

Leopards Post Decisive Win, Advance To Area

The New Home Leopards and the Dawson Dragons faced off at the Rip Griffin Center in Lubbock Tuesday night to decide the bi-district championship, and the Leopards left no doubt about who would take home the trophy, jumping all over the Dragons in a 61-21 win. They now advance to the Class 1A Area playoffs, taking on the Cotton Center Elks at 7 p.m. Friday night in the Abernathy High School gym.

The first four minutes of the game were a defensive struggle with the score tied at 2-2. Then the Leopards found their stride and scored another 14 points to end the first quarter leading 16-6. That was as close as the score would be the rest of the way.

At the half, New Home was leading by a score of 28-10. The crowed was wowed not only by the offensive play but also by the excellent defensive steals and rebounds. The third and fourth quarters were more of the same with the Leopards continuing to extend their lead until the final

Leading the offense were Michael Wied and Jason Reves with 17 points apiece. Shaun Wied contributed 12 points and Angel Silva and Justin Garza tossed in five points each. Keaton Askew put in three and Matthew Cramblet added a deuce.

Top rebounders for the game were Cramblet with nine and Askew with seven. Reyes. Silva and Nathan Black each grabbed six boards.



BACK IN THE 1950s, there was a football official named George Washington who called games in the Lubbock area ("I cannot tell a lie, son; you were in motion"). There was a story which went around the South Plains in those days about how this official was trying to arrange to call a game for Morton, whose coach at the time was a man named John Paul Jones.

"I asked the telephone operator to place a collect call to John Paul Jones in Morton, and she asked my name," Washington said. "I told her it was George Washington, and she refused to put the call through. She said she didn't have time for pranks."

Anyway, the original George Washington, whose birthday we observed Monday, but who really wasn't born until Feb. 22, perhaps would have had a laugh out of the above story. Or maybe not; he wasn't especially known for his sense of humor, since his was a serious and trying time as he struggled to create legends and become the Father of Our Country.

George Washington was a mighty military and domestic leader. He also had to be physically strong to survive of war and the elements (in fact, he probably was the strongest man ever, because I remember hearing that he pitched his entire camp across the Delaware River).

Washington fought the British, often winning against larger and better armed forces. He later became the new nation's first president, getting his picture on the dollar bill. This may have been the only picture ever made of him. Certainly it is the only one I've ever seen, on dollars, stamps and hanging in about 60 zillion schoolrooms. His expression in that picture is sort of like that of the Mona Lisa. They had similar hair-dos, too.

Filing Period Now Open For Area School, City Elections

March 20 for candidates interested in filing for seats on area school boards and city councils. Elections will be held May 4 for cities and schools.

In Tahoka, three two-year terms on the city council will be up for grabs, with two single-member districts and one at-large district to be considered. As of Tuesday, incumbent Clara Calvillo has filed seeking re-election to her seat in District 2, and incumbent Jimmy McMillan has filed for another term in the at-large District 5. Ray Box has also filed for the District 5 seat. No one has filed yet in the other single-member district (District 4), currently held by councilman Jay Dee House.

Two three-year terms in singlemember districts will be opening on the Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees, with no one reported filing as of Tuesday. Currently, Math Bartley represents Precinct 3, and Brad Hammonds represents Precinct 4. Candidates are not required to live in the precincts they represent, but only those registered voters residing within those precincts may vote in the election. A school precinct map may be viewed at the school business office, located at the Harvick Educational Building on Main Street.

Three seats on the Wilson ISD Board of Trustees will be considered, with two three-year terms and a oneyear unexpired term to be placed on Cook, Clyde Wilke, and Mike Tay-rently Mayor.

may begin making their choices in several local, state and national elected positions next week, as early voting begins Monday, Feb. 25 and continues through March 8 for the Democratic and Republican Primaries, to be held March 12.

Early voting will be conducted at the Lynn County Clerk's office inside the Lynn County Courthouse; during regular business hours Monday through Friday. Voters should bring their voter registration cards, and may only vote in the one primary

of their choice. In Lynn County, all local races will be decided in the Democratic Primary with the exception of the Judicial seat for the 106th Judicial District, which includes Lynn County. There are three candidates in that race, one in the Democratic Primary and two in the Republican Primary. The Democratic candidate, W. Calloway (Cal) Huffaker of Tahoka, will face the Republican party winner in the November General Election. Judge Carter T. Schildknecht (incumbent) and Bonnie C. Ericson are seeking the Republican nomina-

Three of eight county races are contested in the Democratic Primary, with two candidates each vying for the positions of Lynn County Judge, Lynn County Treasurer, and Lynn

Lynn County registered voters County Commissioner Precinct 4. Sandra Cox Kizer and H.G. Franklin are challengers for the County Judge seat. County Treasurer Janet Porterfield is being challenged by Diana Calvillo Solorzano, and Pct. 4 Commissioner J.T. Miller faces challenger Freddie Kieth.

Incumbents in the other five county positions up for election are. uncontested, including District Clerk Sandra Laws, County Clerk Susan Tipton, Pct. 2 Commissioner Mike Braddock, and Justices of the Peace Teresa "Terri" Walker (Pct. 1) and Wayne Noland (Pct. 4).

On the national level, five candidates each are seeking their party nominations for United States Senator, but U.S. Representative Larry Combest (District 19) is unchallenged in the Republican Primary, and no candidates have filed for that seat in the Democratic Primary. Texas Governor Rick Perry is the lone candidate on the Republican ticket, but four candidates are seeking the Democratic party nomination to face him in the General Election.

Numerous other seats are also on the ballot, including State Representative James E. "Pete" Laney (District 85, which now includes Lynn County) unchallenged on the Democratic ticket, facing Judy Strickland on the Republican ticket in the Gen-







We Support Tahoka High School Principal Jerry Lee!

On December 31, 2001, numerous members of the faculty and staff of Tahoka High School presented the following letter to the school board at their regular meeting. Contract renewals for principals would be voted on at the February board meeting, so it was the intent of the signatories of the letter to inform the board of the good things Mr. Lee had accomplished in his year-and-a-half as principal. Every single teacher, secretary, and custodian involved with the high school voluntarily signed this letter showing their unanimous approval of Mr. Lee and the

At the February 11, 2002, school board meeting, Mr. Jimmy Parker, superintendent of Tahoka I.S.D., recommended that Mr. Lee's contract be extended; however, the board voted four to three to disregard Mr. Parker's recommendation.

The faculty and staff of Tahoka High School would like to thank the three school board members who voted to extend the contract for Mr. Lee and, thereby, showed their confidence in and appreciation of the work being done to help our students excel. The voters in Tahoka Independent School District are encouraged to share their opinions regarding this matter with school board members.

Dear Board Members:

In our school we have 240 students, 31 certified teachers, and 14 support staff. In addition, there are parents, grandpatents, and community members who care about our students. There are issues that involve cultural, gender, and socioeconomic concerns. A principal needs to make his way through this complex and often shifting environment to make decisions that are not only for the good of each student, but also for the greater good of all.

How does one begin to make decisions that are for the good of the school if every community member has his or her own definition of what is good and right with regard to a child? Given the many cultural, religious, political, and public beliefs, the principal must be able to recognize and deal with these often conflicting positions. He must start with the recognition of his own core values. Without this understanding, he will not be able to recognize when dilemmas occur, much less be able to deal with them. When a principal can analyze the situation and apply basic ethical principles to make the right decision in tough situations, the good for every student will be served.

The faculty and staff of Tahoka High School believe we have such a principal in Mr. Jerry Lee. He became our principal after a year of poor leadership. Within a short period of time, he was able to reestablish order and move our campus toward forming a quality working and learning environment. Working at school during this time, we have seen the steady improvement and are aware that this took more than hard work. It took a vision of what a school should be; of how people, adults and adolescents, should be treated; and of how to build a learning community in which we set high standards for our students and provide them with a way to attain their goals. As in any large organization, there have been distractions, but Mr. Lee has kept his and our focus on the real reason we are all here - to educate our students and help them develop into mature, independent citizens who can contribute to and successfully live in our country.

We know Mr. Lee to be modest about his accomplishments. We also know that, unless a person is at school every day, many of the things Mr. Lee has done might go unnoticed. Because he often gives credit to others for things he initiated, we want to make sure you are aware of some of the things he has accomplished. We have listed some of the things he has done for our school. We are not here to impose our beliefs on the school; however, we do want to inform the members of this school board how strongly we support Mr. Lee. [The names in parenthesis indicate the person who explained these points.]

Informed decisions (Ms. Spearman)

- · Mr. Lee gets input from teachers before making decisions.
- The sophomore sponsors meet with Mr. Lee to decide on the incentive events offered to students who meet
- · The senior sponsors work with Mr. Lee and Mrs. McCord to monitor seniors' progress toward graduation (or lack of progress) in an attempt to make sure they all have met the requirements to graduate.
- The freshman sponsors work with Mr. Lee on ideas of how to improve morale.
- Special education (Ms. Shanks)
- A low teacher and principal turnover.
- · Mr. Lee has given individual attention and has motivated students to adjust their behavior so that they can return to school. (Mrs. Huffaker)
- Safe environment (Mrs. Renfro)
- He stands in the hall between every class to monitor student behavior.
- · When a student is having a conflict with a teacher, Mr. Lee arranges for the student to do the class work in his office until the conflict can be resolved.
- · When he knows that two students are having personality conflicts, he will remove one student and allow for a cooling-off time.
- Attendance and tardies (Mrs. Williams) Our attendance rate has improved.
- · Tardies are being dealt with immediately, effectively, and fairly.
- · Saturday school (Mrs. Jaquess)
- Youth Leadership organizations (Mrs. Stone). Curriculum alignment (Mrs. Swindle)
- Leadership philosophy (Mr. Rhodes)
- Faculty/student morale (Mr. Bruington)
- · Rather than fear Mr. Lee, the students respect him. The teachers trust him to handle discipline problems fairly.
- The teachers are not afraid for Mr. Lee to come into their classroom. They know that he is there to help them and not try to trap or catch them. They trust him to fairly observe and evaluate them.
- When we go to him asking for assistance and he says that he will take care of it he does exactly what he says he will do, and if he is unable to help, he is honest about his inability.
- He remains calm even when those he is working with are highly agitated.
- · With the incentive rewards each six-weeks, he is trying to motivate our students by rewarding good behavior rather than only punishing bad behavior. Mr. Lee has a genuine philosophy that he applies to running a school. Most principals wander through the school

year working from one problem to the next with no true self-guidance. Mr. Lee's philosophy places value on the student and teacher. He runs our school according to this philosophy and looks at each individual incident with this vision in mind. As educators, we hear a lot about developing an "educational philosophy," but Jerry Lee is one of the few who actually practice what he preaches. It is a privilege and a joy to work for a man who is confident, decisive, and well grounded in solid principles.

Newspapers and television show how many schools are lowering their standards rather than tackling divisive issues and risk confrontations. It takes a strong person to withstand the daily grind of school and still maintain a positive focus on the future. Mr. Lee is such a person. The entire faculty and staff support Mr. Lee, and we are in hopes that you will join us in the unanimous backing of our principal.
