



McDaniel serves as a volunteer in her church, teaching fifth grade Sunday school, and on occasion, teaches preschool as well.



As a custodian. I get to see a lot of what goes on in class and during passing periods. I also get to see how students. behave and react to each other. Sometimes they pass without problems, and


sometimes they react with a little more emotion than normal.


