Four More File For School Elections

Four more candidates filed for places this week in the Tahoka and O'Donnell school elections, giving some interest to the Place 3 seat on the TISD school board with three candidates vying for the position to date. Not much interest has been shown in the four city elections, with only one candidate filing last week for the Wilson City Council.

Deadline to file for a place on city or school ballots is March 17, and elections will be held May 1. For information on filing, contact city or school administrative offices.

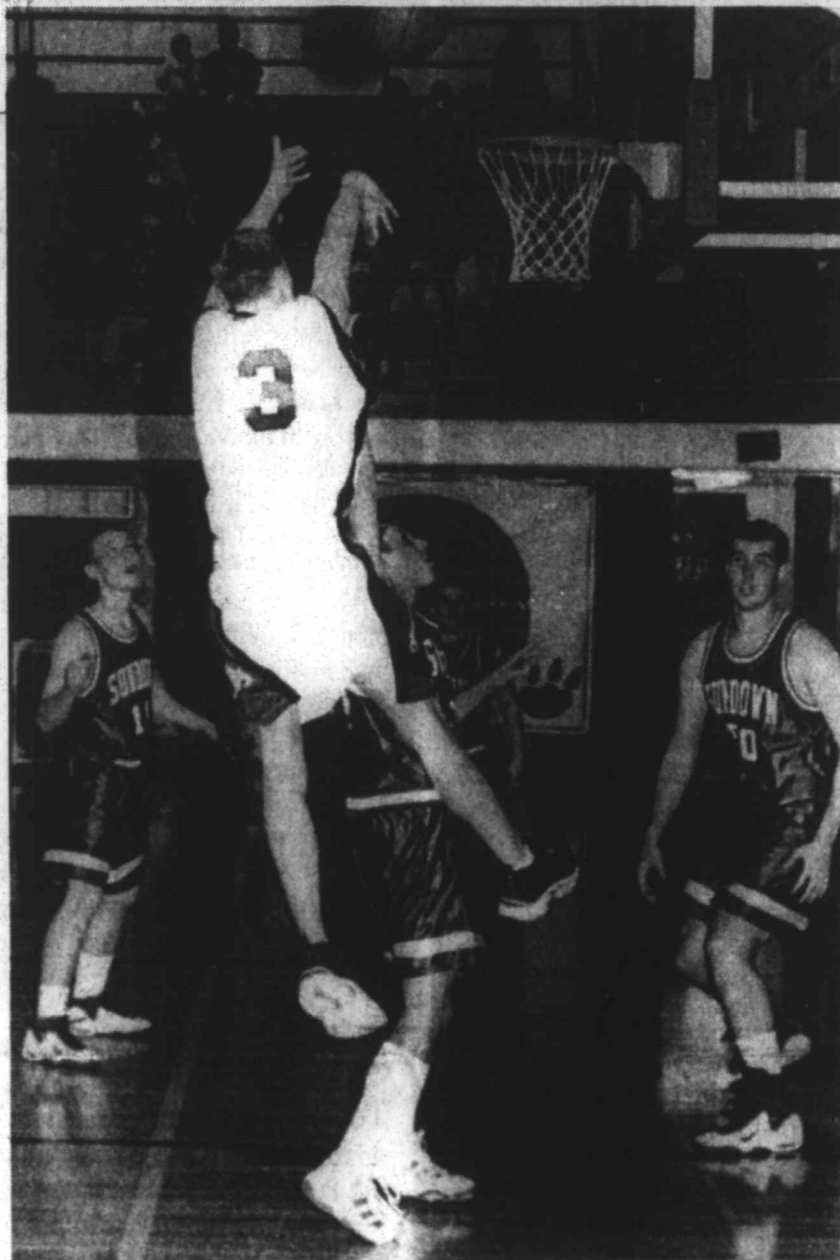

Dogs, Eagles Win Bi-District; Area Games Set This Friday

Two Lynn County boys basketball teams have claimed Area playoff berths with wins this week in the Bi-District pairfups. Tahoka and O'Donnell will travel to Big Spring and Plainview, respectively, for Friday night matches.

The Tahoka Bulldogs claimed Bi-District Championship honors in the Class 2A playoffs with a 61-54 win over Sundown in Brownfield Monday night. The win puts Tahoka in the Area playoffs, where Coach Rusty Frazier's Bulldogs (17-13) will face District 4-2A champion Ozona (21-10). The game is scheduled for 8 p.m. Friday at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum on the Howard College campus in Big Spring. Ozona had a bi-district bye to advance to the area round.

O'Donnell's Ramiro Montez led his team with 20 points in the Eagle's Class 1A bi-district victory over Whitharral, 68-52, Tuesday night. The Eagles and their fans will head for Plainview Friday night, where the Eagles will take on Motley County in the Area playoffs. The game is set for 7 p.m. in the Wayland Baptist University gym. Motley County (21-9) edged out another Lynn County team, the Wilson Mustangs, 53-51 in bi-district.

O'Donnell was evenly matched with Whitharral during the first period Tuesday night, trailing by only three at the half, but the Eagles pulled away with a strong second half to claim the Bi-District Championship honors. Manny Gutierrez tossed in 14 points for the Eagles, and Tatum Bessire added 12. The Eagles scored 18 points to Whitharral's 6 in the third period, and then clinched the win with another 20 points to the Panthers' 13 in the final quarter.

Tahoka Tops Sundown

Brad Pebsworth, a 6'3" junior, led Tahoka with 23 points, and junior Sedrick Williams tossed in 16 in Monday's win over Sundown. The

Dogs took an early lead in the bi-district match, leading 22-7 at the end of the first period, and never relinquished their lead although the Roughnecks charged back with a 30-point rally in the final quarter.

The Dogs led 28-16 at the half, and gained a big 17-point lead going into the final quarter with a score of 41-24. Sundown rallied with seven 3-pointers and several jump shots in the fourth period, and with just over a minute left in the game came to within five points of the Dogs, when the score was 56-51, and again with 40 seconds remaining were behind only five at 59-54. The scrappy Bulldogs, however, answered with 20 points of their own in the final period, staying ahead to claim the victory and a berth in the area playoffs.

Brady Raindl added 6 points for the Bulldogs, and Shaun Williams, Larry Davis and Matt Chancy each tossed in 4 apiece, with Blandon Hancock and Anthony DeLeon both adding a jumpshot.

Clay Edwards and Ross Elliott scored 14 and 13 points, respectively, for Sundown.

Wilson Edged Out

The Wilson Mustangs started out strong in their bi-district match against Motley County, leading 22-9 at the end of the first period, and staying pretty even in the second quarter with 9 points to the Matadors' 8, to lead 31-17 at the half. But Motley County came back with a strong third quarter to pull away from the Mustangs, tossing in 21 points while Wilson managed only 5, gaining a 2-point lead of 38-36 going into the fourth quarter. The third quarter was the difference, as the Mustangs and Matadors scored 15 apiece in the final period.

Bryan Isham led Mustang scoring with a whopping 28 points, and Steven Johnston added 10.

For Motley County, Kean Cruise led scoring with 19 points.

Tahoka FNB Named County Depository

The county judge was forced to break a tie vote between Lynn County Commissioners to name First National Bank of Tahoka as the Lynn County Depository for all county funds, after commissioners for the second time were split 2-2 in the decision. Judge J.F. Brandon cast his vote for FNB at Monday morning's commissioners court when the four commissioners again voted 2-2 on whether to accept the bid from

Tahoka FNB or Wilson State Bank for the county depository.

Commissioners Sandy Cox-Kizer and J.T. Miller voted for a motion naming FNB as the depository, with commissioners Don Morton and Mike Braddock voting against. Commissioners had voted the same way at a meeting last Monday, when the judge abstained from voting.

John Krey, representing FNB, and Dan Cook and Kelly Livingston, representing WSB, were present at the meeting.

In other business, monthly bills were approved with the exception of the bill from Keith Reeger and Company for the county audit, which commissioners said would be paid when the audit is concluded.

A caliche contract with Jones Brothers was discussed, and commissioners agreed to get prices from other companies for caliche prices.

Seven Persons Indicted By Grand Jury Here

Seven persons were indicted by a 106th District Court Grand Jury which met in Tahoka last Wednesday, Feb. 17. Those indicted were as follows:

Abel Juan Guzman, 26, of Lamesa, aggravated robbery on Nov. 21, 1998, when he allegedly used a knife.

Jorge Luis Cantu, 46, of Tahoka, felony driving while intoxicated, third or more offense, on Jan. 1.

Eddie Alvarado, 34, of New Home, aggravated assault, on Jan. 18.

Roberto Robles, aggravated assault on Jan. 21, when he allegedly threatened a Dept. of Public Safety patrolman with a piece of metal pipe.

Kathi Lorraine Price, 38, of Amarillo, possession of a controlled substance, less than one gram of methamphetamine.

José Noe Garza, 17, O'Donnell, deadly conduct (discharging a firearm in the direction of a house on Nov. 22, 1998).

Eliu Alvarez Ramon, 33, of Odessa, possession of marijuana over 5 pounds and less than 50 pounds.

Other activity by police and sheriff's departments during the last week involved incidents of family violence, a traffic accident in the city of Tahoka, a child scratched by a dog, theft and what first appeared to be a counterfeit one dollar bill which may turn out to be a collector's item instead.

A Tahoka man showed police a one dollar bill which had been given as change from a local convenience store. Police checked the bill and

agreed that it appeared to be on different paper from the usual dollar bill, and that some of the printed information was on the wrong side of the bill. However, a check with a bank official who tested the bill indicated that the bill was not counterfeit, and the bank official suggested that it might be a mint misprint, noting that the paper felt slick and crisp compared to other money.

Tammy Privette of Lubbock told sheriff's officers that a wallet containing \$20, credit cards, concert tickets and a checkbook had been stolen from her vehicle.

On Lockwood St. near US 87 in Tahoka Friday, a 1990 Pontiac Grand Am driven by Mandy Rachelle Bertreaux, 18, of Tahoka and a 1985 Oldsmobile driven by Adell Martin Graves, 37, of Lubbock collided. The driver of the Olds was listed as having a possible injury.

In jail during the week were three persons for possession of marijuana under two ounces, with one of these also charged with possession of narcotics paraphernalia, one application to revoke probation on charges of possession of marijuana under two ounces, two persons for driving while license suspended, and eight others on these charges: contempt of court on child support order from Ector County plus failure to appear on speeding warrant, Lubbock traffic warrant, judgment and sentencing for DWI first offense, warrant on simple assault, possession of alcoholic beverage in dry area, assault, and grand jury indictment on felony DWI.

I never can balance my checkbook. What I finally decided to do some years ago was make a deposit once in awhile and not enter it, so my checks would all clear.

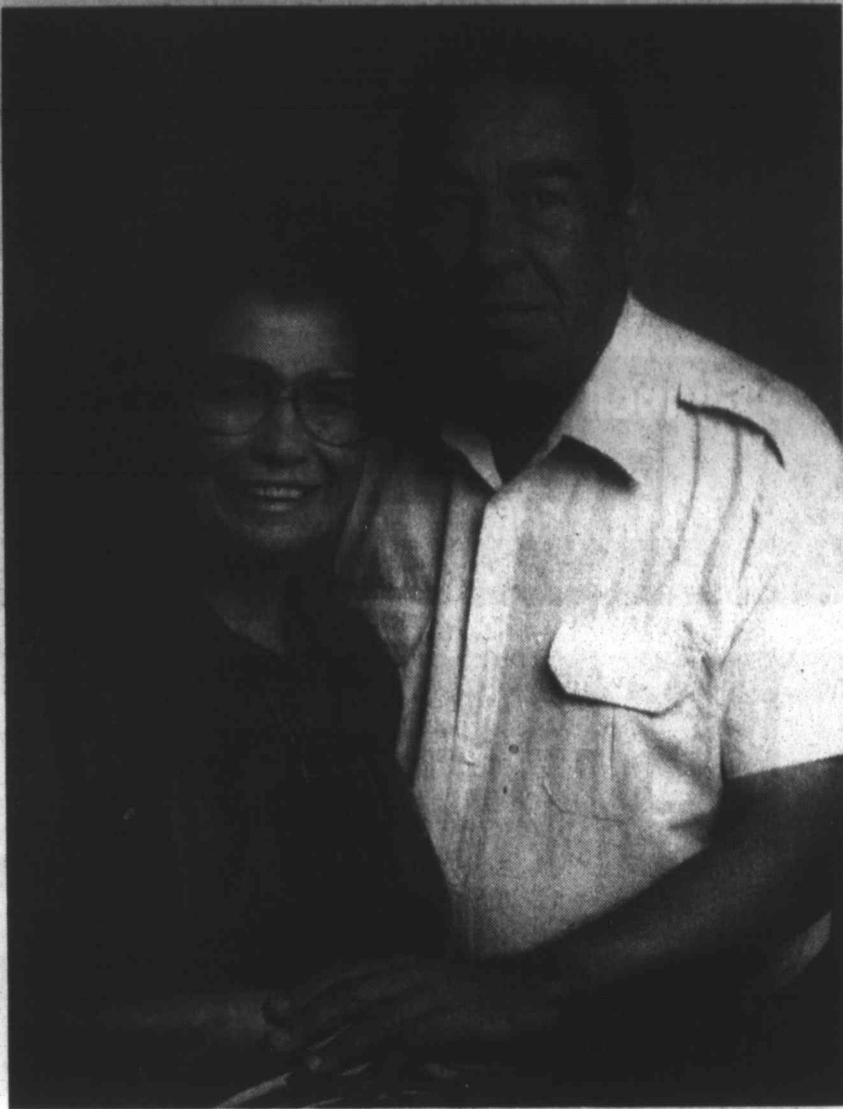

Cloud Seeding Begun: Precipitation Enhancement Program Begins Third Year Of Operation

Three underground water conservation districts in the Texas High Plains have resumed precipitation enhancement operations within a 17-county target area, including Lynn County, to attempt to increase the natural recharge to the Ogallala Aquifer.

Effective Feb. 1, the 1999 Central Southern High Plains Rainfall Enhancement Program target area includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock, Lamb, Lynn, Parmer, Terry, and Yoakum counties, as well as portions of Armstrong, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Potter, and Randall counties. Curry, Roosevelt, and southwestern Quay counties of New Mexico are expected to join the program on May 1.

"We hope we will have more precipitation enhancement opportunities this year," said A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District manager. "Because of persistent drought conditions, there were many days last year when we did not have a cloud in the sky. When clouds finally formed, it appeared that they were affected by smoke particles in the atmosphere resulting from the forest fires in Mexico. This eliminated many clouds as suitable targets for cloud seeding."

Precipitation enhancement, or cloud seeding, is an attempt to stimulate clouds to generate more rainfall than they would otherwise by adding silver iodide as a seeding agent. The silver iodide provides additional condensation nuclei that can allow

more cloud moisture to be converted to large enough raindrops to survive the fall through the dry subcloud layer and reach the ground as meaningful rainfall.

The agricultural and social benefits associated with increased precipitation include the potential for increased crop yields, improved livestock grazing conditions, reduced irrigation pumpage, improved water quality, and increased rainfall runoff into reservoirs used for drinking water supplies and recreational purposes.

Weather Modification Incorporated (WMI) of Fargo, North Dakota is returning as the contractor for the 1999 project. Under the contract, WMI provides a project meteorologist who uses weather radar displays, standard meteorological data and forecasting procedures, surface weather observations, and pilot reports to select clouds suitable for seeding. With this information, the meteorologist in the C-band radar unit at the Littlefield airport can direct aircraft stationed at Amarillo and Lubbock to eject silver iodide flares at cloud-top levels into selected clouds within the target area. A third aircraft will be stationed at Portales when the New Mexico participants join the program on May 1.



2-8" Moisture May Be Needed To Bring Lynn County Soils To Field Capacity

Lynn County producers may need from two to eight inches of water from irrigation and/or precipitation to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity prior to spring 1999 planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS).

At the time pre-plant soil moisture readings were made in November/December 1998, approximately six percent of the portion of Lynn County served by the High Plains Water District needed about two to four inches of moisture to bring the soil to field capacity. Approximately 54 percent of the county needed four to six inches of moisture and the remaining 40 percent needed from six to eight inches of moisture.

However, two precipitation events have occurred since the 1999 pre-plant soil moisture survey was conducted. Precipitation totals ranging from a half inch to three inches were recorded within the 15-county Water District service area in late January.

"This precipitation reduced the soil moisture deficit. Therefore, it is extremely important for producers to

check soil moisture conditions in their individual fields before the start of pre-plant irrigation," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.

A Water District publication, *Estimating Soil Moisture By Feel and Appearance*, can guide producers in assessing their soil moisture conditions. Anyone within the High Plains Water District service area can request a free copy by contacting the District's Lubbock office at (806) 762-0181.

If it is determined that pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the soil to field capacity, it is recommended that it be done early enough so that the 1999 crop has a full soil moisture profile to draw on during the growing season.

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five-foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity.

493 Center Pivot Sprinkler Systems Operating Within Lynn County

Approximately 493 center pivot sprinkler systems are currently in operation within Lynn County, according to a recent High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 inventory.

This represents an additional 185 center pivot sprinkler systems installed in the county since the previous 1995 inventory.

Given an average cost of \$35,000 per center pivot sprinkler system, the 493 pivots in operation within Lynn County represent a \$17,255,000 investment in water conservation by local agricultural producers.

"This inventory shows that farmers are making huge investments to be more efficient in applying ground water for irrigation," said Ken Carver, High Plains Water District Assistant Manager. "The center pivot sprinkler systems provide more flex-

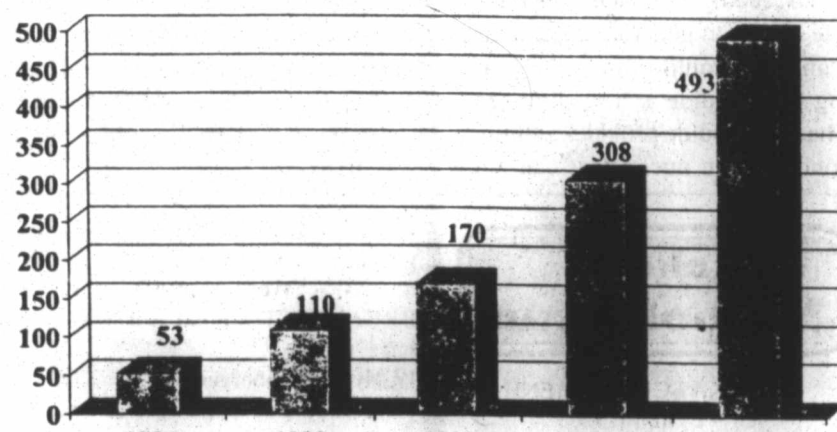
ibility in irrigating and help maintain crop yields with less water."

Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler systems can achieve irrigation application efficiencies of up to 98 percent. Since the ground water is applied at low pressure directly into the furrow, water losses associated with evaporation and wind drift are almost eliminated.

LEPA systems also help reduce labor and fuel costs and save 20 to 40 percent of the water pumped for irrigation as compared to conventional furrow irrigation.

Cancer Information, Resource Service Now Available Through Cancer Help Line

The American Cancer Society has announced that Texans will now benefit from its new cancer information and resource service — a national "one-stop" help line for up-to-date cancer information as well as local cancer resources. The American Cancer Society's new service is now available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is the only national cancer help line in the country that can offer both general and localized information.

The American Cancer Society estimates that nearly 77,400 residents in Texas will be diagnosed with cancer this year and as a result, find themselves in a frightening new realm of foreign medical terms and life-altering decisions. The Society's help line offers cancer patients and their loved ones a single place to turn for help in understanding the challenges ahead. Specially trained cancer information specialists spend time with callers, answering questions about their specific disease, the various diagnostic tests they may face, available treatment options, pain control methods and any other questions that may arise.

A unique advantage of the service is nationwide access to an extensive database of local cancer resources such as support groups, cancer care facilities, patient service programs and local social services. Specialists can connect callers with local services or resources in most other cities — a particular benefit for callers who are caring for loved ones from afar.

"A cancer diagnosis is an overwhelming experience," said Phil Evans, M.D., president, American Cancer Society. "The physician is the first source of information, but patients may forget or even be too frightened to ask their doctor ques-

tions. The information that a patient or family member receives from this service can help them formulate questions that facilitates communication between patient and doctor."

Evans also stressed the importance of the human touch provided by the cancer information specialists.

"There is no substitute for the spoken voice, for the contact with another individual who understands and can even anticipate a caller's needs."

The American Cancer Society's cancer information specialists rely on their psychology or social work backgrounds to handle sometimes emotionally difficult calls. Oncology registered nurses are often on-staff to assist with any clinical questions that may arise. Callers can have their questions answered over the phone and/or request an information packet be mailed or faxed. Special deliveries are available upon request. Mailed materials are sent within the next business day, usually arriving within three or four business days. Sensitive to patients' privacy, the American Cancer Society always offers the option of having materials sent in an unmarked envelope.

"With so many sources of information available today, patients often come to me with inaccurate or outdated information," Evans said. "The American Cancer Society is a trusted authority where I know my patients will get the proper information and resources they need to help them through their illness."

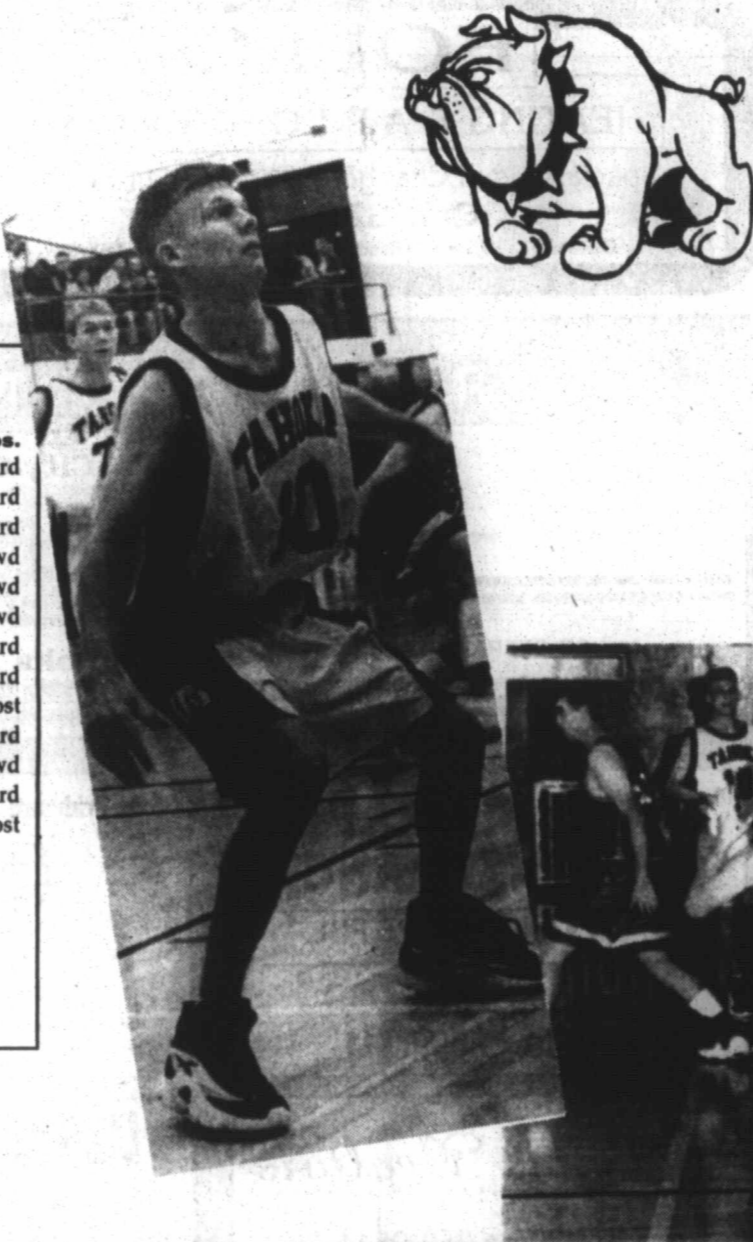

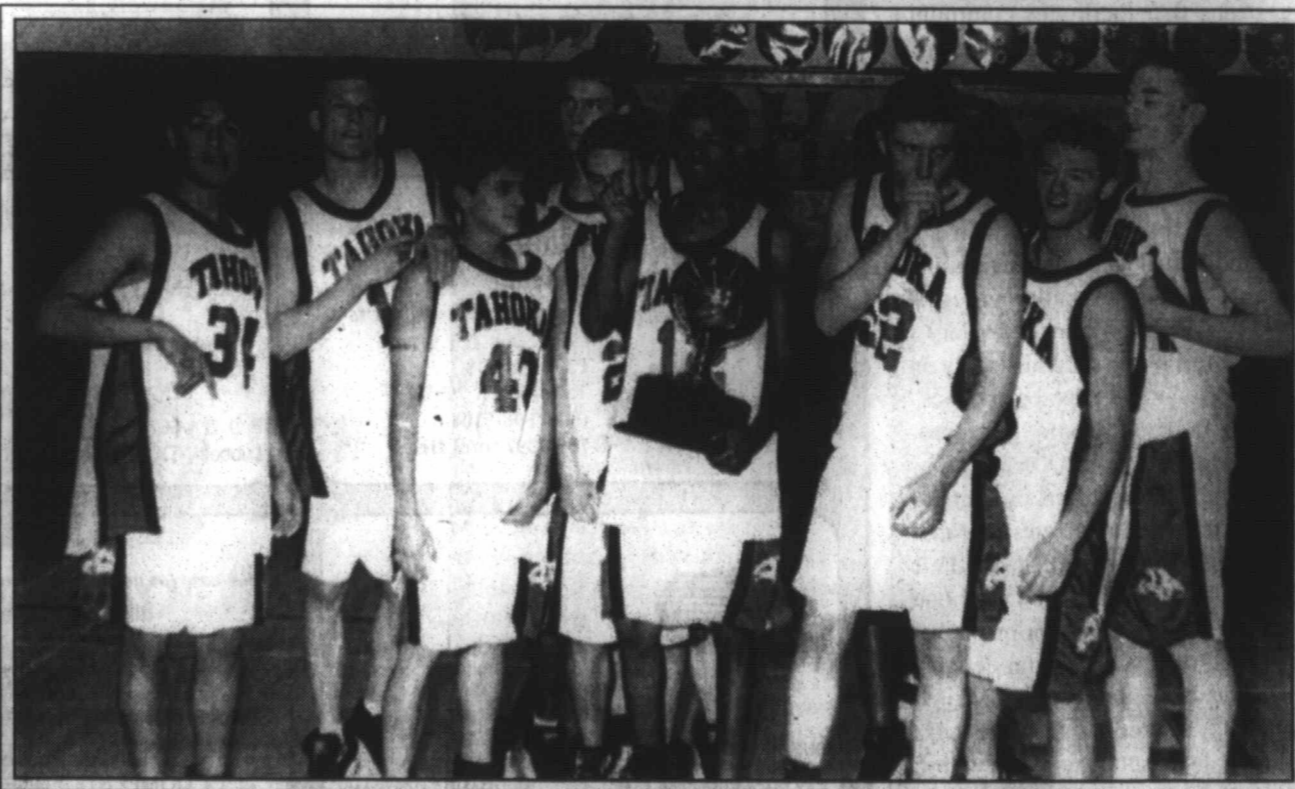
