Denny Belew Receives Distinguished Service Award

Denny Belew, agricultural education teacher at Tahoka High School, recently received the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas Distinguished Service Award for his 30 years of membership in the organization.

This award is designed to commend individuals who are dedicated and supportive of agricultural education in Texas. Belew was presented the award during the Agriculture Teachers' Professional Development Conference on July 28, in Waco.

"This year's conference focused on the partnership between agricul-

ture science technology and local communities," said Ben Shaw, state director of agriculture education. Shaw said that the conference draws agricultural science and technology teachers from around the state and provides them with the opportunity to learn about new and emerging concepts in the field of agriculture as well as learn from other professionals in the state.

In Texas, there are over 109,000 students enrolled in agricultural science classes and over 950 agricultural science and technology programs in the state.

Mary Helen Morin of Tahoka reported that a window at her residence had been broken in July and that she wanted to file charges against the person who broke it.

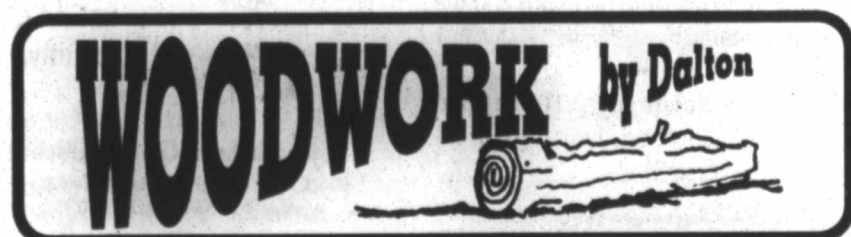
The body of Edgar Marvin Hammonds, 91, was discovered in his home on Lockwood Tuesday. Justice of the Peace Terri Walker ruled death by natural causes.

Kenneth Turner, 42-year-old Tahoka man who was found unconscious in the street in Tahoka July 31, remained unconscious and in critical condition this week in University

Medical Center, Lubbock. Officers still are unsure if his head injuries were caused by a fall or other means.

Eleven persons were jailed during the last week. One was held on a warrant from Midland County for theft by check, plus charges of possession of marijuana under two ounces, possession of narcotics paraphernalia and no auto liability insurance. Another was charged with no drivers license plus no liability insurance plus no tail light. A third person was charged with 16 traffic warrants from Lubbock County.

Other charges which resulted in arrests were expired vehicle registration and failure to appear, possession of marijuana and narcotics paraphernalia, bench warrant, driving while license suspended and theft by check in Ector County, Potter County warrant for theft and no drivers license, driving while intoxicated first offense, DWI second offense plus driving while license suspended, failure to appear on driving while license suspended and no liability insurance.

Food falls into the same category; that is, you never know for sure what's good for you and what will hurt you. One scientific report will say that eggs or red meat, or whatever, are to be avoided because they will kill you. Another report later will say that these things are very good for you and you need to eat them.

No matter what it is, one report says they are great and another says they are poison. Any day now, I expect someone to report on a study showing that sunscreen causes skin cancer.

Some people believe Vitamin C helps prevent colds, and it has even been suggested that a person take several thousand milligrams a day, especially in the winter. This may work, possibly because a person is so busy taking vitamins all day he or she has little time left to get out and mingle with the people who give you colds.

I take some vitamins because they just might help. I went out and bought some vitamin E recently because a guy on the radio said it helps prevent memory loss.

However, most days I can't remember to take them.

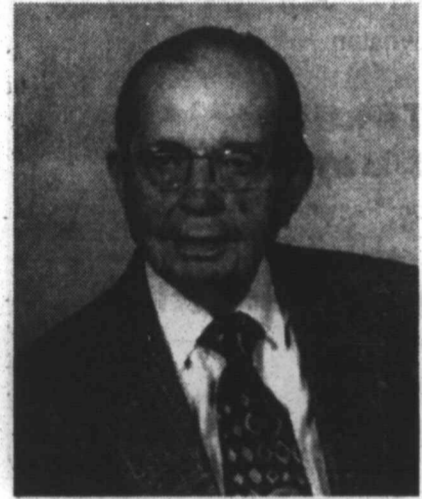

He died Wednesday, Aug. 4, 1999 in Longview.

He was born Nov. 28, 1900, in Bernice, La. He graduated from Shreveport High School in 1920, and from Baylor College of Dentistry in 1928. He moved to Tahoka from Shreveport in 1928. He married Eloise Hutchinson on Aug. 29, 1929. He was a charter member of the South Plains Dental Society, served as its first secretary from 1937-47, and was president in 1949. He was a member of Southwest Society of Dental Prostheses, Texas State Dental Association, the American Academy of the History of Dentistry, and a life member of the American Dental Association. He was elected to membership in the American College of Dentists in 1948. He served as president of the Texas section of the American College of Dentists in 1960. At the time of his retirement in 1978, he had one of the largest dental practices in the Lubbock area, and the only office in the area with three dentists and a full-time laboratory technician.

He was a member of First Baptist Church in Tahoka for 71 years, a deacon for over 60 years, a choir member for over 40 years, and he taught Sunday school. He served on the Tahoka City Council from 1937-51, and was mayor for four of those years. As mayor, he led in building the large water tank and in continuing the street paving program. He was a charter member of the Tahoka Rotary Club, and was its president in 1940-41. The club honored him with the Paul Harris award in 1997. He was a leader in developing the Tahoka Pioneer Museum, and served as its first chairman. He was active in the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce which named him Man of the Year in 1987. He was also a Mason.

He was preceded in death by his wife in 1991 and a daughter, Margaret McMeans in 1983.

Survivors include a son, Ken of Longview; a daughter, Dot Park of Runaway Bay; 10 grandchildren; and 20 great-grandchildren.
