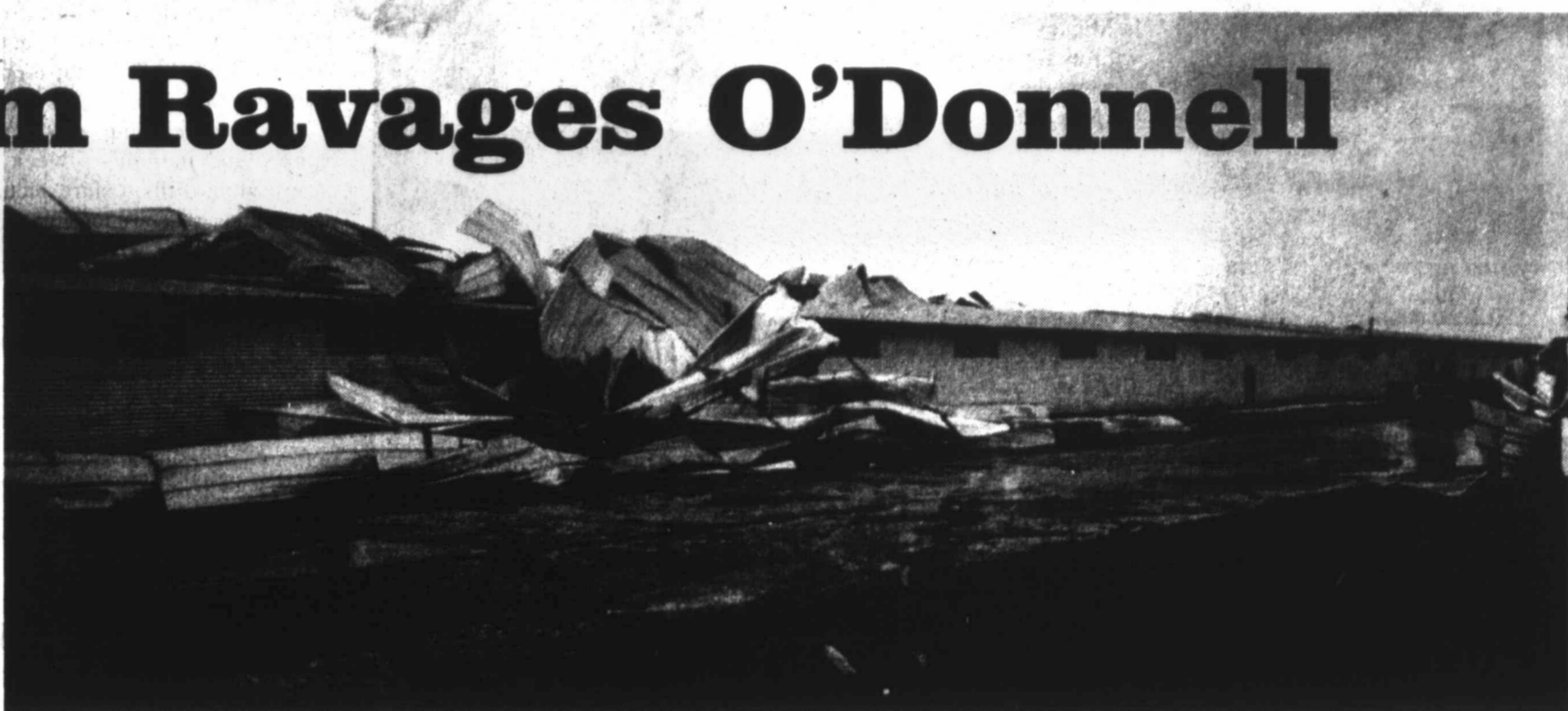
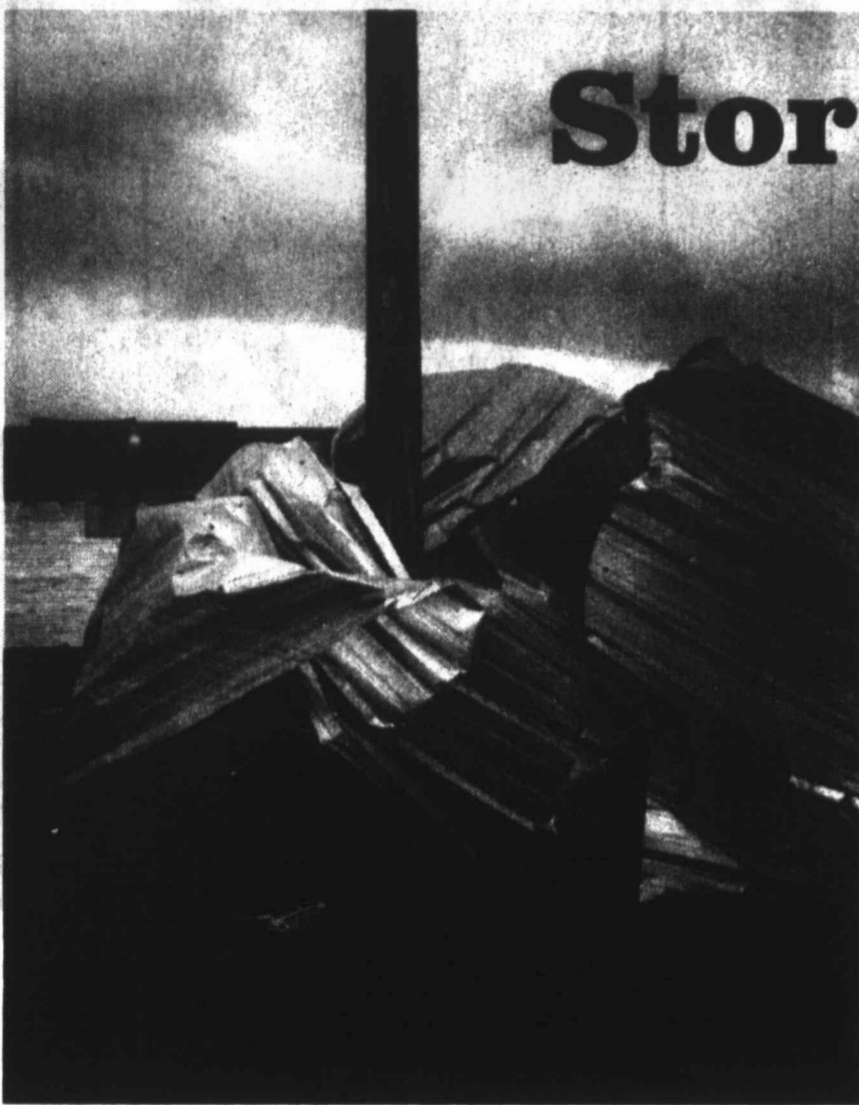


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Storm Ravages O'Donnell



Winds reported up to 80 mph and baseball-size hail wreaked havoc in the town of O'Donnell last Thursday evening, causing extensive damage at the O'Donnell Warehouse Co. Compress Yard, where tin roofs were peeled from the buildings and tossed around poles and in haphazard piles nearby. Four of the five warehouse buildings sustained heavy damage, and at least one warehouse will have to be replaced, according to manager Danny Willis. During the storm the warehouse flooded and the bales were sitting in several inches of water, but Willis said that most of the 7,000 cotton bales inside will be salvaged. About 2.5 inches of rain flooded the small town in about a half hour, and large hail pelted the area, damaging roofs, cars and windows.

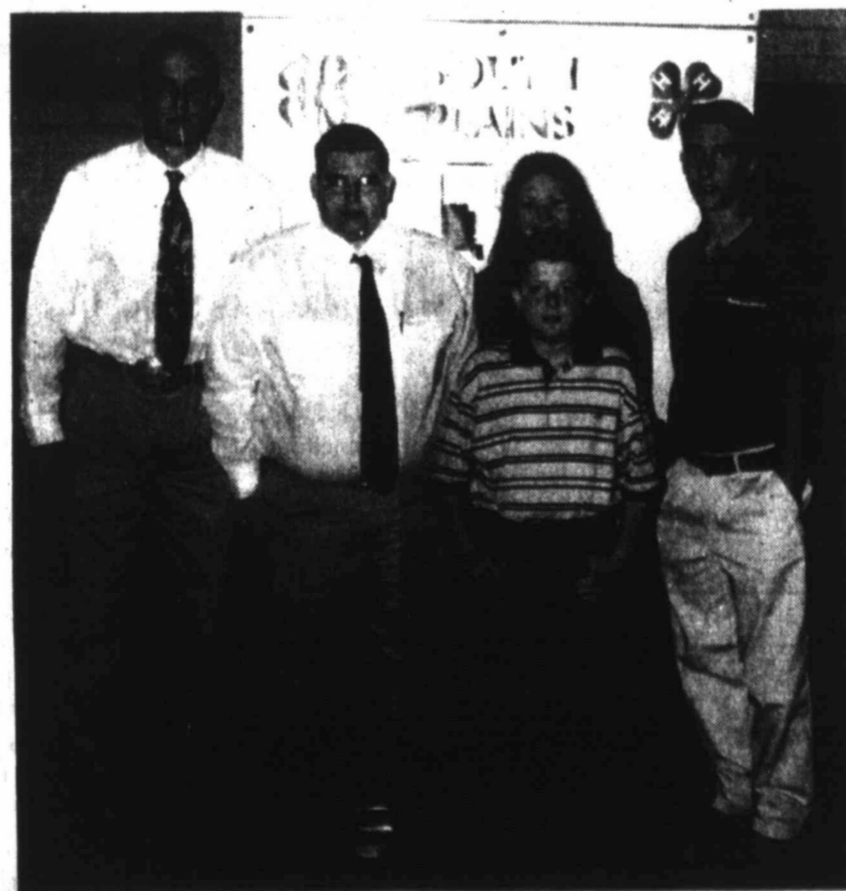
Trevor Gicklhorn competed in Safety Method Demonstration, placing third.

Dear Editor:

The health and well-being of people who are elderly should be one of our highest priorities and concerns. We have them to thank for all of the advances that came before us and their contributions to society continue to better our lives.

Yet, last year in Texas, more than 36,000 people who are elderly or have disabilities were victims of abuse, neglect and exploitation, and 42 persons were confirmed as victims. In the territory covered by this worker, Crosby, Dickens, Garza, King, Lynn and Motley counties, 173 investigations were received and 147 confirmed.

As one of our most important natural resources, elderly people deserve our utmost attention and respect. We must protect their health, safety, and rights. Someday, we will be elderly, too, and our treatment of our elders today should serve as an example to younger generations, of how we would like to be treated in our golden years.

May was Older Americans Month. It is a time to reflect on what we are doing as a community to support people who are elderly. We all have opportunities to reach out to our families, friends, neighborhoods, places of worship, and places of employment. Editor: All the old farmers will know what I'm saying here:

"The Lord put the white weed in a cotton patch to remind the farmer who's in charge."

So said my father, the late Jack Hoskins, who farmed at New Moore in the 1950's.

We called them "white weeds". They were the scourge of the farmer. The correct name is Silver leaf nightshade, and they are actually a member of the potato family. The prickly perennial can grow to 3 feet high and reproduces by seeds and deeply penetrating rhizomes. Other farmers called them white horse nettles, bull nettles, or Trompillo. We hated the things with a passion. I probably hold the all time record for white weeds hoed before the age of eighteen with the exception of my sister.

It was a pretty sad sight to see a half stand of bumble bee dry land cotton in July, blooming at the top, with healthy white weeds twice as tall that never seemed to know that a drought was in progress. Ted Rogers would say that the roots went all the way to China to get water. If you chopped one it would reappear with a vengeance three days later. Old man Pendleton of West Point grocery said "If you would use a dull hoe, it would get the root." This added a day. The old philosopher Brock from O'Donnell said that "Lynn County would be a pretty good place to live if it weren't for the white weeds". The other philosopher John Stevens said "Yeah, And Hell would be a pretty good place if it wasn't for the heat".

With no commercial value, the white weed can be toxic to cattle. My research shows that the Pima Indians would sometimes make a type of cheese by crushing the dried berries the weed produced. That's probably why you don't see any Pima Indians around Lynn County anymore.

Now I understand there are some new varieties of noxious weeds at New Moore that I wouldn't even recognize. Maybe they will choke out the white weed, and the Good Lord will think of something new.

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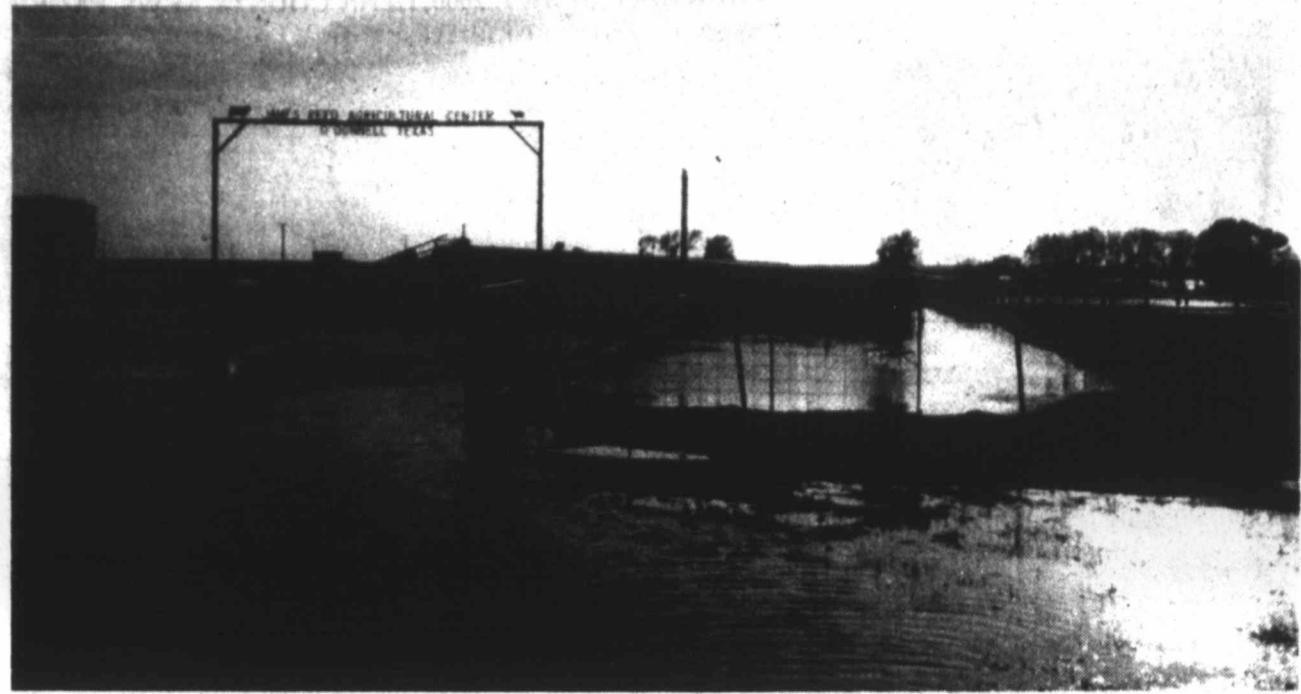

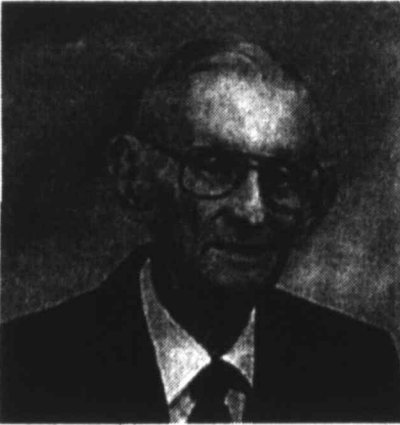

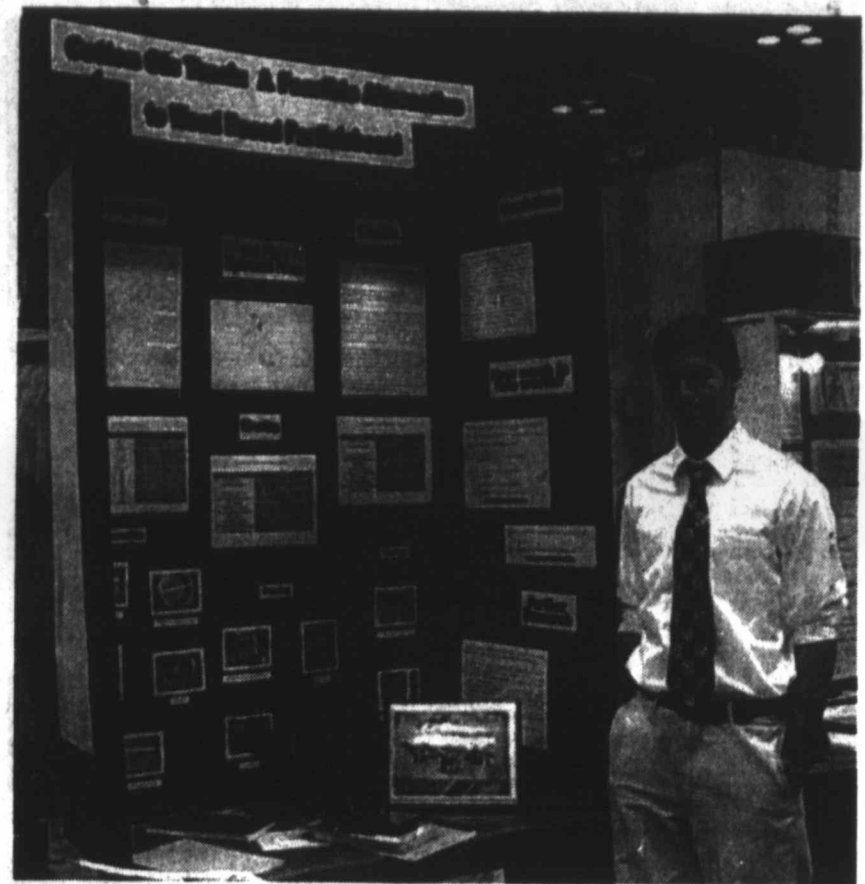

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Protect Children's Futures With Health Insurance

More than a million Texas children are living each day without health insurance. Although many of these children will have healthy lives, many others will miss out on timely health care due to lack of coverage.

The physicians of Texas Medical Association recognize the importance of providing health insurance for children and urge families to learn more about the availability of coverage through a new campaign called "TexCare Partnership: Children's Health Insurance to Fit Your Budget."

"I think that any way we can get health care to children is going to improve their health and their ultimate outcome in life," says Dr. Jane Rider, a San Angelo pediatrician. "We will have healthier children who will be better educated in our schools and will become happier and more productive adults."

Working parents who are unable to afford health insurance for their children face the following obstacles:

- Uninsured children are less likely to receive timely access to primary and preventive care. When the child becomes sicker he or she must receive care in more costly settings.

- Children who must come to school sick are less likely to learn.

- Uninsured children also miss school more frequently. School absenteeism not only denies children the opportunity to learn, but also results in a loss of state revenue for local school districts. Parents lose wages and employers lose productivity when a parent must remain home with a sick child.

On April 3, Texas launched TexCare Partnership. The campaign offers three options to insure children: the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), Medicaid and the Texas Healthy Kids Corporation.

CHIP is designed for families who earn too much money for Medicaid but still can't afford insurance. The program, which will begin coverage on May 1, covers children from birth to age 18 in families making less than 200 percent of the federal poverty level, which is \$33,400 for a

family of four. CHIP is financed with state and federal funds. Parents will have to pay some costs for enrollment, office visits and prescriptions.

Another program is the Texas Healthy Kids Corporation, which partners with private insurance carriers to help families purchase coverage. THKC is funded through private donations, which fund the sliding-scale premium assistance program.

Medicaid cover children from birth through age 18 from families with the lowest income. There are no co-payments of deductibles to pay and no monthly premiums. Eligibility is based on family income and age of children to be covered.

TASP Dates Set At SPC, Levelland

The TASP test is scheduled June 17 and July 22 at South Plains College in Levelland.

The TASP, which stands for Texas Academic Skills Program, is a statewide instructional program designed to ensure that all students attending public institutions of higher education be successful in their college studies, said Claudine Oliver, director of guidance and counseling at SPC.

MAPS, an alternative TASP test, will be given 5:30-9:30 p.m. June 1, 5 and 6 at the SPC Reese campus, 9730 Reese Blvd. in Lubbock.

The TASP test measures college entry-level skills in reading, writing and math and will be given 8 a.m.-2 p.m. in the Student Services wing of the Administration Building. Fee is \$29. Late registration fees may apply.

Since the fall 1998 semester, the TASP has been required of all new students entering Texas public colleges and universities prior to enrollment in college-level courses. The

test indicates if a student possess the basic college-level skills necessary to begin an undergraduate degree.

Persons exempted from taking the TASP are those who have earned at least three hours of college credit prior to the fall of 1989, students who have made high scores on the ACT,

SAT or TAAS tests, veterans who have completed basic training prior to the fall of 1989, and students enrolled in certain certificate programs.

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Technical Analysis Marketing Seminar Slated June 20

Agricultural producers and agribusiness persons can learn how to read, interpret and understand futures market price charts at a June 20 technical analysis marketing seminar at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock, said a Texas A&M economist.

The seminar will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The center is one mile east of Interstate 27 on FM 1294 north of Lubbock.

"This seminar is an introductory training on how to read price charts," said Jackie Smith, Extension economist based in Lubbock. "It is designed for beginners in chart watching. It will help prepare them for an advanced technical analysis seminar scheduled later this year."

"Our goal is to teach participants how to read and use futures market price charts, and anticipate price movements, as part of an effective risk management program."

Smith will explain how to use trend lines, moving price averages, support lines, resistance lines, gaps, corrections and other charting tools — tools producers and traders often employ to decide when to "pull the trigger" on a futures market pricing strategy.

"Many producers believe supply and demand factors and fundamen-

New EPA Report Shows Progress For Texas Air Quality

This week, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released its newest National Air Pollutant Emission Trends report, which covers the 1998 reporting year. The report confirms that while Texas still faces challenges with regard to air quality, there has been a substantial improvement since 1995.

According to the report, between 1995 and 1998, emissions of Carbon Monoxide in Texas fell by 23 percent, emissions of Nitrogen Oxides fell by 11 percent, emissions of Volatile Organic Compounds fell by 51 percent, emissions of Sulfur Dioxide fell by 21 percent, and PM 10 emissions fell by 2.6 percent.

Combined levels of these emissions fell by close to 4 million tons between 1995 and 1998, the largest reduction in the nation. As an overall percentage, these emissions were cut by 22 percent, tied for second best in the country.

Said Patrick Burns, Director of Environmental Policy at Citizens for a Sound Economy, "Texas has made some great progress since 1995 when, in the words of the Sierra Club, Gov. Ann Richards left the state a 'mess.'"

BBB Issues Warning About Itinerant Pavers

The Better Business Bureau, in cooperation with local and county law enforcement, is alerting the South Plains of itinerant pavers that have swept into the area on the spring winds. Better known as "gypsy pavers", these itinerants travel across the country with their families in brand new pickups, most with out-of-state license plates or temporary Texas tags or in some case, no tags at all. They say in local RV parks and as quickly as they show up, they are gone-taking hundreds if not thousands of dollars with them-leaving behind disappointed South Plains residents with empty pockets and with nothing to show for the money they spent.

According to a representative with the Texas Department of Public Service, the gypsies that are running their scams here on the South Plains are making claims that they were on a "road crew" OR "...we did the drive down the way" as their cone-on to lure unsuspecting consumers to buy into their paving scam. "Typically, these traveling work crews use substandard materials and do a poor job" according to Nan Campbell, President of the BBB.

Wilson ISD Gets \$6,727,000

Wilson Independent School District received class size reduction funds in the amount of \$6,727,000 for the 1999-2000 school year, according to Twila Rex, Wilson Elementary Principal.

"Since our district already met the intent of the law by having 18 or fewer students in each class in first, second, and third grades and all of our teachers were certified to teach in the areas assigned, we were able to use these funds as a part of a school-wide program," Ms. Rex explained.

"Our ultimate goal is to have all students passing TAAS by third grade. Some of the areas we selected to use these funds include classroom computers and software to enhance reading instruction for struggling readers and in-depth phonics program. It is the goal of Wilson ISD that all students become successful learners," added the principal.

Jobless Rate Dips To 4.5 Percent

Unemployment in Texas dropped to a seasonally adjusted rate of 4.5 percent in April, down from 4.6 percent in March, the Texas Workforce Commission announced today.

"This is our lowest April rate since 1979," said TWC Chair Diane Rath. "Texas employers added 14,800 Nonagricultural jobs last month and more than 250,000 over the year."

The gains include 6,500 construction jobs in April and 32,900 over the year. "That's a robust monthly growth rate of 1.2 percent and a yearly growth rate of 6.3 percent," said Commissioner Representing Labor T.P. O'Mahoney.

"Finance, Insurance and Real Estate added 1,600 jobs in April," said Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman. "This industry led the Service Producing Sector with an over-the-year job growth rate of 4.2 percent."

The lowest unemployment rate in the Metropolitan Statistical Areas was 1.4 percent in Bryan College Station, followed by Austin-San Marcos at 1.9 percent, Lubbock at 2.3 percent, Waco at 2.8 percent and Dallas at 2.9 percent.

The highest unemployment rate was 13.0 percent in the McAllen-Edinburg-Mission MSA, followed by Brownsville-Harlingen-San Benito at 8.7 percent, El Paso at 8.3 percent, Beaumont-Port Arthur at 7.8 percent and Laredo at 7.1 percent.

"Our economy remains strong, as the labor market continues to experience healthy job growth," Rath said.

Wilson Fire Department Tip of the Week: Hot weather and the end of school will really begin the boating and water craft season. Boat and other water craft fires are somewhat scarce in this part of the country, but they still happen. Be sure to check your boat or other watercraft and make sure that all the electrical lines and wires are in good shape and not damaged or frayed. If you made the mistake of leaving fuel in the fuel tank through the winter be sure to properly discard the old fuel and clean out the tank. Then be sure that the engine is in good working repair. If you have an inboard engine, make sure that the engine compartment is free of combustible debris and other trash. Most important, and also a legal requirement, is to have a well maintained and workable fire extinguisher on board, along with life jackets and other flotation devices. Boating can be fun, but boat or watercraft fire can really put the damper on a trip to the lake.
