. Thursday, July 30 at Dr. Freitag's office. Cost of the exam is \$5, and forms must be filled out at the doctor's office, signed by the doctor, and returned to Tahoka coaching staff at the beginning of the school

Male athletic physical exams will be offered Friday, July 31, beginning at 4 p.m. at Dr. Freitag's, with the same cost and forms.

"UIL rules require all students participating in athletics who are entering seventh and ninth grades, or who have never been in athletics before, to have a physical exam," said Hinds. "We cannot issue athletic equipment without physicals and the proper forms completed," he added.

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Some student athletes may have taken their physicals during the spring, and if so, are not required to have another exam.



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

#### **Governor Seeks Drought Disaster Declaration For Entire State**

asking the federal government to grant disaster status to an additional 176 counties stricken by drought, including Lynn County. If the U.S. Department of Agriculture grants the Governor's request, all 254 Texas counties will be under a drought disaster declaration.

In a letter to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman, Governor Bush describes the economic emergency caused by above normal temperatures and severe drought conditions. If the request is granted, Texas farmers and ranchers will be eligible for emergency loans to cover losses suffered under the drought. The Texas Agriculture Extension Service estimates total losses will be \$1.5 billion statewide.

> As of July 17, two Texas counties, Terrell and Glasscock, have been designated disaster areas by the federal government. Requests from seventy-six counties are pending.

## Cotton Drought Losses Pegged At \$1.8 Billion For Texas

Unrelenting hot, dry weather across the state continues to take its toll on Texas crops, slashing an estimated \$500 million from cotton farmers and \$1.8 billion from the economy, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist.

The estimated losses, which will climb even higher if sufficient rain doesn't fall; have surpassed the 1996 levels when agriculture last felt the impact of severe drought, said Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension cotton marketing economist. Cotton farmers that year took a \$359 million loss that translated into a \$1.2 billion cut to the state's overall economy.

Expected cotton losses this year have more than tripled in the two. weeks since the Extension Service released its first drought impact for 1998, estimating the loss to cotton farmers then to be \$157 million.

"We still have hopes that if temperatures were to cool and the rain was to move into the West Texas area, then cotton would have a chance, dryland in particular," Anderson said. "But with another two weeks of the same hot, dry weather with high temperatures then the losses will be greater than we are estimating today."

Last year, Texas cotton farmers harvested some 5.3 million bales valued at \$1.8 billion at the farm and generating \$6 billion in economic activity across the state. But, Anderson estimated, the number of bales expected to be harvested at this point may total only 3.3 million. He said the reduction of 2 million bales is

"The loss will hit the rural regions the hardest," he said.

Anderson's figures come on the heels of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's cotton planting figures report released Tuesday. That report indicated that all cotton acreage planted in Texas totaled 5.4 million, about 125,000 acres less than was planted last year. Anderson noted that the reduced acreage mostly was in the Blacklands, Upper Coastal and Central growing regions.

"However, the greatest economic losses will be across the Texas South Plains and Rolling Plains regions," Anderson said. "These regions include around 4 million acres - a little more than 1.5 million have some irrigation and 2.5 million are dryland."

He said the current estimate is that 1.65 million of the dryland acres will not be harvested because of the extreme dry weather and high temperatures in May and June.

The value of the drought loss to farmers across the South and Rolling Plains is estimated at \$343 million, he said, and the mostly local economic losses to businesses are placed at \$929 million, for a total economic impact of \$1.27 billion.

Central and southern cotton regions already have reached losses of \$157 million to producers, or about 475,000 bales. The producers' loss of income impacts total business activity by some \$529 million.



The Southwest Disability and Business Technical Assistance Center and LIFE centers for Independent Living are collaborating to provide

the training opportunities, scheduled as follows:

Wed., Aug. 5, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in Baker Conference Center, Lubbock Christian University. A business person's overview of the law and how to comply. This session recommended for business owners, managers and human resource personnel.

Thurs., Aug. 6, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in Baker Center. You Be The Judge. Advanced training that provides insight of enforcement procedures the Dept. of Justice. Recommended for persons already familiar with the ADA, such as architects, contractors, advocates, etc.

Training will be conducted by a staff member of the Southwest Center, located in Houston.
