## Lynn Voters Choose Bush, **Pass Jail Issue Referendum**

marked ballots in Lynn County in the General Election, with 2,131 ballots tallied after polls closed at 7 p.m. Tuesday. Lynn voters want Republican candidate Texas Governor George W. Bush as their president, with an overwhelming 1,507 votes compared to 562 for current U.S. Vice President Al Gore in the presidential bid. As of press time Wednesday, no winner had been declared nationwide in the presidential campaign, with a gridlock over Florida votes to determine the next U.S. President.

Lynn County voters want a new county jail built, responding 996 to 720 in favor of building the \$2.3 million facility. The nonbinding referendum was an opinion poll which Lynn County Commissioners placed on the ballot to determine if the general public wanted county officials to seek financing to purchase land and remodel a building into a new 48-bed

A little more than 2,000 voters jail facility. Passage of the referendum does not require that the facility be built, but rather gives commissioners a nod to continue in that pursuit if they so choose.

In other election results, Lynn voters concurred with other voters statewide, choosing incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchison for U.S. Senator with 1,519 votes in the county, compared to 470 for Democratic challenge Gene Kelly.

U.S. Representative Mac Thornberry carried Lynn voters as well, with 1,268 votes compared to Democratic challenger Curtis Clinesmith with 714 votes in the

Locally, all candidates were running unopposed to reclaim their seats, including District Attorney Ricky Smith, Lynn County Sheriff Jake Diggs, County Attorney James Napper, Tax Assessor Sherry Pearce, and Commissioners Don Morton and Don Blair.

### Tahoka Man Recalls Combat Duty **During World War II Years**

Name: William Edward Bartley,

Technical Sergeant 421st Night Fighter Squadron Civilian Occupation: Farmer in Lynn County Date of Service: October 27, 1944 to November 22, 1946 Honorable Discharge from United States Army: November 22, 1946

States of America in the military service, and Lynn County has their fair share of veterans who have given their time, talents, honor and sometimes their lives in defense of their country. This Saturday, Nov. 11, is Veterans Day, officially the day set aside to recognize and honor the nation's servicemen and women.

In recognition of Veterans Day, the story of Ed Bartley, longtime Lynn County resident who resides in Tahoka, is shared by his daughter, Myrna Bartley Weaver, who for her family recorded the history of her father's combat duty during World

Bartley served two years in the army, and was honorably discharged after earning an Asiatic Pacific Campaign Ribbon with one Bronze Star, Philippine Liberation Ribbon with one Bronze Star, Good Conduct Medal, Army Occupation Ribbon (Japan), Victory Ribbon and two Overseas Service Bars.

This story is printed here in full, as told to Mrs. Weaver by her father, who although reluctant to appear boastful about serving his country, wanted to share the historical aspect of his service with his family.

### A History of the Military Service of William Edward Bartley

A group of boys from Lynn County and I left for Basic Training in October of 1944. Some of them were E.R. Blakney, Jack Edwards, Louis Alsup, Skeet Clem, Boner and Cook. These men and I stayed together until we reached our first point of service in Manilla. Along with them, I received my basic training in Mineral Wells, Texas. I was stationed there until February, 1945. I went home for ten days before leaving by

train for Fort Orr, California. From Fort Orr, I boarded a ship destined by the Philippines in March of 1945. I didn't see land for 22 days until I docked at New Guinea for a day and night where supplies were replenished. During this voyage, our ship zigzagged the seas, not holding a straight course for more than five minutes. I was told that the ship was being tracked by a submarine and it took seven minutes for the sub to set its target before it could accurately

My first assignment while on board this ship was K.P. and I didn't rotate off for the duration of the voy-

fire torpedoes.

There have been many men and age. I got very seasick being in the omen who have served the United hull of the ship and continuously having to smell the food. The voyage lasted a total of 32 days and I learned of President Roosevelt's death while on board my ship.

> My ship docked at the island of Luzon in the Philippines the first part of May, 1945. I was stationed there with the 32nd Division until February, 1946. I was a radio man on the

> A classmate of mine that I served with named Jack Edwards, was killed while I was in the Philippines. He was about three feet behind me when I heard fire. Two shots hit him in the head and two shots hit him in the

> Although the war officially ended about four months into my duty, the platoon I was in stayed on to secure the area. One day as my platoon approached an ammo bunker, we were fired upon. The Japanese were firing mortar shells that were said to be able to kill someone within a 50-foot radius. While laying on my belly behind a small hill, a shell hit about ten to twelve feet from me. It blew my helmet off my head. I wasn't injured and the blast didn't even leave a ringing in my ears. It did injure a couple of men nearby. One of the men was sent home because some of the shrapnel lodged in his shoulder. It was several days before we received backup and secured the area.

After my action in the Philippines, I was transferred as a replacement in the Air Corp. and sent to Japan. In February of 1946, I boarded a ship for Japan. My ship was caught in a typhoon and the ship was about 18 hours behind the eye of the storm. The seas were rough for several days before we got caught in the storm and then we hit very turbulent winds. The strongest winds lasted for about three or four days. Some of the swells were so large that our ship would fall, nose first into the sea and the engine would come up out of the water. When the engine finally caught the water again, the ship would vibrate so badly that I thought it would break apart. The swells had to be two or three stories in height. My friend, Lester Adams, who was stationed at Okinawa during the typhoon said that the wind speed was clocked at 215 mph before the instruments broke apart. Finally, the winds gradually calmed. I was at sea for 17 days during my voyage to Japan.

During the voyage, I didn't get decided that being seasick was silly so I mentally prepared myself not to get seasick. I guess it worked because I had been so sick during my first voyage but I didn't get sick during the raging typhoon of my second

**November 11** 

When I docked in Japan, my first assignment was to help secure the territory and then I helped update all military records for six weeks. They were destroyed during the typhoon. I was then assigned to the duty of personal equipment supply sergeant for my division of the Air Corp. I was placed in charge of checking the safety equipment for P-61 Night Fighter airplanes. (These combat planes were also called Black Widows.) I checked the parachutes, the Mae West one-man life boars that fit in with the parachutes, and various equipment on the planes. Generally, the pilots flew about 50 missions and then they got to go home.

I finished our my duty in Japan and boarded a ship home on September 3, 1946. It took me about 15 days to get back to California. I then caught a train to Fort Sam Houston and stayed there for four or five days. I came home and spent 65 days on furlough before being officially discharged. My discharge came in November of 1946.


### Free Thanksgiving Dinner Slated This Sunday For Local Residents

### Senior Citizens Center Discontinues Bingo Here

Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center will no longer sponsor Bingo activity in Tahoka, its board of directors decided last week. The center has sponsored Bingo for the past four years at the Tahoka Activity Center, but directors voted to discontinue the sponsorship as of this week, saying the center was not making any "appreciable" amount of money from the venture.

Center officials said the Bingo venture paid \$418 per month on a loan for the heating and air conditioning system for the Pioneer Center located at 1600 South 3rd in Tahoka, but did not provide any additional funding for the Senior Citizens.

"We hope that area organizations and individuals will consider the service that the Lynn County Senior Citizens Center provides to our local residents, and will help us keep the center operating with donations, especially if they realize we are no longer associated with Bingo," said one of the center's directors.

It takes \$7,000 to \$8,000 per month to operate the center, according to administrator Rebecca Ingle. South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) provides a portion of the funding, based on the number of meals served at the center, Mrs. Ingle said, noting that the SPAG portion only amounts to about half of what is needed monthly.

"The more people who eat at the center, the more SPAG will pay, and if those who eat at the center will contribute the suggested \$3 donation per meal that would also help us out," explained the administrator. Fundraisers such as dinners and bake sales are also held periodically, she said.

Currently, the center serves an average of 70 meals per day, including meals served at the center, home deliveries in Tahoka for those unable to come to the center, and deliveries to Wilson and O'Donnell. In Wilson, City Secretary Susann Follis takes calls from Wilson residents wanting meals, with an average of six meals per day delivered to the Green Building on Mondays and Wednesdays. An average of 15 meals per day are delivered to O'Donnell five days a week, Mrs. Ingle says.

The meals served must meet government nutrition guidelines, and are served at noon Monday through Friday at the center. For those age 60

and above, a donation of \$3 per meal is suggested, and for those guests under age 60, a donation of \$4.50 per meal is suggested.

"We have one man, who does not have a car, who comes to the center every day for a meal. This is probably the only hot meal he gets, because he does not have electricity at: his home. He eats his meal, and takes his carton of milk and dessert home with him, and I feel like that is probably his supper," the center administrator said. "We have several who take home deliveries who are unable to prepare meals for themselves, and the center provides the only hot meal they may get during the day," she

"This center serves anyone age 60 and above, and visitors are always welcome," Mrs. Ingle said. "However, younger family members or guests are also welcome," she

The center has received several donations recently, and Mrs. Ingle expressed appreciation for any and all funding or canned goods donated to the center.

"We just cannot make ends meet without donations, so we truly appreciate any help we can get," she said. "Most recently, I want to thank First National Bank of Tahoka, the Masonic Lodge 1041, Lynn County Harvest Festival, SPJST Lodge 215, Mr. and Mrs. Kelly Livingston, the Danny Paris family and another party who wishes to remain anonymous for: their generous donations. Also, the canned food drives by Tahoka High School FCCLA and the Methodist: Church Family Fun Night are very appreciated," the administrator:

A donation box for the center will: be placed at the Community Thanksgiving Dinner at the school cafeteria this Sunday, sponsored by the Tahoka Ministerial Alliance, from 5-7 p.m.





### Tahoka's Huffaker, Smith Among Cotton Group Who Toured China

producer Wayne Huffaker and Bryant Seed & Delinting owner John Smith were among a group of 30 cotton growers, ginners and seed processors from west Texas who toured China in September under the sponsorship of the People to People Ambassador Program. Both returned to Tahoka with a healthy respect for the cotton growers in China, and Huffaker can show two albums full of pictures of the trip.

The People to People Ambassador Program was initiated by Dwight D. Eisenhower when he was president, for the purpose of exchanging information and generating goodwill between ordinary citizens of the United States and those in the same occupation in foreign countries. Un-

One of the members of the group was a non-Texan, Jesse F. Moore of Virginia, who upon his return compiled notes of some of their experiences, from which information was gathered for this article in *The News*, provided by Huffaker.

The trip itinerary was arranged by the People to People staff, in consultation with the group leader and Chinese agricultural officials. An experienced People to People tour guide from the United States traveled with the group, which spent 11 days inside China.

The days were spent visiting with cotton experts which included trips to cotton fields, gins, and textile mills, and the group also spent some

were spent in and around Beijing, with much of this time spent seeing such sites as Tian'anmen Square, the Great Wall which meanders fairly close to Beijing, and the Forbidden City. The Forbidden City, so named because ordinary people were forbidden entry in those long-ago days of the Emperors, is walled in and consists of palace grounds covering many acres, with numerous palatial buildings that have been preserved and/or restored.

After leaving Beijing, the group toured rural areas, first by train and

"Almost immediately after we had gotten outside the city limits of Beijing, we began to see out the train window huge fields of lush green cops, uniformly of the highest quality, as far as the eye could see. Most of these large fields were devoted to corn but lots of peanuts too, along with lots of smaller acreages of land growing almost any kind of vegetable crop you can imagine. These crops extended right up to the railroad bed,' Moore wrote.

"We had been told that each farmer in China has only 1/2 to about 3 acres of land to farm, so we were prepared to see small plots, each prominently identified by fences, turn rows, ditches, or at least wooden stakes at each corner. It is true that each farmer only has a small plot of ground, but the major field crops like corn, cotton and peanuts are planted in such a way that you would think that those huge fields, containing hundreds if not thousands of acres, were owned, planted, fertilized, and cultivated all by one farmer, all on the same day!" he continued.

However, the tour group was told that individual farmers all planted and tended their small acreages in unison with everyone else, to give the large fields one uniform, continuous appearance.

"Even when we got out in the fields later, it was impossible for us to tell where each farmer's plot began and ended," Moore wrote. "We were told that farmers could definitely identify the boundaries of their plots, but throughout our visit we remained curious about just how they did it. We could never find any kind of ground marker."

inch of land in all of China is owned by the national government. Land for farming, constructing businesses, building homes, etc., may be leased from the government for up to 70 years, but title to the land remains permanently with the government.

The government is also the sole buyer of the cotton crop in China, and it establishes the price which is uniform for all cotton purchased. However, the group was told, farmers are allowed to "shop around" among the government buying agents in search of a little premium and often found it due to competition among the agents trying to meet their buying

The average per-acre cotton yield in China is 1138 pounds, well over two bales per acre, nearly double the 625 pounds per-acre yield in the United States, Moore wrote. This is primarily due to the fact that all cotton in China is irrigated, whereas much of the U.S. crop is not.

"The Chinese appear to be just as advanced as the U.S. in the development of superior varieties of cotton, not only for yield and quality but for insect control as well." said Moore. "They have used gene transplants, as has our country, to develop a cotton plant with leaves that are poisonous to the bollworm, an insect extremely harmful to cotton plants and a major headache to cotton growers everywhere.

"On the other hand, the method of planting, cultivating and harvesting cotton, as well as all other crops produced in China, remains the same as that used over the centuries: the farmer's two hands and those of his family," Moore continued. "But this presents no obstacle and is perhaps an asset to his production of highyielding, high-quality cotton. The very small acreage that he tends permits him to visit each plant individually as many times as needed for cultivation, insect and disease control, and to hand-pick the cotton boll by boll as it opens to get it out of the field before it can be damaged by the weather."

The group was told that the downside to each farmer having only a small plot of land to farm is that farm families, which make up 80 percent of China's population, barely eke out a living with absolutely no room for any discretionary spending beyond the bare necessities of life. Farmers must also pay a heavy annual tax on their land, which is how the national, regional and local government raise most of their revenue.

The group met with cotton breeders, seed distributors, agronomists, entomologists, ginners, textile mill operators, and officials from the regional offices of the national government whose duties relate to agriculture. China and the U.S. are the top two producers of cotton in the world, with their combined production amounting to about one-half of all the cotton produced in the world, Moore explained. The two countries are currently tied for the number one position, he said.

"Our Chinese trip was outstanding in every respect," Moore said, expressing what seems to be the general consensus of the group. "I feel very fortunate to have become acquainted with this very interesting and rapidly developing country, under the expert guidance and assistance of the People to People Program, and in the company of the finest group of people you would ever hope to know," he added.

### **CRP Payments Total** \$2 Million In County, \$159 Million In Texas

Wayland Shurley of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency, announces \$159 million to be paid on 23,149 Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts in

"The Conservation Reserve Program is the U.S. Department of Agriculture's largest conservation program and is a voluntary program that offers landowners annual rental payments and cost-share assistance as incentives to convert cropland to approved permanent cover for a contract period of 10-15 years," said Shurley.

To date, USDA has administered 23 CRP sign-up periods spanning 15 years since the program's inception in the Food Security Act of 1985. Recent state data for Texas indicates program enrollment of approximately 4 million CRP acres statewide. Rental payments for program year 2000 averaged \$35.00 per acre and \$7,000 per farm for Texas landowners and operators.

Nationally, the CRP program boasts 32.5 million acres enrolled. FY 2000 payments will total more

State Executive Director, A. than \$1.4 billion making the national average payment per farm \$4,833 with an average payment per acre of \$45.17. Approximately 293,857 farms are enrolled in more than 462,855 CRP contracts across the

"The substantial CRP acreage enrollment in Texas is a direct reflection of Texas agriculture producers' natural resource stewardship," said Shurley. "They (farmers) voluntarily agree to take environmentally sensitive land out of production when they enroll in CRP."

"Lynn County CRP participants have received \$2,152,069 rent from 65,585 acres enrolled in 333 contracts of CRP," stated Lynn Maeker, Chairman of the Lynn County FSA Committee.

Land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program must be highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem or provide substantial environmental benefits if devoted to specific conservation uses. 
