The new facility, located about a half mile east of the traffic light in Tahoka on Hwy. 380, is housed in the former S&K Implement building. The interior of the building was reconstructed to include a 48-bed jail complete with the required separate men's and women's cells, exercise area, kitchen, and other facilities, as well as housing offices for the Sheriff's Department, Lynn County Victim's Assistance, and local Department of Public Safety officers. 

Emergency Farm Loans Now Being Accepted At FSA

Applications for emergency farm participating in the Federal Crop Insurloans for losses caused by drought that ance program will have to figure in prooccurred from Jan. 1, 2001 and continu- ceeds from this program in determining ing are being accepted at the Farm Ser-their loss. vice Agency (FSA) office located in Tahoka, FSA Ag Credit Manager Curtis Barlow said today.

Lynn County is one of 50 counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann M. Vineman as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought. Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 per-

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Barlow said. Farmers

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until July 26, 2002, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest. The FSA office in Tahoka is open

from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Mon.-Fri.




