

THERE is an organization called the American Wind Energy Association, which recently ranked Texas as the No. 2 state in the nation with the greatest energy potential from wind power, meaning a way to generate electrical power by large windmill-like wind chargers.

That's because we have a lot of wind available in Texas, and we can harness the wind power almost any time we have the right equipment to do it. And, of course, just in case the wind should suddenly quit blowing, the owner of a wind charger could chain a few politicians and lawyers (and newspaper writers?) next to the generating equipment and tell them to do their stuff.

Incidentally, North Dakota was the No. 1 state in wind energy potential. I have never been to North Dakota, but if tl.ay have more wind than West Texas, I may just keep it that way.

Use of windmills has grown a lot in recent years, according to a recent newspaper report which estimated that generating capacity nationwide is expected to almost double by the end of this year, providing enough electricity for 1.3 million homes.

It's good to know that wind, which is usually an aggravation, can be put to practical use. Unless you fly a kite or remember when strange wind currents used to draw teenage boys to a certain location on 7th St. in downtown Fort Worth, wind is mostly useless.

Seventh St. in Fort Worth? Well, when I was a teenager about half a century ago, guys used to go to Fort Worth and just hang around on 7th St. near the old Worth Theater just because the current there always seemed to catch the women's skirts as they walked down the sidewalk or crossed the intersection. It was one of life's biggest thrills up to that time.

'I don't know if the wind still does that on 7th St. in Fort Worth, or if the Worth Theater is still there. I'm not even sure Fort Worth is still there. Anyway, with the women mostly wearing pants these days, about all anyone would see is men's hats blowing off their heads.

Red Cross Donations Accepted Here


Donations are being accepted in several locations in Lynn County to assist with disaster relief efforts in New York City and Washington, D.C. following the recent terrorist attacks.


Cotton Bales Spilled As Truck Overturns



Library Receives \$20,181 Grant

The City-County Library in Tahoka has received \$20,181 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board, a state agency in Austin. TIF has awarded non-competitive grants for approximately \$7 million to 118 public libraries and branches to expand their current telecommunications infrastructure for greater public access to modern technology.

The local library will use the TIF funding to purchase two work stations, a slim-line computer for future automation, software for automation, a scanner for automation, a printer, and various cable and supplies. The library is committed to assisting their patrons in this information era, adding the necessary equipment so that the public will have access to the most information available with the mere click of a button. These grant projects officially began in August.

"The library is a place for information and resources. Many Texans still do not have computers in their homes. So why not have workstations and Internet connectivity for library patrons to use," said Shirley Draper, the Projector Director for this grant. "Public libraries are oriented towards providing as much information and education as possible. This grant money will assist us in serving our patrons through more modern technology."

Since its creation by the 74th Legislature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$700 million in telecommunications infrastructure grants to its four constituent groups: public schools, libraries, institutions of higher education, and public, not-forprofit healthcare facilities. TIF receives in excess of \$150 million per year in revenues from telecommunications assessments to disburse over a ten-year period.


(Tradition — a mode of thought or behavior followed by a people continuously from generation to generation.)

Report Price Gouging, Says BBB Official

In the aftermath of the tragic terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001, the Better Business Bureau is receiving reports of isolated instances of price gouging. The calls are coming from all over the South Plains area and BBBs are reporting that calls are being received in their areas as well not just in New York and Washington. The closure of airports and the demands for alternate means of transportation, shelter and other related services are impacting marketplaces across the country,

"The vast majority of businesses adhere to honorable, responsible business practices in good times, and bad. It is unfortunate that a few merchants would take advantage of a tragedy or crisis by charging much more than the usual price for a product or service," said Nan Campbell, the president and CEO of the Better **Business Bureau of the South Plains.**

Not all price increases constitute price gouging, however. Prices on some products, such as gasoline, do vary throughout the year. Other prices, such as on fresh produce, may

den, unusual price increases significantly out of line with the competition in their geographic are, can contact the local Better Business Bureau at (806) 763-0459 or (800) 687-7890. The BBB will be able to refer consumers to the proper agency or advise them how to file a complaint.

The Bureau should also be contacted if a consumer experiences a misrepresentation regarding the reason for an abrupt increase in the price of a product or service. While Bureaus generally do not handle complaints solely in reference to the price of goods or services, the local BBB will review concerns about misleading advertising and selling practices.

Complaints can be filed online through the www.bbbsouthplains.org web site (click on the "File A Complaint" icon). The BBB will review the concerns, and if appropriate, contact the business. In some situations the Bureau may also refer the matter to law enforcement agencies.

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonias. Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border colonias."

PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw, cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."

PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 1)

Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed two years.

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control proj-ects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The const amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion.






