I'll bet "gluten" is something which makes you want to eat everything on the table, whether anybody else gets to eat or not. I thought the correct spelling was g-l-u-t-t-o-n.

There was a recipe for chocolate seitan stew. It can't be all bad, because it includes walnuts, onion, chili, tomatoes and other good stuff, in addition to the cocoa and seitan. I doubt that I ever will get a chance to try it.

Part of the story was about spices from Europe and other odd places, like Latin America and Boston. A photograph showed a South African spice box, holding some "tumeric, corlander and " (another substance which I would be ashamed to print in a family newspaper). Anyway, I don't want any of that stuff on my plate. Tumeric sounds like a growth, and a corlander/must be some kind of snake.

I have saved the recipe for chocolate seitan stew, in case somebody wants to get it and make up a batch. But they have to bring me a bowl full, or a chunk of the finished product.

Property purchases and land easements have been completed following months of study and prepa-

ration, and City Administrator Jerry Webster says the actual construction phase should begin in mid-October. The facility will include three large pits and a building to house electrical units, and should be completed

within six months. The new facility will replace the current outdated plant, located in south Tahoka.

In other business, Webster sought permission from council members to conduct a feasibility study regarding cost effectiveness of constructing a municipal landfill, which the council approved. Larry Hagood was reappointed as the city's representative on the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority Board of Directors, and council members scheduled budget workshops. Mayor Mike Mensch, Webster, and council members John Chapa Jr., Clara Calvillo, and Amy Preston. Council members Jay Dee House and Jimmy McMillan were absent.

According to Tahoka High School officials, all forms that students picked up at registration need to be filled out and returned to the high school office no later than 5 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 9.


These forms must be filed in the office prior to the student's beginning classes on Monday, Aug. 13.





City-County Library Board Meeting Held





Dear Editor:

Next week, our Lynn County **Commissioners and County Judge** will be asked to follow Dawson County's lead by unanimously passing a resolution declaring a local agricultural emergency. Basically, this resolution asks the local elected officials who know best how dependent our local schools, hospital district, and county tax bases are on a strong rural economy to request and direct state officials to compile data and hold hearings regarding how those tax bases have been weakened by the failure of federal officials to (1) comply with permanent farm law as it relates to national monetary policy, especially the negotiation of stable currency exchange rates to give equal market access to U.S. producers; and (2) maintain an open competitive market of ag suppliers and commodity buyers through strict enforcement of antitrust law. U.S. Treasury Secretary Paul

O'Niell, a Bush administration appointee, intends to maintain the Clinton administration's "strong dollar" policy that subsidizes the importation of cheap consumer goods from weaker-currency countries and encourages investors from those countries as well as our own to buy U.S. and corporate stocks and bonds. Unfortunately for U.S. farmers and manufacturers like 3M, Xerox, Gillette, and Alcoa, a strengthening dollar has a devastating effect on their domestic markets and exports. In the July 19 Southwest Farm Press (p. 10), Mark Bagby, Director of Communications for the California cotton marketing cooperative Clacot, said that "a 43-cent New York futures contract is equivalent to 86-cents per pound for an Australian producer." This trade-distorting monetary policy "is strangling not only the domestic cotton producer, but domestic mills as well. The strong dollar is killing 3 million bales of domestic consumption and adding to U.S. stocks" of raw cotton, even though annual U.S. cot-

annual production. Thus our misguided federal monetary and trade policies of recent years are making the U.S. cotton farmer the supplier of last resort for our own consumers. Mr. Bagby says that "the American dollar is a very good currency earner for foreign nations. This may be good for the American consumer buying clothes at WalMart, but it is killing American agriculture and the domestic manufactures of cotton."

The Bush administration has signaled that it will be no friend of West Texas cotton farmers by cutting the current ag budget by \$1.6 billion, threatening to veto last week's failed Senate effort to restore \$2 billion, eliminating all disaster funding from the USDA budget, and appointing former Foreign Agriculture Service "free-trade" attorney Ann Veneman as Secretary of Agriculture. Her most notable and distressing action thus far has been to issue an unsolicited opinion that AMTA payments to local farmers like the reduced amount scheduled for September are "tradedistorting" according to World Trade Agreements. It is regrettable that she did not say this about the Treasury Secretary's monetary policy instead, for it is that policy that makes additional AMTA payments and the declaration of local agricultural emergencies necessary.

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
