New Home, O'Donnell Teams In Basketball Playoffs This Week

School varsity basketball teams continue in hoop playoff action this week, with the New Home Lady Leopards claiming the Bi-District Championship trophy Tuesday night. Boys bi-district games are scheduled for next Tuesday, and O'Donnell's Lady Eagles ended their season Tuesday in a bi-district battle with Roby.

The Lady Leopards, under the direction of Coach Joe Helms, defeated Dawson 54-48 at the Texan Dome in Levelland Tuesday night for the Bi-District win. The Ladies advance to the Sectional Semifinals Friday night, when they will take on Whitharral at 8 p.m. in the Canyon High School gym.

Three players scored in double figures to lead the Lady Leopards to victory over Dawson, with Randi Thornhill scoring 15 points, Heather Kieth 11, and Stephanie Kieth tossing in 10. New Home gained an early lead in the first quarter, putting 10 points on the board while allowing only 4 for Dawson, but the battle heated up in the second quarter and the Lady Leopards led by only 2 points at the half, 26-24. The second half of the game was a battle for the boards, as New Home scored 10 and Dawson 9 in the third period, but the Leopards pulled ahead with 18 points O'Donnell girls squad.

New Home and O'Donnell High in the final period while Dawson trailed with 15.

The win gives the Lady Leopards an 18-10 record heading into the Sectional Semifinals.


Playoff action for the New Home boys team begins next Tuesday, Feb. 20 as the Leopards take on Loop for Bi-District honors. The game is scheduled at South Plains College in Levelland, with game time not known as of press time. Head coach for the team is Shawn Harrison.

O'Donnell's varsity boys team heads for the bi-district playoffs Tuesday also, facing Bronte at 7 o'clock in the Forsan gym. The Eagles tied for District Championship honors with Crosbyton, finishing 5-1 in district and an impressive 24-2 season record. Coach Mike Read leads the Eagle squad.

A practice game is scheduled this Friday at 7 p.m. in Levelland, where the Eagles will play Ropes to prepare for playoff action.

The Lady Eagles ended a good season Tuesday night in a bi-district battle with Roby, just nine points short of victory, 63-54.

They had a perfect 6-0 district record for the District Championship title, and were 22-8 for the season. Coach Billy Wilson directs the

And there was this older couple sitting around one evening, and he said, "You know, Elsie, we've had a good life together for all these years." And she replied, "We sure have, all right."


"Yes," he said, "It has been really good. But I've been thinking lately that one of these days, one of us will be gone, and what will the

TISD Principals, A.D. Contracts Renewed; **Board Hears Parent Complaints At Meeting**

School trustees did not disclose any information about parent complaints heard behind closed doors at last week's monthly school board meeting, but the seven board members, Superintendent Jimmy Parker, school attorneys Cal Huffaker and Philip Mack Furlow, and High School Principal Jerry Lee met for just over an hour and a half with Gloria Moore, Wanda Williams, Helen Payne and Debbie Harris to discuss the apparently controversial issue while a crowd of 30+ waited to hear the outcome.

Board President Greg Henley issued a brief statement when the board reconvened in open session, stating merely that the board would take no action on the issue and that trustees supported the school's administrative action.

"The board believes the administrator acted accordingly with school policy," Henley said. "That being said, we also encourage administrators to continue to enter into dialogue with concerned individuals to address

any remaining concerns," he added. When the board moved on to the next item of business, about half of the crowd left the meeting, many of whom gathered outside the meeting room to voice their complaints to a Lubbock News Channel 28 videographer who had been assigned to attend the meeting. Lubbock news stations later aired opinions from Ollie Jo Lawson claiming racial discrimination issues with the school district and complaining that she had been barred from attending any school functions on the high school campus. Ms. Lawson, however, was not one of the parents who met with trustees in the closed session.

School administrative officials

discuss details regarding specific students and disciplinary action and have therefore made no comment to public news media. Additionally, when a grievance is brought against a school employee, the employee has the right to hear the complaints in closed session, unless the employee specifically requests the grievance be heard in open session. Specifics of conversations held in closed session cannot be disclosed to the public, except as directed by a court order.

Trustees took action on several other agenda items during the meeting, including contracts for principals and the athletic director (after another three-hour closed session), calling for an election for three seats on the board, soliciting bids for an elementary campus renovation project and for a new school bus, and increasing the salary scale for at-will employ-

All administrative contracts were extended with salary increases, including Elementary Principal James Baker at a salary of \$57,000, Middle School Principal Glo Hays at a salary of \$49,000, High School Principal Jerry Lee at a salary of \$59,500, and Athletic Director Bryan Gerlich at a salary of \$51,500. All received \$1500 increases in their respective salaries. Elementary Assistant Principal Lisa Ramirez, whose one-year contract was extended to a two-year period like other administrative contracts, received a \$7500 salary increase to bring that position up to scale with other assistant position salaries in the state. Her salary will be \$45,000.

Three seats on the board of trustees will be up for election, with trustees calling the election for May 5 and naming Jackie Stephens as election and board members, by law, cannot judge, Donna Brooks as alternate

judge, and Susan Tipton as early voting judge. Precincts 1, 2 and 5 singlemember districts will be up for grabs, currently held by Leighton Knox Jr., Joe Calvillo and Carmen Chapa, respectively. Filing period for candidates is Feb. 19 through March 21, at the school business office located in the Harvick Educational Building.

John Baker, representing MBA Architects, Inc., made a presentation to the board regarding the proposed elementary campus renovation project and trustees voted unanimously to solicit bids for the project. The proposed renovations include removing the old boiler heating system and installing a new heating/air conditioning system for the elementary campus, electrical wiring renovations, new ceilings and light fixtures, and carpeting/flooring, as well as a new roof on the elementary gym. Total estimate, including several options which trustees will consider, is \$649,445 for the project.

Trustees authorized Supt. Parker to solicit bids for the purchase of a new 77-passenger school bus, and instructed him to sell the 1996 46passenger bus for a minimum price of \$20,000.

The salary scale for hourly employees in custodial, grounds maintenance and cafeteria positions was increased by \$1 per hour, approved unanimously by the board and effective immediately.

The next regular board meeting was set for Thursday, March 8 at 7 p.m. in the Harvick Building.

All seven trustees were present for the meeting which adjourned at 1:32 a.m., as well as Supt. Parker and other administrative and district staff, the district's attorneys, and about 30 guests for the first portion of the meeting.

FNB, WSB Submit **Bids For County**. **Depository Rights**

Representatives from First National Bank of Tahoka and Wilson State Bank met with Lynn County Commissioners Monday morning to present county depository bids for handling the county's financial business, but after hearing remarks and receiving informational packets commissioners tabled any action on selecting a county depository until the next regularly scheduled meeting, on Feb. 26. John Krey represented First National Bank, and Dan Cook and Kelly Livingston were present on behalf of Wilson State Bank. Currently, the county depository is with First National Bank of Tahoka. The bidding process occurs every two

In other business, monthly bills were approved as presented, and commissioners approved a request by County Clerk Susan Tipton to allow the Lynn County Abstract and Title to provide a copier in the county clerk's office, which would be maintained by the Abstract office for the use of office space. Mrs. Tipton also informed commissioners that the county clerk's office is contracting with Tahoka ISD and Lynn County Hospital District to conduct early woting for those entities for their upcoming May elections.

Lena Cloe, representing the county's Crime Victims Assistance office, met with the court to give an update on her department's activities since forming the new office six months ago, noting that the office had offered assistance to 89 victims during that time period. She explained that the goal of the office is to provide victims of crime in Lynn County with services as well as assistance and compensation through the Crime Victims Compensation Act. She provided informational packets to commissioners, and said that Lynn County had received approval for the continuation of a grant for the 2001-2001 year beginning in June 2001.

Commissioners J.T. Miller, Don Blair, Mike Braddock and Don Morton were all present for the meeting, as well as County Judge J.F. Brandon and others.



Dan "Hoss" Blocker Is **Becoming Legend Here**

(By The Printer)

Dan Blocker came home to O'Donnell the last day of the rodeo, that night stood in the middle of the arena choking back tears, and told the overflow crowd his affection for his home town and friends.

Obviously Saturday, July 10, was a big day for Bobby Dan, the "Hoss" Cartwright of "Bonanza", the most highly rated actor in the cast of the most highly rated TV program on the air today.

Still humble, unspoiled by notoriety, the big old overgrown Lynn county boy spilled out praise for those at home who had inspired him. The crowd loved it, and their presence was a tribute to old Bobby Dan

Earlier, he had ridden through the streets of his home town in the parade and before and after the show he met old friends at the home of his cousin, J.D. Stewart, who operates Blocker Grocery in partnership with Mrs. Shack (Mary) Blocker, Dan's mother, who now lives in DeKalb, Bowie county, from whence the Blockers came to Lynn county.

At the Stewart home, he reminisced with "Fuzzy" Moore, Hal Singleton III, Roy Gibson from Denver City, John Saleh, and others, and all the employees from the store including several Latin American

Around O'Donnell and over this entire area, in fact, Dan Blocker (Hoss Cartwright) is becoming quite a legendary character.

Born in Bowie county December 10, 1929, the nearly 300-pound six-foot-four TV star is reputed to have weighed 14 pounds at birth, the largest baby ever born in the county, weighed 105 pounds when he entered school and 200 pounds at age 12.

Moving to O'Donnell, where his late father established Blocker Grocery, Dan attended school, played football on occasion a year or two in high school. He next attended Texas Military Institute at San Antonio, then Hardin-Simmons one semester.

At Sul Ross State, he played football, majored in drama and English, received B.A. and M.A. degrees. Incidentally, he is now working toward his Ph.D. at UCLA. He served in the Korean war with the 45th Division, married an Oklahoma girl in 1952, taught a year at Sonora and one at Carlsbad, N.M.

He had played summer stock, went to California and made more playing a part in one "Gunsmoke" episode than he had in a month of teaching, and finally landed in "Bonanza." He and wife have four children, live in Northridge, Calif.

As a young kid, the "Big'n" was known for extraordinary strength. At 10 he worked with grown men on a grain truck.

Although good natured and liked by most, his boyhood pastime was fighting. Dan took on all comers, some 18 to 20 years old, when he was 12. Once, they roped off the street in O'Donnell Saturday night and "Big'n" was pitted against the town toughs. Finally, fighting fizzled out for lack of competition.

One day in the store, though, Robert Harvick and Dan had a disagreement. Robert swung at Dan, the latter dodged and knocked a pile of canned goods all over the place.

Elvin Ray Moore says Dan used to sprawl out on the sidewalk in front of Ben Moore's insurance office and he and other kids would broad-jump, landing in Dan's stomach to toughen him up.

"Fuzzy" says he's seen Dan at about 10 carry a 100-pound sack of flour under each arm from the store out to a customer's truck.

We're told Ervin Sumrow once hired Dan to pull bolls, but Dan came near breaking him the first day. "Big'n" pulled only 50 pounds of cotton but ate \$2.00 worth of grub.

"My dad used to say," Dan chuckles, "that I was the onliest man in Texas that wears a No. 14-plus shoe and a size 3 hat. He also said that I was too big to ride and too little to hitch to a wagon — no good for a damned thing."

We know Dan was exaggerating on this, though, because no one has ever been found with a head big enough to wear Dan's hat. Belving appearances, that big head is pretty full of brains. We're personally certain that Shack took great pride in his one and only son. Mr. Blocker lived to see his "pride and joy" reach stardom, and he and Mrs. Blocker

were living near Dan in California when Shack passed away in 1962. Dan's first acting was at Sul Ross, where he was dubbed for a part in "Arsenic and Old Lace" because "someone was needed strong

enough to carry the bodies off the stage.' He turned down a pro-football contract for summer stock in

He does not especially like to ride, is too heavy for a quarter horse, and rides a Morgan on Bonanza. He says, "It's the only horse on TV with fallen arches.'

Dan Blocker does not have to act his part on Bonanza—he just acts naturally.

Levin Davis, Odessa public relations man and brother of Deen Davis of O'Donnell's First National Bank, was responsible for getting Blocker from the airport in that city to O'Donnell for the show. Deputy U.S. Marshal Jack Graves of El Paso and Jim Blair, an old Korean war buddy, accompanied him.

The whole show at O'Donnell was something of a tribute to John Ellis, too. He's been head of the Roping Club and Rodeo Association for 26 years, and this one pleased him the most because happy, jovial - July 23, 1965 Dan Blocker came home to help put it over.

Police Experience Leads Tahoka Ex-To Bosnia, International Police Force

more ways than the thousands of a second application when the remiles of Atlantic Ocean separating North America from the ex-communist Republic of Bosnia in Europe. But for the past six months – and the next six as well - former Tahokan Scott Isbell calls Bosnia home.

A far cry from his home in Brownfield, where his wife Sarita and children reside, Isbell now shares quarters in a three-story house in Doboj (pronounced Dough-boy) with two other Americans and a man from Holland. All are part of the United Nations International Police Task Force (IPTF) stationed throughout Bosnia.

He recently came home for two weeks for a surprise visit with his family, including his parents, Jerry and Janie

Isbell of Tahoka he and brought his friend and Bosnian interpreter, Darko Petrovic, with him to

the flat plains of Texas. They visited with the Isbell clan, and Scott introduced Darko to the All-American sport of watching the Super Bowl game on television. Last Tuesday, Darko and Scott were to have boarded a plane for the 10-hour trip across the ocean to return to their duties in Bosnia.

It is not a military service, although Isbell did a tour of duty with the Air Force from August 1988 to December 1991, following his graduation from Tahoka High School in 1986. The job in Bosnia is a result of Isbell's experience with various law enforcement forces in Lynn and Terry counties, and an opportunity to see a little more of the world, learn new cultures, gain new experiences, and, he admits, to earn a hefty salary.

Isbell did stints with Sheriff's departments in Lynn and Terry County, as well as nearly seven years with city police departments in Friona and Brownfield, of which the most recent was a five-year stint with the Brownfield PD. He applied for the position in Bosnia with a company called Dyncorp, which contracts with the state department to hire applicants for the IPTF. When he first applied, he fell just short of meeting the requirements of at least eight years experience in full-time law enforcement, because reserve time and mili-

Following a physical and psychological evaluation in Dallas, Isbell accompanied 20 other Americans on the overseas mission, flying from Dallas to Frankfort and Munich before arriving in Sarajevo. Upon arrival at the IPTF station in Sarajevo, Isbell says the first thing all applicants must do is to pass a written and verbal English test, no matter what nationality, because all of the Bosnian interpreters translate to English. Following a week of orientation training, during which members were briefed on security measures in Bosnia, they were dispatched to dif-

ferent training units. Isbell Bosnian friend. "In the beginning, it was w a s hard for him to understand Texan, but I'm s e n t first to truthfully, I could not do my job without the city Madritia, popula-

tion about 30,000, and now serves in Doboj, a city of approximately 100,000 people located two-and-ahalf hours north of Sarajevo. As part of the United Nations ef-

fort, the IPTF members include not only Americans (approximately 200 members in the American contingent) but police officers from a wide range of other nationalities. Isbell's six-member training unit in Doboj includes a man from Denmark, who is the head of the unit, two Americans, and men from Spain, Austria Isbell, have families back home, and now regard their team members as a sort of family unit. "This is your family for the next year," Isbell says of the IPTF units.

"We do as much as possible together. Of course, there are personality clashes but for the most part we get along. We're all in the same boat, missing our families, so we are family to each other - we spend a lot of time together," he explained.

A other man with whom Isbell spen is a great deal of time is their Bosnian interpreter, and Isbell discovered he and the young Bosnian, Darko, hit it off immediately. They have since become good friends, and in fact Isbell considers Darko's family his "family away from home." visiting Darko and his sister and parents at their home in nearby Madritia.

"They are like my second family -I go there and eat supper and visit," Isbell says with a smile, adding, "And his mother speaks English, so that gives Darko a break from having to translate everything that's said. And you know, all mothers are the same they just worry about their kids."

Darko said he learned the English language mostly by himself by watching American movies with subtitles, after having two years of English in school. "I watched and learned English from the movies, teaching myself," he said with a smile, although his mother, a teacher, also speaks English. His father is a mechanical engineer.

The family was displaced during the war, moving away from their home to a safer area. Darko had little to say about the war, saying only, "It wasn't nice. I had to move from the town where I was born to another

town where there was no war. We couldn't come back to our home after ... we had to move to another home," he said.

Isbell explained, saying that certain areas were given over during the war, and that if Darko and his family had returned to their home immediately after the war, they would prob-

ably have been killed. Darko said that all young men must serve nine months in the Bosnian military when they reach the age of 18, and that his service came after the war. He has served as an interpreter both for the military and, for the last year, for the United Nations. In his early twenties, the young man has an engaging smile and seems to easily understand the English language - even the Texas ver-

We're trying to get the police to take the first step in relating to the community - giving programs to schools, talking to business owners about security, trying to bridge the gap between the people and the police. The police have been seen as the enemy - that's something they want

to change," Isbell explained. The joint venture came about as a result of the peace treaty signed in Dayton, Ohio after the war in Bosnia, he explained. "A part of the treaty was that the United Nations would help train the Bosnian police," Isbell

Crime, he says, is different there than the United States. There are no problems with gangs, drive-by shootings, and very few burglaries. He says there are many traffic-related incidents, and problems with thefts, relating many times to people who fled from their homes and returned to find someone else living there, damaging or taking their belongings before the former owners could re-

"The kids don't wear the baggy jeans or flash the gang signs like they do here - unless they see it in an American movie and you see one kid trying to do it, and they just get laughed at," Isbell said.

There have been a few burglaries in recent months, Isbell said, which are practically unheard of. But, money for the locals is becoming a problem, with teachers and doctors on strike, and the local police force has not been paid for five or six months.

"Truthfully, if I hadn't been paid for six months, I probably wouldn't show up to work, but these guys show up every day. They really are good people - they just don't have the programs in place like we do here," he explained.

Isbell has served six months of this 12-month contract with the IPTF, and returned to Bosnia this week for the remaining six months. He says he may consider extending his contract for another six months, although he has not yet decided.

"The hardest part is that I miss my family - when I left, my baby girl wasn't even talking, and now when I come back she's a motor-mouth. My oldest daughter wants me home for her senior year in high school, and I don't want to miss that," Isbell said.

He says he talks to his family twice a week by phone, calling Sundays and Wednesdays, but he misses seeing his wife, Sarita, and daughters Micha, 15, Kaytlin, 6, and Mackenzi, 2.

"I'll come back in May, or they will fly down to see me," Isbell said, adding that his oldest daughter, Micha, may stay with him for the summer and they could visit the coast, and see places such as Austria and Germany.

"Oh, by the way, there's no air conditioning in any of the homes there," he said with a grin to his daughter, explaining that summer temperatures in Bosnia get close to the 100-degree mark, much as temperatures here. That got her attention, but the trip still remains an option.

In the meantime, Isbell's family was getting in as much visiting as possible during his two-week surprise trip home, with many of the extended family getting together to visit before Isbell returned to a place which, to them now, is much more than a place seen on world maps in a country across the ocean (5,764 miles from home, as the crow flies). For now, Bosnia is a much more important place - it's home for their loved

Wilson ISD Drops HS Principal Position, Appoints Twilla Rex As K-12 Principal

Wilson Independent School District combined the jobs of Elementary and High School Principals in board action last week, naming Elementary Principal Twilla Rex as Wilson I.S.D. Principal to oversee grades pre-K through 12, and extending her contract to two years. The action came following the resignation of High School Principal William Jolley in recent weeks, with the board of trustees acting on the recommendation of Superintendent Mike Jones.

In addition, the board approved Supt. Jones' recommendation to invoke the Reduction in Force policy, resulting in the elimination of the school nurse position and one high school English position for the next school year.

Lower student enrollment, financial decline due to the lower enrollment and devaluation in property values, and property taxes already set at the maximum levels all played a part in the board's decisions, Supt. Jones told The News.

"In 1997, Wilson ISD had 56 more up to \$50,000 in funding. students than now, and we actually have one more person on staff than "we did then," Jones said. "We dropped \$22 million in property values, and we can't generate any more money – we're already maxed out at \$1.50 tax rate and there is just nowhere else to go."

The superintendent said he and the

at the school, but were trying to make the fewest amount of changes to keep the district in good fiscal condition.

"This is not an indication that these folks weren't doing a good job, and that's what makes it all the more difficult," Jones said in regards to eliminating staff positions. "We are dealing with people's lives and livelihood, and nobody likes to make these kinds of decisions. But, we are fiscally responsible to the taxpayers, and something has to give somewhere," he added.

In other action in the board meetings held Feb. 8 (regular meeting) and Feb. 12 (a special meeting at which the staff positions of school nurse and high school English teacher were designated for the reduction in force), trustees authorized the superintendent to select the lowest bid estimates for repairs to the principal's house, and authorized submission of a TIF grant application for telecommunications funding, noting that Wilson ISD is eligible for

Trustees discussed the Alternative Education Placement policy, and studied reports concerning the district's financial status. Supt. Jones reported on the development of a Four Year Graduation Plan, which was aligned with the more rigorous Recommended Degree Plan from the state, for high school students. 

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by a severe ice storm that occurred Dec. 12-Jan. 15 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Tahoka, FSA Ag Credit Manager Curtis Barlow said recently.

Lynn County is one of 28 counties recently named by former President Bill Clinton as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the ice storm. Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 per-

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Barlow said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will

There are many reasons why refund checks might not reach taxpayers. Most frequently, people move and the tax refunds come back to the IRS. For example, college students might file a return while at school and move before the refund arrives.

Other undelivered refunds can occur because taxpayers provide an incorrect address when they mail their return. Taxpayers should take extra care when providing a return address. Often, numbers are transposed or information is incomplete,

A death or marriage may also re--sult in a returned check. Estate executors should explore whether a refund check might be involved. Newly married taxpayers are urged to notify the IRS promptly if there is a change of name or address.

What if you don't realize you have a refund? The IRS will keep the information on file and forward the full amount to the taxpayer as soon as a valid address is known. For many taxpayers owed refunds, the money will be forwarded automatically the next time a tax return is filed. There is no statute of limitations for claiming these refunds.

There is an easy way to ensure your refund won't be lost. Choosing to have a tax refund deposited directly to a bank account is the best way to guard against loss or theft. Nearly 30 million taxpayers elected to use the direct deposit option during the 2000 filing season, up from 23.5 million the year before.

Filing a change of address card with the post office is not enough to guarantee delivery of a refund check. Taxpayers who have moved since filing their last tax return are urged to file a Form 8822, "Change of Address," with the IRS. The form can be obtained by calling 1-800-829-3676 or by downloading it from the IRS web site at www.irs.gov.



FROM THE MUSEUM FILES

(Editors Note: Stories of pioneers of Lynn County are available for perusal at the Tahoka Pioneer Museum. The following series is taken from museum files, reprinted with permission. The article is titled simply, "Aunt Gabby" with a handwritten note, "Aunt Tabby Doe — Draw Community" at the beginning. It is believed to have been written in 1968.)

Second part of "Aunt Gabby" series: In the early days there were no graded roads, only trails through the prairie. Later the roads were graded and ran on the section lines — 90° turns in all the roads.

I remember the old morman car the D.W. Gaignats drove and the high seated Ford roadster of Karl Griffing's — you could buy a new Ford for \$500 to \$700. That of course was with no taxes. Today the hidden and ovate taxes are that much. People are living longer now — they have to, to pay their taxes.

Our government is the most effective collector known. You have to hand it to them or they'll come and get it.

Tahoka was a small town then you know a small town is one where you never know what you've been around to you, where a baby is never born unexpectedly.

Long years ago Mrs. Crie used to leave her horse in the south east part of town. One day the Tahoka pranksters slipped down and sheared the horse's tail. It's an odd looking horse with a sheared tail. A prominent Tahoka doctor was in on that prank. Mrs. Crie never could quite get used to cars — she accepted them with reservation. When she'd stop and have to crank her car, she'd call Beecher Sherrod and say, "Beech, kick her on the shin for me."

There is this story about Paul Howell. He was working in the back of a storage room and had started to the front of Belton Howell's service

up to until the gossip gets back to run up his pants leg and he turned a flip in the air and when he hit the floor he was out of those pants right there. He beat the rat with his trousers, then looked up and two ladies were just dying laughing at the free

> In 1917 most everyone in Tahoka had the Mexican itch. They didn't want each other to know they had it so they would go to Slaton to get their "Hunt's Itch Cure." Dr. McCoy mixed up a batch of his own formula in a wash pot. Many Tahoka people would come at night with cups and buckets to get this medicine, and it cured them.

Soon after this the flu epidemic hit Tahoka. Homan Edwards was in school one day and the teacher asked station when two big wharf rats ran who had contagious diseases at their out in front of him. One rat managed house. Homan held up his hand and

Once Jake got a prescription for whiskey with directions to take one spoonful as needed. He got a big soup ladle and sat on the front steps on the bank. He would take a ladle full and look at his watch and say, "Take as needed," and took one after another until it was all gone.

Thirty-eight years ago in 1928, Maurice Small and Velta English eloped and were married in Lamesa. After getting married, they came back to Tahoka and the groom took his bride to her parents house and then went home to the Small's house for the night. Maurice has never told anyone what his trouble was.
