

Dogs, Eagles Win Bi-District; **Area Games Set This Friday**

teams have claimed Area playoff berths with wins this week in the Bi-District pairups. Tahoka and O'Donnell will travel to Big Spring and Plainview, respectively, for Friday night matches.

The Tahoka Bulldogs claimed Bi-District Championship honors in the Class 2A playoffs with a 61-54 win over Sundown in Brownfield Monday night. The win puts Tahoka in the Area playoffs, where Coach Rusty Frazier's Bulldogs (17-13) will face District 4-2A champion Ozona (21-10). The game is scheduled for 8 p.m. Friday at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum on the Howard College campus in Big Spring. Ozona had a bidistrict bye to advance to the area round

O'Donnell's Ramiro Montez led his team with 20 points in the Eagle's Class 1A bi-district victory over Larry Davis and Matt Chancy each Whitharral, 68-52, Tuesday night. The Eagles and their fans will head for Plainview Friday night, where the Eagles will take on Motley County in the Area playoffs. The game is set for 7 p.m. in the Wayland Baptist University gym. Motley County (21-9) edged out another Lynn County team, the Wilson Mustangs, 53-51 in bi-district. O'Donnell was evenly matched with Whitharral during the first period Tuesday night, trailing by only three at the half, but the Eagles pulled away with a strong second half to claim the Bi-District Championship honors. Manny Gutierrez tossed in 14 points for the Eagles, and Tatum Bessire added 12. The Eagles scored 18 points to Whitharral's 6 in the third period, and then clinched the win with another 20 points to the Panthers' 13 in the final quarter.

Two Lynn County boys basketball Dogs took an early lead in the bi-district match, leading 22-7 at the end of the first period, and never relinquished their lead although the Roughnecks charged back with a 30point rally in the final quarter.

The Dogs led 28-16 at the half, and gained a big 17-point lead going into the final quarter with a score of 41-24. 

After a few minutes, he stopped explaining, and his daughter was standing there with an astonished look on her face. Her father queried her, "Honey, what made you decide to ask that question?"



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

Cloud Seeding Begun: Precipitation Enhancement Program Begins Third Year Of Operation

Three underground water conservation districts in the Texas High Plains have resumed precipitation enhancement operations within a 17county target area, including Lynn County, to attempt to increase the natural recharge to the Ogallala Aquifer.

Effective Feb. 1, the 1999 Central Southern High Plains Rainfall Enhancement Program target area includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock, Lamb, Lynn, Parmer, Terry, and Yoakum counties, as well as portions of Armstrong, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Potter, and Randall counties. Curry, Roosevelt, and southwestern Quay counties of New Mexico are expected to join the program on May 1.

"We hope we will have more precipitation enhancement opportunities this year," said A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District manager. "Because of persistent drought conditions, there were many days last year when we did not have a cloud in the sky. When clouds finally formed, it appeared that they were affected by smoke particles in the atmosphere resulting from the forest fires in Mexico. This eliminated many clouds as suitable targets for cloud seeding."

Precipitation enhancement, or cloud seeding, is an attempt to stimulate clouds to generate more rainfall than they would otherwise by adding silver iodide as a seeding agent. The silver iodide provides additional condensation nuclei that can allow

more cloud moisture to be converted to large enough raindrops to survive the fall through the dry subcloud layer and reach the ground as meaningful rainfall.

The agricultural and social benefits associated with increased precipitation include the potential for increased crop yields, improved livestock grazing conditions, reduced irrigation pumpage, improved water quality, and increased rainfall runoff into reservoirs used for drinking water supplies and recreational purposes.


Weather Modification Incorporated (WMI) of Fargo, North Dakota is returning as the contractor for the 1999 project. Under the contract, WMI provides a project meteorologist who uses weather radar displays, standard meteorological data and forecasting procedures, surface weather observations, and pilot reports to select clouds suitable for seeding. With this information, the meteorologist in the C-band radar unit at the Littlefield airport can direct aircraft stationed at Amarillo and Lubbock to eject silver iodide flares at cloud-top levels into selected clouds within the target area. A third aircraft will be stationed at Portales when the New Mexico participants join the program on May 1.





493 Center Pivot Sprinkler Systems Operating Within Lynn County

Approximately 493 center pivot sprinkler systems are currently in operation within Lynn County, according to a recent High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 inventory.

This represents an additional 185 center pivot sprinkler systems installed in the county since the previous 1995 inventory.

Given an average cost of \$35,000 per center pivot sprinkler system, the 493 pivots in operation within Lynn County represent a \$17,255,000 investment in water conservation by local agricultural producers.

"This inventory shows that farmers are making huge investments to be more efficient in applying ground water for irrigation," said Ken ibility in irrigating and help maintain crop yields with less water."

Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinkler systems can achieve irrigation application efficiencies of up to 98 percent. Since the ground water is applied at low pressure directly into the furrow, water losses associated with evaporation and wind drift are almost eliminated.

LEPA systems also help reduce labor and fuel costs and save 20 to 40 percent of the water pumped for irrigation as compared to conventional furrow irrigation.

2-8" Moisture May Be Needed To Bring Lynn County Soils To Field Capacity

Lynn County producers may need from two to eight inches of water from irrigation and/or precipitation to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity prior to " spring 1999 planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS).

At the time pre-plant soil moisture readings were made in November/December 1998, approximately six percent of the portion of Lynn County served by the High Plains Water District needed about two to four inches of moisture to bring the soil to field capacity. Approximately 54 percent of the county needed four to six inches of moisture and the remaining 40 percent needed from six to eight inches of moisture.

However, two precipitation events have occurred since the 1999 preplant soil moisture survey was conducted. Precipitation totals ranging from a half inch to three inches were recorded within the 15-county Water District service area in late January.

"This precipitation reduced the soil moisture deficit. Therefore, it is extremely important for producers to

check soil moisture conditions in their individual fields before the start of pre-plant irrigation," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.


A Water District publication, Estimating Soil Moisture By Feel and Appearance, can guide producers in assessing their soil moisture conditions. Anyone within the High Plains Water District service area can request a free copy by contacting the District's Lubbock office at (806) 762-0181.

If it is determined that pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the soil to field capacity, it is recommended that it be done early enough so that the 1999 crop has a full soil moisture profile to draw on during the growing season.

Historical data shows that aboveaverage crop yields are more likely when the five-foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity.
