Tahoka Woman Foils Kidnapping Attempt

A Tahoka woman in her early 40s told sheriff's officers Sunday that some Hispanic males in a white car followed her home from Lubbock early Sunday morning. The driver of the white car then advised her that her friend she had been talking with earlier at a Lubbock restaurant had car trouble north of Tahoka and she needed to go back to help him.

She started driving back toward Lubbock and then the occupants of the other car stopped her about 8.5 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. She said the driver came to her car and told her in Spanish that he had a gun and threatened her, telling her to turn off onto a dirt road. She struggled with the man who tried to force the car to steer toward a ditch as she drove off, but he let go after she dragged him a short distance with his arm through the window.

As she drove back, the other car continued toward Lubbock. She returned home and called Tahoka Police. Lynn County Sheriff's officers are continuing to look for the suspects.

On Sunday at the intersection of County Rd. 32 and FM 3112 near the Wells community a 1984 Chevrolet Blazer driven by Robert Huerta, 36, of Lubbock overturned. Huerta was not injured as the vehicle returned to an upright position, but his wife, 36, and two children age 6 and 7, were taken by O'Donnell EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital, where they were treated and released for apparent minor injuries.

A minor collision of a car with a brick wall in Tahoka Sunday morning caused no injuries. Driver of the 1995 Ford pickup which struck a retaining wall in a driveway on N. 1st St. was Eusevio Resendez, 46, of Tahoka

In jail during the week were eight persons, three for driving while license suspended plus other charges including no liability insurance, possessing expired drivers license, no seatbelt, unrestrained child, resisting arrest and driving while intoxicated (DWI). Others were charged with application to revoke probation on burglary and DWI convictions, parole violation, and possession of marijuana and narcotics paraphernalia.

Proof Of Residency To Be Required For Landfill Use, Says Commissioners

Bringing something to the county landfill? Be sure to bring a drivers license as well.

In an effort to cut rising costs at the Lynn County Landfill, Lynn County Commissioners this week voted unanimously to require proof of county residency for use of the landfill. Last year, commissioners noted, Lynn County paid \$50,048 for trash bin rentals and hauling at the county dumpsite, and suspect that at least some of the usage was from persons who do not reside within the county. The new requirement, which will entail showing a drivers license for use of the landfill, will take effect immediately.

In other business during Monday morning's regular meeting, commissioners approved a list of official holidays for the county, named a Grievance Committee for 2000, and discussed a contract between the Lynn County Appraisal District and Lynn County for tax collections.



Wilson Fire Department Tip of the Week: Windy and dry weather conditions can create dangerous fire conditions. Dry vegetation can explode into large grass fires from a very small beginning. A careless cigarette or dropped match can ignite the dry grass and weeds in a bar-ditch and with a moderate wind, the resulting small fire can sweep across acres and acres of dry grassland and CRP. These types of fires can be especially dangerous to firefighters as wind shifts can make the fire change directions in an instant. Most vehicles have ashtrays and by using them and not throwing your cigarette out of the window, you can be preventing the possibility of a dangerous fire.

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
