Theft, Vandalism Are Investigated
A burglary and an incident of vandalism to a vehicle were among during the last week.
Raymond Vega of Tahoka reported Friday that his 1999 Ford Ranger pickup had been scratched with a key or other instrument all
along one side. Preliminary estimate of damage was $\$ 1,000$.
Benny Onofre of Tahoka reported that his residence had been burglarized last Wednesday and rap and Spanish CDs in a black case had been stolen. They were valued at
$\$ 200$.

WHEN SOMETHING sounded really loud or really bad, like Roseanne Barr mangling the national anthem at the Super Bowl one year, my grandmother used to refer to the noise as "an unGodly racket" or sometimes she would say, "That sounds like a dying calf in a hailstorm."

An "unGodly racket" would be a noise that would be an affront even to God, but I could only imagine what a dying calf in a hailstorm would sound like, since I never heard one. I'm sure it would be a disturbing noise, especially if you owned the calf or belonged to some animal rights group.

Some of the other references she would make included "slower than molasses in January" , "tearing up Jake," having more (of something) than Cox's army" and telling me that "your eyes are bigger than your stomach."

I still don't know who Jake was, but I did know that this referred to being destructive to the point of vandalism, and it ook me years Io understand hat poy esisto mach remark neant I was laking mor hereby being wasteful.

Later in life l learned (I don't remember where) that "Cox's army" really was "Coxey's army" and that the maximum numeer of people in the "army," which was really a protest marching group, was about 500 .
According to my computer's Grolier Encyclopedia, which comes close to knowing everything, Coxey's Army was a coningent in unemployed workers who marched on Washington C in 1894 (most marches are organized so the TV cameras can show them, but not this one). A man named Jacob Coxey 100 strong left March to protest unemployment. The army, about it arrived in Washington May 1, it had grown to about 500 and was immediately broken up by the police.

Obviously they had better ways of handling protest marches than they do now.
"Slower than molasses in January" is pretty easy to understand, since syrup gets thicker in cold weather (I usually get hicker in the winter myself). I do know the syrup was very black, very thick and tasted great with biscuits and butter, at.least to a 7 -year-old who was many years away from knowledge about high cholesterol, triglycerides and glucose and all those things medical science later came up with to try to make people feel bad about eating good things.

Beer/Wine Sales Proposition Defeated In Wilson Election

Voters in the city of Wilson said questing Saturday's election, Parish no to the legalization of beer/wine sales within the city limits, by a margin of 23 in a Local Option Election held Saturday. A total of 201 votes

were canvassed with 112 against and 89 in favor of the proposition. Early voting surpassed records from any previous Wilson city election, with 80 ballots marked.
The election is the second to be held in Lynn County since prohibition was passed in 1915. The first local option election, held in Wilson last August, was defeated by votrs
$101-66$. In both instances, the election
were held due to the efforts of Conne Parish, owner of the Country Store in Wilson, who fulfilled legal requirements, including petitions signed by at least 35 percent of registered voters within the city of Wilson, to re-
quest the elections be held. In re-
presented county officials with a pe tition signed by 132 individuals. There are 367 registered voter within the city limits of Wilson, ac records. Althoug option election went throughe local channels, election costs were paid by the City of Wilson, which mounted to approximately $\$ 400$ ac cording to city officials.
