

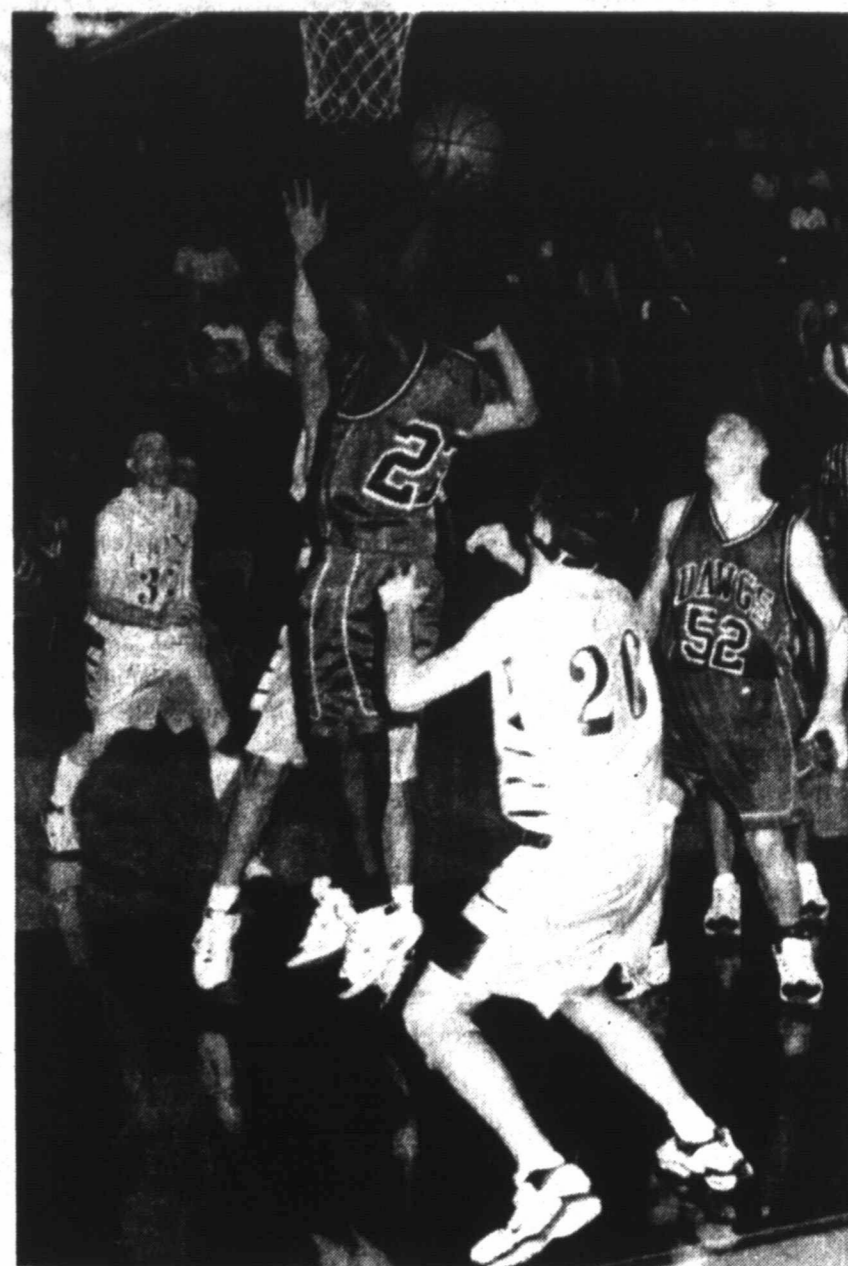

District Grand Jury Indicts 19 Persons

A 106th District Grand Jury last week returned indictments against 19 persons accused of crimes in Lynn County, including 10 for felony driving while intoxicated (DWI). Charges and those indicted were:

- Sexual assault—San Juan Gonzales, 26, of Tahoka, in connection with an incident involving a Tahoka woman on Jan. 20.
- DWI—Robert Salazar Huerta, 36, of Lubbock; Larry Wayne Riggs, 26, Big Spring; Tony Paul Sinast, 40, Fulton TX; Garlynn Wayne Thibodeaux, 27, Quitaque; Gregorio Antuna Jr., 28, O'Donnell; Guadalupe Michael Barrientez, 36, Lubbock; Dustin John Williams, 21, Tahoka; Johnny Olivarez, 34, Midland; David Valdez, 33, Idalou; and Michael Shayne Scott, 39, Tahoka. Tahoka Police Dept. investigated a collision Friday afternoon at the intersection of Lockwood and Ave. L, where a 1990 Geo Storm driven by Judi Marie Webster, 17, of Tahoka and a Ford F-350 pickup driven by Robert Lowery Guilliams, 58, of Tahoka were involved. There were no injuries.
- Seven persons were jailed during the last week, on these charges: DWI first offense, DWI 2nd, DWI 2nd plus possession of marijuana under 2 ounces, obtaining controlled substance by forgery, warrant for theft, and criminal mischief.

The Tahoka Bulldogs varsity boys basketball team advances to the Region 12A tournament in Abilene with a pair of postseason wins over Ozona and Reagan County in the Area and Regional Quarterfinal playoffs. Up for grabs is the Region 1 AA title and, most importantly, a state tournament berth to "The Drum" in Austin next weekend.

Tahoka now takes a 26-8 record to Abilene to face off with West Texas Stinnett in Abilene Christian University's Moody Coliseum at 8 p.m. Friday night in the Regional Semifinals. As Tahoka battled Reagan County for a 72-66 victory in Tuesday night's Quarterfinal action, West Texas advanced with a 47-46 win over Floydada in overtime.

The other region semifinal pits Canadian against Hale Center, who will meet each other in Friday night's first game at the tournament in Abilene, at 6 p.m. The winners of Friday night's semifinals will face off in the Regional Finals at 12 noon Saturday in Moody Coliseum. That winner earns a trip to the State Tournament, March 9-11, where Class 2A action is scheduled for Friday and Saturday at the Frank Erwin Center on the University of Texas at Austin campus.

Ticket prices for the regional tournament in Abilene are \$5 for adults, \$3 for students, with children age 6 and under admitted free. No passes will be allowed, according to information released by tournament officials. The Tahoka games reportedly will be broadcast locally on radio station KJAK, 92.7 FM.

In Tuesday night's Regional Quarterfinals, the #6 ranked Tahoka Bulldogs outlasted the #8 ranked Reagan County Owls 72-66 in front of 1,562 fans at Dorothy Garrett Coliseum in Big Spring.

The game stayed fairly close throughout as the biggest lead of the night was a 10 point lead by Tahoka midway through the second quarter, as the Dogs led 35-25.

After the first few minutes of the ballgame, Coach Rusty Frazier's Bulldogs never trailed. Reagan County, however, was able to stay within 10 points during the game, and in fact tied it at one point.

Brad Pebsworth was the top scorer of the night for the Dogs with 26 points, and Sedrick Williams added 17. Jordan Sarchet followed up with 10 points and Shaun Williams tossed in 8.

Tahoka and Reagan County each had a total of 37 rebounds apiece for their teams. In the turnover category, however, Tahoka committed 25 turnovers to the Owls' 17. From the foul line, Tahoka shot 73 percent (11-15) on their free throws while Reagan County made 72 percent (18-25).

In the first quarter, and in the rest of the game, Tahoka was able to use its press to their advantage. They were able to force the Owls to take several bad shots and to throw away some passes, but it was a battle that never ceased until the final buzzer. Reagan County kept clawing their way back, tying the score at 20-20 on a tip-in basket at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Tahoka opened up with an 11-3 run in the first three minutes to make the score 31-23. Again, though, Reagan County fought back to a one-point difference, at 35-34 in the next four minutes. Pebsworth hit a nailbiting 3-pointer at the buzzer to give the Bulldogs a 42-38 halftime lead.

In the second half of this fierce athletic contest, Reagan County kept the game close, never trailing by more than 9 points.

Although there were four Bulldogs in foul trouble, the defense of Tahoka stiffened against the Owls, and on the offensive side Tahoka was

able to deliver key baskets at crunch time in the fourth quarter.

Jordan Sarchet scored a key basket with 1:30 left in the game to give Tahoka a 70-65 lead. The Dogs then regrouped during a timeout with 1:16 left. After Reagan County made it 70-66 on a free-throw, the next shot produced a loose scramble for the ball. It ended up being a tieball with possession favoring Reagan County with 45 seconds left.

Reagan County never converted a basket the rest of the way and they were forced to foul Sedrick Williams with 32 seconds remaining. Williams hit two clutch free throws to help seal the win 72-66.

This is the first regional tournament berth for Tahoka since 1997. The 1996-97 team achieved the first-ever state berth to Austin, of whom three of this year's senior squad members were freshmen.

After the net was cut down and the trophy presented to Tahoka after the Reagan County game, Coach Frazier exclaimed, "Two more, baby, two more!"

Doyle Lee Named Police Chief Here

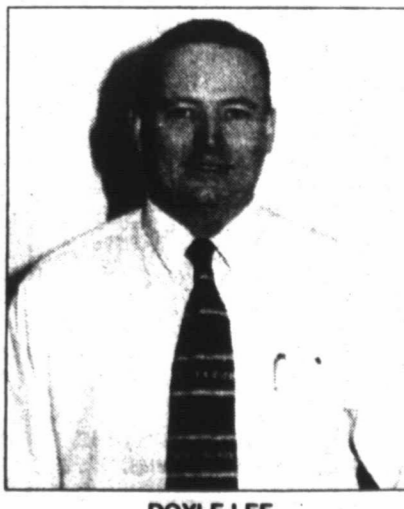
After five months without a Chief of Police, the Tahoka Police Department this week has a new chief officer with more than ten years experience in the law enforcement field. Doyle Lee, 44, began his duties as Chief of Police Monday morning, filling the vacancy left by the resignation of Steve Chance in October 1999.

The Chief of Police will earn an annual salary of \$27,000, according to City Administrator Jerry Webster. Lee was working for the Lynn County Sheriff's Department, serving as Chief Deputy since January 1997, and as a deputy from 1994-1997. He worked for the Lamesa Police Department prior to his Lynn County service, from 1988-1994.

"I am looking forward to serving the citizens of Tahoka as Chief of Police," Lee told *The News* Monday.

Webster, Mayor Mike Mensch and the Tahoka City Council looked at 15 applicants for the position and interviewed several candidates last Saturday before making their final choice.

Lee's appointment to the position adds one more officer to the department, which has been operating the

last several months with only three officers. Webster said that city officials are not considering adding any other officers to the department at this time.

Prior to October, the Tahoka Police Department had five officers, one of whom served as the school officer for Tahoka Independent School District, who resigned for another position at about the same time as the former police chief. School officials say the district is considering hiring their own law enforcement officer instead of collaborating with the city, as has been done in the past.

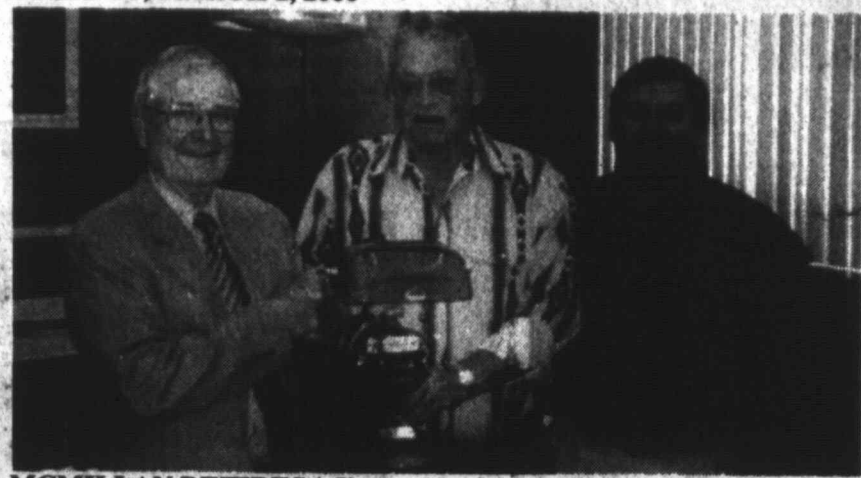

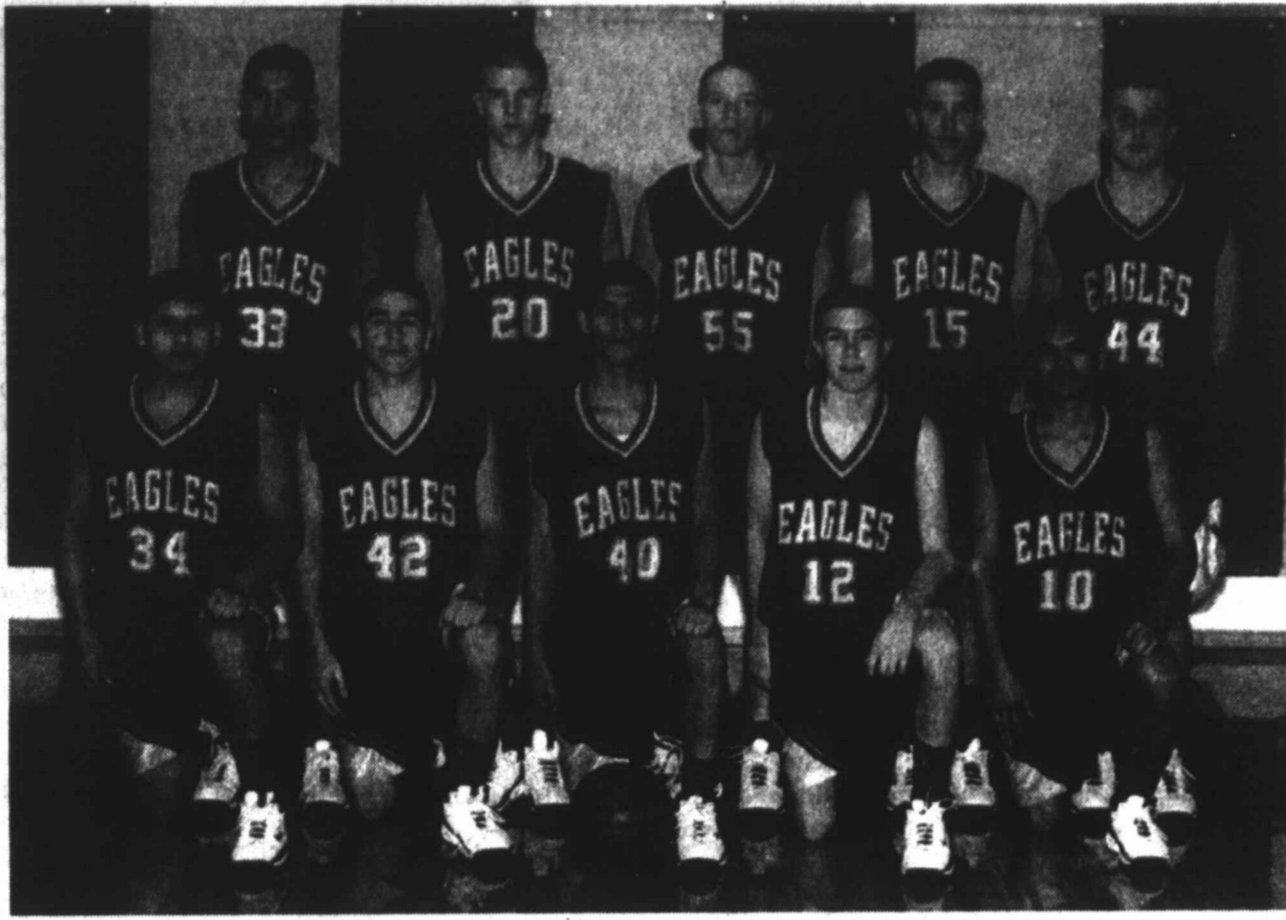

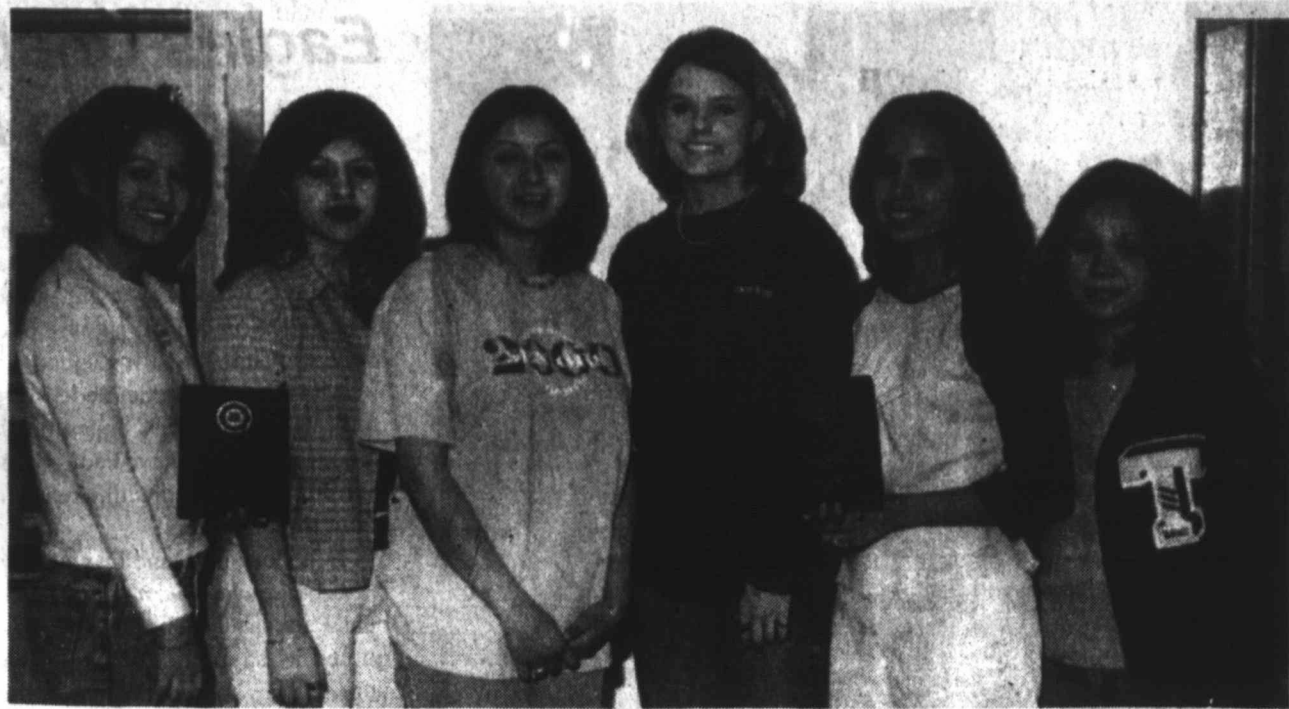
Early Voting Continues

Early voting in the Democratic and Republican party Primary Elections began Monday, Feb. 28 at the Lynn County Clerk's Office in the county courthouse, and continues through March 10. Voters should bring their voter registration cards and may vote during regular business hours (8:30 a.m.-5 p.m.) Monday through Friday at the courthouse.

Several Lynn County citizens are taking advantage of the early voting opportunity, with 30 voting in the Democratic Primary and 3 voting in the Republican Primary as of early Tuesday afternoon, according to County Clerk Susan Tipton. She is expecting a good turnout in the election since it is a presidential election year and because there are contested local races in the Democratic Primary.

Registered voters may vote in either the Republican Primary or the Democratic Primary, but may not vote in both. In the local county races, all candidates are running on the Democratic ticket, and two of the four county positions on the ballot are contested races.

Two candidates are seeking the position of Lynn County Sheriff, with Marvin Pierce challenging incumbent Jake Diggs for the top county law enforcement position. And in Lynn County Precinct 3, incumbent Sandy Cox Kizer is being challenged by Don Blair for the two-year term on the Lynn County Commissioners Court.

Hospital Sets Election For Three Board Seats

Lynn County Hospital board of directors last week called for an election May 6 for three board members, who will serve three-year terms. Terms of board members Billy Tomlinson, Jerry Ford and Virginia Griffing are scheduled to expire, all of whom indicate they will seek reelection.

At last Wednesday night's meeting, the board also met with Attorney Cal Huffaker to discuss ease-

ments for two utility companies regarding service lines crossing hospital property in the area in which a new assisted living facility is scheduled to be constructed.

Architect Ken Condray of Lubbock also was present to advise the board that seeking construction bids on the proposed assisted living center will be delayed until the easement situation is resolved. Condray said he has finished the plans and specifications on a 20-unit facility.

The board noted that bids on renovation of the reception areas for two of the three doctors at the clinic were higher than anticipated, so Condray was authorized to try to lower the cost of the overall project by changing some of the specifications for cabinets and woodwork. In the meantime, none of the several bids received for various phases of the clinic renovation have as yet been accepted.

Huffaker and Administrator Louise Landers reported that papers have been signed closing the sale of the building housing the Wellness Clinic on Lockwood to the hospital, which has been renting the property. Total of the transaction was about \$40,100.

The board approved contracting with Central Reserve Life Insurance Co. for employees' health insurance. Hospital employees pay none of the premiums for themselves, as the hospital pays it all, except in cases where the employee wants to add family members at their own expense.

Correspondence rating the hospital and its personnel on emergency services and transfers in the last month was reviewed, with one highly critical and three favorable assessments from patients and their families.

Other than Huffaker, Condray and Mrs. Landers, those attending the meeting were board members Jerry Ford, who presided in the absence of president Tomlinson, Dalton Wood, Mrs. Griffing and Peggy Morton. Board members Mike Rivas and Joe Hays also were absent.

Tahoka FFA Members Excel At Region I FHA Conference

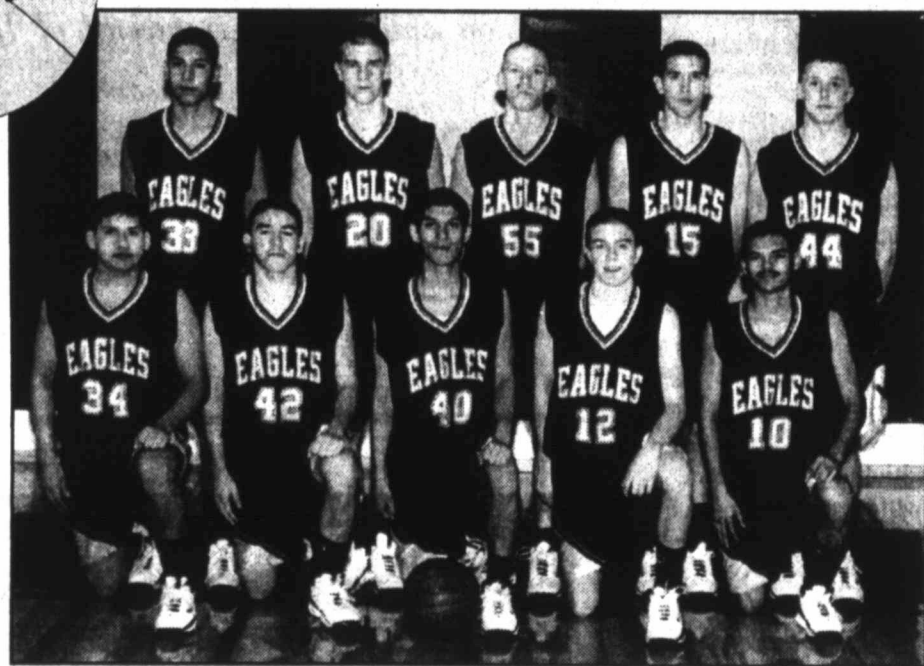

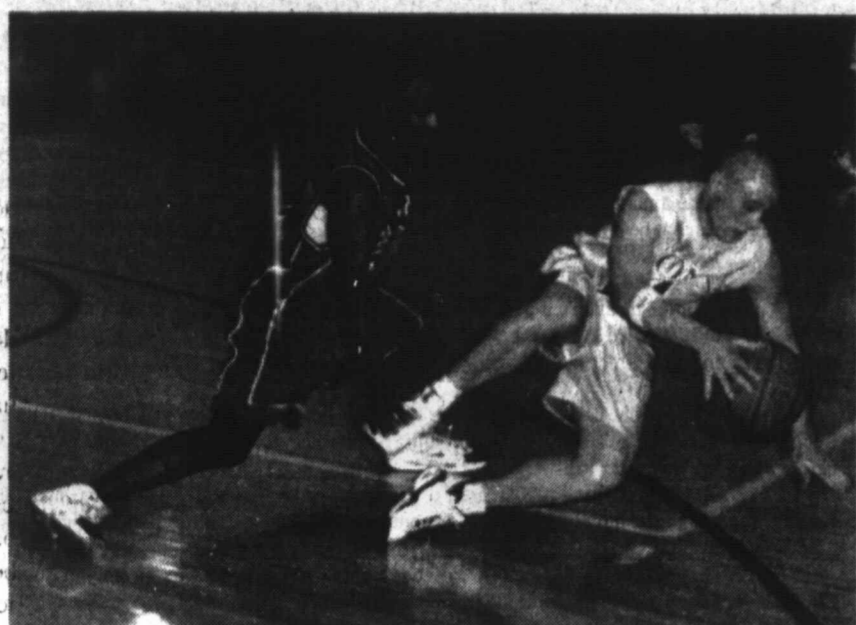

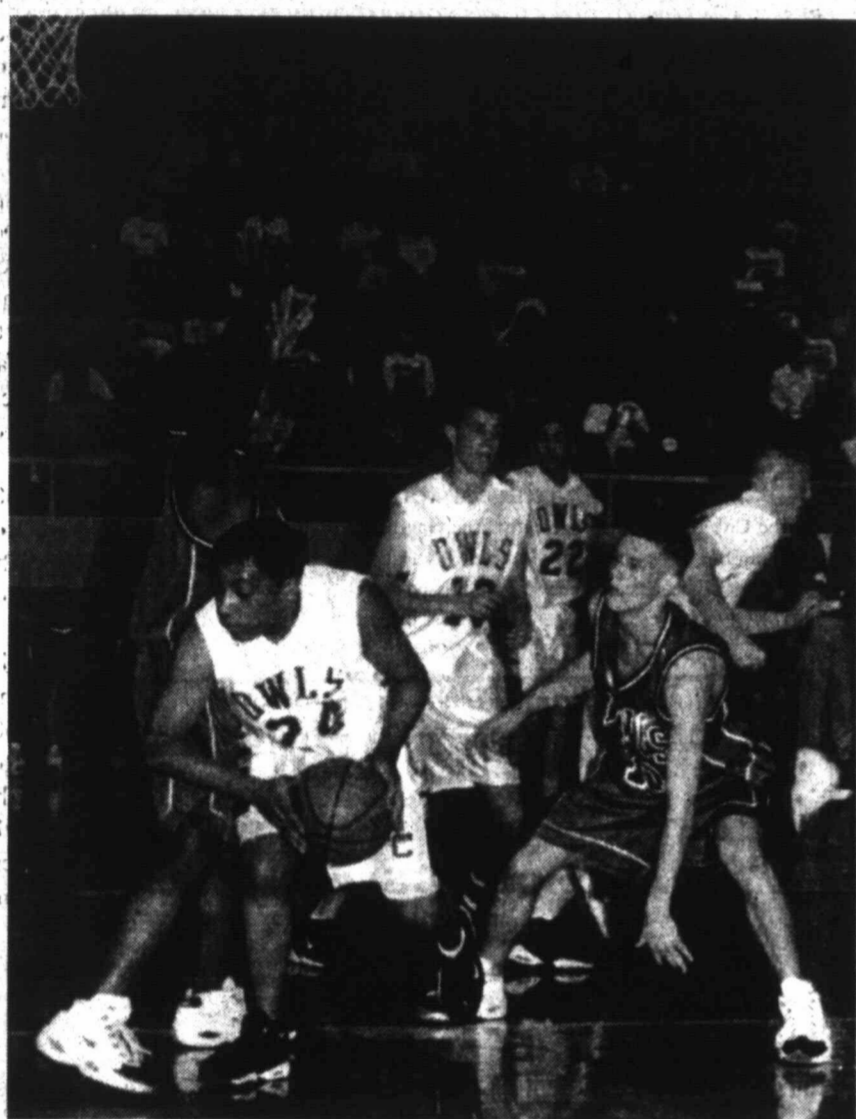

ADDITIONAL NOTICE. After technical review of the application is complete, the executive director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. Notice of the application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list or the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments and requesting a public meeting.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or otherwise significant public comments. The Response to Comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. The mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the executive director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing.

Crop Insurance Deadline Nears For Texas Farmers

Ronald L. Berryhill, Director of the Risk Management Agency's Regional Office in Oklahoma, reminded farmers that they only have until March 15 to take advantage of an estimated 25 percent premium discount on higher levels of crop insurance protection.

"We're trying to make higher levels of protection affordable," said Berryhill. "Farmers should contact an agent immediately to discuss coverage options on crops insurable in their county."

In addition to higher levels of coverage, the catastrophic level of insurance protection (CAT) is also available to producers. For only \$60 per crop per county, farmers may obtain a low level of protection. Limited resource farmers may not have to pay the \$60 fee for CAT coverage if they fill out a waiver available from their crop insurance agent.

Farmers who need more information about sales closing dates or their insurance options should contact a crop insurance agent.

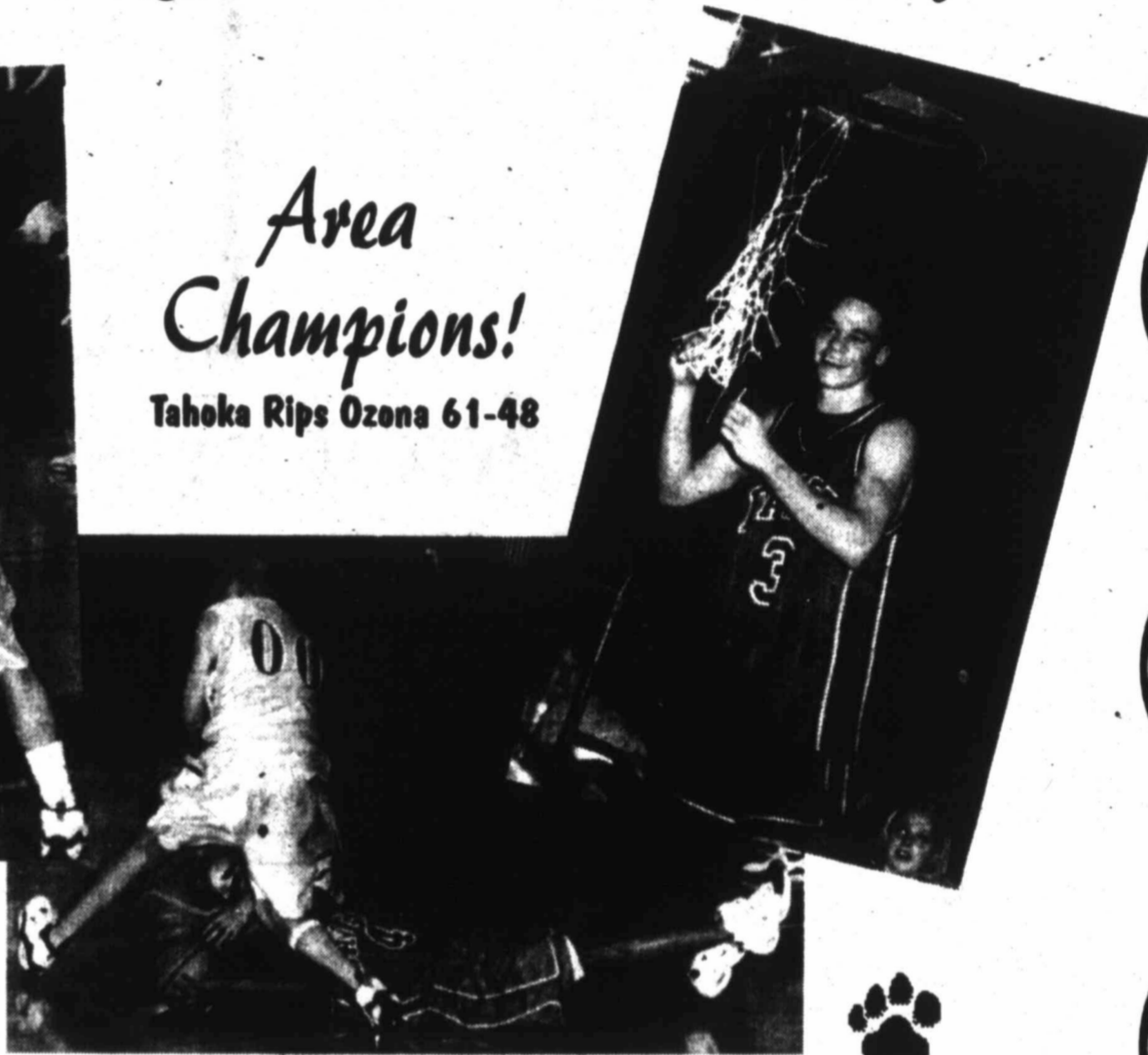
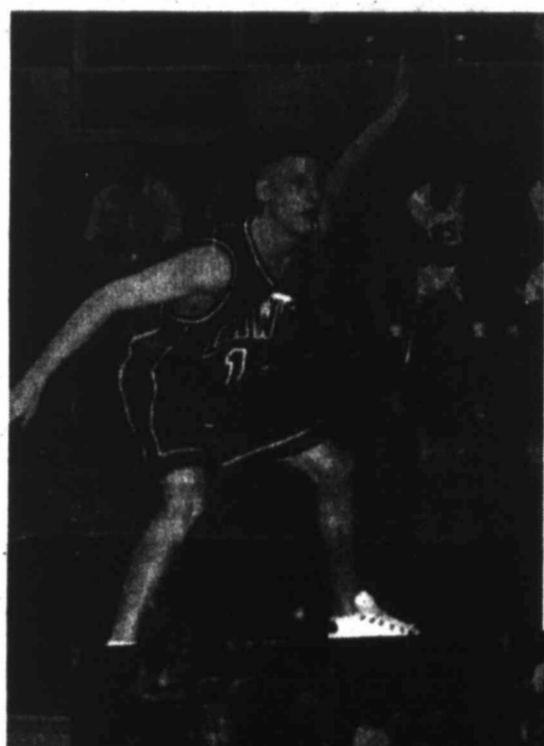

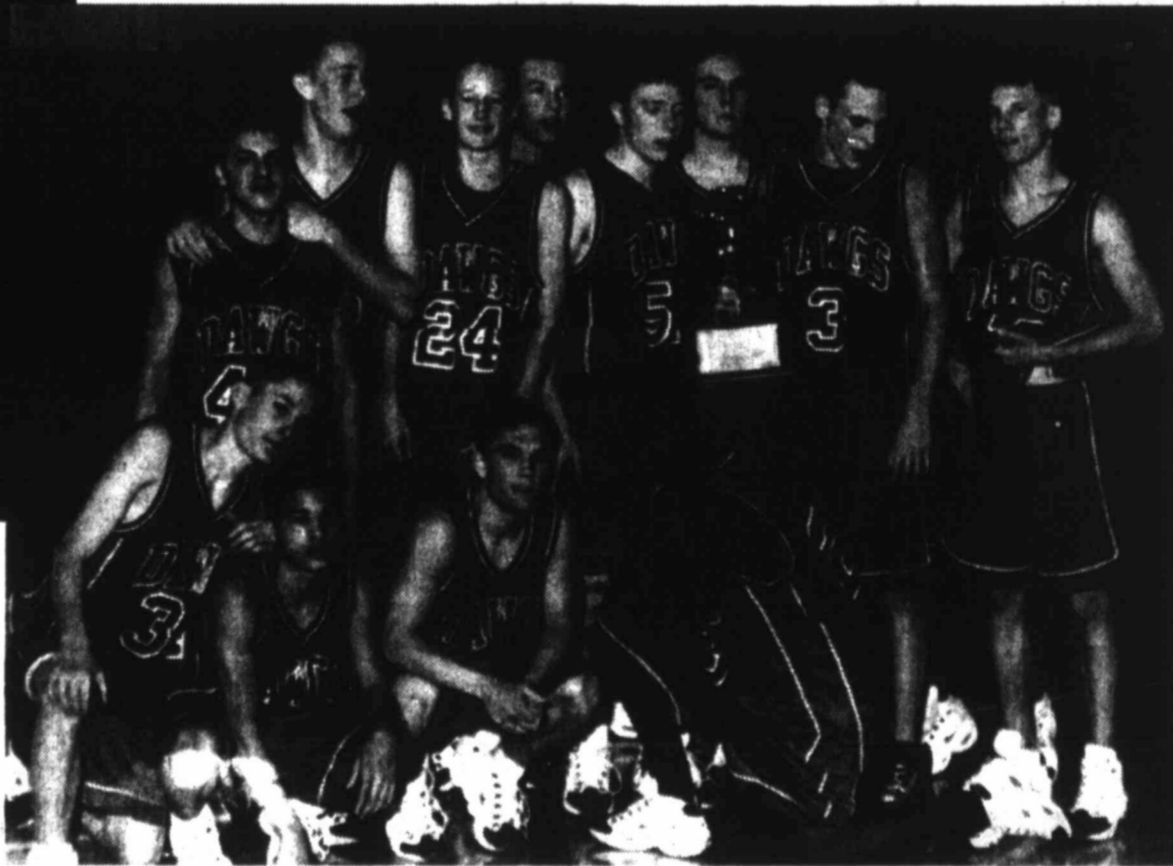
