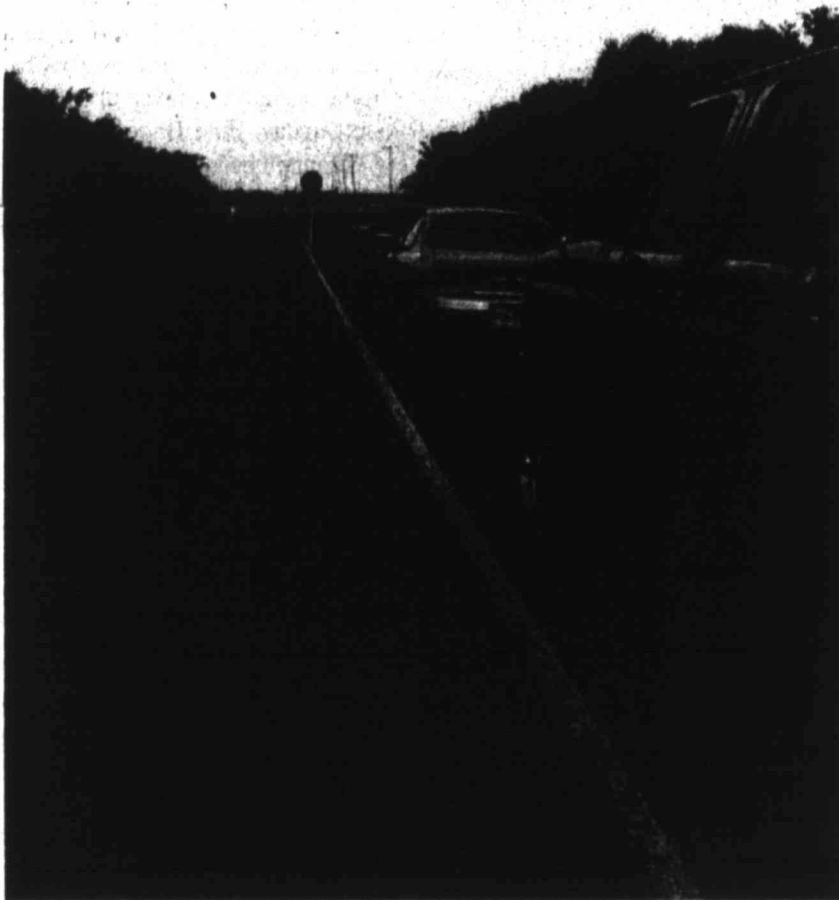
**Lynn County Harvest Festival
 Events Scheduled For Sept. 8**

The 26th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival will be held on the square in Tahoka Saturday, Sept. 8, with entertainment, prize drawings, booths offering food, games and crafts, and more slated for the all-day event.

Booth reservations are currently being accepted, by calling booth chairman Rebecca Ingle at 998-5264 (9 a.m. to 3 p.m.) or 998-4440 (after 3 p.m.) Cost of an 8x10' area will be \$30. This year, food booths are limited to two food items, and any booth requiring electricity hookups must be noted. Extension cords are not provided by the Harvest Festival, and all booth participants must check in with Mrs. Ingle prior to setting up their booths the day of the festival, as booth areas will be assigned.

Chances to win a computer with printer, a Texas Tech football game weekend package, and a \$1000 vacation getaway package will be sold by festival queen and princess contestants this year. Any Lynn County girl wanting to participate may call Princess Chairman Tammi Angeley at 998-4213 or Queen Chairman Leah Taylor at 998-5142. Both contests will be organized soon after school begins.

Because of damage to downtown buildings at last year's festival, spray paint cans will not be allowed, and will be confiscated by law enforcement officers and Harvest Festival Committee members. Parents are urged to remind their children not to bring the spray paint to the festival.

I WAS READING an article which said you can substitute a certain spice for the meat in your chocolate beef stew and it will be better for you.

Chocolate beef stew? The last time I ever heard of any such combination of foods was when I considered mixing ketchup with peanut butter on a sandwich.

Okay, I never tried that either. But apparently some people do eat something called chocolate beef stew, and this story said you can eliminate the beef by substituting something called seitan, described as low in fat and carbohydrates and cholesterol-free.

Well, they lost me again with the word "seitan." Seitan, I thought, was an island in the Pacific where Robert Taylor killed about a million Japanese in a movie. The story described seitan ("also called wheat meat") as a "dense protein formed from the gluten of wheat flour."

I don't know where you get the stuff. But I'd be afraid somebody would hit me if I went into Thriftway and asked for some seitan, or even some gluten, whatever that is. I'll bet "gluten" is something which makes you want to eat everything on the table, whether anybody else gets to eat or not. I thought the correct spelling was g-l-u-t-t-o-n.

There was a recipe for chocolate seitan stew. It can't be all bad, because it includes walnuts, onion, chili, tomatoes and other good stuff, in addition to the cocoa and seitan. I doubt that I ever will get a chance to try it.

Part of the story was about spices from Europe and other odd places, like Latin America and Boston. A photograph showed a South African spice box, holding some "turmeric, coriander and ..." (another substance which I would be ashamed to print in a family newspaper). Anyway, I don't want any of that stuff on my plate. Turmeric sounds like a growth, and a coriander must be some kind of snake.

I have saved the recipe for chocolate seitan stew, in case somebody wants to get it and make up a batch. But they have to bring me a bowl full, or a chunk of the finished product.

A woman reported that her husband had violated a protective order with harassing phone calls.

Bill Chancy reported that someone had broken into a coin-operated air machine at his business last week. About \$30 was believed missing.

In jail during the week were 14 persons, with one jailed on four Lubbock municipal warrants for expired drivers license, failure to appear (2)

and driving on the wrong side of the road. Others were arrested on warrants for speeding, failure to appear, application to revoke probation for evading detention, and driving while license suspended.

Other charges resulting in jail time included public intoxication, driving while intoxicated, furnishing alcohol to a minor, minor driving under the influence of alcohol, failure to identify to a peace officer and unlawfully carrying a weapon.

**City Awards Bid To Construct
 New Wastewater Treatment Plant**

Tahoka City Council Monday awarded a \$1,201,574 bid to D.E. Rice Construction Co. for construction of a new Wastewater Treatment Plant, a project which city officials have long scrutinized and worked with Oller Engineering to get to the construction phase.

Property purchases and land easements have been completed following months of study and preparation, and City Administrator Jerry Webster says the actual construction phase should begin in mid-October. The facility will include three large pits and a building to house electrical units, and should be completed within six months.

The new facility will replace the current outdated plant, located in south Tahoka. In other business, Webster sought permission from council members to conduct a feasibility study regarding cost effectiveness of constructing a municipal landfill, which the council approved. Larry Hagood was re-appointed as the city's representative on the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority Board of Directors, and council members scheduled budget workshops. Joe Hays, CPA, was approved to conduct the city audit.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Mike Mensch, Webster, and council members John Chapa Jr., Clara Calvillo, and Amy Preston. Council members Jay Dee House and Jimmy McMillan were absent.

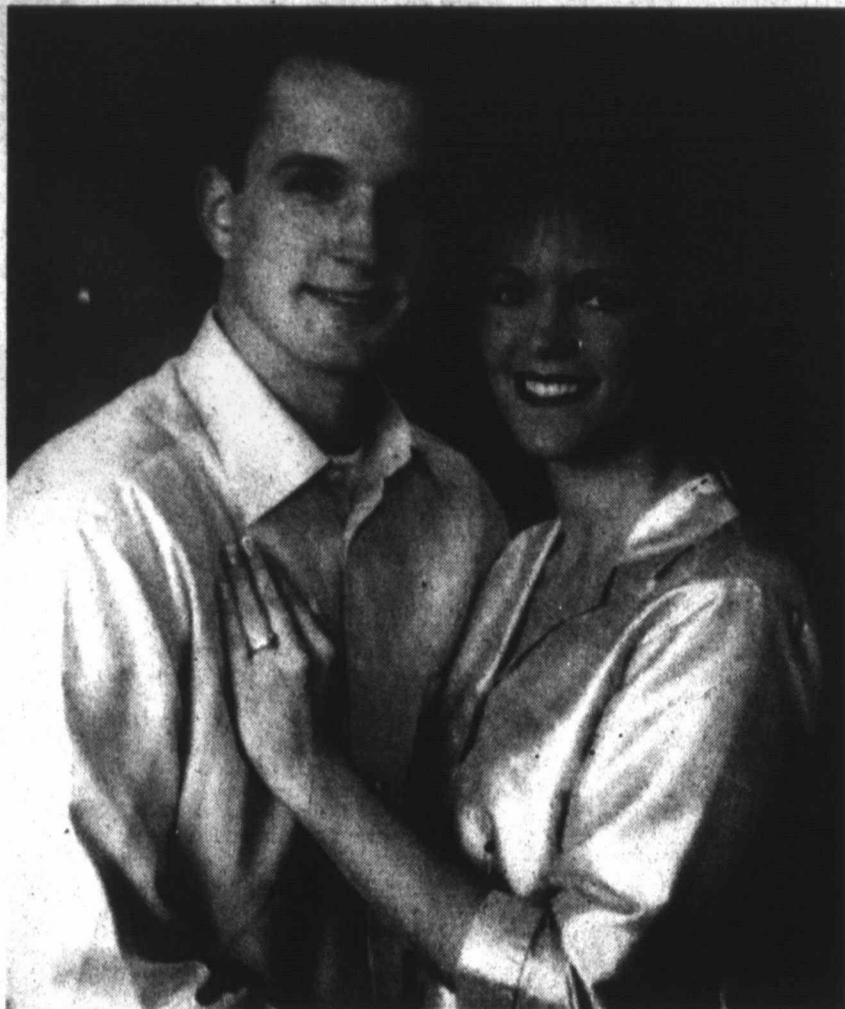

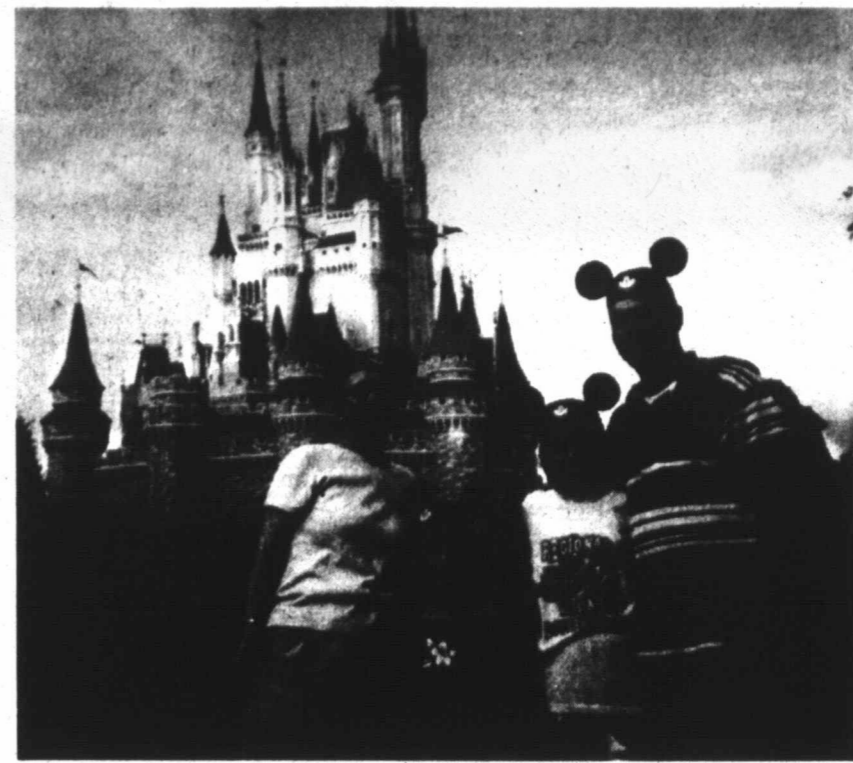
