WE WENT all the way to the jumping off place last month. To "The End," where the road stopped at Key West, FL. There were signs all over the place, like "Mile 0", "90 Miles to Cuba", "Don't Go Any Further or You'll Be in Deep Water" and "The Southernmost Point in the United States."

Okay, so there was no sign about not going any further, but the other signs were for real. It was fairly warm and humid down there, even in February; in June or July it must be miserable.

Everybody in Florida is from somewhere else, mostly Michigan, New York and Ohio, Cuba, and from just about everywhere but Florida. During a month-long visit in which we used up most of our energy and savings, we met only one person who said he was born and raised in Florida.

In Florida they call all those people from the northern states "snowbirds," because they spend two or three months each year in Florida to get away from the snow. I guess they could have called us "sandbirds," because we did miss a few sandstorms while there.

Because we were lonesome for the company of family members and friends back in Tahoka and Lubbock, we came home three days earlier than planned, an unwise decision since we were welcomed back by several days of bad weather.

Where we stayed was in an area surrounded by several houses of Michigan people, and they were all really nice, although, as I told them, "Y'all sure do tawk funny."

A few days after we arrived at our quarters near Daytona Beach, they had the Daytona 500 race, a really big deal which we didn't attend, because driving on the interstates all the way to Florida was enough racing for me.

And just before we left we caught the tail end of motorcycle rally week or whatever they call it, in Daytona. There were hundreds of thousands of motorcycles in Daytona, and we saw (and heard) them in incredible numbers. All the motorcyclists, mostly on Harleys, had beards. Some looked like nice folks while others looked like they just arrived from outer space. But they all had beards.

That's part of the reason my wife and I sold our cycles a few years ago. She didn't want to grow a beard.

We visited a lot of nice places, including Universal Studios. Kennedy Space Center, the World Golf Center, Alligator farm and a Chevrolet dealership where they changed the oil in our van for just \$9.95.



Lynn County Commissioners voted Monday to switch local telephone service from Valor to Poka Lambro at the Lynn County Courthouse, but to leave the 998-prefix for all courthouse numbers for an unspecified amount of time. Commissioners reached the decision after hearing a presentation from Sid Applin, representing Poka Lambro.

In other business, Justice of the Peace Wayne Noland met with the court to inform them of a memorandum he received from the Texas Justice Court Training Center regarding the Justice Court Technology Fund Fee. Due to pending litigation in Travis County, commissioners voted to continue collecting the fee but to hold all funds pending resolution of the litigation and release of an Attorney General Opinion.



South Plains IPM Projects Funded By Texas Department of Agriculture

Seven Integrated Pest Manage ment (IPM) research projects conceived by Texas A&M scientists and Extension agents working on the South Plains recently received more than \$70,000 in grants from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs said the agency funded 26 such projects statewide with \$300,000 in grant monies.

"This year's grants will help fund research projects that affect a wide spectrum of crops grown across Texas — from traditional commodities such as cotton, corn and grain sorghum, to alternative crops such as sunflowers," Combs said, "Texas producers welcome IPM techniques that can help them reduce their production costs by using less pesticides and other inputs.

TAAS scores improve with better accountability for schools: report

COLLEGE STATION - Students' test scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) are improving and research by the Private Enterprise Research Center (PERC) at Texas A&M University suggests that the state's accountability system is the reason.

Student improvement on the TAAS may have more to do with schools and districts being held accountable than with availability of resources and per capita expenditures, says PERC Research Fel-

low Donald Deere. "Increases in the typical measures of school resources such as the student-toteacher ratio and teacher salaries cannot explain the pattern of passing rate increases across schools over time," he says. "Instead much of the explanation appears to rest with schools responding to the incentives of the accountability system."

Deere and Economics Professor Wayne Strayer, examining the state accountability system and TAAS test results for 1994-1999, found that between these years the fraction of students passing each test and the number of schools and districts receiving improved accountability ratings increased.

"The high visibility of the TAAS tests and associated accountability ratings have placed increasing pressure on district and school administrators and on teachers to achieve TAAS success," Deere says.

Local Residents Donate Cell Phones To Aid Victims Of Domestic Violence

Lynn County residents donated more than two dozen cell phones to help victims of domestic violence, through a campaign spearheaded by Nelda Laney, wife of State Rep. Pete Laney. A collection point was set up at the Lynn County News during the past two months, where local residents brought their extra unwanted cell phones for the program.

Mary Russell, of Covenant School of Nursing in Lubbock, collected three large containers of the phones at the News Office Wednesday morning, noting that the project has had wonderful response in all areas of the South Plains, where more than 1500 phones have been collected.

"The phones are all being sent to a Motorola factory in Minnesota where they are stripped and refurbished, then returned to the South Plains, where locally they will be activated with two numbers, the 9-1-1 emergency number and one other number, probably a local crisis line." explained Ms. Russell.

Motorola, Cingular and Fed-Ex are corporate sponsors for the project. donating shipping costs, refurbishing, and cellular service to activate the phones for use by victims of abuse. The Lubbock Covenant School of Nursing and Covenant Student Nurses Association organized port as well," she added.

"The goal of the program is to provide safety, not a cell phone for normal use," Ms. Russell explained. "The phones will be provided through Women's Protective Services and the Hale County Crisis Center to victims of abuse, so that these persons may have a 'safety line' to get help quickly when needed," she said.

The phones are programmed to be used only for the two emergency numbers provided, with all previous information and numbers stripped from the phones when they are refurbished. Those who receive the phones do not pay any monthly ser-

Mrs. Laney, after a successful drive in Austin that netted more than . 10,000 cell phones for crisis centers in that area, joined with the Covenant School of Nursing in Lubbock to provide cell phones in this area.

"We are very appreciative of all the help and support Mrs. Laney gave to this project - she just gave immeasurable support and energy, and brought wonderful attention to this unique program," said Ms. Russell; "We appreciate the citizens of Lynn County for their generosity and sup-




