Dogs Edged Out 30-27 In Overtime At Homecoming

The Tahoka Bulldogs were just one play away from attaining their third win of the season, as they were narrowly defeated 30-27 in overtime by Seagraves at the annual Homecoming game last Friday. The Bulldogs head into their bye week with a 2-3 record.

This is the first time the Bulldogs have played in an overtime session at the end of a game since overtime rules were implemented only a few

The game was sent into extra play when kicker, Odilon Granados, kicked a 20-yard field goal through the uprights with four seconds left in the game to tie the game 27-27.

Seagraves was given the first possession at the Tahoka 25-yard line in the first official overtime period. From there, Seagraves ended up making a 25-yard field goal to make the score 30-27 in their favor with the Bulldog's chance on offense yet to come.

However, on the second play from scrimmage with Tahoka on offense at the Seagraves 25-yard line, the Bulldogs turned over the ball, and Seagraves recovered the loose fumble to end the game and give them the victory and a bitter defeat for the Bulldogs.

The gridiron contest was a battle throughout all four quarters of the game. After Seagraves struck first to gain a 6-0 advantage, Tahoka responded with two touchdowns of their own in the opening quarter to make the score 14-6 at the end of the first period.

Running back Jeff Elmore, who had 156 yards on 29 carries, scored the Dogs' first touchdown on a 19yard run. Wide receiver Josh Thompson scored on a 19-yard reverse play on a gambling 4th and 7 to extend the Bulldog's lead.

After Granados added three points on a 27-yard field goal to make the margin 17-6, Seagraves returned the ensuing kickoff to close the gap to 17-14 heading into halftime.

In the second half, quarterback Brandon McCord threw a strike to Thompson on a 35-yard touchdown pass after Seagraves had regained the

lead to make the game 24-27 before it was headed to the fourth quarter and eventually overtime.

McCord completed 8 out 24 passes for a season high 143 yards with one touchdown and one interception. On special teams, Granados was able to convert on two out of three field goal attempts.

The Bulldogs hung tough with Seagraves by forcing a blistering seven turnovers despite the opposition gaining 301 rushing yards on 56 carries. Seagraves fumbled the ball six times, losing five of them. Two passes were also intercepted by the Bulldog secondary.

The Bulldogs will not play a game until next week at New Deal on Friday, Oct. 13 at 7:30 p.m. The game will be the first of five meaningful district games for the rest of the season.

Assisted Living Facility Name Changed:

"Lynnwood" Name To Honor **Hospital Director Dalton Wood**

In a surprise move to board member Dalton Wood last Wednesday, fellow Lynn County Hospital directors voted unanimously to name the help us decide which way we wanted hospital's soon-to-be-constructed as- to go, and he even found out finansisted living facility "Lynnwood" in recognition of Wood's dedication in spearheading the project and ultimately helping the hospital to achieve the long-envisioned facility. The new center will offer area residents an alternative for independent or assisted

living. Ground was broken prior to last Wednesday's meeting, signaling start of construction for the facility scheduled to be completed by June 7, 2001, which Hospital Administrator Dan Powers said should mean the assisted living center can open about July 1. Board members and mayors of New Home, O'Donnell, Tahoka and Wilson were present, plus the administrator, two doctors and other interested persons.

After groundbreaking ceremonies, board member Peggy Morton made the motion to change the name of the facility from the previously suggested Lynn Villa to Lynnwood, and the other directors concurred unanimously, with the exception of Wood who abstained from voting.

"I feel that Dalton was instrumental in getting this project off the ground," Mrs. Morton told The News. "He did most of the legwork, although others did as well, but he was

of the responsibility, visiting several other facilities to try and find out what types of facilities there are, to cial information and kept the board in touch with them. I don't think we would ever have gotten this off the ground without him - I truly don't," she added.

The "Lynn" portion of the name helps to locate the facility, and the "Wood" part is a tribute to the former editor and publisher of The News.

Hospital directors have eyed the assisted living project for many years, but long-time board member Billy Tomlinson told the group at groundbreaking ceremonies that directors have been seriously considering options for the past seven years. Wood was elected to the board three years ago, is chairman of the assisted living committee named by the board to investigate all aspects of the project, and has been "very dedicated to getting this done."

Hospital Administrator Powers said he was very much in favor of honoring Wood with the name change, "I'm all for it, and the motion was very much supported by the other board members. I think that's wonderful," he told The News. "Every time I called somewhere to follow up on this project, whether it was a state agency or another assisted living facility - everywhere I called,

the most persistent. He took on much Dalton had already been there and they all said, 'Oh, yes, we know Dalton.' I was just following in his footsteps," said Powers, who began his duties as hospital administrator here on Aug 1.

Wood, who said he was "totally surprised" by the motion to change the facility's name, also said he was humbled by the board's decision. "I am flattered and humbled that they would want to do this. It is very much an honor for me - I just don't know what to say," he said.

Powers told the board he has visited an assisted living center in Olton and plans to visit some others to get ideas on policies for operation of the center. He also said that already he is listing names of potential residents with phone numbers so they can be contacted when Lynnwood starts taking reservations.

The board last Wednesday also approved a bid of \$27,284 from Simplex, a firm with offices in Lubbock, to install a new fire and smoke alarm system for the entire hospital and clinics. Board members expressed appreciation to the hospital auxiliary for their commitment to pay part of the cost of the new alarm system.

Tomlinson, president of the board, presided at the meeting which was attended by Powers and board members Jerry Ford, Wood, Mrs. Morton and Virginia Griffing. Absent were members Joe Hays and Mike

Rollover Causes Minor Injuries

Two persons in a 1995 Chevrolet pickup were injured late Friday afternoon as the truck overturned 7.9 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87.

Lynn County EMS ambulance took the driver, Maria Vasquez, 46, of Tahoka and a passenger, Joaquin Hernandez, 56, of New Home, to Lynn County Hospital, where they were treated for apparent minor injuries and released.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. members used the jaws of life to cut off the top of the pickup, which wound up on its side in the median, to free the two occupants. A highway patrolman who investigated said the pickup was southbound when the accident occurred.

In another incident, law enforcement officers arrested a 20-year-old Hispanic male late Friday night for no drivers license after he was stopped for driving on the wrong side of the east access road. Charges of resisting arrest and failure to identify to a peace officer were later added.

A woman complained to Tahoka Police Dept. Saturday that someone had sprayed her vehicle parked at the Harvest Festival with pink hair spray sometime during the day.

Two large bags of aluminum cans were reported stolen from the property of Wayne Jeffcoat sometime during the week.

Fifteen persons were jailed during the week on the following charges: driving with license suspended (enhanced), warrant for no liability insurance in Ward County, no drivers license, driving on wrong side of highway, resisting arrest, theft by check, issuance of bad checks, public intoxication, DWI, no liability insurance, warrant for violation of promise to appear, warrant for no drivers license and no liability insurance, and one for unrestrained child under two years of age.

Sheriff's Dept. dispatchers answered 230 calls in September, including 104 for the county, 85 for the Tahoka Police Dept., 18 for EMS, 12 for fires, and 11 for the O'Donnell Police Dept.

wear them until it's time to throw them away. And especially I'm not watering the yard. (Well, actually my wife waters the yard, but I'm triving to get her to agree to stop watering it. Forever).

These decisions were easy to make after I received our water bill for last month. It was more than \$100, and everybody else I checked with also topped that mark.

I'm not mad at the city, though. I know how hot and dry it has been for the last month, and I know the city has established rates for water, so the obvious point is, we're just pumping too much water, and the big culprit is the green grass. My water bill said that \$75 of the total actually was for water (the rest is for sewer and garbage disposal and other necessary stuff). Probably \$50 worth of that went onto the grass. And \$50 a month is too much to pay just so people going by will think your home looks nice.

My water bill said I used "43" of something, which cost me that \$75. I don't know if that's 43 gallons, 43 million gallons or if the meter reader was going down the alley at 43 miles an hour when he read it. Anyway, I'm willing to accept how much they said I used as good information.

The word "Tahoka" is an Indian word having something to do with water, probably meaning "good water," according to most researchers. Actually, they are wrong. The word, as translated by me from the Indian dialect, means "Place Where Green Grass Costs Much Wampum."

Frying pans left on the stove when the homeowner goes to another part of the home, even for a very short period of time, are a fire waiting to happen. Splashed or spattered cooking grease also can catch fire very easily. If you have a frying pan of grease catch on fire, one of the quickest ways to control the fire is to put a metal lid on the pan which can help to smother the fire. Others say that the fire can be smothered by using baking soda. The best way to control a grease fire is to be sure that you have a class A-B-C fire extinguisher handy. Follow the directions and use the extinguisher.

If you don't control the fire immediately, call 911 and call for the fire department. Many people feel that you should call 911 as soon as the fire breaks out, anyway.

Most Lynn County residents, if you live in town, will pay taxes to five different taxing agencies. These agencies include your local city, your local school district, the Lynn County Hospital District, the County of Lynn and the High Plains Underground Water District. If you live outside of town you will just pay to four agencies.

Most of the taxing agencies use the Lynn County Appraisal District office to compute and collect their taxes, so many people will only receive a single notice for their taxes. Those living in the City of Wilson will receive a notice from the City of Wilson and one from the Lynn County Appraisal District. The Appraisal District notice will include the taxes for the County, the Hospital District, the High Plains Underground Water District, and the Wilson School District. The notice from the City of Wilson will include only the City of Wil-

Some of the taxing entities allow a discount for early payment of the taxes. These discounts, normally, are 3% for payment in October, 2% for payment in November and 1% for payment in December.

Taxes for the City of Wilson will be paid at the Wilson City Hall, either by mail or in person. Taxes for all the rest of the agencies should be paid to the Lynn County Appraisal District office in Tahoka, either mail or in person.

For more information, contact either the Lynn County Appraisal District officer of the City of Wilson office.

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Dear User: The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that nitrite poses an acute health concern at certain levels of exposure. This ihorganic chemical is used in fertilizers and is found in sewage and wastes from humans and or farm animals and generally gets into drinking water as a result of those activities. While excessive levels of nitrite in drinking water have been observed, other sources of nitrate have caused serious illness in infants and sometimes death in infants under six months of age. The serious iflness in infants is caused because nitrite interferes with the oxygen carrying capacity of the child's blood. This is an acute disease in that symptoms can develop rapidly. However, in most cases, health deteriorates over a period of days. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin. Clearly, expert medical advice should be sought immediately if these symptoms occur. The purpose of this notice is to encourage parents and other responsible parties to provide infants with an alternate source of drinking water. Local and state health authorities are the best source for information concerning alternate sources of drinking water for infants. EPA has set the drinking water standard at 10 parts per million (ppm) for nitrate to protect against the risk of these adverse effects. EPA has also set a drinking water standard for nitrite at ppm. To allow for the fact that the toxicity of nitrate and nitrite are additive, EPA has also blished a standard for the sum of nitrate and nitrite at 10 ppm. Drinking water that meets the EPA standard is associated with little to none of this risk and is considered safe with respect to

NOTICE OF FLUORIDE LEVEL IN WATER

The City of Wilson has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for fluoride established by the department's "Safe Drinking Water Act."

The samples of water from the Wilson system contain 4.1 milligrams of fluoride per liter, and the department requires the city to notify all customers. There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing fluoride at this level except that it could cause mottling (brown stain) on the teeth of children under 14 years of age.

All the dentists in this area are aware of the fluoride level.

The City will continue to search for alternate sources of supply and will investigate any available treatment techniques to lower the level of our fluoride if they are affordable at all. Bottled water is available for families with children under the age of 14 years at the City Office at no cost.

MANDATORY HEALTH EFFECTS LANGUAGE FLUORIDE

Dear Consumer

Many public water systems are required by federal regulation to routinely analyze for fluoride levels in the drinking water they provide to consumers. Analyses of the drinking water in your community has found a level of 5.1 mg/l of fluoride. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has set a standard for fluoride at 2.0 mg/l to minimize the occurrence of objectionable dental fluorosis.

Fluoride at the appropriate levels in the drinking water of children up to the age of nine, reduces cavities. However, children exposed to levels of fluoride greater than 1.0 to 2.0 mg/l may develop dental fluorosis in their permanent teeth. Dental fluorosis, in its moderate and severe forms, is a discoloration (brown staining) and pitting of teeth.

Because fluoride affects only developing teeth, households without children would not be expected to be affected by this level of fluoride. Individuals with children under the age of nine are encouraged to seek other sources of drinking water for their children.

The EPA Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for fluoride is 4.0 mg/l. That standard is based upon protection from crippling skeletal fluorosis, which may result from levels of 4.0 mg/l or more. The MCL is an enforceable standard and has been set to protect public health.

Your water supplier can lower the concentration of fluoride to the level where beneficial effects still occur (cavity prevention) and where the occurrence of dental fluorosis is minimal. The technology for the removal of fluoride is currently available but the use of this technology by your utility may increase your monthly water bill. Treatment systems for the removal of fluoride from drinking water are also available for home use. Information on such systems is available at the address given below. Low fluoride bottled drinking water that would meet all standards is also available

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
