



according to the telephone company district manager. The theft of transmission wires also have reached serious proportions. The current legislation is n effort to curb such situations,

According to SB309, which beame law June 16, it is a misdemeanor to obtain telecommunication service with the intent to defraud any individual or company through the use of fictitious telephone numbers of false credit cards.

Defrauding or misrepresenting through the use of a code or any prearranged trick or scheme where the telephone is involved is also covered in the

Charging calls to false, nonxistent or discontinued telephone numbers is classified as a misdemeanor by the legislation and carries up to a \$1,000 fine and/or up to one year in jail for violation of the law.

Senate Bill 366, which becomes effective August 27. states that it is a misdemeanor to maliciously obstruct emergen-Shipments of eating plums cy telephone calls or to secure the use of the telephone line by much larger than usual for this falsely claiming that an emergency exists.

Any person refusing to relinquish immediately a party line when such line is needed for an emergency call to a fire department, police department, medical or ambulance service after compiles this monthly plentiful having been informed that an emergency exists, will be guilty

of a violation of this law. Fines of \$25 to \$500 and-or up to one month in jail are the penalties levied on a person guilty of violation of this law.

Publication of the party line law must be inserted in telephone directories and also stuffed into the subscriber's statements at least once a year, according to the law.

Muleshoe's so-called library is made up of approximately 2.000 books housed in a room about 9 feet by 15 feet. In order to keep this number of books in this amount of space, it is necessary to pile them one atop the other in stacks on top of the few meager shelves and in corners.

Mrs. E. R. Wright, who has served as librarian in the Muleshoe Library since 1943, is unable, due to lack of space and facilities, to even file books in proper order.

Mrs. Wright reports that about 200 persons have reading cards which ae used regularly. These people keep her busy serving them. But how can she serve them? With books over a year old!

NO NEW BOOKS HAVE BEEN BOUGHT in a full year for the library. Therefore, these 200 plus readers are unable to enjoy the newer books being published. There are approximately 5,000 new titles published each year by publishers in the United States alone. Certainly Muleshoe could not afford more than a fraction of this number, but it could certainly afford to buy the better titles being printed.

What can be done to remedy this deplorable situation? County and City Commissioners both turned down the library when offered its facilities as a gift.

Muleshoe Study Club has sponsored the library, in conjunction with the county and city, for some time. They can no longer afford to support the undertaking, however, in the way they feel is needed. They offered to give the books in the present library, located in the County Court House, to either the city or county or both. Both declined the gift.

If government will not dicharge an obligation and a private group is unable to do so, then what can be done? What can be done, you ask? Popular subscription is the only answer.

A small group cannot hope to do what a large group must do. Government is composed of a large group, but government sometimes is unable to act. People are not held back by red tape and fear in a situation of this kind, however. People can get together and do what small groups and government cannot do. So why not unite?

Bailey County has a rich historic background and a need for a library. Combine the two and there is only one conclusion-combine a museum and library.

The Journal editor will begin action toward a popular subscription for a combined museum-library by pledging \$50 toward construction of same. Who will join in this endeavor? Those who donate funds for this purpose will find their names in these editorial columns on an honor roll of Library Boosters. Contact Mrs. Thurman White or Mrs. Sherman Sweatman to help in this fight against an intellectual vacuum.
