ACCORDING to a guy I know who has an engineering degree from Texas Tech, next Wednesday night (or maybe early Wednesday morning after midnight) we may be able to drive around without our headlights on.

Of course; you may get a ticket for driving without lights. But my source says if there happens to be a little snow on the ground, it could be an especially bright night, because this year will bring a rare full moon to occur on the winter solstice, Dec. 22, commonly called the first day of winter.

My friend then says (he can't help talking somewhat in scientific gobbledegook), that "since a full moon on the winter solstice occurred in conjunction with a lunar perigee (point in the moon's orbit that is closest to Earth), the moon will appear about 14% larger than it does at apogee (the point in it's elliptical orbit that is farthest from the Earth) since the Earth is also several million miles closer to the sun at this time of the year than in the summer, sunlight striking the moon is about 7% stronger, making it brighter. Also, this will be the closest perigee of the Moon of the year since the moon's orbit is constantly deforming."

That's what he said. I thought a perigee was what you needed when you went to sell your dog. And an apogee is what you need to make when you've done something bad.

Anyway, he went on to say that if the weather is clear and there is a snow cover where you live, it is believed that even car headlights will be superfluous. (That's another big word, meaning you don't need none).

"In laymen's terms," he said (finally!), it will be a super bright full moon, much more than the usual AND it hasn't happened this way for 133 years! Our ancestors 133 years ago saw this. Our descendants 100 or so years from now will see it again.

I guess I'd better go out and see the moon next Tuesday night or Wednesday (he never did make it clear which time would be best). I wouldn't want to miss something which happens only once in 133 year

# **Filing Period Continues For Local Elections**

The filing period continues this week for candidates interested in Lynn County positions, with two new candidates listed this week. District Attorney Ricky Smith of Lamesa has filed for re-election to that seat, and a candidate has filed a declaration of intent to run as an independent candidate in the November general election for the position of Lynn County Attorney. The filing period for the March Primaries continues through-

out December, closing Jan. 3. All of the candidates who have filed, except for the independent candidate, will be listed on the March 14, 2000 Democratic Primary ballot which precedes the November general election. The Lynn County Democratic Chairman is Ms. Tracy Kendrick.

Candidates interested in filing should contact Lynn County Clerk Susan Tipton at the Lynn County Courthouse. One requirement for filing is that candidates must reside in the county for at least six months prior to filing.

Listed below are candidates who have filed for local seats, according to information released from the County Clerk's office as of press time Wednesday morning. All positions are for the full four-year term.

Sheriff: Jake Diggs (incumbent), Marvin Pierce

County Attorney: None have filed for the primaries, although Lynn County Attorney James Napper, who was appointed to the position by commissioners, this week filed a "Declaration of Intent as an Independent Candidate" with county officials, to run as an independent candidate for the seat in the November general election. Napper could not file for the March primaries, because he has not fulfilled the six-month residency requirement prior to filing, but will qualify for the general elec-

"It is an opportunity for people in the area to greet one another at Christmas by contributing their Christmas card money to our scholarship funds," the member said.





# Tahoka I.S.D. Bands To Get New Uniforms

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session last Thursday evening, approving routine items as well as the purchase of 80 new band uniforms

for the high school band. The current band uniforms are approximately 10 years old, and trustees approved the purchase, not to exceed \$25,000, of 80 new uniforms. Band Director Carroll Rhodes researched the choices and price ranges available, and presented two choices within an acceptable price range. Trustees voted unanimously to allow Rhodes to order the new uniforms immediately, in time for the

next school year. In other business, trustees approved a District Textbook Committee as presented, TASB Policy Update 62 as presented, and monthly bills. Business Manager Ken Eudy reported total tax collections of \$632,691.28 at the end of November,





Superintendent Jimmy Parker presented the "Academically Acceptable" results of the 1998-99 Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) report on the district, and noted that 76.4 percent of revenue received by the district is from state and federal funding, while 21 percent of revenue is from local property taxes. Parker also reported that Governor George W. Bush has sent TISD \$13,500 (90 percent of a \$15,000 allotment) which is to be used to improve reading skills at the Kindergarten through third grade levels.

The meeting adjourned at 11:30 p.m., with all seven trustees and other school staff present, as well as the school's attorney, Cal Huffaker and his partner, Philip Mack Furlow.





Dear Editor:





Homeowners need to check the strings of lights and other electrical items used for these decorations for broken and damaged wires and bulb sockets. Weather changes and exposure to outside weather conditions can damage the wires and cause the insulation to crack after a time. Damaged light strings should

be discarded and replaced. You can overload outside plugs the same way that you can overload those inside your home. If you have extensive outside electrical decorations, be sure to that you spread the electric load out over more than one plug. Just as water and electricity don't mix inside the home, neither do they mix with exterior lighting. Be sure to turn off outside lights if it is raining or if there is moderate to heavy snowfall. Some of the light strings are weather resistant but many are not, so read the instructions on the boxes and know what quality and level of service your lights should be expected to provide.

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# Locals Are Generous With "Christmas For Kids" Program

Christmas is a time for sharing and giving, and Lynn County residents are showing that they have that Christmas spirit by their generosity in providing gifts and funding for the Lynn County "Christmas For Kids"

The non-profit volunteer program provides Christmas gifts for Lynn County children ages 14 and under whose families are in financial situations where they cannot afford to purchase extras, such as Christmas gifts, but who still want their children to experience the joy of receiving a special gift for Christmas. These families contact the "Christmas For Kids" coordinator, Lynn County Treasurer Janet Porterfield, who in turn determines that the family qualifies for the program and adds the children's names to the list.

To date this year, 184 children are on the list for providing Christmas gifts - a number which is significantly less than last year's record number of 243 children. Of those 184 children, 74 have been "adopted" by various individuals, organizations, church groups or businesses who get the children's names, clothing sizes and wish lists and provide gifts for them. The remaining 110 children on the list are provided gifts by donations of toys and money to the program, and volunteers such as Mrs. Porterfield go shopping with the funds to purchase two clothing items and one toy for each child.

"We have had fewer children on

this year's list, and more adopted this year than last, and \$2,831.62 has been donated to the program," Mrs. Porterfield reported this week, expressing her appreciation for the generosity of area residents and organi-

"It is not the same people year after year in the program, although of course we do have several whose financial situations don't change and who need help every year," Mrs. Porterfield explained. "But this year, I have had several call me whose families were on the list last year who explained that they did not need assistance this year, and they wanted to say thank you for all the help. And, and I had one mother call whose children were provided for last year, to say that the family was better off this year and did not need any help, and in fact wanted to 'adopt' a child to buy gifts for - that really made us feel good," she said with a smile.

This week, she said, families on the list may begin picking up the Christmas gifts from her office at the courthouse, but they may want to call first (998-4055) to see if the packages are ready for pickup. Those that aren't picked up are delivered in time for Christmas by volunteers.

"Every year we worry that we won't have enough toys or funding to provide for so many children, but every year the people here have always come through for us, and we do so appreciate everyone's help," said Mrs. Porterfield.
