### **Voters Mark Choices In** School, Hospital Elections

The vote was split for incumbents in Saturday's hospital and school elections in Lynn County, with some reclaiming seats on their respective boards and others unseated by chal-

In the Lynn County Hospital District election, challenger Joan Knox led the ticket with 372 votes to claim one of the two seats up for election on the board of directors, and incumbent Dalton Wood reclaimed his seat with 304 votes. Joe Hays, who was also seeking re-election, received 216

Tahoka Independent School District had three single-member precinct elections, with all three incumbents reclaiming their three-year terms on the board of trustees. In Precinct 1, Leighton Knox Jr. (incumbent) had 23 votes to win his seat over challenger Gloria Moore with 7 votes. Incumbent Joe Calvillo reclaimed the Precinct 2 seat on the board with 64 votes, with challengers Carlos Moralez receiving 6 votes, and Linda Oages-Tillman with 5. Incumbent Carmen Chapa, in Precinct 5, was unopposed and was re-elected with 21 votes.

#### **TISD To Dismiss** Early On Monday

Officials at Tahoka ISD have a nounced that students will be dismissed from school at 12:30 on Monday, May 14. Buses will run at 12:35

Classes will resume on a normal schedule on Tuesday, May 15.

Five candidates vied for three seats on the O'Donnell I.S.D. Board of Trustees, making an interesting race in that election. Dan Mott led the ticket with 243 votes, Kirby Williams had 166, and Willie Villarreal


was the third elected with 160 votes. Incumbent Kenneth Dan Vestal received 137 votes, and Keri Goad had

And in the Wilson I.S.D. election there were four candidates for three seats on the board, with Doug Bolyard claiming 61 votes, Dennis Bednarz 53, and incumbent Lonnie Paul Donald re-elected with 40 votes. Incumbent Michael F. Taylor also ran, receiving 34 votes.

All four city elections in Lynn County, as well as the New Home I.S.D. election, were canceled due to unopposed candidates. Mayor Mike Mensch and council members John Chapa Jr. (Dist. 1) and Amy Preston (Dist. 3) will be declared elected for the City of Tahoka; on the Wilson City Council, Victor Steinhauser, Helen Stephenson and Lupe Guzman will be declared elected for two-year terms, and the council appointed outgoing council member Janie Zavala to fill a one-year unexpired term.

O'Donnell City Council members Rex Little, Larry Pyron and Max Mendieta will be declared elected, and New Home Mayor Don Sharp and council members Leroy Nettles and Kyle Johnston will be declared

On the New Home I.S.D. board, Kelly Kieth, Michael White and Andy Maeker will be declared

## Clayton Chancy Honored With Red Cross Lifesaving Award

Fortunately for Tahoka's Dustin McNeely, Tahoka High School student Clayton Chancy was in the right place at the right time - and had the "right stuff" - to help save the life of the young man who fell from the bed of a pickup in Tahoka during Homecoming activities last year. McNeely is alive and well today, thanks in large part to the quick-thinking actions of Chancy, who last week was honored with a Lifesaving Award from the American Red Cross during an awards ceremony at Tahoka High School.

David Saunders, Director of Youth Services with the American Red Cross, South Plains Regional Chapter, presented the prestigious award to Chancy, noting that the award had not been presented in five years in this region.

The incident happened on a Thursday evening in September, 2000, when Tahoka High School students and ex-students were participating in what is referred to as the "spirit drag," where vehicles follow each other through Tahoka prior to the Homecoming bonfire and pep rally. While enroute to the high school where the bonfire was scheduled, THS ex-student McNeely fell from the bed of a pickup to the street, striking his head on the pavement.

Chancy, who is trained in American Red Cross CPR/First Aid, rushed to give aid to the severely injured McNeely, using a shirt and applying pressure to the laceration on the

victim's head to stop the bleeding. "Clayton had to keep telling him to lay still and not move at all," Saunders reiterated during the awards ceremony. "Clayton reassured him that everything would be all right. As more people started to arrive on the

scene, there were some that wanted to move the victim or roll him over Clayton told everyone to stay back and not move him until the ambulance arrived and EMTs could take over," he explained.

When one student asked Chancy how he knew what to do, he responded by saving, "I learned it in first aid in Ms. Scarbrough's class." Ms. Julie Scarbrough, Tahoka High School teacher, is also a CPR and First Aid Instructor for the South Plains Regional Chapter of the Red Cross.

When the ambulance arrived on the scene, emergency personnel took over the care of McNeely. The ambulance crew members all credited Clayton for his quick thinking and life saving skills, Saunders said. McNeely was transferred by helicopter to a Lubbock hospital, where brain surgery was required immediately due to swelling of the brain from the accident's severity.

"I also spoke with the former student's mother, and she said the surgeon that performed the brain surgery on her son told her that had it been 30 minutes longer, her son may have died," Saunders said. "The surgeon told her that everyone from Clayton Chancy to the ER doctor had done an outstanding job in saving her son's life," he added.

Mrs. McNeely concurred, saying that the surgeon told her that everyone, from Clayton to the EMTs, and Dr. Bruce Fried at Lynn County Hospital who made the decision to transfer Dustin by helicopter, made the right decisions which ultimately resulted in saving her son's life.

"You need to go home and kiss everyone who had a hand in this, because they all saved Dustin's life." Mrs. McNeely said the surgeon told her. "Dustin could easily have died or been severely incapacitated by this accident, and we are just so grateful to everyone - as we look back on it now, it was truly a miracle," she told The News.

McNeely, a 1998 graduate of THS, is the son of Todd and Rhonda McNeely of Tahoka. He has completely recuperated from the accident and surgery, says his mother. Chancy, now a junior at Tahoka High School, is the son of Donna Chancy of Tahoka and Jabo Chancy of Lub-

## **Stephen Fancher Named Head** Girls Basketball Coach Here

Idalou girls basketball coach Stephen Fancher will head the Tahoka I.S.D. girls basketball program next year, and the middle school and high school will gain two new computer labs thanks to a \$100,000 grant awarded to the district. The Tahoka Independent School District board of trustees met in regular session Tuesday night, with these and other issues on the meeting's

Fancher has a long list of achievements in the coaching arena during his 19-year career, including assistant positions with five state championship teams at Levelland ISD. He has been the head girls basketball coach at Idalou for the past eight years, leading his teams into the playoffs for the past seven years, including regional semifinalists for three years. He is a graduate of Midwestern State University, and comes to Tahoka with his wife, Carol, who was also hired as District Librarian for TISD.

Kathy Hildebrant, fifth grade teacher at Tahoka, submitted her resignation effective at the end of the school year.

**District Technology Coordinator** Angie Ehlers presented a report to the board, noting that the district has been approved to receive a \$100,000 TIF grant which will be used to pur-

chase new computers for the district. Two new computer labs for middle school and high school will replace the current labs, Ms. Ehlers said, with the grant funds.

Trustees canvassed the May 5 election, with incumbents Leighton Knox Jr., Joe Calvillo and Carmen Chapa reclaiming their seats on the board. Board officers were elected, with trustees electing the current officers, with Greg Henley as President, Brad Hammonds as Vice President, and Joe Calvillo as Secretary.

A bid was awarded to Vibrowhirl for resurfacing the school track, at a cost of approximately \$50,000, and trustees decided to add another long jump pit at the site.

Board President Henley appointed trustees Calvillo, Mrs. Chapa and Tommy Botkin to an ad-hoc committee, instructing them to research policies for the use of school facilities by the community and other civic groups and private citizens. The committee will then create a local policy to present to the board for consideration at a future meeting.

Trustees voted to extend the district's depository contract with First National Bank of Tahoka for another two years, taking advantage of a new law which allows a one-time contract extension without the bidding process.

## **Bulldogs Begin Playoffs** This Friday in Midland

A FRIEND who gets a new vocabulary word every day by e-mail advised me that on April 27 the word she received was "daltonism," and naturally she thought of me and sent the word and its definition along.

Daltonism is defined as color blindness, "especially the inability to distinguish between red and green." So if you have this problem, you can't tell the difference between Indians and little men from Mars. Or maybe Leprechauns.

The word, said the e-mail, is named after John Dalton (1766-1844), "English chemist and physicist who gave us Dalton's Law of Partial Pressures. He studied his own color blindness

It was also noted that the word daltonism in common usage refers to the difficulty some have in perceiving and appreciating the viewpoints or needs of persons of other nationalities.

I'm curious about this Law of Partial Pressures. Most of the pressures I have had to deal with (financial, social or whatever) are about the same as those faced by other people I know; therefore they appear to be Impartial Pressures.

Anyway, I don't think the term "daltonism" applies to me. I can recognize colors. My dreams are even in color. And besides that, the name "Dalton" is not pronounced the same. The e-mail said "daltonism (DAWL-tuh-niz-em) noun."


My name, as many know, is pronounced Dalton (Dowelton). The first syllable is the same as the first three letters of Dallas. It rhymes with pal, gal and fowl, or, as one person suggested, "foul."

WHEN I WAS a child, I did childish things (I've done a few since then, too), among which was play games such as Drop the Handkerchief, Ring Around the Rosey and Red Rover Cross Over, Imagine my surprise to learn recently that the nursery rhyme "Ring Around the Rosey" is a rhyme about the plague, at least according to an unverified source. I read this:





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#### Spears Tells Of **School Needs**

Supt. Otis Spears of the Tahoka schools was the principal speaker on the Rotary Club program Thursday of last week.

He revealed many facts and figures concerning the operation of the Tahoka school system, and outlined the program of work the school is trying to do.

The Tahoka schools have 53 employees on the payroll, and has a budget of a little over \$200,000 for the year. The district covers 334 square miles, had 1223 scholastics enumerated in the census last year, has a total valuation of a little over \$6,000,000 and a \$1.50 tax rate.

Of the \$200,000 required for operation of the schools, \$90,000 is due to come from local taxes, \$73,000 from the State Permanent School fund and the rest from the Foundation Program of the State. Thus, it is difficult to meet state standards and make both ends meet finan-

The average teacher in the Tahoka schools draws \$191.00 per month take home pay, has taught 11 years, and spent 4-1/2 years in college in preparation for teaching at a cost from \$4,000 to \$6,000.

Many people are prone to judge a school, he said, by what they see — such as the band and athletic teams. Athletics just about pays their way, but the board has had to put about \$3,000 into the band for music and instruments the past year. What the average patron doesn't see is, for example, the work being done in an English classroom. Classroom work is the prime good that comes from school attendance, although the extra-curricular activities are necessary also...

Among other things, he said the school needed a darkroom for visual education....

Vocational agriculture classes need room and equipment for teaching shop work, including repair of farm machinery. More room is needed by the homemaking department, and he hopes some day Tahoka can have a homemaking cottage. More facilities are needed by the commercial department, so that finished secretaries, bookkeepers, and typists can be turned out by the local schools.

Further music training is needed, including a choral club.

Tahoka's school campus is an eyesore. The campus needs beautifying with more trees, shrubs, and grass. He thinks the School and City should be able to work out some deal of mutual benefit to the town on the water proposition. He said the school cannot beautify its campus on the present water rates. Last summer, the school's water bill ran as high as \$138.00 a month.

For protection of the boys against injury, the school needs a better sodded football field and also a practice field, as most schools now

Mr. Spears didn't say so in his talk, but the Tahoka gymnasium is rapidly becoming inadequate for the local system. Scores of students get no opportunity to use the gym for physical education at this time. Also, the local gym floor was built too small and the ceiling too low, and competitive schools who have large modern gyms - and all of them in this area now have them — are beginning to complain about having to play in the small, low-ceiling Tahoka gym....

Maurice Bray spoke briefly in regard to the current Boy Scout financial drive.

Royce Blankenship of Lubbock, one of the owners of the Wallace Theatres, was present and explained that steps were being taken to improve the shows and the service at local theatres. He offered his firm's co-operation in any way it could help in making Tahoka a better



Willis was three years old and Garland was a three month old baby. They settled in Coleman County where they farmed and ranched. In 1922 the family moved to Lynn County and purchased a farm eight miles southeast of Tahoka where they lived until they retired in 1950 and moved into town. Garland and Willis followed in their father's footsteps and became involved in farming and ranching.

Estha Lee Russell and Garland were married in 1925. They had one daughter, Rae Fern who was the mother of Cal Womack. Rae Fern died in 1947 and Estha Lee died in

Garland Pennington, long time 1950. Robbie Milliken and Garland were married in 1951. They were both active in the First Baptist Church. Robbie died in 1996.

In 1931, Garland went o work for West Texas Gin Company as a book keeper and was promoted to manager in 1935. He worked there until Oct. This was the newly organized cooperative that brought electricity to Pennington's family, Harris W. every rural home and business over a seven county area and included a little booming oil town, Sundown in Hockley County. During the developing years of the cooperative, Garland made numerous trips to Washington, D.C. to obtain loans and assistance for the expansion and development of the project. He made many valued and lasting friends, one of whom was the late Congressman, George Mahon.

All these years, he continued to be interested in farming and raising cattle. After his retirement in December 1973 he became partners with his grandson Cal and for many years enjoyed watching the planting and harvesting of the crops and seeing the cattle grow.

He still resides in his home in Tahoka.

### **TDH Gives Tips To Prevent Hantavirus**

Springtime means spring cleaning, as thousands of Texas residents prepare to clean up their homes, garages, barns and toolsheds. But as you begin spring cleaning, you should take precautions to prevent exposure to hantaviruses.

According to Dr. James Alexander, zoonosis veterinarian with the Texas Department of Health (TDH), hantaviruses are the agents of a potentially fatal disease known as hantavirus pulmonary syndrome (HPS). Since 1993, the disease has killed five of the 15 people in Texas who developed HPS.

"People may become exposed to the virus when dust that has been

contaminated by rodent droppings and urine is stirred up during the annual rite of spring-cleaning," said Alexander. "If rodents have been present in an enclosed space that is to be cleaned, wear rubber gloves, eye protection and a good quality mask to prevent inhaling contami-

Prior to initiating the cleaning process, open any windows and doors in the room to allow the air to circulate through the room. Spray the area with a solution of one part bleach in ten parts of water or another disinfectant that will kill viruses. If rodent carcasses or nest materials are fund, spray them down with the disinfectant too. Allow the disinfectant to remain on the surfaces for at least

To keep the amount of dust to a minimum, spray the disinfectant a second time just prior to beginning

In addition, some specific housekeeping measures can help control rodent activity in and outside of the

• Inside — keep the kitchen clean and store food and trash in containers with tight lids. Rodent-proof the house by plugging openings around pipes with steel wool and sealing cracks in the walls and floors.

• Outside — Eliminate possible nesting materials by clearing brush from around the foundation. Elevate hay, woodpiles and garbage cans, and place them away from the house. Pet food bowls should be picked up as soon as the animal finished eating, and pet food should be stored in closed containers.

"The best way to prevent HPS is to avoid contact with rodents and to avoid inhaling dust that might be contaminated with rodent saliva, urine or droppings," Alexander said. "You can greatly reduce your risk of exposure to HPS by taking just a few simple precautions."

However, Alexander advises that if a person develops flu-like symptoms after cleaning a rodent infested area, a physician should be contacted and the possibility of HPS should be

Hantavirus is most commonly carried by rodents like the deer mouse, the hispid cotton rat, the western harvest mouse, the white-footed mouse and the rice rat. The common house mouse is not known to be a

#### **SPS Says...** Play, Work Safely This Spring

When outside at play or when tackling chores around the home and yard this spring, remember basic safety information regarding overhead and underground power lines. Southwestern Public Service Company offers the following tips for electrical safety:

· Be aware of overhead lines while participating in any outdoor activity. Always assume that lines are energized.

 Never play on or near power poles or electric substations. Do not climb trees if the branches touch or reach close to power lines or other electric equipment. Overhead lines are not insulated, but conduct electricity at high voltage, so avoid any contact with them. A tree limb touching a power line will become energized, and touching the limb would be just as dangerous as touching a

Warn children about the dangers of flying kites or model airplanes during storms or near electric power es. If a kite or airplane becomes tangled in a power line, abandon it and call SPS or another power supplier. Don't use wire as kite string or to control a model airplane, and never fly such toys with a wet string. Even a dry string can conduct electricity, so stay well clear of lines.

· Never use an electric lawn mower on wet grass, and postpone using electric tools if working surfaces are wet or if it's raining.

• Be aware of power lines near rivers and lakes when boating or fishing. The masts on sail boats conduct electricity, as do some types of fishing line. Avoid casting near power lines no matter what kind of fishing line you use.

• If a pet climbs a power pole, it's safest for all concerned to let the animal come down on its own.

 Stay away from downed power lines and anything they come in contact with, and always assume that electrical energy is running through downed lines. In case of a downed line, call SPS immediately at 1-800-750-2520 or call 911.

• Don't use a metal ladder or stepladder near powerlines — they will conduct electricity if they come in contact with the lines. Even a wooden or fiberglass ladder could contain conductive material, so always "make sure to look up" before using any kind of ladder to ensure it doesn't come near our touch an electric line.

• When trimming trees, make sure branches and limbs are clear of any power lines. If branches near power lines affect electric service,

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
