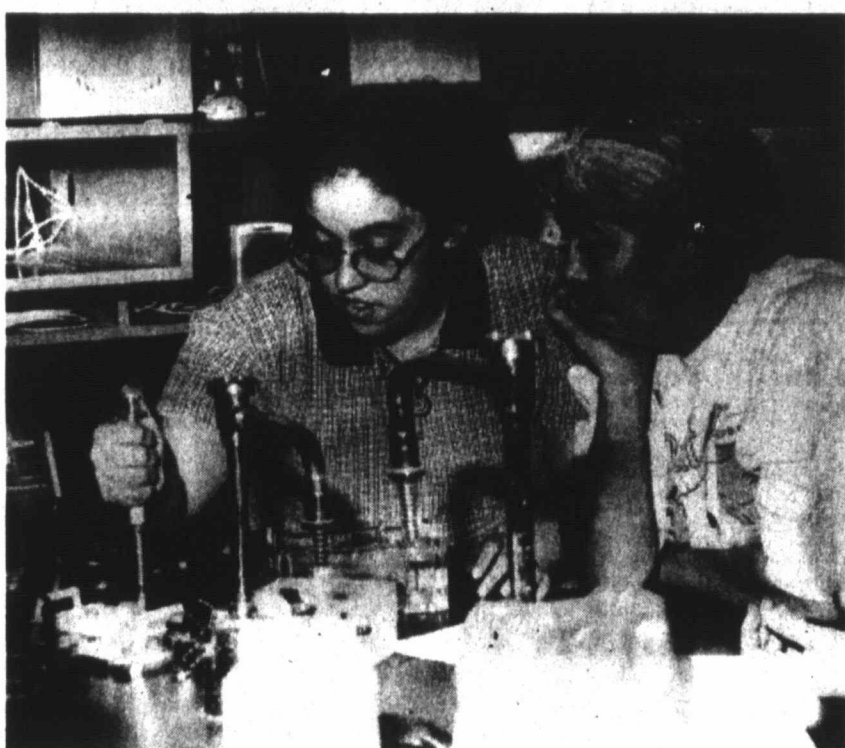
Filing Period Ends Wednesday For Area Elections

Any candidate interested in filing for area city and school elections has until Wednesday, March 21 to file for the May 5 election. Several candidates, mostly incumbents, have filed for places on ballots during the past two weeks, and a complete list of those candidates will be printed in next week's Lynn County News.

School board positions are three-year terms for the four school districts in the county, and city terms are for two years. Information on filing is available at the respective city and school offices.

The Lynn County Hospital District election, which also takes place on May 5, has a different filing deadline for candidates. The filing period continues through April 3 for that election, with two seats on the board up for election.

Any county resident who is not registered to vote may register by April 5 to be eligible to vote in the May 5 election. Voter registration cards are available at the Voter Registrar's Office at the Lynn County Courthouse, or may be available at city and school offices.

Man Found Dead With Gunshot Wound To Head

Lynn County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Rangers are investigating an apparent homicide in the county after the body of Gary Boyd McElroy, 46, was found at his residence Monday afternoon, with a gunshot wound to the head. Report-

edly, the man had been dead for more than a day before his body was discovered.

Law enforcement officials were called at 1 p.m. Monday, when a friend discovered McElroy's body at his home 6 miles south and 2-1/2 miles east of Tahoka on FM 3332. Sheriff Jake Diggs told *The News*. McElroy had been shot with a small caliber weapon, and was found seated at his kitchen table. The time of death has been narrowed to sometime between 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. Saturday, March 10, according to a Lubbock pathologist's report.

Reportedly, no weapon was found at the scene, and law enforcement officials are treating the case as a homicide. Sheriff Diggs said several people have been interviewed in regards to the case, and the investigation is continuing.

Funeral services for McElroy are pending with White Funeral Home of Tahoka.

Tahoka Police Department investigated several calls during the week, including a two-vehicle collision in the 2200 block of North 4th Friday morning. A 1995 Ford Contour

driven by Brian Christopher Valdez, 17, collided with a 1993 Chevrolet Silverado driven by D'Lynn Amanda Stone, 17. No injuries were reported.

Ricarda Salinas reported to police that someone had damaged her 1984 Pontiac Parisienne, causing \$300 worth of damage sometime Tuesday. The car was struck with some type of unknown instrument, making a hole approximately 6 to 8 inches long and 5 inches wide.

Another woman reported a case of beer stolen Monday from her residence on Ave. E, and a report of a nine-year-old girl bitten on the leg by a Chihuahua was investigated. A 16-year-old male was reported as a runaway and turned over to juvenile authorities, and two persons were arrested on drug paraphernalia charges after police answered a call for possible intoxication of persons who had stopped by the cemetery overpass changing a tire on a vehicle.

In jail during the week were eight persons on the following charges: two for DWI first offense, one for driving with license suspended, three for public intoxication, and two for possession of drug paraphernalia.

Parking Lot Paved For School

Tahoka High School students will be surprised when they return from Spring Break next week to discover the school parking lot just north of the gym on N. 4th Street has been paved this week.

Lynn County Commissioner J.T. Miller had a crew paving the lot early this week, with materials donated by the Texas Department of Transportation. Miller said county employees used county equipment to spread the asphalt on the lot, and that TxDOT employees were to come in with heavier rollers to pack the material.

Tahoka I.S.D. Superintendent Jimmy Parker said the school very much appreciated the cooperative efforts of the county and state, at no cost to the school, and that the project would be something which students would appreciate.

"This is something that needed to be done for the kids, and we were glad to do it," said Miller.

Plans Continue For New Jail Facilities

Lynn County Commissioners continued with plans for a new county jail/law enforcement facilities at regular meetings Monday and Tuesday, meeting with Jeff Heffelfinger of SouthWest Architecture and Danny Butler of Dinosaur Valley Construction, Inc. to discuss plans for the renovation project. The facility will be built at the site of the former S&K Implement building on Hwy. 380 East in Tahoka, from plans to renovate the existing building there.

Heffelfinger told commissioners he was meeting with various public utility entities regarding utility hook-ups for the site, and discussed some proposed changes to the construction plan which would be noted in the final blueprints at a later date.

Butler presented a contract for his company, Dinosaur Valley Construction, Inc., to serve as Construction Manager for the project. A motion to accept the contract was approved unanimously by commissioners.

Commissioners also voted to name the new facility the Lynn County Law Enforcement Center, with a motion put forth by Commissioner Mike Braddock and approved unanimously by the court.

In other routine business, commissioners approved monthly bills.

Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon presided over both meetings, with all commissioners present including Braddock, Don Blair, Don Morton and J.T. Miller.

Seven Teachers Resign From Tahoka Schools

Seven teaching professionals won't be returning to Tahoka Independent School District next year, trustees were informed at last Thursday night's meeting of the Board of Trustees when teacher contracts were being considered.

Submitting resignations effective at the end of this school year were Margaret Carter, elementary librarian who is retiring from the school system; long-time science/physics teacher Betty Stennett, who is reportedly taking a position outside the school system; head girls basketball coach/teacher Scott Lucas, who has been at Tahoka the past two years; teacher/coach Ron Meador, a one-year employee here; special educa-

tion teachers Chris Barrera and Venita Dyas; and assistant band director Arthur Plotts Jr. Additionally, school bus driver Gloria Moore submitted her resignation.

All other teacher contracts were renewed by the board of trustees, and no new positions were considered for hiring.

In other business, the board unanimously approved the elementary school renovation project, awarding a bid of \$593,942 to Pharr & Company for work to be completed this summer, including electrical wiring, new central heating/air for the elementary campus buildings (except the gymnasium and cafeteria), new flooring, and re-roofing of most elementary buildings.

A new 77-passenger school bus was approved for purchase from Blue Star bus lines in the amount of \$59,448, and an additional identical bus was approved at the same price under a lease/purchase option for the district.

The 2001-2002 proposed school calendar was approved for public comment, which is being published in this week's and next week's edition of *The Lynn County News*. Public comment on the calendar should be addressed to Superintendent Jimmy Parker, and the board expects

to adopt the school calendar at their April meeting.

Cheerleader sponsor Alecia Hancock met with the board to present proposed changes to the school district's Cheerleading Constitution, and some changes to the constitution were made with approval of the board. Donna Stone presented an overview of the school's PEP program which provides childcare for children of students attending school, and trustees authorized Supt. Parker and Mrs. Stone to apply for another federal grant to continue offering the program here.

Business Manager Nathan Ehler reported tax collections totaled \$1,022,107 which is 88.42 percent complete, and monthly bills were approved as presented.

The next regular board meeting was set for Monday, April 9.

Six trustees were presented at the 5-1/2 hour meeting which included an hour and a half closed session for personnel discussion. Present were trustees Greg Henley, Math Bartley, Joe Calvillo, Carmen Chapa, Brad Hammonds and Tommy Botkin, with trustee Leighton Knox Jr. absent.

Tahoka Duckwall Store Closes

District Manager, Pat Jellison, said store personnel will be offered positions at other Duckwall locations. Associates will be working in the Tahoka store for the next several weeks packing the merchandise and removing fixtures.

Jellison said, "As a normal course of business, we financially evaluate all of our locations on an annual basis or when the lease options allow us to exit a location. Our study indicated that we would be able to make better use of our assets in another location."

Duckwall's operates 18 stores in the state of Texas and a total of 90 stores in an 11 state area.

Chuck Herfkens, Vice President, said, "I would like to express my gratitude to the many friends we have served in Tahoka, and I wish the very best to the loyal employees who have served our company so well during this period of time."

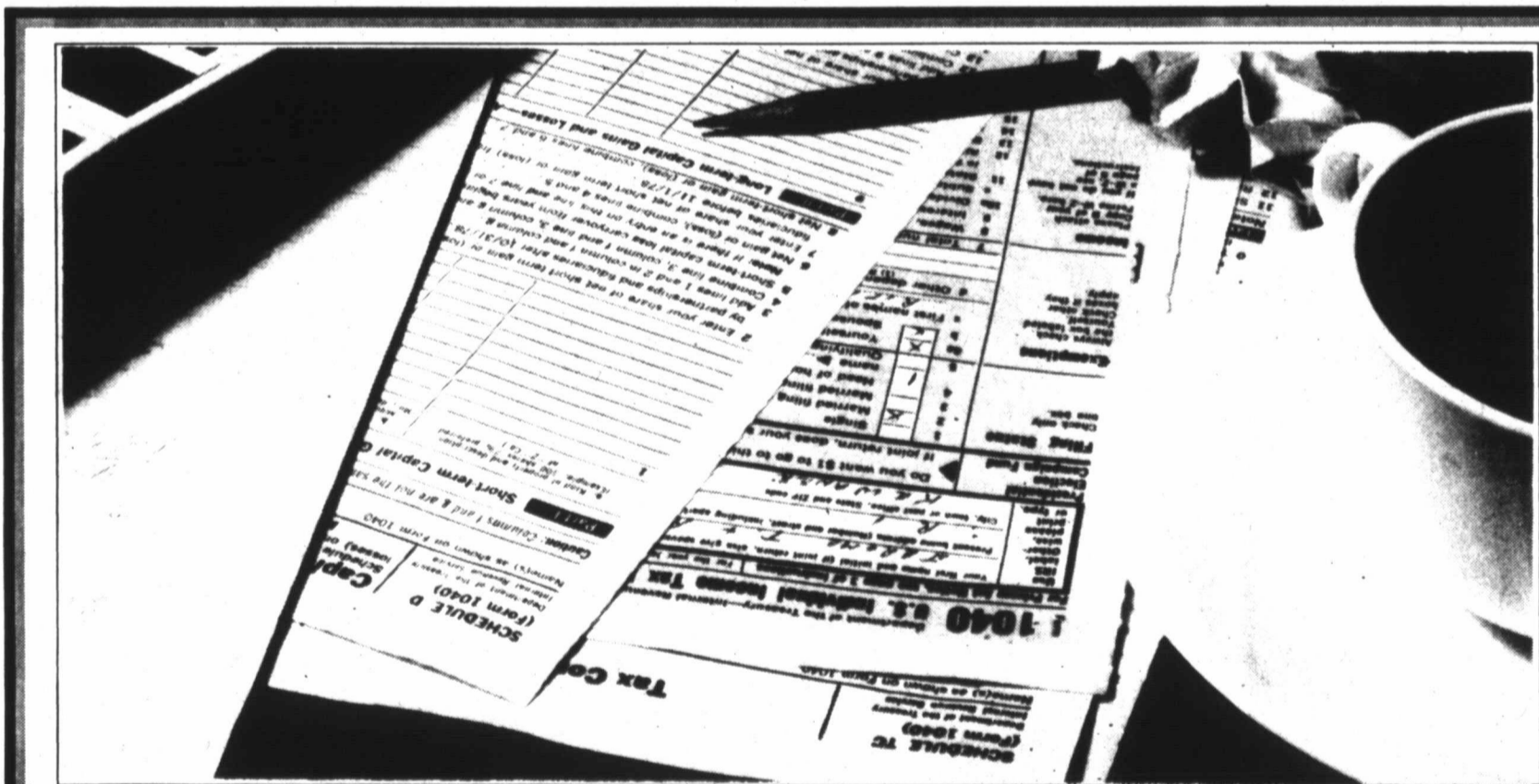

Wilson Volunteer Fire Department Tip of the Week: All families should have a "family plan" for getting out of the house when the smoke detector goes off. (What, no smoke detector? Then get a couple and put them up!). This plan should include the fastest way out of the home for every family member and who has the responsibility to check on family members who will need help to get out. The plan should include designating a place where all family members should gather after they get out, to make sure that everyone is out.

Be sure to call the fire department or 911 as soon as you get out. The plan should be reviewed and practiced so that all family members know what to do so that they can get out. Younger children must be taught that getting out is important and the idea of hiding under the bed or under a blanket in the closet to escape the fire is wrong. One of the most important parts of the plan is for all family members to realize that "once out — stay out." Many fire related fatalities can be traced to a family member going back into the burning house to try to make sure that everyone is out or to go back and get some personal item.

Set up the plan, practice it and then you should be prepared when the smoke detector goes off.

BBB Says... Warm Weather Brings Out Con Artists

Spring is just around the corner and so are con artists who prey on homeowners, especially senior citizens, warns the Better Business Bureau. These con artists show up at the door offering a variety of products and services from household cleaners to magazines, from tree trimming to roof repair. Some may offer to pave the driveway with leftover materials from a previous job, mow the lawn, or remodel a home for a very low price. Oftentimes, these fly-by-night operators may drive vehicles with out-of-state license plates, or set up temporary offices from which they can move quickly once authorities start looking for them.

Before paying money to anyone who uses this type of approach, and especially before allowing an unknown individual into a home, the Better Business Bureau suggests the following:

- Obtain the name and address of the company that the person allegedly represents. If the person does not represent a known business and the circumstances suggest an itinerant contractor or sales representative, ask for references and contact each one.
- Get all details of the offer in writing and carefully review them. Make sure everything in the contract is understood. Any verbal promises should be included in the contract.
- Make sure the salesperson has

Rylander Delivers Sales Tax Rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has delivered a total of \$200.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,105 Texas cities and 119 counties, a 2.3 percent increase over the \$196.1 million allocated to cities and counties in March 2000.

March sales tax rebates represent sale taxes collected in January and reported to the Comptroller in February.

While Tahoka and Wilson showed an increase over last year, O'Donnell took a big dip (71.53%), earning only \$346.33 this year as opposed to \$1,216.76 last year. Wilson showed an increase of 39.84 percent, receiving \$483.07 this year versus \$345.30 last year. Tahoka received \$5213.93 this year; \$4,990.69 last year, for a 4.47 percent increase.

Year to date, Tahoka has received \$19,125.93 in rebates, with O'Donnell receiving \$2,935.42 and Wilson earning \$1,902.02.

The next sales tax allocation is scheduled for Friday, April 13.

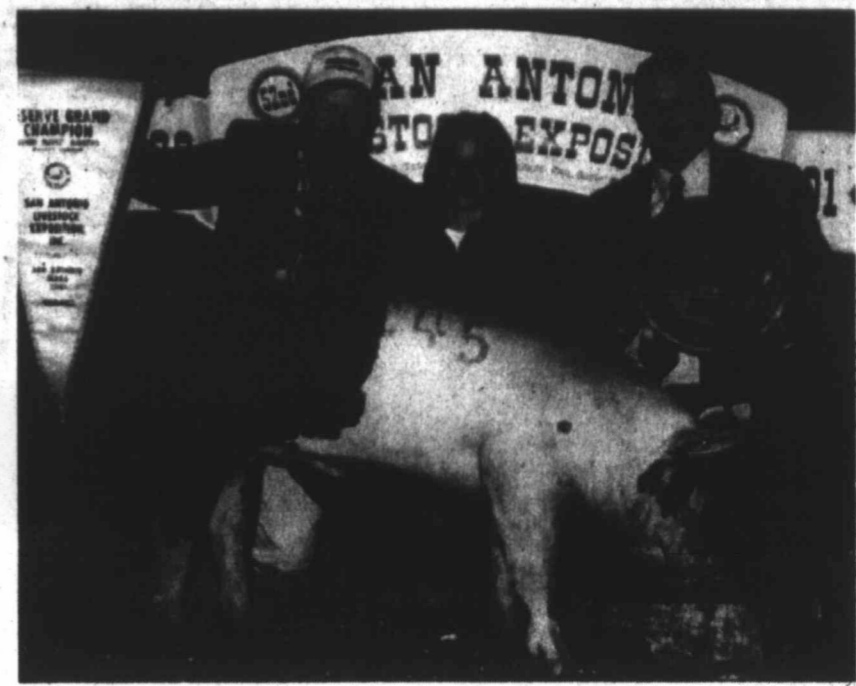
• Verify that the contractor is properly licensed, bonded and insured.

• Determine how long the company has been in business and call the BBB to determine the firm's customer experience record.

• After checking references and making the decision to hire the company, make the check payable to the company and not to the salesperson or another individual's name. Do not pay in cash.

Remember, any legitimate company that wants a customer's business will be more than willing to allow that customer time to "check them out." Don't fall prey to high-pressure tactics such as "this is the only chance you have" or "by tomorrow the extra materials will be gone." If it is an expensive repair, be especially cautious of these offers. Obtain bids from several companies (the BBB suggests at least three). Don't always go for the lowest bid, in many cases the customer gets what they pay for.

I guess J.T. Miller has forgotten that country road No. 18 is still here again, or he has been so busy doing the golf course and country club road and his special friends.

He told me once that they just forgot this road was here. I moved here to take care of my two granddaughters, then ages 3 years to newborn as their mother and Dad both worked at the hospital and I didn't want the kids to be drug in and out so early in the morning and in all kinds of weather to a baby sitter. So I retired from Hendrick Medical in Abilene and moved up here. Several years later J.T. told me I knew this road was like this when I moved up here. My youngest granddaughter said, "and it's his place to make the road better."

When they closed the oil well up on the hill from here, Mr. Bartley hauled all the caliche from the oil well and put on country road 18. Made a nice road, but it was not taken care of properly and pretty soon the ditches were level and some places higher than the road so there was nowhere else for the water to go except down the middle of the road, taking what caliche the grader hadn't pushed into people's fields with it. Now the road is a perfect mess.

I have a little "Black Book" that I keep a record of when the grader is here and what he does. I called J.T. on Nov. 15th, 2000 at 11 a.m. and left a message on his answering machine. The module trucks had made such deep ruts in the sandy road I could hardly get in and out in my car, was afraid it was going to drag the bottom out from under my car. He never returned my call but the grader did come out on Nov. 22nd, 2000 — ran over the road and that is the last time it has been here. It is now March 11th, 2001 and we have had a lot of ice, snow, and rain since Nov. 22nd. Had the ditch been properly pulled, the water would not have washed the road away.
