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Bulldogs Win Big Over Horns, 46-12

Lockney scored first as they hosted Tahoka last Friday night, but the Bulldogs came roaring back from a 6-0 first quarter deficit to score 27 points in the second quarter and went on to win 46-12.

The victory gave Tahoka a 2-1 record for the season as Coach Bryan Gerlich takes his Bulldogs to Class AAA Shallowater this week. The Mustangs were beaten 17-14 by Idalou in two overtimes last week.

Stephen Solarzano tied the game early in the second period with a 10-yard scoring run, and a missed extra point left it at 6-6. Then defensive end Ben Stroope of Tahoka achieved a rare double whammy for the Bulldogs by returning consecutive blocked punts for touchdowns. The first one he ran back 10 yards and the second one 5. After Stroope's first score, QB Brandon McCord passed for two points and Odilon Granados kicked the point after the second one. Before halftime, McCord teamed

up with receiver Josh Thompson for a tremendous 90-yard touchdown pass play. The kick was blocked, and it was 27-6 at halftime.

Tahoka built the lead to 33-6 in the third quarter as McCord passed to Jordan Vega for 15 and a TD. Lockney came back with an 8-yard run by Martinez, and McCord and Vega teamed up again, this time for a 2-yard scoring pass, to make it 40-12 after Granados' kick.

Tahoka's final score came in the fourth period, another long journey by Thompson, who intercepted a Lockney pass and raced 95 yards for a touchdown.

Red Cross Donations Accepted Here

Donations are being accepted in several locations in Lynn County to assist with disaster relief efforts in New York City and Washington, D.C. following the recent terrorist attacks.

The Lynn County Victim Assistance office in Tahoka has organized donation boxes, placing them in several locations in the county, with all funds raised to be forwarded to the American Red Cross. Donation boxes are in Tahoka at the school, City Hall, Thriftway and Tahoka Drug; in O'Donnell at the school, City Hall, and Moore-Raines Insurance; and at the schools in New Hope and Wilson.

"The Lynn County Victim Assistance Program was designed to assist victims of crime by providing various services that will hopefully make a difference in the life of those affected by crime. While Lynn County is far from New York, we are very fortunate to be a part of the United States and to have many great people who want to do something in order to help," said Lena Cloe, Victim Assistance Coordinator.

She noted that while her office is organizing the donation boxes, many school children throughout the county had already begun collection processes through their schools, and that any other groups organizing Red Cross donations are welcome to participate in their own way.

"What matters is that the people of Lynn County are coming together to try to help the victims of this terrible tragedy," she said.

Poka Lambro To Offer Local Phone Service In Tahoka

Tahoka residents and businesses will soon have a choice when it comes to their telephone service. Poka Lambro officials are pleased to announce that they plan to open an office in Tahoka and begin providing quality local telephone service to the citizens here. Poka Lambro's request to the Public Utility Commission of Texas to obtain certification allowing them to become a competitive local (telephone) exchange carrier (CLEC) was approved on Sept. 14, 2001. They received official notification Sept. 18. According to Sid Applin, Manager of CLEC Operations, Poka Lambro will be burying cable throughout most of the town, as well as installing all new switching facilities. Construction will be implemented in three phases and is scheduled to begin very shortly. "We hope to have our first customers on line by year-end," said Applin. Poka Lambro anticipates having their new plant installed and being fully operational by mid-2002.

Poka Lambro will provide all of the services and features currently offered in Tahoka and will match the

current calling scope as well. Pricing is still being set, but according to officials will be competitive with that of the existing phone company. "We plan to provide Tahoka with something they've been deprived of for some time, and that's quality service," said Applin.

In addition to quality phone service Poka Lambro plans to extend exceptional customer service to the citizens of Tahoka. "We are very excited about becoming a part of the community and plan to be very accessible to our customers," said Poka Lambro CEO David McEndree. "Poka Lambro's office in Tahoka will be a one-stop shop where customers can come in and discuss or sign up for any of the services offered by Poka Lambro." In addition to local phone service, Poka Lambro will continue providing long distance service, Internet service and cellular service in Tahoka.

Cotton Bales Spilled As Truck Overtakes

Bales of cotton were scattered over the southbound lanes of U.S. 87 approximately 12 miles north of Tahoka last Thursday as a 2001 Western Star truck/tractor overturned. A Dept. of Public Safety officer said all 88 bales on the truck were spilled, and some went across into the northbound lane.

Driver of the truck was Eugene Rieves, 31, of Spring, TX. He was not injured.

Another traffic accident was reported in Tahoka, also with no injuries. Clinton Allen Luckett, 20, of Poteet was driving a 1999 Ford pickup which was involved in a collision at Ave. L and N. 4th St. with a 1995 Ford van driven by Debbie Rhea Darwactor, 38, of Tahoka.

A 43-year-old Lubbock man was sentenced to 15 years in prison Tuesday after he pleaded guilty of possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver. Judge Billy John Edwards of Abilene, presiding in 106th District Court here, assessed the sentence for Jackie Glenn Summerford.

Tahoka Police arrested a 54-year-old Tahoka man for public intoxication after a woman called to complain that a man was urinating on her front porch Saturday.

A 69-year-old Tahoka man was named as a suspect in an assault on a 40-year-old Tahoka woman last Thursday.

In jail during the week were four persons, one for application to revoke probation on felony driving while intoxicated plus grand jury indictment, one for terroristic threat, one for public intoxication and one for no auto liability plus no drivers license plus driving under the influence.

First Bale Ginned Here

The first bale of cotton was reported ginned in Lynn County on Tuesday, Sept. 18. Chip Anderson, superintendent at Wells Farmers Coop Gin, reported Lynn County producer Ty Askew had brought in cotton from irrigated land in the southern portion of Lynn County, which was ginned at about 3:30 p.m.

The cotton weighed in at 546 pounds, and produced 840 pounds of seed.

WOODWORK by Dalton

THERE is an organization called the American Wind Energy Association, which recently ranked Texas as the No. 2 state in the nation with the greatest energy potential from wind power, meaning a way to generate electrical power by large windmill-like wind chargers.

That's because we have a lot of wind available in Texas, and we can harness the wind power almost any time we have the right equipment to do it. And, of course, just in case the wind should suddenly quit blowing, the owner of a wind charger could chain a few politicians and lawyers (and newspaper writers?) next to the generating equipment and tell them to do their stuff.

Incidentally, North Dakota was the No. 1 state in wind energy potential. I have never been to North Dakota, but if it has more wind than West Texas, I may just keep it that way.

Use of windmills has grown a lot in recent years, according to a recent newspaper report which estimated that generating capacity nationwide is expected to almost double by the end of this year, providing enough electricity for 1.3 million homes.

It's good to know that wind, which is usually an aggravation, can be put to practical use. Unless you fly a kite or remember when strange wind currents used to draw teenage boys to a certain location on 7th St. in downtown Fort Worth, wind is mostly useless.

Seventh St. in Fort Worth? Well, when I was a teenager about half a century ago, guys used to go to Fort Worth and just hang around on 7th St. near the old Worth Theater just because the current there always seemed to catch the women's skirts as they walked down the sidewalk or crossed the intersection. It was one of life's biggest thrills up to that time.

I don't know if the wind still does that on 7th St. in Fort Worth, or if the Worth Theater is still there. I'm not even sure Fort Worth is still there. Anyway, with the women mostly wearing pants these days, about all anyone would see is men's hats blowing off their heads.

Library Receives \$20,181 Grant

The City-County Library in Tahoka has received \$20,181 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board, a state agency in Austin. TIF has awarded non-competitive grants for approximately \$7 million to 118 public libraries and branches to expand their current telecommunications infrastructure for greater public access to modern technology.

The local library will use the TIF funding to purchase two work stations, a slim-line computer for future automation, software for automation, a scanner for automation, a printer, and various cable and supplies. The library is committed to assisting their patrons in this information era, adding the necessary equipment so that the public will have access to the most information available with the mere click of a button. These grant projects officially began in August.

"The library is a place for information and resources. Many Texans still do not have computers in their homes. So why not have workstations and Internet connectivity for library patrons to use," said Shirley Draper, the Project Director for this grant. "Public libraries are oriented towards providing as much information and education as possible. This grant money will assist us in serving our patrons through more modern technology."

Since its creation by the 74th Legislature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$700 million in telecommunications infrastructure grants to its four constituent groups: public schools, libraries, institutions of higher education, and public, not-for-profit healthcare facilities. TIF receives in excess of \$150 million per year in revenues from telecommunications assessments to disburse over a ten-year period.
