Contract Extended, Salary Raised For TISD Superintendent Jimmy Parker

Another year was added on to his contract, and a salary increase was unanimously approved by all seven trustees for Tahoka Independent School District Superintendent Jimmy Parker last Thursday evening, among a slate of other routine business

The board approved a salary increase of \$3500 for the superintendent, which raises his annual salary

to \$72,500. A \$500 allowance for an annual medical physical was also added to the superintendent's package. Supt. Parker's contract was extended by one year, which gives the superintendent a three-year contract.

The salary package is consistent with other districts of this size statewide, Board President Greg Henley told *The News*. "The superintendent's salary is slightly below the average

slightly above average for salaries reported last year," Henley explained.
The board also considered other salary schedules for paraprofessional positions (aides) in the district, but took no action at this meeting, saying the salary schedules will be dis-

took no action at this meeting, saying the salary schedules will be discussed again at the next board meeting. Trustees did, however, approve a \$1500 stipend above base salary for aides staffing district libraries.

In other business, trustees amended the local athletic policy to reflect UIL policy regarding athletes with failing grades. In the former local policy, student athletes who failed two consecutive six-weeks grading periods were removed from the athletic program, because they were not allowed to practice or participate in games. UIL policy now allows student athletes to practice in athletics even if suspended because of failing grades. If, after three weeks, a student athlete's grades improve to passing levels, the athlete may be eligible to participate in games.

Business Manager Nathan Ehlert reported that as of Dec. 31, the 2000 tax collection totaled \$677,406, which is 58.38 per cent complete. Monthly bills were approved, and principals reported on attendance rates and other activities at their cam-

The board met in closed session for one hour to discuss personnel issues, dealing with the superintendent's contract and salary schedules.

All seven trustees were present for the meeting, which adjourned at 9:15 p.m. The next regular meeting was set for Thursday, Feb. 8.

Gasoline Theft, Vandalism Top Police Reports

Two incidents of motorists driving away without paying for gasoline and three criminal mischief cases were among reports on file this week at Tahoka Police Dept.

At Allsup's store Sunday a man driving a Chevrolet pickup left without paying for \$10 worth of gas, and at Town and Country store last Wednesday the driver of a van reportedly left without paying \$18 for gasoline. He later was stopped by a Lynn County sheriff's deputy and brought back to face charges. The man denied the charge.

Police were advised by a 41-yearold Tahoka woman that a Tahoka man had scratched her car and damaged it with keys last Saturday. Investigation was continuing.

A 79-year-old Tahoka man told police that another Tahoka man had damaged the window screen on his house Saturday in an apparent effort to enter the home. The screen was valued at \$10.

Maria Diaz, 19, of Tahoka advised police that someone had damaged a tire on her 1984 Chevrolet Blazer while she was at work Monday. Damage was estimated at \$75.

Ten persons were jailed during the last week, on these charges: Invalid drivers license, warrant for speeding, DWI, possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia, disregarding warning signs at construction area, no drivers license, unsecured child under 10 in vehicle, warrant on no seat belt, and minor in possession of alcohol.

Why Your Natural Gas Bills Are Higher This Winter

During the last year, I have been traveling throughout the state discussing the challenges facing the Texas natural gas industry. As the demand for natural gas is increasing, we are seeing the tightening of sup-

Experts in the energy field expect the U.S. demand for natural gas to grow during the next decade. By 2010, it is projected to be more than 30 percent over the 1998 level. In addition to the national demand picture, Texas natural gas consumption has been increasing steadily over the last six years. The biggest driver for that growth is gas-fired electric gen-

On most residential and commercial gas bills, gas is a "pass-through" cost. Utilities make no profit on the cost of gas; they simply pass through to the consumer what it costs the utility to purchase the gas in the marketplace. When natural gas costs increase, consumers face higher bills. When natural gas costs decrease, consumers pay less. Utilities make their profit from distributing the natural gas to consumers. In most cases, the rate that a utility charges for distributing natural gas is approved by the city in which it serves, but in some cases the rate is approved by the Railroad Commission of Texas.

The cost of natural gas is market based, subject to the forces of supply and demand, and changes frequently. The major cause of recent high natural gas prices has been uneasiness in the marketplace over natural gas supply. Simply put, the injection rate of gas into storage was too slow to comfort the market for this winter's heating season. Con- do to help revitalize the industry, ensumption of natural gas in the summer is usually relatively low, which allows excess gas to be injected into storage. However, gas that would otherwise have been injected into storage was being used to generate electricity to run air conditioners.

While natural gas imports have been rising significantly in recent years, the United States may be running into some short-term supply natural gas is available to meet elecconstraints. Several years of relatively low prices have slowed down exploration and drilling for new sources of supply. During the first downturn in 1986, the oil and gas industry lost over 500,000 jobs nationwide. In addition to that number, another 50,000 jobs were lost during the most recent downturn of 1998-1999, which lasted over 18 months. The recent higher prices should be causing an increase in drilling oppor-

tunities, and in fact rig counts have increased significantly from a year ago. However, at the Commission we are seeing a decline in drilling permits and completion permits for natural gas wells. This should not be happening. This shows that we have lost talented, qualified people in the industry who have the ability to identify and explore new fields, drill new wells, and increase production. The new wells that will be coming on line may not begin to yield significant increases in actual production until later in the year.

The demand for natural gas most certainly exists, and the resource is in the ground. The problem is how to stimulate production and ensure that the necessary infrastructure to move gas to consumers remains available. In the long run, the market will answer most of these concerns. But regulatory and legislative policies will certainly influence how quickly the market responds. I believe that with the growing demand for gas by electric generation in Texas, the Railroad Commission and the Texas Legislature should be considering policies to increase the production of natural gas.

This legislative session, I will suggest we address this issue of high natural gas prices by looking long range. Political policy is sometimes looked at as a short-term fix when prices are either too high or too low. We should view energy issues from a long-term perspective and seek to help stabilize the industry, which should result in lower prices for consumers and businesses. The legislature will need to look at what we can courage people to invest their money in Texas energy projects and encourage the skilled labor to return.

I have testified to the legislature about policies and incentives for investing capital in the Texas oil and gas industry. This will ultimately lead to competitive electric rates for Texas consumers and businesses and the reassurance that enough supply of tric and human needs. I have confidence that the natural gas exploration and production companies will eventually increase production, however that will take time.

I will continue working with industry on how technologies and opportunities can be applied today to ensure that Texas can meet the challenge of providing the natural gas to fuel electric generation and other growing demands.

b) Cookies, bar cookies or brownies (2 dozen)

c) Quick Breads: 1 large or 2 small loaves, muffins (12)

e) Pies: 9" f) Decorated Cakes

g) Bread Machine Creations: 1 large loaf, rolls (12)

2) All cakes, cookies, brownies, and breads must be on paper plates or cardboard cake boards. All pies must be in plain disposable aluminum pie pans. All items are to be wrapped in plain clear plastic wrap. No decorative baskets, plates, trays, etc. will be accepted. NO PANS




