Defendant Jumps Bond, But Trial Goes On Here

A 20-year-old man who was stopped just north of Tahoka April 21 with a large quantity of marijuana in his vehicle was being tried in absentia in 106th District Court here this week after the defendant, free on \$50,000 bond, failed to show up for his jury trial.

Jorge Heribert Martinez-Garcia, who had been living in Kansas, but originally came from Mexico, was stopped by Dept. of Public Safety Patrolman Jay Druesedow for speeding in a construction zone just outside the city limits. A search of Martinez-Garcia's car turned up more than 180 pounds of marijuana in packages.

The suspect has not been located, but a jury was selected and the trial still was in progress Wednesday morning. Terence Cook of the District Attorney's office in Lamesa was prosecuting the case, and Brian

Chavez of Lubbock was attorney for the defense.

Judge Vann Culp of Midland was presiding over the trial which started Tuesday.

The One-Stop store in Tahoka was burglarized Monday night, with merchandise and a cash register containing two checks totaling \$29 and some change stolen. The burglars gained entry by prying open a door. Total loss and damage were estimated at \$393. Tahoka Police said the missing items included 11 cartons of cigarettes, valued at \$264.

Ima Lou Raindl of Tahoka told police someone had broken out a window in a building in her back yard last Wednesday. The loss was estimated at \$10.

In jail during the last week were eight persons, all on charges related to driving while intoxicated or driving while license suspended.

Senior Citizens Center Still Needs Donations

The Lynn County Pioneer Club, senior citizens center serving more than 60 meals every weekday to older residents in Lynn County, has had a gratifying response to an appeal for help last week, receiving more than a third of the money needed to keep the center going after the end of this month.

By last Monday, the center had received \$3,102.68 in cash donations from individuals and organizations, plus a donation of 30 cases of canned food which can be used to feed senior citizens in the county. Twice a week, food is delivered by volunteers to Wilson, and meals go to O'Donnell every day, plus 20 or 30 meals served daily at the center in Tahoka.

According to Janet Porterfield, president of the board of directors, and Lenda Wood, secretary, at least \$9,000 is needed by the end of the month to pay current and past due bills. And another two months of operating expenses, or about \$11,000, will be needed to keep the center operating until January, when some of the annual funds allocated by the South Plains Assn. Of Governments will be made available.

Donations may be made to any of the board members, or at the center. Checks may be made out to Lynn County Pioneers, or just "Lynn County Senior Citizens," and also may be mailed to the center at P.O. Box 223, Tahoka 79373.

One unusual donation received was when Willard Benedict brought in five gallons of pennies, which totaled more than \$300.

Others who have donated during the last week include Norma Poe, Bill and Gail Roberts, Billy Tomlinson, Poka-Lambro, D.R. and Jean Adamson and Dortha Flynn. In addition, St. Pius Catholic Church at O'Donnell had a food fund raiser which brought the center 30 cases of canned goods.

Among those helping with the O'Donnell event were DJ Perico of New Home, Melissa Padira of Lamesa, DJ Triple J Productions of O'Donnell, the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. and Richard Lueria.

"We're most appreciative of what all these people are doing to help the senior citizens of Lynn County," said Mrs. Porterfield.

Bulldogs Surprise New Deal 42-20

Last Friday's football game here between Tahoka and New Deal was one of Tahoka's finest hours ever in football as the Bulldogs hammered the Lions 42-20 to even their season record at 3-3 and give the Dogs a 1-0 mark in district play.

Quarterback Brandon McCord ran for three touchdowns and passed for a fourth to lead the Bulldogs. Senior running back Stephen Solorzano gained 163 yards in 19 carries, including touchdown runs of 7 and 14 yards.

Tahoka scored three times in the second quarter after a scoreless first quarter. The Bulldogs were up 21-0 at halftime after the fierce defense kept New Deal mostly deep in their own territory. Tahoka's front line also did excellent work on offense.

McCord, just a junior, opened scoring with a 5-yard run and Odilon Granados kicked the point. A little later in the period, McCord scored on a 1-yard run and the kick failed, making it 13-0. Then before halftime, McCord passed to wide receiver Josh Thompson for 39 yards and a touchdown. Solorzano then took a 2-point pass from McCord.

In the third, Tahoka went ahead 28-0 on a 7-yard run by Solorzano and a kick by Granados. New Deal, which previously had lost just one game this season, then got on the board with a 55-yard pass play, Zac Stephenson to Ryan Barnett.

Still in the third, Solorzano ran 14 for yet another Tahoka touchdown, and Granados' kick made it 35-7.

New Deal scored twice in the fourth period, and Tahoka iced the game with a 16-yard run by McCord.

The Bulldogs this week will go to Ralls for another district game, and Tahoka will be favored in this one, as Ralls last week lost to Post 56-0. Idalou beat Sundown in overtime last Friday to remain unbeaten for the year and tied with Post and Tahoka for the district lead.

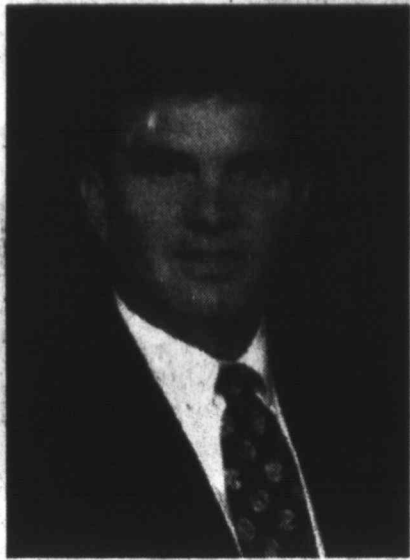
Fall Family Fun Fest Set For Halloween

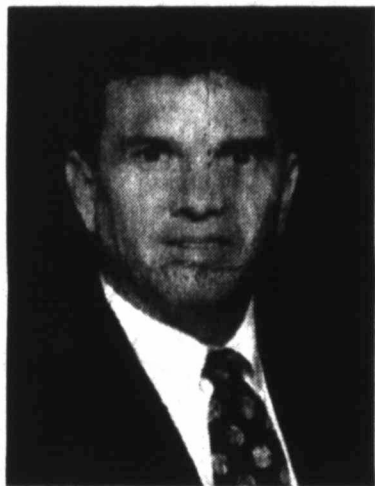

Items will be delivered after Thanksgiving to ensure freshness for holiday decorating. To place an order, contact any band member or call 428-3247 or 428-3484.

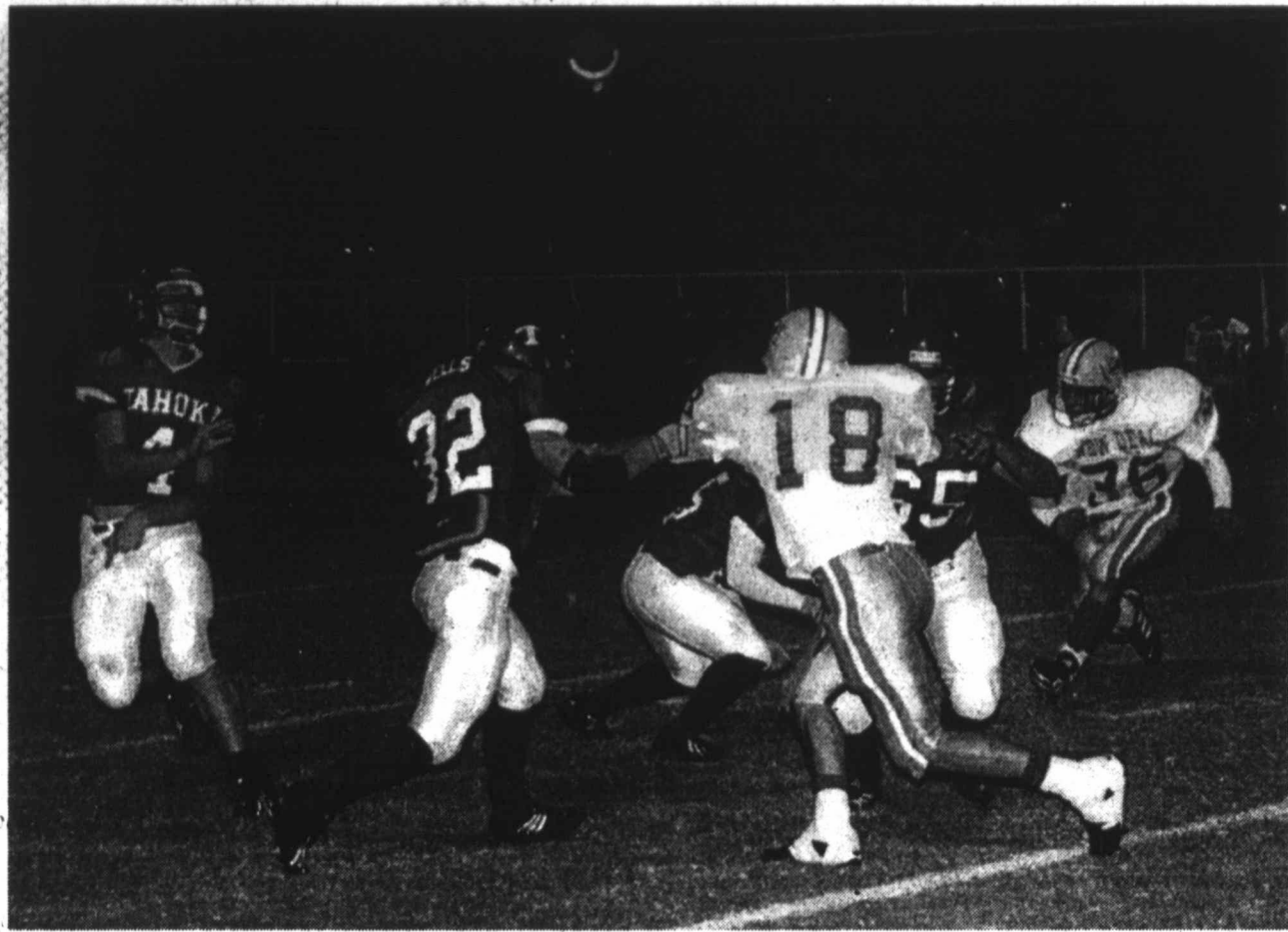
Other fund raisers include a turkey dinner for Thanksgiving and Friday night dinners.

Tribute To America

(Editors Note: The following was reprinted from a Canadian newspaper by the Booker News and was brought to The Lynn County News by Tahoka resident Bill Collins.) Its subject is:

"America: The Good Neighbor" Widespread but only partial news coverage was given recently to a remarkable editorial broadcast from Toronto by Gordon Sinclair, a Canadian television commentator. What follows is the full text of his trenchant remarks as printed in the Congressional Record:

"This Canadian thinks it is time to speak up for the American as the most generous and possibly the least appreciated people on all the earth. Germany, Japan, and to a lesser extent, Britain and Italy were lifted out of the debris of war by the Americans who poured in billions of dollars and forgave other billions in debt. None of these countries is today paying even the interest on its remaining debts to the United States.

When France was in danger of collapsing in 1956, it was the Americans who propped it up, and their reward was to be insulted and swindled on the streets of Paris. I was there. I saw it.

When earthquakes hit distant cities, it is the United States that hurries in to help. This spring, 59 American communities were flattened by tornadoes. Nobody helped.

The Marshall Plan and the Truman Policy pumped billions of dollars into discouraged countries. Now newspapers in those countries are writing about the decadent, warmongering Americans.

I'd like to see just one of those countries that is gloating over the erosion of the United States dollar build its own airplane. Does any other country in the world have a plane to equal the Boeing Jumbo Jet, the

Lockheed Tri-Star, or the Douglas DC10? If so, why don't they fly them? Why do all the International lines except Russia fly American planes?

Why does no other land on earth even consider putting a man or woman on the moon? You talk about Japanese technocracy, and you get radios. You talk about German technocracy, and you get automobiles. You talk about American technocracy, and you find men on the moon — not once, but several times — and safely home again. You talk about scandals, and the Americans put theirs right in the store window for everybody to look at. Even their draft-dodgers are not pursued or hounded. They are here on our streets, and most of them, unless they are breaking Canadian laws, are getting American dollars from Ma and Pa at home to spend here.

When the railways of France, Germany and India were breaking down through age, it was the Americans who rebuilt them. When the Pennsylvania Railroad and the New York Central went broke, nobody loaned them an old caboose. Both are still broke.

I can name you 5,000 times when the Americans raced to the help of other people in trouble. Can you name me even one time when someone else raced to the Americans in trouble? I don't think there was outside help even during the San Francisco earthquake.

Our neighbors have faced it alone, and I'm one Canadian who is damned tired of hearing them get kicked around. They will come out of this thing with their flag high. And when they do, they are entitled to thumb their nose at the lands that are gloating over their present troubles. I hope Canada is not one of those." Stand Proud America!

Cal Farley Once Played Ball On Team At Tahoka

Cal Farley, 70, well known by many Tahoka people, died of a cerebral hemorrhage Sunday in the chapel at the Boys Ranch he founded at historic old Tascosa on the Canadian River.

Over the past 30 years, he has visited Tahoka frequently, has spoken at several civic meetings here, and away back just following World War II he played semi-pro baseball briefly for Tahoka while Hall Robinson was the catcher.

Reared in Minnesota, Cal was a wayward youth himself, served in World War I, played professional baseball, and came to Amarillo in 1923 as a professional wrestler. He made a big business success as a tire and appliance store operator, began working with street waifs, organized Amarillo's Maverick Club for these boys, then Kids, Inc., and finally he sold out his business and established Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, 40 miles northwest of Amarillo, now with a population of 350 homeless, orphan, and wayward boys. Directors claim Farley has never taken a dime of the money he has raised for the institution that made him famous all over the nation.

Among many offices of honor he has held included Rotary District governor. - Feb. 24, 1967

Cancer Society Recruiting Volunteers For Tell-A-Friend Breast Cancer Initiative

During Breast Cancer Awareness month in October, the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, Inc., is launching a statewide campaign to reach Texas women with potentially lifesaving information.

"Tell-A-Friend (TAF) will be held primarily in October, when women are asked to call and encourage friends and family members to have regular screening mammograms," said Laura Balla, RN of Austin, chairman of the statewide effort. "We hope to reach more than 30,000 women, and encourage them to get a mammogram, especially if they have never had a mammogram. If a friend 40+ has never had a mammogram, we must work harder to encourage her to do so."

According to Balla, "Research shows that women are more likely to get a mammogram if they are urged to do so by a doctor, friend or family member. We have created a simple program by which women volunteers call at least five of their friends and acquaintances and encourage them to get a mammogram."

The benefits of mammography are paying off, as statistics show that the survival rate of breast cancer is almost 100% when detected early. "The only way we can further reduce the death rate from breast cancer is by getting more women to have annual mammograms and Tell-A-Friend is a way to accomplish that goal. More importantly, now that Medicare covers the cost of annual screening mammograms, we're hoping that even more women will avail themselves of this important procedure," Balla concluded.

Businesses are also encouraged to participate by allowing their employees to make Tell-A-Friend calls from the workplace and throughout the month.

Annual screening mammograms for women age 40 and older are the key element of newly revised American Cancer Society guidelines, which also include annual exam by a health care professional and monthly breast self-examination.

Rylander Releases List Of Unclaimed Property Owners

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has released the state's annual list of unclaimed property owners who have assets they are either unaware of or have simply forgotten. It might be anything from a dormant bank account to a forgotten utility deposit, an uncashed check to family heirlooms in an abandoned safe deposit box.

The state is currently holding more than \$905 million in cash and other valuables that have been turned over to the Comptroller by businesses and financial institutions that have been unable to locate the rightful owners. People on a printed list released by the Comptroller's Office have at least \$100 in unclaimed property.

Persons wanting to know if they are on the unclaimed property list may visit the unclaimed property web site at www.window.state.tx.us/up; call 1-800-654-3463; or write Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, Unclaimed Property Research and Correspondence Section, P.O. Box 12019, Austin, 78711-2019.

Those searching the list, which is set up by city, should not only look for the city in which they currently live, but also in other cities where they have lived in the past.

Persons with less than \$100 in unclaimed property and those whose names have been reported in the past may also be found on the web site.

Jamie Cavender scored on a 20-yard pass from Ruben Rodriguez for a Wilson touchdown in the second quarter after New Home already was

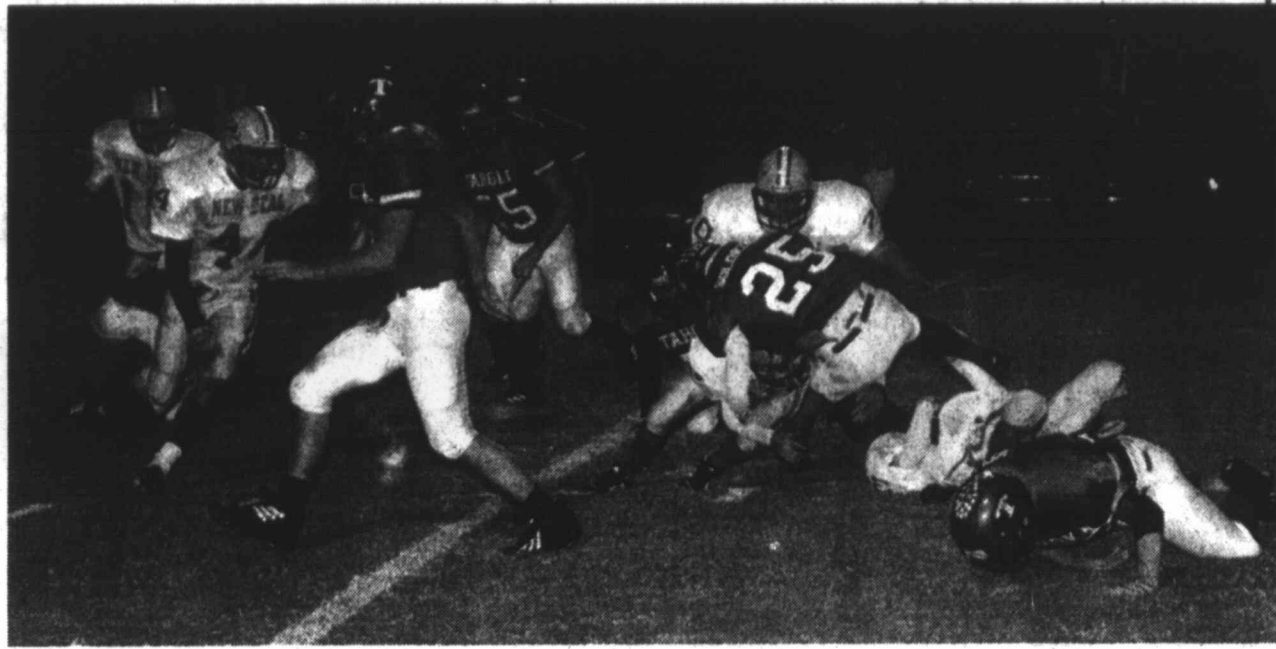

Area Residents Invited To Comment On Draft Water Plan During Public Meetings

Area residents are invited to offer comments about the draft 2002 state water plan during a series of public meetings to be held Oct. 29 in Lubbock and Oct. 30 in Amarillo.

The Lubbock public meetings are set for Oct. 29 at 3 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. in the Texas Tech University International Cultural Center, 601 Indiana Ave. The Amarillo public meetings will be held Oct. 30 at 2 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. in the Potter County Santa Fe Building, 900 South Polk.

The draft water plan is the culmination of a three-year effort by regional water planning groups, state natural resource agencies and the public.

"Water For Texas — 2002" is the first state water plan to be developed by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) in Austin since the passage of Senate Bill 1 in 1997," said Jim Conkwright, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District in Lubbock. "This changed the water planning process by including public participation through the 16 regional water planning groups in the state. This bottom-up process forms the basis of the draft state water plan."

The draft state water plan includes policy issues and legislative recommendations, highlights of the 16 regional water management plans, and adopted water supply management strategies for all statewide water user groups through 2050. The draft "Water For Texas — 2002" document is available for viewing on the TWDB website at www.twdb.state.tx.us.

During October, the TWDB will hold 26 public meetings in 15 cities

and conduct video conferences in 10 additional cities. In addition, two public hearings will be conducted in Austin on Nov. 1.

Area residents may provide comments about the state water plan to the Texas Water Development Board either in writing or by e-mail. All comments will be considered by the TWDB prior to its final adoption of the state water plan on Dec. 12. Following TWDB approval, the plan will be submitted to the Governor, Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House, and the House/Senate Natural Resources Committees on Jan. 5, 2002.

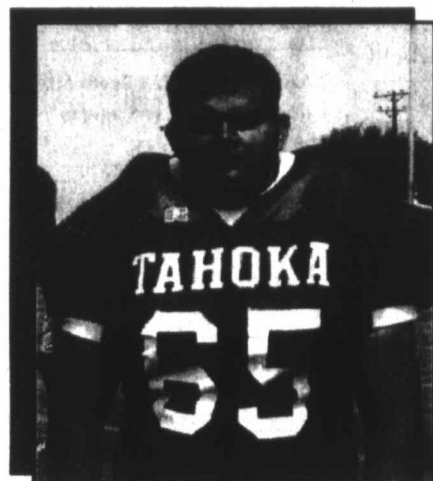

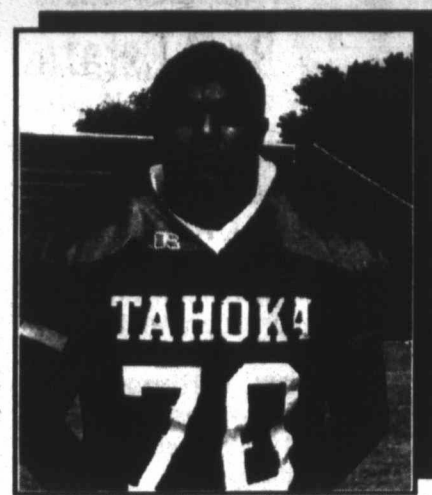

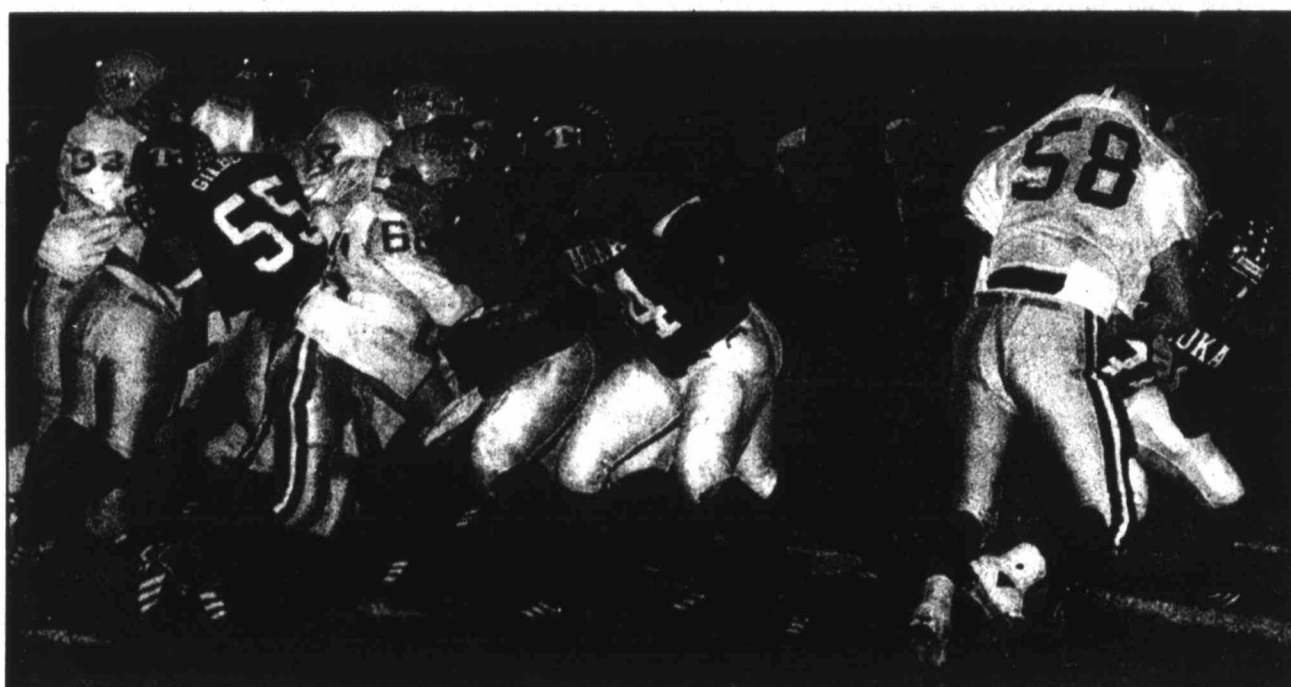
