Assisted Living Center Construction Approved

A new 20-unit assisted living center which will offer Lynn County and area residents an alternative to living alone at home or going into a nursing home will be built just north of Lynn County Hospital, at a projected cost of \$1,534,000.

The project, which has been considered for several years by hospital officials, got the green light at last Thursday's regular meeting of hospital directors when all directors present voted unanimously to go ahead and build the facility, after directors discussed the project at length and expressed opinions that it would be a tremendous asset to the community and its older citizens, as well as to the hospital.

The clinic and hospital's location next to the center, which will serve persons in the "independent living" category as well as those needing some assistance, is seen as a plus for both facilities.

Board member Dalton Wood moved to award the construction contract to the low bidder, Denton-Renfroe, Inc. of Lubbock, an action that signals the final go-ahead for the project. The motion was seconded by Virginia Griffing, and all the other board members present, including Jerry Ford, Board President Billy Tomlinson, Mike Rivas and Peggy Morton, also voted approval. Board member Joe Hays was absent.

Also approved unanimously was a resolution to authorize Locke Liddell & Sapp of Dallas as bond

counsel and Government Capital Securities Corp. of Irving as private placement agent for revenue bonds to be issued to pay for the project.

The revenue bonds in the amount of approximately \$1,674,000 to pay for the construction and related costs of the project are scheduled to be paid out over a 20-year period from income generated by the new facility.


Barring any unexpected prob-

lems related to the financing, construction of the facility should begin sometime this summer. Denton-Renfroe's low bid of \$1,534,000 stipulates that the work can be finished in 260 days from the start of construction.

Plans for the living center call for ten studio apartments, eight one-bedroom apartments and two larger one-

bedroom apartments large enough for two beds. All of the units will have refrigerators, microwave ovens and showers. Parking spaces will be available for residents who have their own cars.

Tomlinson presided at the meeting. Non-directors present were Administrator Louise Landers and architect Ken Condray of Lubbock.

Collision, Burglary Reported In County

A STORY in the daily newspapers recently commented on the fact that perceptions of what is good or bad for you change, as scientists and doctors frequently come up with results of half-baked studies.

Six THS Athletes To Run In State Track Events

Six Tahoka High School varsity athletes will advance in three events to the State Track Meet in Austin after gaining victories in the regional track event held in Abilene April 28-29. The Tahoka Varsity Boys 4x100m relay team earned a trip to the state event with a second place regional win, and two Lady Bulldog tracksters will compete in Austin, one in the 200m dash, and one in the 400m dash, after claiming second place awards in Abilene. The top two places in each regional event advance to state competition, to be held next Saturday, May 13.

Claiming a chance to compete in the state relay event are Stephen Solorzano, Larry Davis, Randy White and Jeff Elmore, members of the Bulldog 4x100m relay team which took second place at Regionals with a time of 42.81. Carissa Graves earned her ticket to Austin with a second place medal in the 200m dash with a time of 25.26 seconds (24.80 hand clock), and Chelsea White qualified with a second place medal in the 400m dash with a time of 59.76

(58.80 hand clock). Tahoka sent a number of athletes to the Abilene Regional Meet, with

other results as follows. Davis earned third place in the 400m dash with 50.8 and the 200m dash with 22.61; Graves placed third in the 100m dash with 12.32.

Elmore placed fifth in the 100m dash with 11.07 and R. White earned sixth place in the long jump.

Brady Raindl placed seventh in the 110m hurdles with a 15.26 and ninth in the 300m hurdles with a 41.03.

The boys 1600m relay placed tenth after running a season best 3:31.

Also competing in the meet were Anthony Garza, 300m hurdles; Keely Boone, shot put; Kyndel Byrd, 3200m run; and the girls 4x200m relay team of Kayla Griffin, Chelsea White, Kammie Williams, and

DISTRICT MEET

In order to compete at Regionals, track team members had to place first or second at the District meet which was held April 17 in Seagraves.

The boys team took first place district honors with 176.5 points. This was the first time since 1973 that the Bulldogs have finished first in district. The girls team earned a total of 117 points to finish third behind Post and Coahoma.

The boys 4x100m relay team of Solorzano, Davis, Randy White, and Elmore placed first as did Brady Raindl in the 100m and 300m

Elmore was first in the 100m run. second in the 200m run, and fourth in the triple jump; Davis finished first in the 400m and 200m runs, third in the long jump, and fifth in the triple

Randy White took first in the long jump, and was second in the 100m dash, high jump and triple jump.

Graves won both the 100m and 200m, while Chelsea White took second in both the 200m and 400m. Boone took first place honors in shot put and Byrd finished second in the 3200m run

Garza placed second in the 300m hurdles and fifth in the 110m hurdles; Leslie White finished third in the pole vault; and Jana Eudy was third in the high jump.

The girls 4x200m relay team of Griffin, Chelsey White, Williams, and Graves placed second while the boys 1600m relay team of Josh Thompson, Ryan Curry, Solorzano and Raindl finished second.

The girls 4x400m relay team of Byrd, Williams, Boone and Lana Jones placed third and the girls 4x100m relay team of Kirsten Tillman, Mickey DeLeon, Williams, and Griffin placed fourth.

Curry was fourth in the 300m hurdles, Sarah Hawthorn finished fourth in the 1600m run, and Matthew Benavides placed fourth in both the 3200m and the 1600m runs.

Taking home fifth place were Griffin, 100m dash; Chelsey Miller, shot put; Tillman, long jump, Hawthorne, 800m run; Thompson, long jump; and Shannon Cowley. 800m run.



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

Imagine one minute you're fine, and in the next moment, your vision is blurred and one side of your body goes numb. You're disoriented and dizzy. You are having a stroke. The people around you don't understand what's happening and don't know what to do. You're scared but think that maybe these symptoms will stop soon. Meanwhile your chances of severe stroke and your risk of death are increasing with each minute that

This is a scene that is played out several hundred times a day in America. Stroke is the No. 3 cause of death and the No. 1 cause of serious long-term disability. The sobering fact is that more than 70 percent of adults in the U.S. don't know the symptoms of a stroke. As a result, people wait too long before seeking medical attention and either die or suffer severe disability.

Many don't realize that there is a lot that can be done to help someone suffering from a stroke. If a patient gets to the emergency room within three hours of the onset of symptoms, doctors can provide medical treatments that can help reverse the effects of a stroke. The sooner appropriate treatment is begun, the better the chances for recovery. This is why it is so important to know the warn-

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

Wilson Fire Department Tip of the Week: Spring is here and summer is just around the corner so outdoor cooking and grilling is sure to follow. Gas and electric Bar-B-Que grills have been stored for the winter and need to be checked and cleaned before use.

Electric grills need to be cleaned and maintained to make sure that all electrical cords and elements are in good repair and free of foreign matter that could cause a fire. Gas grills need to be cleaned and maintained to make sure that all the gas lines, fittings and burners are clean and free of debris that could cause an un-

If your grill uses pumice rocks as part of the cooking system, it will be a good idea to burn them off before using the grill. This will help clean off any leftover grease and debris from prior years use. This can be done by lighting the grill and just letting it set at high heat for about 30 minutes with the lid open and the grill rack removed. The grill rack should be cleaned with a stiff wire brush and then washed with soapy water and scrubbed with steel wool, or similar product.

A well maintained grill can provide many hours of clean, safe use and enjoy-

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

Census Data Used For Many Purposes

United States Census 2000 is well may use census data to develop so underway, with many residents already having filled out their forms and returning them as requested. However, census workers continue to contact those who, for various reasons, have not yet filled out their Census 2000 forms, even though compliance in completing and returning the forms is required by law.

One of the reasons which residents are reluctant to fill out the forms is possibly because they are unaware of what the data in the forms will be used for. According to census officials, many state and federal organizations are greatly dependent on the data included in the census for determining fund allocations for social service programs, community action projects, education programs, and more, as well as statistical data for analysis of the quality of life in

Federal government organizations may use census data to allocate over \$100 billion in federal funds annually for education programs, veterans services, programs to reduce unemployment, housing and community development, programs to stimulate economic growth, public health care, services for the elderly, programs for the disabled, or assistance programs

for low-income families. State and local governments may use census data in planning and allocating funds for new school construction, occupational and vocational education programs, programs to assist the elderly and disabled, youth programs, health care services and facilities, public buildings such as libraries, highway safety and public transportation systems, emergency preparedness planning, rural development programs, and delineating

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

If you live in rural Texas and have not received a census form in the mail or at your doorstep, I strongly urge you to contact the U.S. Census Telephone Questionnaire Assistance number at 1-800-471-9424 to make sure you can participate in the census process. Why is this important? Because rural Texans are already outnumbered with 80 percent of the state's population living in urban areas. An accurate census count is especially critical with our Legislature undertaking redistricting of congressional and state legislative seats next year. It is essential that no one in rural Texas miss this important head count and risk losing representation in Austin and Washington, D.C. due to population growth in urban areas.

While most urban Texans have received and already filled out their census forms, others in rural areas still have yet to receive a form because they get their mail at post office boxes, rural routes, box numbers or general delivery addresses. According to the census bureau, if you live in certain rural areas, you don't "count" unless an enumerator sees you face-to-face. That may be a sur-

prise to those of us with post office boxes who think we are still hale and hearty. Many local officials are questioning the practicality of "door-todoor" visits in some areas of the state such as Brewster, Jeff Davis and other border counties, where homes can be few and far between. Brewster County officials have been told that enumerators will try to visit residences in the 6,129-square-mile county that is almost the size of Israel. Other rural counties are also facing similar instances of a serious undercount with entire communities. still not receiving forms.
