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Early Voting Ends Tuesday For School, City Elections

Early voting for area school and city elections continues through Tuesday, May 2 at designated early voting locations. Election officials urge all voters to bring their voter registration cards to polling locations. Election day is Saturday, May 6.

In the Tahoka city and school elections, 38 ballots had been marked in early voting as of Tuesday afternoon in the at-large races.

CITY ELECTIONS

Tahoka: Three seats (one at-large, two single member districts), 2-year terms. Early voting at Tahoka City Hall. Candidates: District 2 - Clara Calvillo (Incumbent); District 4 - Jay Dee House (I); District 5 (At-Large) - Ray Don Box (I) and Jimmy McMillan.

O'Donnell: Special Election for one-year unexpired term on City Council. Early voting at City Hall. Candidate: Rex Little.

SCHOOL ELECTIONS

Tahoka I.S.D.: Two at-large seats, 3-year terms. Plurality voting, which means the two candidates with the most votes are elected. Early voting at Tahoka City Hall. Candidates: Greg Henley (I), Valton Stephens, Mitch Raindl, David Ehlers, Leonard Dunn, Tommy Botkin, Abraham Vega.

Wilson I.S.D.: Special election for one-year unexpired term. Early voting at Central School Office. Candidates: John Fields and Michael Taylor.

New Home I.S.D.: Two at-large seats, 3-year terms. Early voting at Superintendent's Office. Candidates: Michael Rodriguez (I), Marinda Tyler, Johnny Morris, Alan Nettles.

O'Donnell I.S.D.: Two at-large seats, 3-year terms, cumulative voting. Early voting at School Tax Office. Candidates: Renn Dorman (I), Nelson Hogg (I), Ernie Cruz.

Tahoka Band Earns Superior Ratings In UIL Concert, Sight Reading Contests

The Tahoka High School Band brought home Superior ratings from the Regional UIL contests last week, earning a "I" in Concert as well as a "I" in Sight Reading contest. The 41-member band performed well, says director Carroll Rhodes, earning long-overdue accolades for their quality of performance.

"Through the years the Tahoka Bands have struggled with excellence and/or consistency, with the exception of an occasional, brief bright spot. That changed last Wednesday at the regional UIL concert and sight reading contest in Sundown when the Tahoka 3-D Band for the second year

in a row earned a 'I' in concert," says Carroll Rhodes, the justifiably proud director of the Tahoka High School Band.

"In addition, the band earned a 'I' in sight reading, earning them a small sweepstakes. It has been 30 years plus since a Tahoka band earned I's in consecutive years or to receive a I in concert and sight reading the same year," explained Rhodes.

"I am extremely proud of these outstanding young people. They played a hard, long program; harder and longer than has been attempted in the last several years, and they did

it well," Rhodes continued. "It only takes two years to establish a tradition and the students have — a tradition of excellence and a legacy for those who follow," he added.

On May 11, the 3-D Band will present its spring concert which will include the contest music plus other music. Prior to the band's performance, the high school choir will perform.

The 6th, 7th, and 8th grade bands and middle school choir will perform May 16.

Both concerts are free and the public is welcome to attend.

All County Facilities, Including Showbarn, Designated Smoke-Free

The county showbarn and courthouse offices will be smoke-free environments, Lynn County Commissioners said in regular session this week. Three commissioners voted in favor of a motion to "make all county facilities smoke-free" brought by Commissioner Sandy Cox-Kizer, with Commissioner Mike Braddock abstaining from voting on the issue. Commissioners J.T. Miller and Don Morton approved the motion along with Cox-Kizer.

Although the courthouse facilities had already been designated as a smoke-free environment, compliance has not been strictly enforced. Commissioners reiterated the non-smoking policy not only in the courthouse building, but "all county facilities" including the county showbarn.

In other action at Monday morning's meeting, the court approved the purchase of a water trailer, tank and truck combination for \$17,000 for use in maintaining county roads. The request was brought by Pct. 2 Commissioner Braddock, and approved unanimously. A smoke detector for the courthouse elevator was approved, and monthly bills paid.

A cost estimate from Poka-Lambro for a new telephone system for the courthouse was discussed, estimating \$9,700, but commissioners backed off from making any decisions after the cost estimates proved higher than expected.

In a meeting held last Tuesday afternoon, commissioners met for ongoing discussions of jail expansion proposals, but say they are merely considering all options for future consideration and are not close to making a decision for jail renovation/expansion.

One bid was submitted to purchase an old pickup from Precinct 1, with commissioners accepting the bid of \$357 from Edward Gomez.



THE REALLY BIG Chicken and Other Weird Things: One person in the news office has a calendar which lists some very strange happenings, none verified, so far as I know. On March 24, this one was offered:

In the spring of 1985, Gianpiero Baizi, who farmed outside Milan, Italy, was startled to find four huge depressions in his maize field. They were eight feet long, five feet wide and 16 feet across, and were covered, police investigators confirmed, with an odd gray powder. Baizi said, "They were the exact shape of a chicken's footprint, but enormous, as if some gigantic bird had swooped down, landed, and taken off again."

Anybody who believes that is a dumb cluck. Well, I won't say it's an outright lie, but better verification is needed.

Anyway, here are a couple of the other things the calendar offered in March:

As he drove home from work about 2:30 a.m. on this day (March 28) in 1967, a Munroe Falls, Ohio man sighted a luminous object hovering near a rural highway. An acrid smell emanated from the UFO. Then four or five large-headed "midgits" clad in body-covering suits appeared on the road in front of him. He hit the brakes too late, hitting one of the figures and knocking it beneath his car. Terrified, he fled the scene.

As he sped away, he heard one of them shout, "Hey! Is this the road to Roswell?"

Well, I added that last part. Here's another:

In mid-March 1979, masses of birds fell dead from the sky over the Newburgh, NY area, a disaster termed "unbelievable" by New York State Pathologist Ward B. Stone. When the toll was finally tallied, it came to more than 10,000 dead blackbirds, sparrows, cardinals, grackles, cowbirds and starlings. As in comparable cases recorded throughout history, there was no explanation for the catastrophe.

It's strange enough for birds to fall dead out of the sky, but the sky is where birds spend most of their time. How about dead fish falling out of the sky?

On Feb. 19, 1830, according to a report in the American Journal of Science, thousands of fish fell on Nokulhatty Factory, India. M. Prinsep wrote: "The fish were all dead; most of them were large, some were fresh, others rotted and mutilated. They were seen at first in the sky like a flock of birds descending rapidly to the ground. There was rain drizzling at the time, but no storm."

AN OLD farmer lived alone with a pet Irish setter he doted on. The dog finally died and the farmer went to the Methodist Church and asked,

"Preacher, my dog is dead. Could you possibly conduct a small service for him?"

The minister replied "No, we cannot have services for the animal in the church, but there are some other churches in town. No telling what some of them believe. Maybe one will do something for the animal."

The old man said "That's a great idea, preacher. Do you think \$10,000 is enough to donate for the service?" The preacher replied "Why didn't you tell me the dog was Methodist?"

Animal Shootings, Eight Traffic Accidents Reported

Five traffic accidents were investigated by Dept. of Public Safety and three others by Tahoka Police Dept. in the last week. The sheriff's department meanwhile arrested and charged three teenagers after a tractor and barn were damaged by gunshots and two cows and a dog were killed in the Wilson area during the last three weeks.

Adan Morin, 28, was hospitalized at Lynn County Hospital for treatment of a severe knee injury suffered last Thursday when the 1992 Honda motorcycle he was riding collided with a 1989 Ford driven by Martin Liendo, 41, in the 1200-block of Ave. E. Both drivers are Tahoka residents. Morin was taken to the hospital by Lynn County EMS ambulance.

Police also investigated a collision at Main and Lockwood on Sunday, when a 1992 Ford driven by Melissa Engle, 19, and a 1997 Dodge van driven by Angie Moore, 23, were involved. A 13-year-old female in the Ford and a 21-year-old male passenger in the van were taken by EMS to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of apparent minor injuries.

A collision at the U.S. 87 access road and Lockwood on April 18 involved a 2000 Toyota driven by Barbara Privette Becknal, 51, of Tahoka and a 1985 GMC pickup driven by Emilio Calvillo Jr., 32, who lives on FM 400 at Wilson.

On FM 211 about 2 miles west of Wilson April 15 a 1979 Mercury Cougar driven by Aurora Ochoa Valdez, 28, of Wilson went out of control and struck a ditch on the opposite side of the highway. The driver was taken by Lynn County EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital, where she was treated for apparent minor injuries and released.

On April 18 on a convenience store parking lot in O'Donnell a trailer unit being towed by a 1980 Chevrolet driven by Rickey Lee Roghair, 40, of Odessa came loose and struck the building. There were no injuries.

Last Friday on U.S. 87 six miles south of Tahoka, a 1999 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Elizabeth Carter Kuzmich, 34, of Midland, went out of control and struck a guard rail. There were no injuries.

Also on Friday, 2.5 miles southwest of Wilson on FM 400, a Ford pickup driven by Robert Ortiz, 38, of near Wilson, overturned and wound up in a field. Ortiz was not treated for injuries.

Daniel Evans, 30, of Lubbock was injured Monday when his 1984 Chevrolet pickup overturned on FM 2192 five miles north of FM 211. He was taken to University Medical Center by Slaton EMS ambulance.

Three teenagers were charged with felony criminal mischief in the shooting incidents near Wilson dur-

ing the last few weeks. They are Shad Quick, 18, of Slaton; Cory Phillips, 17, of Wilson; and Donald William Buxkemper Jr., 17, of Lubbock. On April 6, David Wied of Wilson reported bullet holes in his new barn and on a John Deere tractor, with total damage estimated at \$655.32. Two of the suspects were arrested on April 11.

On April 7, Phillip Munoz of Lubbock reported two of his cows had been killed, apparently by gunshots, at his farm near Wilson, and Manuel Zamora also reported that his dog, a red heeler valued at \$200, had been shot and killed on April 5.

The three young men admitted involvement in all the shooting incidents and also admitted stealing numerous stop signs from intersections in the Wilson area. The signs were valued by highway department officials at more than \$1200.

A 20-year-old Post resident ticketed for a traffic violation by Tahoka Police was jailed after she refused to sign the citation Saturday.

Tahoka Police Dept. has issued 182 traffic tickets so far this year, with a high of 72 given during April.

In jail during the week were two persons each for first offense driving while intoxicated (DWI) and Lubbock traffic warrants, and five others on these charges: assault/family violence, theft by check, disregarding stop sign, public intoxication, driving while license suspended plus three warrants out of New Mexico for distribution of marijuana, and application to revoke probation on conviction for possession of marijuana.

I also want to publicly thank the Tahoka School Board for their support of the band in the purchase of new uniforms. The band looked as good as they sounded. So often we only hear the negative impact our kids have and the poor quality of our schools. This is only one small example of what we can easily take for granted if we are not careful, and I believe we have among the best in the board, administration, faculty and staff in our school. How fortunate we are to have this quality in our school.

I cannot help but reflect on how far this band has come in the five years my family has lived in Tahoka. In 1995, the band did not have the ability to play the national anthem at the opening of the football games, yet on Thursday they played technically difficult pieces and truly made music.

I entered the auditorium early enough to watch the band that played just before our band. These kids looked like they had been placed before a firing squad. Not once did I see any of them smile or show any sign of enjoying the competition. What a sad statement. As our band was seated on stage, Mr. Rhodes was speaking quietly to them. It was apparent he had their attention, and as he spoke, many were smiling and some even laughed out loud. These kids were learning several very valuable lessons besides the obvious benefits of teamwork, cooperation, atten-

And finally, look at the actual length of time it takes to overcome a bad reputation - sometimes years. I believe Mr. Rhodes has been an exemplary teacher by not only teaching the technical skills of music, but also in the many other ways he teaches these kids that I am sure they don't even realize they are receiving. What a privilege for these kids to experience!

The band will present their Spring Concert on May 11th in the High School Auditorium at 7 p.m. I encourage all of you to come out and see for yourselves the excellence exhibited in this group.

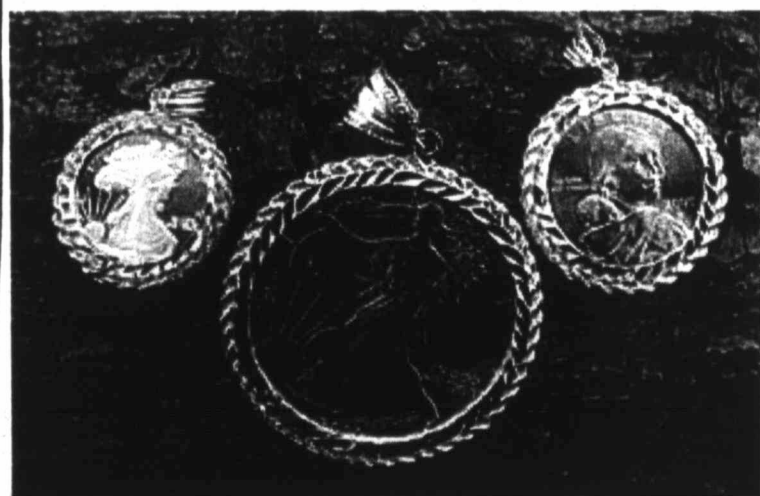
The Mustangs played a great game Tues. April 18 but lost to Amherst 4-10.

April 30-May 7 Designated As Soil And Water Stewardship Week

Keeping community waters clean and plentiful is a common goal all Americans should embrace, according to organizers of the 2000 Soil and Water Stewardship Week, set for April 30-May 7.

Conservation efforts in the Lone Star State involve both government and private citizens. Working at the local level, 216 soil and water conservation districts serve as practical and democratic organizations through which landowners can take the initiative in protecting resources.

Under the direction of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, these districts promote the stewardship of natural resources. Their leadership helps ensure that communities wisely manage soil use and maintain sufficient water quality and quantity, strengthening the foundation of nature's food chain for the benefit of all living things in the Lone Star State.

The conservation districts in Texas have joined with other groups and government organizations to sponsor Soil and Water Stewardship Week on April 30-May 7. In honor of this year's theme, "Community Waters," they are working to coordinate local activities throughout the state in recognition of the importance of soil and water conservation.

Locally, County Judge J.F. Brandon signed a proclamation in support of the Stewardship Week at a breakfast hosted this week by the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The focus of this year's national observance is on the total watershed management approach to natural resource conservation.

A watershed is defined as an area of land that sheds water into a common water body, such as a river or lake. There are thousands of identified watersheds in America.

"Developing a positive stewardship attitude is important as we work together to maintain an adequate supply of clean water," said W.R. Steen, chairman of the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District, local sponsor of this year's Soil and Water Stewardship Week. "Our local conservation district would like to help take the leadership to bring all interested groups and individuals

together to discuss how to improve the health of our own watershed," Steen added.

"The abundance of good, clean water in our communities is not guaranteed as some kind of right. Rather, it is a resource that must be earned and re-earned as time passes and conditions change. While overall per capita consumption of water has decreased in the last decade, water conservation efforts should never be abandoned. Modern conservation efforts are now focused on ways to keep our natural water supply system clean, helping to keep down costs in water treatment facilities. For example, farmers are now installing grassed waterways and filter strips along the edges of their fields and streams to prevent soil and nutrients from being washed into major streams. Similar good management practices are being installed around construction sites and large building and parking lots in suburban and urban areas," Steen explained.

The technology is available to ensure a clean water supply. The real challenge, according to Steen, is to develop the collective community and political will to get the job done.
