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18 Month Traffic Detour:

Four-Way Stop, Traffic Detours Added For U.S. 87 Facelift Here

A four-way stop sign at the intersection of U.S. 380 and U.S. 87 frontage roads and highway detours will cause traffic to slow in the Tahoka area during the next 18 months while the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) reconstructs U.S. 87.

Barricades were erected Monday in preparation for the rehabilitation project on U.S. 87 through Tahoka from the north city limits to the south city limits, and traffic will be routed onto frontage roads, according to TxDOT officials.

Drivers should expect lane closures and detours as a result of this project, says Penny Mason, Public Information Officer at the Lubbock TxDOT office. A four-way stop sign will be posted at the intersection of

U.S. 380 and the U.S. 87 frontage roads, where formerly only the frontage roads had stop signs. Motorists are urged to use caution at the new four-way stop where traffic converges from two major highways, and drivers on Highway 380 should be aware of the new stop signs on that east-west route.

"Both sides of U.S. 87 will be closed at the same time, and traffic will be diverted to existing frontage roads," explained Ms. Mason. "Where there are no frontage roads [on either side of the city limits] traffic will be diverted onto half lanes until frontage roads are reached," she added.

The 4.6-mile project will cost \$8.1 million and is expected to be completed in January 2002, TxDOT officials say.

"This is a complete rehabilitation project, which means that the existing highway will be taken down to the subsoil and completely rebuilt," Ms. Mason told *The News*. "This is similar to the project in Lubbock, and will include at 10-inch salvage base and 5-inch hot mix - it's a complete reconstruction of the highway."

She said that the Tahoka area project was probably planned several years ago, as each district determines which highway areas have the most deterioration, and that reconstruction plans are made accordingly in Austin.

Motorists are cautioned to observe reduced speed limits, traffic detours and the additional four-way stop during the reconstruction period.

SUMMER RE-RUNS: Okay, so it isn't summer. But it sure feels like it. Anyway, when I can't think of anything to write about, I go back and reprint some column from several years ago, figuring nobody will remember it anyway. So here is one from 1995:

BILL GATES is rich, and it's not fair. Okay, so he's smarter than I am, but only in the field of computers, which no really sane person can understand. Gates is a big muckety-muck in Microsoft, which makes things which computers can work with. He's only in his 30s, I think, and he has more money than Midas (a king who had a lot of gold, converted it to tin and opened 11 zillion muffler shops).

I don't know exactly how old Bill Gates is, but I do know I'm a lot older, and I can't even pay my property taxes or win \$3 on the lottery.

Bill better watch out, though. As soon as the people on welfare learn how much money he has, they're going to demand it all.

PRETTY SOON everything anybody orders will have to be assembled. You will want a new car, and when you go down and trade in your old one, they'll ask you where you want your new one shipped to. A few weeks later, an 18-wheeler will pull into your driveway, cracking it in several places, and slide off a boxcar full of parts plus 40 pounds of instructions on how to assemble your new vehicle. The only thing you'll recognize will be wheels inside the box and maybe the engine block. The box will be labeled "Your New 1999 600-cu. in. Whizzo. Some assembly required. All that is required is a screwdriver." (and a block and tackle, \$4000 worth of wrenches and a degree in automotive engineering).

Cars won't be the only thing requiring assembly. Already, it's hard to buy anything other than groceries that is ready to use. In the last couple of weeks, I have helped put together two desks, a chair and hardware on a storm door, none of which is easy if you try to follow directions and have never done it before. (One guy told me that the first thing you do is throw away all the instructions, but I was afraid to do that.)

Typical instructions read something like this: "Attach dingbars A and Q to the anterior sides of the slotted Z-board, tightening nuts firmly." So you do that, and then read the next line: "But first, insert warglenuts into slots under A and Q."

Tahoka Exes Reunion Plans Printed Next Week

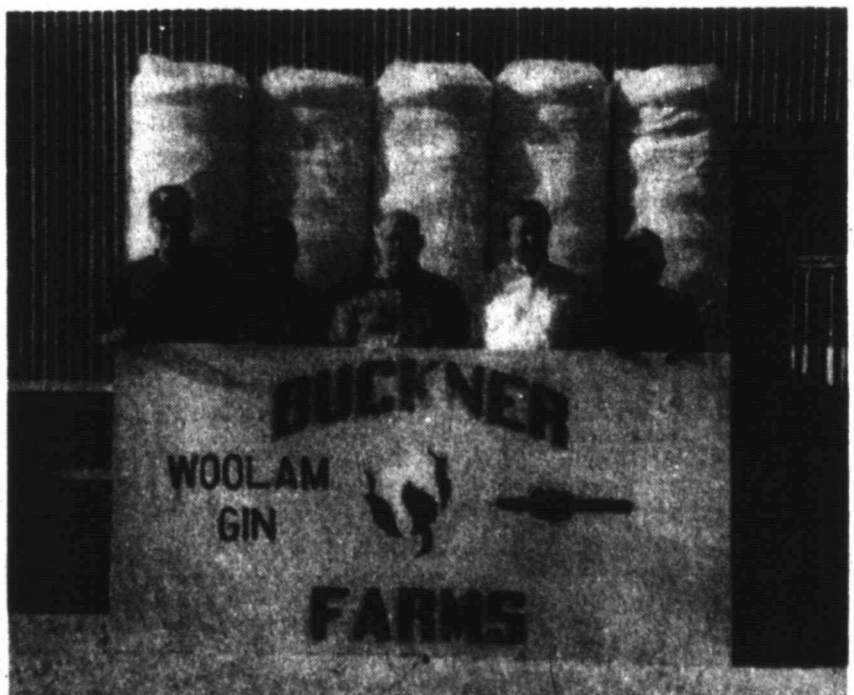

Dogs Trail Behind Lockney, Fall 35-6 In Home Opener

Tahoka dropped its first loss of the season to Lockney 35-6 on Friday night in the home football opener, giving the Bulldogs a 2-1 record heading into this coming week.

The Bulldogs had trouble keeping the Lockney offense off the field as they amassed 362 rushing yards on 59 carries and 5 touchdowns. Lockney converted 26 first downs during the game.

Offensively, the Bulldogs mustered 125 total yards on six first downs. The ground game produced 49 yards on a sum of 23 carries. Quarterback Brandon McCord finished the game completing 5 out of 18 attempts for 76 yards with one touchdown and one interception.

Yellow flags cluttered the field throughout the night, as referees called 25 penalties. The Dogs were penalized 10 times for 70 yards while Lockney had 15 penalties for 129 yards.

Lockney ran out to a 20-0 lead in the third quarter before the Dogs struck with a score of their own to make the score 20-6. The lone touchdown was scored on a 35-yard touchdown pass to receiver Stephen Solorzano from McCord.

In the fourth quarter, Lockney piled up another 15 points on two short touchdown runs to wrap up the game.

The Bulldogs will continue the season again this Friday in the second game of a three-game home-

stead, as they collide with tough former district foes, the Shallowater Mustangs, here at 7:30 p.m.

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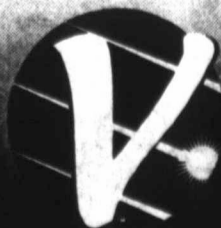

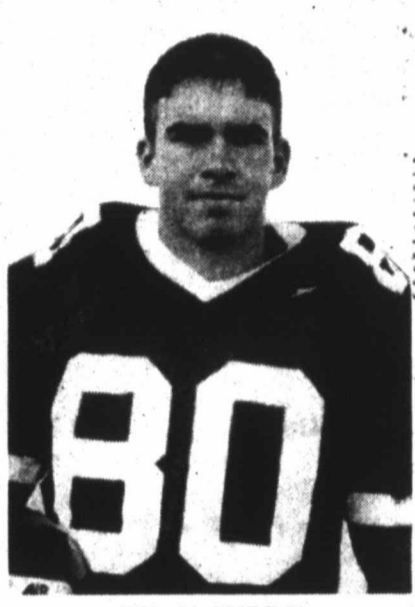

Wilson Fire Department Tip of the Week: Fall is just around the corner and even though there will still be some lingering hot weather, now is the time to contact your heating and air conditioning maintenance service so that they can get you on their schedule for filter changes and a check-up for the heater. A good maintenance firm will check the filters, the fan motor and fan drive belt as well as to check and make sure that the burner is properly adjusted and to make sure that the heat exchanger does not have any damage to it. A damaged heat exchanger may permit carbon monoxide to enter the home. Carbon monoxide is a dangerous, odor-free gas created by the burning of fossil fuels including natural gas and propane.

Also, remember that open flame space heaters in the home need to be vented to the outside so that the fumes from the burning gas can be vented out of the home. Many communities have passed laws which prohibit the use of

these non-vented gas space heaters. If you must use one of these units, be sure to leave at least one window open, part way, so that fresh air and oxygen can get into the house.
