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Band Breaks 35-Year Barrier: THS Band Earns "1" In UIL Marching Contest

Not since the days of Lyndon B. Johnson and the Beatles has a Tahoka High School band earned a first division at UIL Marching Contest, but on Saturday at Texas Tech the THS marching musicians claimed the "1" Superior Rating which has been so elusive for the past 35 years.

Under the direction of Carroll Rhodes and assistant Arthur Plotts. the 52-member THS band performed

Spanish music while marching before a crowd at Texas Tech's Jones Stadium, earning ratings of 1, 1 and 2 for the overall superior rating.

"I am extremely proud of these fine young people who have worked long and hard for this honor," said Rhodes. "They have put in multiple hours at before-and-after school rehearsals. This now makes them eligible for a large Sweepstakes (1's in

marching, concert and sightreading) if they earn a 1 in Concert and 1 in Sightreading this spring - that is another barrier that has not been broken in 35 to 40 years," he explained. During the past 35 years, several Tahoka bands have come close to earning a superior rating in marching contest with ratings of 1, 2 and 2, including the band of two years ago.


Three judges rate the marching con-

test, but at least two ratings must be I's to claim the overall superior rating.

Records in the Tahoka High School annuals and past issues of The Lynn County News indicate that the Tahoka Band under the direction of Gary Hall in the fall of 1965 earned a 1 in marching contest. Prior to that, the band under Vic Kyler earned a 1 in 1962, and possibly in 1963 or 1964

as well, but no records have been found.

"Please allow these young people to know how proud you are of them as a community," Director Rhodes said. "They are an awesome group. I feel very blessed to be able to work with them," he added.



Unfounded Here

Rumors that infectious hepatitis has caused a local restaurant to close in Tahoka are untrue, according to information from the Texas Department of Health regional office in Lubbock.

Bulldogs Upend Jackrabbits 21-0 To Snap Losing Skid

The Tahoka Bulldogs delivered their first district win in almost four years on Friday night with a 21-0 triumph over the Ralls Jackrabbits to keep their season district hopes alive. Their record is now at 3-4 overall with a 1-1 standing in district play.

The win puts the Bulldogs in position to move up in the standings significantly with only three games left to go in Coach Brian Gerlich's first year as head coach.

Turnovers plagued both teams throughout the ballgame. Both teams combined for an astounding eleven turnovers and eight other fumbles.

Early voting continues this week for the Nov. 7 General Election, conducted in Lynn County at the Lynn County Clerk's Office from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. Monday though Friday, through Nov. 3. Voters are reminded to bring their voter registration cards.

In addition to a slate of national candidates including the Gore/Bush bid for U.S. President, bids for U.S. Senator, and District 13 Representative, and several local non-contested races, Lynn County voters will have a referendum printed on the lower portion of the ballot asking if voters are in favor of building new county jail facilities.

Lynn County Commissioners voted to place a "non-binding referendum" (basically, an opinion poll) on the General Election ballot, allowing area residents to voice their opinions on the issue. The referendum will read:

"Are you in favor of obtaining financing for the purpose of purchasing land and facilities for a 48-bed Lynn **County Jail at an estimated** cost of \$2,300,000?"

Commissioners are considering architectural plans for renovating an existing building in Tahoka (the S&K Implement building on Hwy. 380 East) into a 48-bed jail facility, as the best, and most economical, means for expanding the local jail. Total cost of the renovation project, including property purchase and some interior furnishings, is approximately \$2.3 million

More than 2,500 colleges and univer: sities nationwide use the publication to recognize their academically qualia fied students.







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In the World Series of Politics, How Did Mac Thornberry Strike Out as Your 13th District Representative?

STRIKE ONE (5-24-2000) VOTED to give PERMANENT NORMAL TRADE STATUS (PNTR), formerly referred to as MOST FAVORED NATION TRADE STATUS, TO THE COMMU-NIST CHINESE GOVERNMENT. This action stops annual Congressional reviews of (\circ) Chinese human rights abuses, including slave labor and persecution of Christians and genocide against the captive nation of Tibet. For District 13 farmers, it also phases out by 2005 any restrictions on Chinese raw cotton, textiles, or finished garments. Any raw cotton that China, the world's No. 1 cotton producer, might lack can most cheaply be supplied by Pakistan, their nearby neighbor that is second in world cotton production and an exporter of cotton similar in grade to that grown in West Texas. The damage that existing levels of Asian cotton imports (13 million bale equivalent) have already done to the Lubbock-based farmer-owned Plains Cotton Coop Association (PCCA) spinning mill profits this year is discussed in their current annual report, p. 12-13, reducing allocated margins from \$18.08/bale in 1998 to 26¢ in 1999. This vote, according to Cotton Grower magazine (June 2000, pg. 5), will immediately cost 150,000 U.S. textile and cotton-industry jobs.

STRIKE TWO (5-24-2000) VOTED AGAINST THE TAIWAN AMENDMENT TO HR4444 THAT WOULD HAVE REVOKED PNTR WITH THE CHINESE COMMUNIST GOVERNMENT (IF THEY INVADE, ATTACK, OR BLOCKADE OUR TREATY PARTNER, TAIWAN. This independent democratic island nation off the coast of mainland China is the third largest Asian economy. The U.S. has a far better trade balance with this country than with China. The Chinese Communists regard Taiwan as a rebel province and in 1996 threatened war with the U.S. if we oppose their plans to annex it, as they did the sovereign peaceful border nation, Tibet. The Chinese Communists' approach is similar to Hitler's annexation of border countries in the 1930's.

STRIKE THREE (6-21-2000) VOTED AGAINST HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 90 THAT WOULD HAVE WITHDRAWN U.S. SUPPORT FROM THE WORLD TRADE ORGANIZA-TION (WTO) AGREEMENT. The bill's sponsor, Rep. Ron Paul (Republican, TX), warned that the U.S. Congress had "unconstitutionally abdicated regulative authority to an unelected secretive international body" where foreign trade lawyers act as judges. This gives a foreign dictatorship like China the authority to challenge the legitimacy of laws passed under the U.S. Constitution before a global governing body.

On each of these three votes, several conservative Republican Congressmen voted opposite Representative Thornberry. With his votes, it is small wonder that he has already been dubbed "Rep. Chinaberry" by some District 13 constituents.


BONUS STRIKE FOUR (4-28-1996) VOTED FOR THE FAILED "FREEDOM TO FARM" (FAIR) ACT, under which West Texas cotton has lost 50% of its market price since 1995. Since several District 13 cotton farmers will lose their farming careers by next spring as a result of this misguided legislation benefitting commodity buyers far more than farmers, it would seem appropriate for a Congressman who voted for this disastrous bill to lose his also.




