Beer/Wine Sales Proposition Defeated In Wilson Election

Voters in the city of Wilson said no to the legalization of beer/wine sales within the city limits, by a margin of 23 in a Local Option Election held Saturday. A total of 201 votes were canvassed, with 112 against and 89 in favor of the proposition. Early voting surpassed records from any previous Wilson city election, with 80 ballots marked.

The election is the second to be held in Lynn County since prohibition was passed in 1915. The first local option election, held in Wilson last August, was defeated by voters 101-66.

In both instances, the elections were held due to the efforts of Conner Parish, owner of the Country Store in Wilson, who fulfilled legal requirements, including petitions signed by at least 35 percent of registered voters within the city of Wilson, to request the elections be held. In requesting Saturday's election, Parish presented county officials with a petition signed by 132 individuals. There are 367 registered voters within the city limits of Wilson, according to county voter registrar

Although the request for the local option election went through county channels, election costs were paid by the City of Wilson, which amounted to approximately \$400 according to city officials.

After the official results of the election were posted Saturday evening, Lynn County Sheriff's Officers were called twice to Wilson by residents complaining of the behavior of a group of several adults at a location downtown on FM 400 who were reportedly complaining loudly about the election failing and throwing empty beer cans at cars passing

O'Donnell Councilman **Resigns Unexpectedly**

Phil Bairrington, who was reelected last May to the O'Donnell City Council, resigned his position unexpectedly during a city council meeting Tuesday night. The resignation followed a heated discussion between Bairrington and O'Donnell Mayor James Williams concerning a recent city audit, sources report.

Reportedly, Williams challenged statements made by Bairrington to others that the city's annual financial audit had violations reported in the auditor's letter. Williams said that the auditor's letter did not say the city was in violation in any way, but merely contained helpful suggestions from auditors about the manner in which financial records could be maintained.

After several heated exchanges, Bairrington reportedly penned a hasty letter of resignation on paper, handed it to the city secretary, and

left the meeting, sources said. Other members of the city council include Ben Edwards, Larry Pyron, Oscar Calzada, and Max Mendieta. Bairrington had a year and a half remaining on his term. No information was available on whether the council will appoint someone to fill the position for the remainder of the term or until the next election.

After presenting the check to Mrs. Draper, the Tockers toured the library and other facilities at the Life Enrichment Center in Tahoka, expressing their pleasure in the facilities and visiting with library board members, as well as with city representative Retha Pittman and Lynn County Judge J.F.

"We're thrilled the Tocker family came to Tahoka to look at our facilities in person," said Mrs. Draper. "When you walk into our library, it's evident what the Tocker Foundation has done for the library," she added.

In addition to the grant funding presented Friday, the Tocker Foundation has provided funding of approximately \$7200 in the past for reference books, a copier, large book carousel and children's furniture in the City/County Library.

The Tocker Foundation was established in 1964 to implement the philanthropic interests of Phillip and Olive Tocker. In 1992 the foundation board decided to focus grant distribution to small rural libraries in Texas serving a population of 12,000 or less, and that year provided approximately \$12,000 in grants. This year, the foundation has provided grants in excess of a million dollars, Tocker told the Tahoka group.

New Home Utility Rates Going Up

City of New Home utility rates will be going up soon, with city council members approving new rates effective Oct. 20. Water rates will be raised from \$6 to \$10 for the first 2000 gallons and \$1.50 per thousand thereafter. Sewer rates will go up from \$6 to \$10 per month, and garbage collection rates will go up \$2, from the current \$6 to \$8 per month, plus tax.

WHEN SOMETHING sounded really loud or really bad, like Roseanne Barr mangling the national anthem at the Super Bowl one year, my grandmother used to refer to the noise as "an unGodly racket" or sometimes she would say, "That sounds like a dying calf in a hailstorm."

Grandma has been dead for quite a few years, but I remember wondering as a child and even as a young adult exactly what she meant by some of her sayings, although a few of them were pretty easy to translate.

An "unGodly racket" would be a noise that would be an affront even to God, but I could only imagine what a dying calf in a hailstorm would sound like, since I never heard one. I'm sure it would be a disturbing noise, especially if you owned the calf or belonged to some animal rights group.

Some of the other references she would make included "slower than molasses in January", "tearing up Jake," having "more (of something) than Cox's army" and telling me that "your eyes are bigger than your stomach."

I still don't know who Jake was, but I did know that this referred to being destructive to the point of vandalism, and it took me years to understand that the eyes/stomach remark meant I was taking more food on my plate than I could eat, and thereby being wasteful.

Later in life I learned (I don't remember where) that "Cox's army" really was "Coxey's army" and that the maximum number of people in the "army," which was really a protest marching group, was about 500.

According to my computer's Grolier Encyclopedia, which comes close to knowing everything, Coxey's Army was a contingent of unemployed workers who marched on Washington DC in 1894 (most marches are organized so the TV cameras can show them, but not this one). A man named Jacob Coxey organized the march to protest unemployment. The army, about 100 strong, left Massilon, Ohio, on Easter Sunday 1894. When it arrived in Washington May 1, it had grown to about 500 and was immediately broken up by the police.

Obviously they had better ways of handling protest marches

Anyway, he bought shiny tin buckets and sealed each gallon and left the buckets all over the house until one day he would gather them up and go sell them, to stores, I think.

I do know the syrup was very black, very thick and tasted great with biscuits and butter, at least to a 7-year-old who was many years away from knowledge about high cholesterol, triglycerides and glucose and all those things medical science later came up with to try to make people feel bad about eating good






Regular household garbage may be placed inside dumpsters, as well as bagged grass clippings.
