"No matter their means or method of shopping, wise consumers will avoid post-holiday hassle by asking two important questions up front: what is this merchant's record in the marketplace? And, what is this merchant's refund and exchange policy? Knowing the answers ahead of time will save both time and money," said Nan Campbell, president of the Better Business Bureau of the South Plains (BBB).

CHECK ON . THE **BUSINESS'S RELIABILITY - "The** single best piece of advice we can offer to shoppers is to purchase from businesses and stores that you know to be reliable or whose record in the

## File Deeds For Ownership: Warranty Deeds Are A 'Must' When Buying Cemetery Plots

Have you ever thought of a cemetery plot as a land or property purchase? Many people are not aware of the importance of a warranty deed and the legal actions to consider when buying or selling cemetery plots.

According to Tahoka City Administrative Assistant Retha Pittman, the buyer receives a warranty deed when they purchase a cemetery plot from the city.

"Many people do not realize when they purchase a cemetery plot from the city it is treated just like a land purchase," said Mrs. Pittman. "This means you should file the deed with the county clerk's office. When you file the deed it serves as a recorded legal document," she explained.

Lynn County Clerk Susan Tipton said people are not aware they should automatically file their deed with the county clerk's office after they purchase a cemetery plot. She said it is very important to file the deed with the county clerk because it is documented proof that a person has purchased and owns a specific plot.

"You may have purchased a cemetery plot 20 years ago and lost or misplaced the deed," said Mrs. Tipton. "If you have filed the deed with our office we have it on record, which serves a legal proof," she ex-

"If you have not filed your deed with our office there is no record of your purchase, and legally you cannot use the plot," warned the county clerk

Another problem, according tocity and county officials, is that people are buying and selling cemetery plots from individuals without obtaining a warranty deed or transferring the deed into their name.

This leads to several problems. "If a person has purchased a cemetery plot from another individual, and they do not transfer the deed into their name, there is no document or proof to verify they purchased the plot," said Mrs. Pittman. "The deed is the only legal proof of purchase,"

she reiterated. When a question arises over ownership of a plot, city officials must abide by legal documentation.

"People who are not aware of the necessary actions end up in this situation when they have to bury a loved one. They find out they cannot use the plot," added Mrs. Pittman.

Mrs. Pittman said when one purchases a plot from another individual, one should always obtain the deed. She said it is just like selling a car the buyer is given the title to the vehicle, which is proof of purchase and legal ownership.

Mrs. Tipton said after purchasing the plot and obtaining the deed, the next step is to transfer the deed into the new owner's name. This can be done at the county clerk's office and involves a small fee.

When the deed has been transferred it should be filed with the county clerk's office. Filing a deed with the county clerk's offices serves many purposes. The deed serves a legal and historical record, and as a resource for genealogical purposes.

In Tahoka, the city has many cemetery plots available in the newer Nevels Cemetery, at a cost of \$300 per space. In the old Tahoka Cemetery, however, all the plots have been sold and are only available if owners want to sell individual plots.



The Lynn County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring a water well screening day for area residents on Tuesday, Dec. 14 at the Center for Housing and Community Development, located at 1400 Ave. K in Tahoka. The screening day is designed to inform private water well owners and users of the condition of their well water and of possible contamination from two common contaminants - fecal coliform and nitrate.

The presence of fecal coliforms in water indicates that feces (bodily waste from humans or animals) may have contaminated the water. Water contaminated with feces has microorganisms present that can cause a number of "waterborne" diseases such as cholera, typhoid, and dysentery.

Nitrates in ground water at levels of 10 millograms per liter (parts per million) is considered unsafe for human consumption because nitrate levels above 10 mg/L can disrupt the blood's ability to carry oxygen throughout the body. Nitrate is con-

verted to nitrate which combines with hemoglobin, the chemical that carries oxygen in the blood, to form methemoglobin. Oxygen can not bind with methemoglobin, therefore, oxygen is not carried throughout the body. As a result, oxygen starvation occurs. This condition is called methemoglobinemia. If left untreated, death may result. Infants less than six months in age and young livestock are most susceptible to methemoglobinemia.

The cost of the water screening is \$3 per sample. Anyone wishing to have their water sampled must contact the Extension office by Friday, Dec. 10 to receive an approved water sampling bag and instructions for taking a sample. Extension officials request that only sampling bags from the Extension Service be used and that all instructions for proper sampling be followed to insure accurate results.

## Water Management **Conference Planned** For December 14

Franco, along with the support of volunteers, will be able to seek out and meet with seniors in their hometowns at sites such as senior citizen or community centers. These meetings will be able to offer a personal support to seniors in need of benefit understanding and counseling.

The other important volunteer recruitment area in the aging programs is long-term care advocacy. Nursing homes, assisted living, and personal care homes are monitored on a regular basis by the aging programs staff ombudsman, Paul Moore. Moore said volunteers are needed to visit nursing facility residents on a weekly basis to ensure quality care and life based on the Residents Rights Amendment in the Older Americans Act of 1965.

Extensive training is available to anyone interested in becoming an advocate at a community nursing facility. Volunteers can be married couples, college or high school students, retired individuals or someone with a nursing/social worker background. Volunteers will assist residents, family members and staff to find answers to questions, problems or complaints.

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




