Day of Sorrow


Many U.S. Flags throughout the nation were flown at half-mast in sorrow and respect of those killed in a devastating terrorist attack in which hijacked U.S. commercial aircraft were deliberately crashed into the World Trade Towers in New York and the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. early Tuesday morning, Sept. 11. Both 110-story trade towers subsequently collapsed and were completely destroyed, and the Pentagon suffered massive destruction, as untold numbers of lives were lost. A fourth hijacked airliner crashed into the ground near Pittsburgh, PA.

U.S. citizens watched news coverage of the events in fear and horror this week, and churches opened their doors for prayer vigils as the nation struggled to come to grips with the vicious attack on home soil. Every aircraft in the United States was ordered to land at the nearest airport and air traffic nationwide was halted for all of Tuesday through noon Wednesday. No reliable word had been received as to who may have been behind the attacks, but some U.S. officials identifed terrorist mastermind Osama bin Laden, who has been given asylum in Afghanistan, as the prime suspect. 

Because of the horrible attack on the World Trade Center and other major sites in New York and Washington, D.C. Tuesday morning with possibly more horror stories to come as this is being written at mid-morning Tuesday, there will be no Woodwork column in this week's Lynn County News.

As author of this column which normally tries to lighten the day of readers with humor, I just didn't feel like joking, although I think it is important to retain a sense of humor for use at the appropriate time in the face of adversity. At this time, though, I am too filled with shock, sorrow and anger, like every other American, to write some of the things I had intended to write Tuesday morning.

Just a couple of hours after the events in New York and Washington, we already know that this must be the greatest loss of life ever in an attack on the U.S. homeland. We don't yet know the extent of loss or who to blame. The cowardly murderers must be found and punished, and the nation's network of information gatherers must see that such events never happen again.

Bulldogs Win Big Over Kress, 54-8

Tahoka's Bulldogs delighted a homecoming crowd last Friday with a big win over the visiting Kress Kangaroos, scoring 22 points in the first quarter and coasting to a 54-8

The Dogs, now 1-1 for the year, will start a three-game series away from home this weekend with a trip to Lockney. The Longhorns, who bombed Tahoka last season, so far have beaten Slaton and lost to Sundown, both in close games.

Stephen Solorzano ran for fourtouchdowns against Kress and Brandon McCord passed for three touchdowns, two of them to Josh Thompson and one to Adrian Moore. Leslie White scored the final points on a 19yard run on the last play of the game.

Solorzano's first TD came on a 49-yard run with 6:39 left in the first period. The PAT kick was blocked, and it was 6-0. Solorzano quickly made it 12-0 with a 59-yard punt refirst, McCord hit Adrian Moore on a 45-yard scoring pass. Odilon Granados kicked the point to make it

Thompson then intercepted a Kress pass to set up the Bulldogs at the Kangaroo 35, and on the last play of the long (45 minutes) first quarter, Granados kicked a 45-yard field

In the second quarter, Tahoka cranked up another scoring drive, which featured passes to Moore and Thompson and a 16-yard run by running back Matthew Wells. The payoff was a 14-yarder to Thompson with just 2:38 left in the half, with the kick making the score 29-0.

Kress QB Gabriel Vasquez, a really good player for an otherwise struggling team, led the Roos to a touchdown on the next series, hitting; Johnny Torres for 10 yards and a touchdown at the end of a 70-yard; drive. A pass for two points was intercepted in the end zone, and the score was 29-6 at halftime.

Tahoka exploded for three touchdowns in the third period, starting with a 7-yard scoring pass to Thompson after Wells intercepted a Vasquez pass and returned to that point. Granados kicked to make it 36-6. About a minute later, after Moore intercepted a Kress pass, Solorzand ran 28 for a touchdown to boost the margin to 42-6. Moore intercepted another pass later and Solorzano raced 33 yards to score again, putting the Dogs up 48-6.

Kress got two points on a safety when the snap to the Tahoka punter went over his head and out of the end turn. Then with just 1:47 left in the zone, and it was 48-8 starting the last

Running by Vasquez started Kress on a drive in the fourth, halted when Tahoka lineman Gabriel Castro recovered a fumble. White then had runs of 11 and 45 yards before his: scoring run at the end of the game.



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Special Election NOVEMBER 6, 2001

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)

Proposition 1 would amend the constitution to relinquish the state's claim to certain disputed land in Bastrop County. to that land, excluding any mineral interputed title to the land. The amendment would prevent a loss of title by people who bought and paid for property that was never transferred by the state because of faulty surveys.

> The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the owners of certain land in Bastrop County.

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonias. Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border

PROPOSITION 3

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange ort for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."

PROPOSITION 4

Proposition 4 would amend the const tion by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment appointed for a few seconds." amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pen-

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 32)

Proposition 5 would amend the constitution to allow a municipality to donate outdated or surplus equipment, supplies, an underdeveloped country. Current state law does not allow anything of value belonging to the state or its political subdivisions to be donated to another

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloped

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the governor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential electors when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the governor to call a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain cir-

PROPOSITION 7

Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mortgage loans to veterans. Additionally, the posed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve vet-

posed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The con nt authorizing the Veterans Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for veterans' housing assistance and to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide for veterans cemeteries."

PROPOSITION 8

Proposition 8 would amend the constitu-tion to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Pinance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for con-struction and repair projects or for the purchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Texas

Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the Parks and Wildlife Department, the adjutant general's department, the Texas School for the Deaf, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Public Safety, the State Preservation Board, the Texas Department of Health, the Texas Historical Commission, or the Texas School for the Blind and Visually

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$850 million in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for construction and repair projects and for the

PROPOSITION 9

Proposition 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for filling vacancies in the legislature without an election if only one person is a qualified candidate in the election to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional endment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an ty." election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy.'

PROPOSITION 10

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal properfrom property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commer-

PROPOSITION 11

Proposition 11 would amend the constitution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school adminstrator who serves as a member of a goveming body of a school district, city, town, or other local governmental district, including a water district, to receive eming body. Currently, state employees ensation for serving on such a govor other individuals who are compensated directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The consti dment to allow current and retired ublic school teachers and retired public chool administrators to receive con sation for serving on the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, including water districts."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 75)

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to eliminate obsolete, archaic, redundant, and unnecessary provisions and to clarify, update, and harmonize certain provisions of the Texas

PROPOSITION 13

Proposition 13 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a board of trustees of an independent school district to donate real property ar improvements formerly used as a school campus in order to preserve that property. The board may make the donation if the board determines that the property has historical significance, that the donation will help to preserve the property, and that the school district no longer needs the property for educational pur-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an independent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical significance in order to preserve the proper-

PROPOSITION 14

Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15

Proposition 15 would amend the consti tution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, turnpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility

PROPOSITION 16

Proposition 16 would amend the consti tution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a con-tract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addi-tion, the proposed amendment would

authorize the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on a home-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or renovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a forced sale."

PROPOSITION 17 (HIR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party.'

PROPOSITION 18

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for conomically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The consti ndment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."

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Texas' Major Cotton Farming Communities Losing \$433 Million This Year Due To Drought

Dry, hot summer weather has taken a toll on the 2001 Texas cotton crop, with losses totaling \$433 million in the state's major cotton farming communities - primarily in the Rolling and Southern High Plains -Texas Cooperative Extension reports.

Dr. Carl Anderson, an Extension cotton marketing specialist, said estimated losses for Texas cotton growers stands at \$255 million to date. By Aug. 1, cotton farmers had abandoned 1.7 million acres of 6.2 million acres planted this year.

"Additional acreage likely will be lost because much of the dryland crop continues to suffer from drought," said Anderson, noting the rains in mid-August were scattered across the state and came too late to benefit dryland cotton.

He noted this year's acreage abandonment follows 2 million abandoned acres a year ago. In 1998, 2.35 million acres were abandoned, and another 1.5 million acres were abandoned in 1996.

So far, 2001 has been another tough year for cotton growers after three previous years of drought losses in 1996, 1998 and 2000 totaled \$1.5 billion for cotton growers and cost the Texas economy \$2.87 billion.

Corn and sorghum crops are also smaller than last year, Anderson said. Yields in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Western Coastal Bend, South Central Texas, Blacklands and High Plains are below average.

"The drought and low prices prevailing for most of the last six years leaves crop farmers with depressed incomes," Anderson said. "Many producers and related rural businesses are depending on government program payments to survive another year. The largest impact from the extended drought hits the rural areas of the Texas Southern High Plains and Rolling Plains where almost 5 million acres of cotton are planted each year."

With continued production and income shortfalls, Anderson said

pressure is mounting on agriculture infrastructure, and some individuals are looking to leave rural towns for better jobs elsewhere.

"Crop insurance and government payments have bolstered income somewhat," Anderson said. "Given the low cotton, wheat, corn and sorghum prices, a new federal farm program with a safety net to cover production costs in 2002 is needed to prevent added foreclosures and bankruptcies in Texas."

Meanwhile, cattle prices are fairly strong, but supplemental feeding of livestock was started in July and August as pasture conditions continued to decline. Some ranchers maintained reduced herds from previous droughts and are hauling water to livestock where water sources have dried up.

"Fortunately, winter and spring rains benefited early hay production," Anderson said.

While drought is evident throughout much of the state, the northern half has fared slightly better than the southern regions.

"Moisture in the High Plains is well ahead of the parched Trans-Pecos region," Anderson said.

East Texas, North Central Texas, the low Rolling Plains and the upper cost regions have received some rainfall, but the Trans-Pecos, Edwards Plateau, South Central Texas, South Texas and the Lower Valley are extremely dry.

Favorable rains in late summer and early fall will dictate the seeding of the 2002 wheat crop, which will begin in September for some parts of

"Next year's Texas wheat crop is in jeopardy without timely rains over the next few weeks," Anderson said. "Range and pastures also need rain to recover and prevent prolonged supplemental feeding of livestock this fall and winter - resulting in higher production costs," he explained.

Wilson Volunteer Fire Department Tip of the Week: Most household fires are caused by one of two situations, improper smoking habits or kitchen fires. Many kitchen fires can be prevented or easily controlled with the use of a little common sense. You are frying chicken and the phone rings but the phone is in another room — turn off the stove and place the frying pan on another burner. When you come back to the kitchen restart the burner and replace the pan.

What do you do if you leave he burner on and when you come back to the kitchen the frying pan is on fire and the chicken is going to be really well done? First, don't panic, call 911 and get the fire department on the way. Then try to cover the pan with a lid which can smother the fire or get out the fire extinguisher (type A-B-C) and use it on the fire. Be sure to let the fire department examine the fire site to make sure that the fire has not spread to other locations such as cabinets or up into the vent-ahood.
