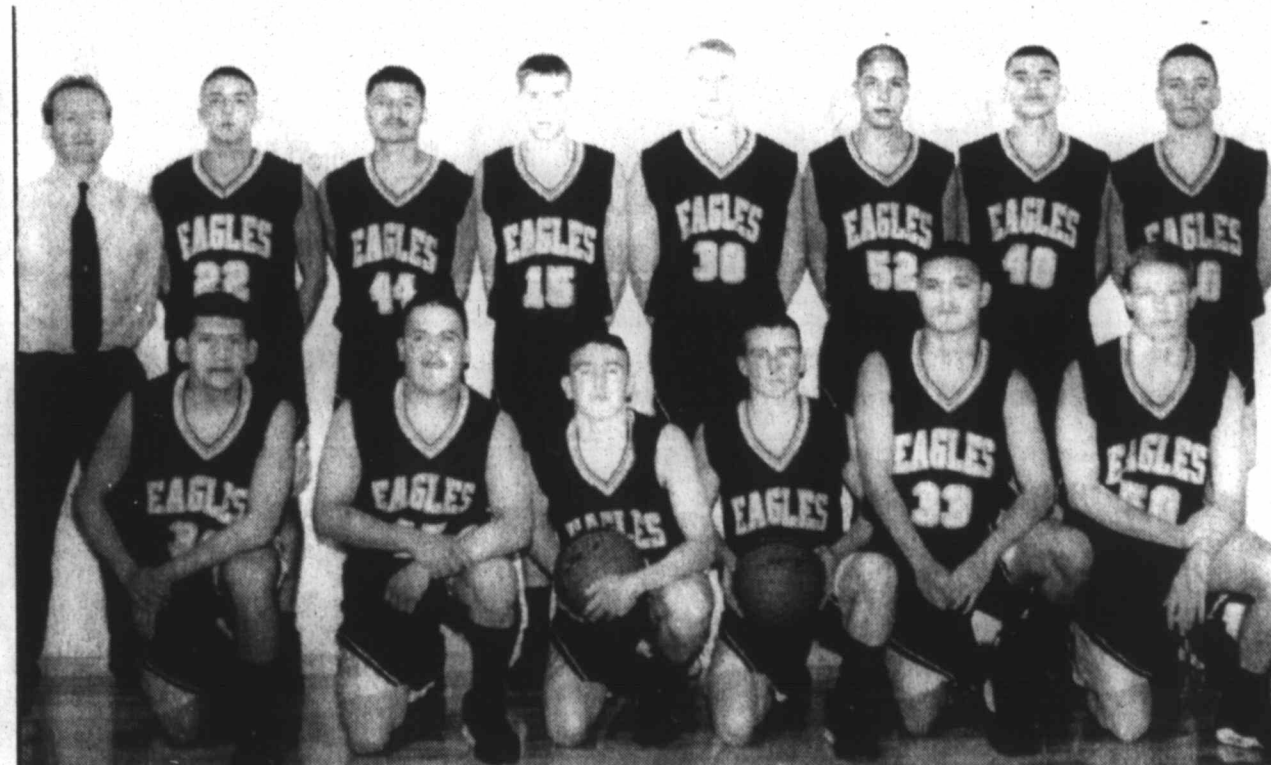

The items are believed to have been taken from her home on S. 2nd St. early in January.

Items totaling \$600 in value were reported stolen from the residence of Kathy Shelton on N. 5th St. in two separate burglaries during the last month, police were advised last Thursday. Among items stolen were two fishing rods and reels, a 21-inch RCA color TV and a Sega game machine.

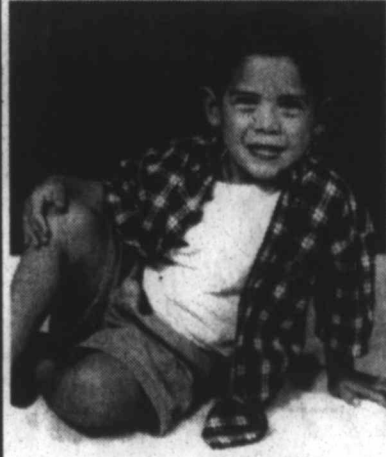

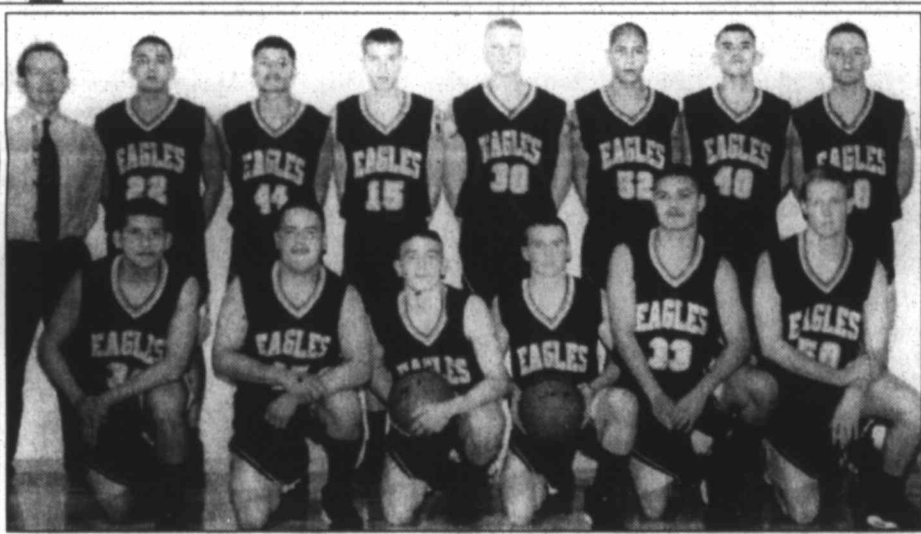

Trustees Call For May 1 Election, Approve Administrative Contracts

Administrative contracts and salary hikes were approved, an election for two trustees was set, and other routine business was conducted during a six-hour meeting of the Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees held last Thursday evening.

Contracts were extended one year for High School Principal Jimmy Parker, Middle School Principal Glo Hays, Elementary Principal Ronald Roberts, and Athletic Director/Assistant High School Principal Troy Hinds, and trustees unanimously approved salary hikes of \$1500 for Parker, Hays and Hinds, and a \$1000 salary increase for Roberts. The motions for contracts followed a 4-1/2 hour executive session during which trustees reviewed each administrator's job performance.

An election for two seats on the board was set for May 1, for two of the single-member districts on the board, Places 3 and 4, currently held by trustees Ginger Henry and Brad Hammonds. Dean Bartley was appointed election judge, Jackie Stephens as alternate judge, and Jerry Webster as early voting judge.

Although only those residents who live in Places 3 and 4 may vote in the election, anyone who lives within the school district may file for a seat representing any single-member district. Candidates interested in filing for a place on the ballot may apply at the School Business Office, located in the Harvick Educational Building on Main Street, now through March 17.

In other business, Business Manager Ken Eudy reported tax collections of \$917,706.18 as of Jan. 31, which is 85.41% complete. Monthly bills were approved as presented with six trustees approving the motion and trustee Leighton Knox Jr. abstaining from voting.

Trustees decided to readvertise for school health insurance proposals because the proposals received on Feb. 4 were unsatisfactory, and trustees set a special board meeting on Feb. 19 to review the new proposals and select an employee health insurance carrier.

Board member Brad Hammonds was authorized to serve as the board's representative in dealing with the Lynn County Farm Service Agency regarding the district's newly ac-

quired farm land and to negotiate with farmer tenants. The land, which was purchased for indefinite future school development plans, will continue to be leased for farming until definite plans are made by the district.

Trustees authorized the Lynn County Tax Appraisal Office to attempt to sell two pieces of property which did not bring minimum bid requirements in a Feb. 2 tax sale for payment of delinquent property taxes.

A resolution which school boards throughout Texas are addressing was approved by TISD trustees, stating that the board supports an increase in state educators' salaries and retirement benefits from the multi-billion dollar surplus in the state budget, and that the board opposes vouchers which would allow the use of tax dollars to send students to private schools.

Superintendent David Hutton and campus principals presented reports to the board, and A.D. Troy Hinds noted that a high school track meet has been scheduled here on March 6 unless the boys basketball team qualifies for the regional tournament. A middle school track meet will be held here April 8. Elementary Principal Roberts reported that the Lynn County Spelling Bee will be held March 8, and the high school principal reported that ten students qualified for State BPA competition in an Amarillo competition.

Parker also presented a proposed extracurricular student conduct guideline as related to alcohol, illegal drugs and tobacco usage, which will be considered for the future.

School counselor Sherri McCord reported good progress on the sophomore TAAS preparation night classes currently being held. TAAS testing will be conducted Feb. 23-25, with a special daily schedule for the three days of testing.

The next regular board meeting was set for 7 p.m. Thursday, March 11. Board President Greg Henley stated that trustees wanted to discuss the future of the volleyball program at Tahoka I.S.D. and requested that it be an agenda item at the March board meeting.

All seven trustees were present for the Feb. 11 meeting, which adjourned at 1:15 a.m.

Holocaust Survivor To Speak In Tahoka Next Tuesday

A woman who survived four years in Dachau, an infamous Nazi concentration camp for Jews in WWII Germany, will tell her story in Tahoka next Tuesday. The public is invited to hear Helene (Shiver) Levi at The Center for Housing and Community Development on Tuesday, Feb. 23 at 4 p.m. as she presents a program for the Phebe K. Warner Club. The event is free and open to anyone interested in hearing firsthand how Mrs. Levi survived four years in Dachau.

She was born Helene Shiver on June 2, 1928 in Sofia, which is the capital city of Bulgaria, a Balkan country in southeastern Europe. Of Jewish ancestry, her mother's family immigrated to Bulgaria from Spain during the late 15th century and her father's family immigrated from Russia in the mid-19th century. Both families started businesses in Bulgaria and prospered and were considered "well-to-do" when Helene was a child.

She attended public schools and also had a governess to assist with her education, until it was all ended, she said, by the Holocaust when she was 13 years old.

"Myself and my family members were taken from our home during a family birthday celebration in early 1942 and transported to Dachau concentration camp in Germany. I survived almost four years there, and was the sole surviving member of

either my mother's or father's family when the camp was liberated by American Army forces in April of 1945.

"I was then age 17, and completely alone in this world. I was also a 'stateless person' as the Communists had taken over Bulgaria and confiscated all of my family's holdings, and there was nothing for me to return to there," she said.

After the war, she met her American husband while working for the European Exchange Service in Salzburg, Austria. The couple were married there and shortly thereafter he brought her home to the United States to live. The couple have been married for almost 50 years, and have a daughter and two granddaughters.

Although the program is free, the Phebe K. Warner Club will be accepting donations at the door to be given to the Holocaust Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Last Tuesday, the club met at Tahoka Care Center where club members provided refreshments and visited with the residents. Marvin Gregory and Dalton Wood provided musical entertainment for the social.



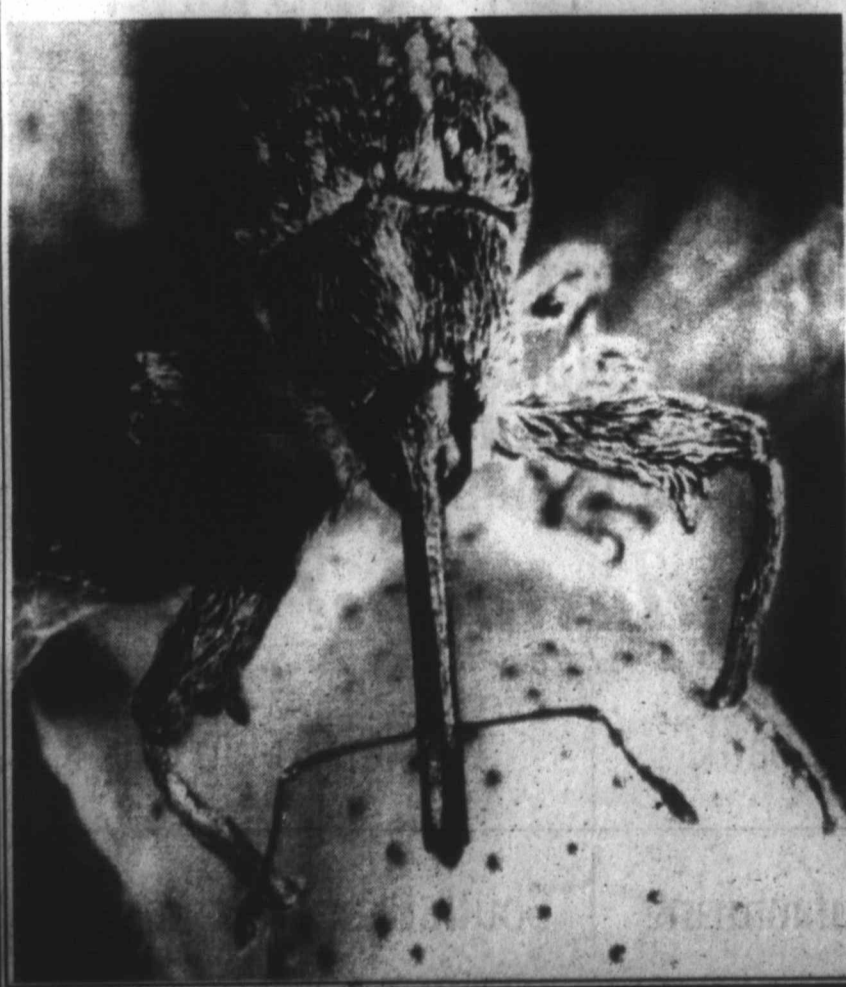

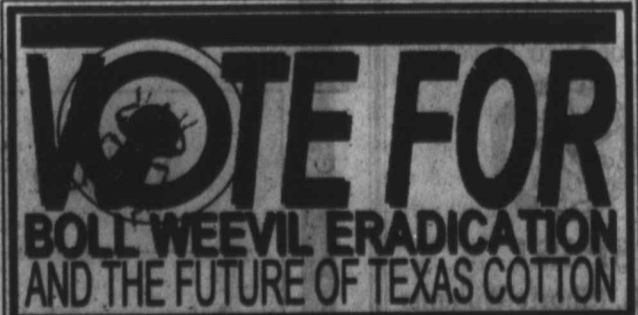

If Not Local, Don't Buy Adv. Says Tahoka A.D.

If it's not one of the Tahoka coaches asking for advertising for school athletics, don't buy it, says Tahoka I.S.D. Athletic Director Troy Hinds. He warns area businesses that it is now the athletic department's policy not to use outside companies who sell advertising for posters and other items for athletic schedules, etc.

"We use our local businesses for our athletic schedule posters, and one of our coaches will come to area businesses asking for sponsor advertising. This is what we are asking our area businesses to support, because all of the money stays home that way," Hinds explains.

"If you get a call or visit from someone other than our coaching staff asking for sponsor advertising, you should know that the school is not supporting that endeavor," he added, noting that this time of year is when other companies sell such sponsorships.

"If in doubt, call any of our coaching staff or myself," Hinds said. "Also, if you do get a call from a company, ask for their name and phone number, and give me that information so that I can contact that company and tell them that this school district is not supporting their product," he added.

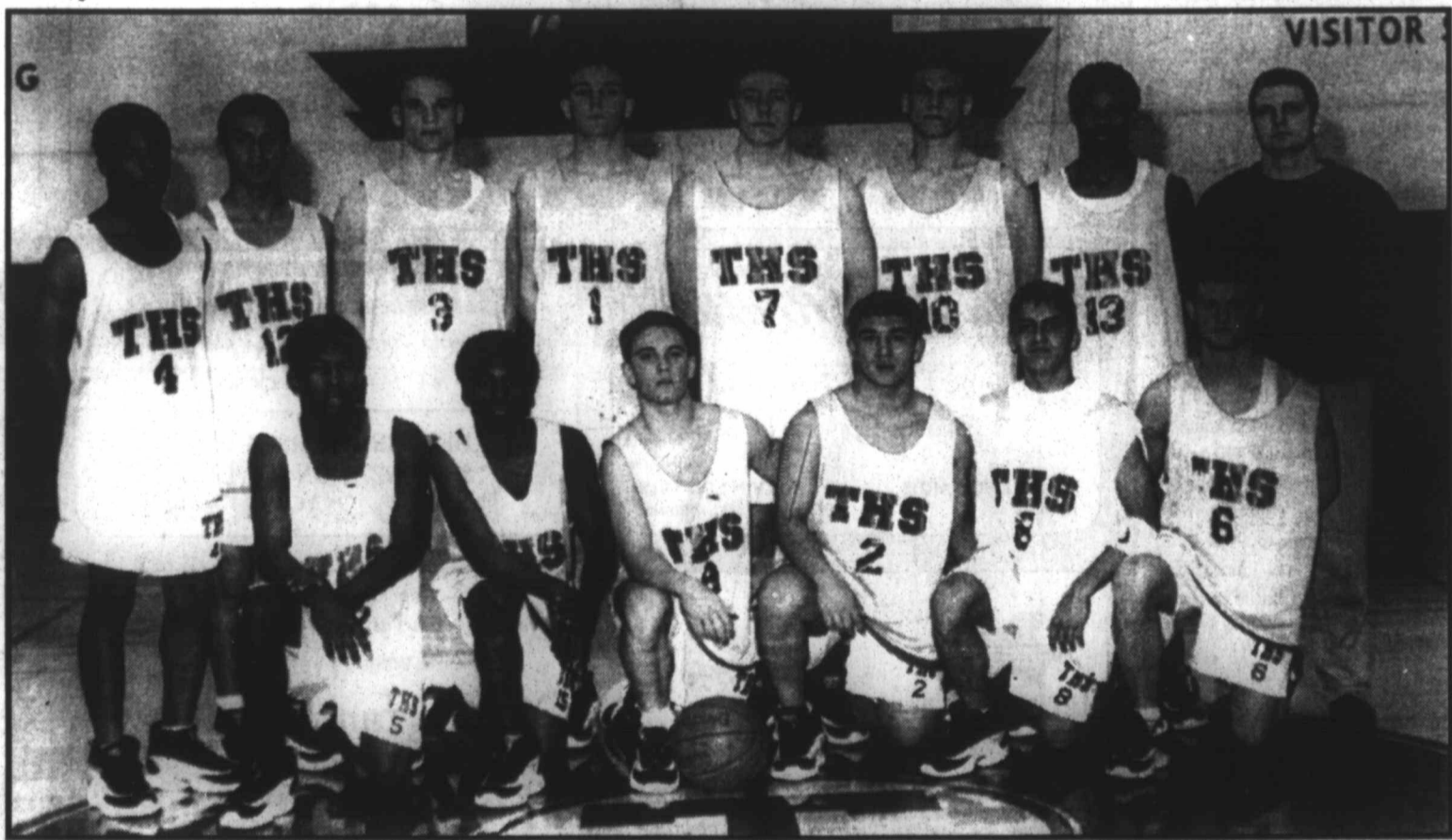
