


Tahoka Police Dept. investigated a collision in the city last Friday, with no injuries. A 1997 Chevrolet Lumina driven by Rene Garza Cruz, 43, of Crosbyton and a 1991 Nissan pickup driven by Rudy Ernest Fuentes, 49, of Tahoka were involved in a collision at Lockwood St. and the west access road of U.S. 87.

A 106th District jury last Thursday found José Zuniga of Lubbock guilty on charges of manslaughter and intoxicated manslaughter in the death of Alfredo Cantu, 65, of Lubbock, in May, 1998, on FM 211 about two miles east of Wilson.

Presiding over the trial was Judge Gene L. Delaney of Snyder, who assessed Zuniga a 20-year prison term.

Tahoka Police also took a report of a burglary of the home of Bibian Saldana on N. 5th St. The victim said family photographs and compact discs were stolen and some clothing

items were damaged Saturday. In jail during the week were one person for possession of marijuana under two ounces and narcotics paraphernalia, one for driving while intoxicated, third offense or more, and for possession of a controlled substance plus narcotics paraphernalia.



Faced with major increases in the costs of operating the landfill for city and county residents, Lynn County commissioners voted this week to start charging fees anytime waste products are taken to the landfill.

Commissioners met Monday with Walter Hardt, new landfill supervisor, and adopted a fee schedule to be effective Sept. 1. Commissioners noted that the county paid about \$10,000 per year for landfill operations from 1986-90, and the county took over from the city the job of running the landfill in 1992, when new **Environmental Protection Agency** (EPA) regulations went into effect. That year and the next it cost Lynn County about \$32,000, and costs last year were \$40,710. By the end of July of this year, costs already totaled more than \$24,000.

Much of the expense is because the county must keep a contract with a waste management company to haul the refuse to a certified landfill, such as Lubbock, and cost of making the county's landfill meet the EPA regulations would be even more, commissioners said.

Fees will start at \$1 for dumping a burn barrel such as many residents outside of city limits use. The average pickup or 8-foot trailer load will cost \$5, a 9-foot trailer \$6, and so on up to \$13 for a 20-foot trailer and \$18 for a dump truck.

All commissioners were present Monday and all voted for the motion by Don Morton to set fees.

"We believe setting up a fee schedule will put the increased cost

of operating the landfill on those who use it, rather than having to increase county taxes to take care of the problem," said one county official.

The county did, in fact, vote at an earlier meeting Aug. 23 to leave the tax rate at its current 64.5 cents per \$100 valuation. At the same meeting, next year's budget was approved, and includes a 3 per cent raise for all fulltime county employees and elected officials. Vote on this motion by Morton also was unanimous.

Highest paid county official is Sheriff Jake Diggs, whose salary will increase from \$23,681 to \$24,391. County Judge J.F. Brandon will make \$22,508 and other elected officials, except the commissioners, will be paid just under \$21,000. Commissioners are paid just \$14,930 annu-

Meeting with the commissioners Aug. 23 was Chief Tax Appraiser Marquita Scott to discuss action by the court related to the Lynn County Hospital District. Mike Braddock moved to give the appraisal district the county's part of a surplus amounting to \$15,313 to satisfy the hospital district's request. All commissioners voted in favor of the motion.

Also discussed at Monday's meeting was a proposal from Correctional Security Systems represented by Van Dryden for a "wireless panic system" for the courthouse and jail. Commissioners deferred action on the proposal, which would cost \$9,250, pending further study. Smoke detectors for the courthouse also were discussed.

Bulldogs To Open Football Season At Floydada Friday

The Tahoka Bulldogs varsity football team will kick off the season this Friday night, September 1, with a road game at Floydada at 7:30 p.m. under the direction of head coach Bryan Gerlich in his inaugural Bulldog season.

Gerlich, in his first head coaching job after 10 seasons as an assistant (last year at San Antonio Madison), has high hopes that the Bulldogs will improve over 2-8 records the last two seasons, in which they didn't win a district game.

Thirteen lettermen return from a squad who want to improve from last year's campaign that includes a total of six seniors - Ryan Curry, Jason Jaquess, Michael Garcia, Justin Antu, Kyle Bueermann, and Michael DeLeon.

"We have a different mindset here this year with much more enthusiasm," said Jaquess. "The guys will work hard and do whatever it takes to win.'

The Bulldogs return ten offensive starters and nine defensive starters from a year ago. Several new faces on both the team and the coaching staff have been added to this year's mix, as well as the installment of new stadium lights at Kelley Field.

The new coaches patrolling the sideline this season include Gerlich and assistants Jody Bolin and John Ramos, joining returning assistants Scotty Bruington, Brent John and

Also, this year the Bulldogs have been placed in a different district, 4-AA, due to UIL realignment for at least the next two years. Other teams competing in the district are Idalou, Post, Ralls, New Deal and Sundown, but the Dogs also will play some tough former district foes, hosting Shallowater and Seagraves in late September. The Lubbock Avalanche-

Journal's pre-season guess at who will win district has Post as the favorite, with Tahoka predicted to finish fifth, just ahead of Ralls.

Altogether, 28 players are on the roster released by Gerlich for the upcoming season. Tahoka is expected to have more speed than usual, and Gerlich listed senior tailback Jeff Elmore, junior quarterback Blandon Hancock and junior receivers Stephen Solorzano, Josh Thompson and Martin Garza as among the fastest Tahoka players. Hancock and Garza, both of whom played linebacker on defense, and Solorzano, who was a defensive back, are among the returning lettermen.

Other returnees include Derrrick Barrientez (QB and linebacker), sophomore lineman Bryan Valdez, seniors Curry, Jaquess and Antu (linemen and defensive ends), senior linemen Bueermann and DeLeon, linemen Gabriel Castro and Michael Garcia, and junior tight end and defensive lineman John Mark Long.

Other team members include seniors Chris Ortiz, Matt Sanders, Ramon Rivera, Tyson Harris, Kevin Rodriguez, Ray Curtis and Pete Hernandez; juniors Odilon Granados, Matthew Benavides, Matthew Gilbert, Miguel Garza, and Jon Luna; and a sophomore quarterback, Brandon McCord.

Financial Woes Continue To Plague Lynn County Senior Citizens Center

In a continuing saga of financial difficulties, the Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center once again pleads for assistance through local donations to help keep the center operating and serving nutritious meals for senior citizens in the county.

The center has a long history of financial struggles, because state funding provides only about half of the funding needed to run the center, according to Rebecca Ingle who manages the facility located at 1600 South 3rd in Tahoka. The remainder of funds comes from donations, including the \$3 suggested donation for a meal which some, but not all, patrons contribute.

The center serves noon meals to approximately 65 senior citizens daily, including an average of 30 meals delivered to senior citizens at their homes or at locations in Wilson and O'Donnell. Some patrons faithfully contribute \$3 per meal, some afford to pay for meals. No one is turned away from the center, says the director, because of inability to pay.

"The center's expenses run about \$8,000-\$9,000 per month. State fund-

ing covers approximately half of that, and we probably take in \$1,850 to \$1,900 per month for meals served at the center, and about \$300 to \$400 per month on our home delivery meals," explained Mrs. Ingle. "We just come up short every month, and cannot ever catch up," she added.

This time of the year causes additional financial woes, she said, because of the state's fiscal year ending. "At this time, we are out of state funding and running strictly on local contributions. When state funding kicks in again in October, we may not actually get those funds until January or February, so we have a four to five month period without any assistance," Mrs. Ingle said.

She did say that Bingo contributes some funding to the center, but pays only the monthly payment on the central heating/air conditioning system. And, Lynn County Commissioners voted just this month to give an additional \$2,000 to help with immediate financial difficulties, in addition less, and there are those who cannot to the \$3000 budgeted annually for

"We do have fund raisers, usually dinners or the July 4th event, and those bring in some funding which does help, but it is just a continual struggle to keep up with the center's expenses," said Mrs. Ingle. "And we don't want the center to close, but bills have to be paid in order to keep it going. We are in the position of begging for contributions," she



O'Donnell High School, **Elementary Receive** "Exemplary" Ratings

O'Donnell Independent School District has two campuses earning the top "Exemplary" accountability ratings from Texas Education Agency, and the district received an overall "Recognized" rating, according to information released by TEA.

O'Donnell High School and Elementary campuses both earned "Exemplary" ratings, while the Middle School campus earned "Recognized"

Superintendent Dale Read said he is pleased with the exemplary ratings, but disappointed that the district received an overall rating of recognized. For the third straight year, he said, the school missed getting an overall Exemplary rating basically by only one student in one of the student subgroups.

He praised students and staff, as well as parents, saying that "Everyone really works at it."

To earn an Exemplary rating, a 90 percent passing rate on the TAAS tests for all students and student subgroups must be earned, with a dropout rate of one percent or less and an attendance rate of 94 percent or better. For Recognized status, 80 percent of students must pass the TAAS, dropout rates must be six percent or less, and the attendance rate must be 94 percent or better.

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Harvest Festival, On Sept. 30 To Celebrate 25th Anniversary

McCord, Jr., president, who asked Mrs. Nadine Dunlap to serve as chairman of a committee to plan the festival.

Other first-year organizers included Jay Dee and Virginia House who organized the merchant drawings (and who are still involved, with Jay Dee serving as Harvest Festival



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Smaller Tax Base Culprit In Hospital Tax Increase

By DALTON WOOD

Lynn County Hospital District taxes were set at 25.413 cents per \$100 valuation as directors of the district met last Wednesday and adopted a budget of \$3,328,600 for the coming year.

The tax rate is exactly what has been determined to be necessary to raise the same amount of money from taxes next year as in the current fiscal year. The rate is less than a penny more than the current rate of 24.839 cents per \$100 valuation. The increase is necessary because of a decline in the total amount of taxable property in the district, a loss of more than \$5 million, according to figures prepared by Lynn County Tax Appraisal District.

In the current year, \$559,905 was collected in taxes on a total tax base of \$225,726,426. This year's tax base totals \$220, 315, 810.

Taxes raise only 17 per cent of the hospital district's total revenue,

expected to be \$3,354,000 in the coming year, mostly derived from patient care.

Completion of financing details for the new retirement center to be built next to the hospital continues to delay start of construction, the board was advised by Administrator Dan Powers.

Students at Tahoka outperformed the state of Texas in all areas of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) in the spring of 2000, earning high marks in reading, math and writing scores on the standardized test in grades 3-8 and 10.

"I want to congratulate all TISD students and staff members for an outstanding performance on the Academic Excellence Indicator System for the 1999-2000 school year," said Superintendent Jimmy Parker. "All students and staff played a vital role in the success of our campuses and our district. Congratulations and thank you for a job well done," he added.

An analysis of Tahoka I.S.D. compared to student scores statewide showed that the local students performed very well on the TAAS tests, with 94.8 percent of Tahoka students passing the Math portion compared to 87.4 percent statewide. On the Writing portion of the test, 93.9 per cent of Tahoka students passed, with 88.2 percent of students statewide passing, and on the Reading portion Tahoka compared favorably with 90.6 percent passing compared to 87.4 percent statewide.

Breakdowns of comparisons on specific population subgroups also showed better scores for the Tahoka students compared to statewide scores, with the Hispanic subgroup passing 91.3% locally to 82.9% statewide in Math, 90.1% locally to 82.3% in Writing, and 84.4% locally to 80.7% statewide in Reading. Other subgroups, including African American and Economically Disadvantaged, also showed substantially higher marks on TAAS scores.

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

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Wilson ISD **Sets \$1.58 Tax Rate**

In a unanimous decision, the Wilson Independent School District Board of Trustees set the 2000-2001 tax rate at \$1.58 after a public hearing on the budget and tax rate Monday evening, setting the rate at \$1.50 for Maintenance and Operating and .08 for Bonded Indebtedness on the new gymnasium. The rate is an increase of approximately 2-1/2 cents from the 1999-2000 rate of \$1.556, which included \$1.49 of M&O and .066 for debt service.

Superintendent Mike Jones reported on current enrollment figures, policies and goals, UIL participation in baseball, and the status of the Distance Learning Lab. Raymond Mendez, Pablo Delgado, Annie Morales and Anita Ortega were recognized and thanked for their positive contributions to the district.

After some discussion, the board tabled action on security deposits on district housing for more study. Board member Roy Isham, who has been appointed to the board to fill a vacancy, was authorized to sign bank transactions as a trustee.

The board went into closed session for personnel discussion, but no action was taken upon returning to open session.

The superintendent also reported that Wilson I.S.D. will have an Open House for parents on Tuesday, Sept. 5, from 6-7 p.m., with all parents encouraged to attend.


