
Taxing Entities In County Set New Tax Rates For Year


The frog reached into his vest pocket and took out a tiny cup and saucer. "Here you are. Take these to your supervisor, and I'm sure he will okay the loan."

The Tahoka Bulldogs, who seem to win every time they play on artificial turf, did it again at Ratliff Stadium in Odessa last Saturday, nosing out Van Horn 21-20, thanks to a 3yard scoring run by Tailback Marlon Womack in the fourth period, and a game-winning extra point kick by

Grant Spearman. Womack, who gained a whopping 182 yards on 33 carries subbing for injured Auggie Cantu, scored his touchdown midway of the last quar-

Coach Troy Hinds' Bulldogs will host the New Deal Lions at 7:30 p.m. Friday

Coach Hinds said the Tahoka defense played "an outstanding game" against Van Horn. "They bent, but they never broke." He said defensive back Mario Luna led the way with nine solo tackles, including a quarterback sack. Linebackers Bradley Rangel and Gene DeLeon also played well, as did defensive end D.J.

The offensive line did a good job of blocking for Womack, and QB Brady Raindl scored Tahoka's first two touchdowns, a run of 5 yards in the first quarter and 1 yard in the third. Spearman kicked all three extra points.

Van Horn led at the half 14-7, and scored six points in the third, missing the extra point. Fernie Carrasco scored all of Van Horn's

Tahoka lost three fumbles and had two passes intercepted, including one which Carrasco returned 36 yards for a score.

City Council Approves Tax Rate; Sewer Rates To Increase Here

Tahoka City Council unanimously approved a tax rate of .67500 per \$100 property valuation, keeping the same tax levy for 1999 as the current year. The 1999 budget was also approved at the council's regular monthly meeting held Monday evening at City Hall.

One revenue item in the budget, that of city sewer revenues, includes a raise in city sewer rates effective Oct. 1. Residential rates will be raised \$3.00, from \$8.25 per month to \$11.25 per month. Commercial rates will be based on water consumption, says city officials, with a minimum rate of \$11.25 and maximum rate of \$17.25 per month.

A letter explaining the rate increase is being mailed to all residential and commercial customers of the city, attributing the increase to funding costs for a new sewage plant. A new wastewater treatment plant is in the planning stages to replace the current plant which was built in 1929.

City officials say the current plant does not properly dispose of the sewage and does not meet compliance standards. The city has already been approved for a loan to build the new plant, and sewage rate increases are expected help fund the project.

In an effort to keep other city utility rates at current levels, the city is absorbing costs from a three percent garbage collection increase from contracted services. City council members voted to keep the current rates for customers, and to cut expenses elsewhere to absorb the addi-

tional cost to the city. In other business, Frances Flores met with the council, seeking assistance from the city in demolishing a dilapidated building she owns (the home in which she lived which was destroyed by fire last year). According to City Administrator Jerry Webster, the council said they would take the request under advisement.

THS Principal Jimmy Parker Named Outstanding Administrator

Jimmy Parker, principal of Tahoka High School, recently received the State Outstanding Administrator Award from the Vocational Home Economics Teachers Association of Texas (VHETAT). He received the award at their annual awards banquet on Thursday, July 23 in Dallas. VHETAT is a statewide organization that represents more than 2,800 home economics teachers in Texas schools.

Parker attended Tarleton State University in Stephenville, receiving his Bachelor of Science in Education in 1977, and his Masters in Education in 1992. From 1984-1992, he taught agriculture science at Clyde High School, becoming assistant high school principal in 1992 and principal in 1994. He became principal at Tahoka High School in 1996.

Parker is a member of the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals, the Texas Association of Rural Schools, and the Texas Association of School Administrators (Institutional Member). He is active in the Tahoka Rotary Club and is a trustee at the First United Methodist Church. He has been awarded the Distinguished Service Award by the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas (VATAT) and recognized as the VATAT Administrator of the Year in Area IV.

He is a strong supporter of Future Homemakers of America (FHA/HERO). A former advisor of FFA, he knows the importance of leadership skills for youth. He is involved with the local chapter of FHA/HERO supporting the activities of the members on the local, regional, state and national level

TISD Trustees Meeting Held

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in a routine session last Thursday evening, approving monthly bills and taking care of other routine school business.

Trustees unanimously approved seeking bids for a new school vehicle for the district, and Business Manager Ken Eudy presented the district's financial report. He noted that the 1997 tax collection totaled \$990,352.81 which is 96.77 percent complete.


Trustees retired to executive session for 15 minutes for consultation with Cal Huffaker, the district's attorney, but took no action upon returning to open session.

Superintendent David Hutton reported that the Public Utilities Commission is doing an energy study on Tahoka campuses at the present time, and he also briefed the board on the upcoming DEC (District Effectiveness Compliance) visit. 
Wheeler died Thursday, Sept. 3, 1998 from injuries received in a onevehicle accident near Temple.

August Weather Near Normal


The weather across the Texas South Plains during the nonth of August was near normal according to the National Weather Service in Lub-

Temperatures averaged 0.3 degrees above normal and ranged from 1.1 degrees below normal at Lubbock to 1.2 degrees above normal at Lockettville.

Precipitation averaged 0.03 inches below normal and ranged from 1.93 inches below normal at Paducah to 2.21 inches above normal at Lub-

Tahoka's average temperature was 78.0 degrees with 2.62 inches of precipitation.

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



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Tax Rate To Remain Same. **Says County Commissioners**

Lynn County Commissioners unanimously approved a tax rate of .59471 per \$100 of property value in their regular meeting Monday morning, and discussed other routine busi-

All four commissioners and Judge J.F. Brandon voted 5-0 to keep the tax rate at the current levy, although because of higher property evaluations from the Lynn County Appraisal District, that same tax rate will bring in slightly more revenue for county coffers in 1999.

In other business, commissioners signed a water resolution and approved a fee of \$250 for Lynn County to participate in a storm water agreement, of which all counties in Texas are participants.

Voting boxes 10 and 3 (O'Donnell and New Moore) were discussed for the upcoming general election in November, and commissioners approved consolidating those two boxes into one at O'Donnell.

Sandra Laws met with the court, seeking commissioners' approval to add Lynn County's Christmas For Kids program to the list of nonprofit entities which jurors may donate jury pay if they so desire. Currently, jurors who choose not to receive jury pay may donate those funds to the Crime Victim's Compensation fund Board. Mrs. Laws noted that the Christmas For Kids account was completely separate from the Child Welfare Board, and asked that the Christmas For Kids fund be approved as another option for jurors to donate to. After some discussion, commissioners voted unanimously in favor of the request.


WISD Board Raises Taxes

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


