

City Extends Loan Period To Pay Off Fire Trucks

Eight years ago the city negotiated an 8-year loan for the purchase of fire trucks for the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department, with monthly payments part by donations made to the city through the \$3 donation added to city renewed annually with variable interest, and due to an increase in interest rates over the 8-year loan period, the loan which would have been paid off this month has been extended to 11 more months, which council members approved.

"We still owe nearly \$20,000 on the note, all due to the interest which has accumulated over and above our payments which stayed the same throughout the note period," City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News. "The city still receives about \$1900 a month in donations through the \$3 donation on water cards, and that is what pays the note - our citizens have been very generous and supportive of our volunteer fire department, and it is very much appre-

O'Donnell High School's Colt Lee, Coach Read Earn Post-Season Honors

Following one of the best basketball seasons in O'Donnell High School's history, the post-season honors just keep coming.

Senior forward Colt Lee has been named to the 2001-2002 Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's All-South Plains Super Team and was named the A-J Player of the Year for 1A Di-

Mike Read, in his second year as coach, led the team to a 26-2 record and the bi-district championship and was named the A-J Coach of the Year

for 1A Division I. The 6'2" Lee averaged 19 points, 7.5 rebounds and eight assists per game. The son of Doyle Lee of Tahoka and Susan Lee of O'Donnell, Colt has been contacted by several universities hoping to lure him to their basketball programs next sea-

Read, who has been the principal at OHS since 1998, was thrust into the role of basketball coach when the former coach resigned after the first game of the 2000-2001 season. It is clearly a position he thrives in. and hopes to continue. With a first season mark of 25-5, along with this year's successful season, Eagle fans hope Read continues to juggle his coaching and administrative duties.

Lee and Read weren't the only Eagles honored by the Avalanche-Journal for their basketball skills. Casey Gandy, a senior, and Taylor Read, a junior, were named to the boys A-J All-South Plains Honorable Mention Team.

Senior Jenae Willis and junior Ashley Morales were named Honorable Mention on the girls team.

Primary Runoff Elections Set On Tuesday

Runoff elections for the Democratic and Republican Primaries will be held Tuesday, April 9, with early voting ending this Friday. Both early voting and election day voting will be held at the Lynn County Clerk's Office at the county courthouse.

The Democratic Primary Runoff is between Ron Kirk and Victor Morales for U.S. Senator.

In the Republican Primary there are four races with runoffs, for one Supreme Court Justice and three Judges for the Court of Criminal Appeals. Elizabeth Ray faces Dale Wainwright for Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2: Tom Price and Tim Taft are in a runoff for Judge. Court of Criminal Appeals Place 1: David Richards faces Paul Womack for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 2; and Cathy Cochran and Guy Williams are in a runoff for Judge.

Court of Criminal Appeals Place 3. According to the county clerk, any registered voter may vote in the runoff elections. However, if you voted in the Democratic Primary, you may only vote in the Democratic Primary runoff, with the same rules applying to the Republic Primary elections. For those who did not vote in either primary, they may vote in the primary runoff of their choice.



She died Wednesday, March 27, 2002 in Plainview.



Lynn County Hospital District directors last Wednesday evening discussed issues related to the hospital and Lynnwood'Assisted Living Center and also were updated on critical problems facing all hospitals in relation to rising costs, new legislation and a nationwide shortage of trained medical workers.

Administrator Dan Powers addressed these concerns and also reported on the progress of plans to build a physical fitness center. Those plans are on hold until some response is received on applications for grants to pay for the project.

The board voted to seek bids on a fire sprinkler system for the hospital. A grant has been approved which should pay for the system. Powers

Powers reported that a computerized system of billing now being used for lab work soon will be expanded to include billing for charges on all areas of hospital service.

He also noted that Lynnwood has five residents and that others have expressed interest in moving to the new facility, which offers apartments for residents who need some help in daily activities or who need no help other than daily meals, cleaning services and reminders of when to take medication.

Powers discussed information from the American Hospital Assn. regarding increases in premiums for employees' insurance, cuts in the amounts paid to hospitals by Medicaid and the shortage of skilled workers, including nurses, medical technicians and pharmacists. The report said that 13 percent of RN positions went unfilled last year.

Billy Tomlinson presided at the meeting. Others present included board members Joan Knox, Peggy Morton, Virginia Griffing and Dalton Wood. Absent were Jerry Ford and Mike Rivas.

Q: I am having problems with my credit card company. I send in my payments well ahead of the deadline, but they post payment as late and charge a late fee. Now they have raised my interest rate because my payment has been late too many times. I have called to protest the fees and the rate increase, but they won't do anything. Can you help?

A: The Consumer Protection Division of my office receives a number of complaints each month about credit card companies. There are several avenues available to you. First, you can file a complaint with my Consumer Protection Division. Our analysts will review your complaint and determine if it is appropriate for our dispute resolution service. If it is, we will contact the company with your complaint and ask them to respond.

Please keep in mind, however, that our service is there to facilitate a resolution. We cannot act as your attorney or take your side in the dispute. Most of the complaints we receive are resolved successfully in this process.

If the credit card was issued by a national bank, you can also contact the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, which oversees national banks. That office may also be able to provide some assistance.

Credit card companies are required by law to credit your account the day a payment is received. There are exceptions, however, if the payment is not submitted according to the creditor's requirements. To make sure your payment is credited appropriately, make sure to follow the company's mailing instructions. Payments that are sent to the wrong address, even if it is an address for the company, can cause delays.





TDH Maintaining System Readiness For Bioterrorist Act

Chemicals or microorganisms turned into weapons at the hands of terrorists is a picture many people have not had or did not want to imagine until recently. Following the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, this scenario has many people asking, "Who or day, what is going to protect me and may

State Epidemiologist Dennis Perrotta at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) says many answers lie in a strong and flexible public health system at local, state and national

"Knowing about and responding to a virus or a bacterial agent that is affecting people is the nature of public health," Perrotta said. "Whether the infection is naturally occurring or the result of a terrorist act, TDH and other public health agencies are trained to react quickly. That's what public health professionals do every

The key is rapid detection of unusual occurrences, he said.

"The sooner we identify any disease outbreak, the quicker we can bring together local, state and federal resources and the more lives we will save. We stay in touch with doctors and other health care providers. monitoring their reports and investigating unusual occurrences," Perrotta said. "We make sure that prevention and control measures are in place."

Teams at TDH have been working on bioterrorism response for several years, according to Perrotta. "We coordinate with federal agencies and help develop response plans with local communities across the state. Preparedness and coordination are crucial."

"Chemical attacks cause injuries almost immediately and will elicit an immediate emergency response," he said. But bioterrorism is more complex because it can be done without much, if any, notice. The first clues to a biological agent release may be sick people who seek medical care days or weeks later, perhaps in different cities.

"In response to bioterrorism, as with any other epidemic, public health plays a critical role," he added.

After the events of Sept. 11, TDH issued an alert to doctors, hospitals and other health care professionals around the state, reminding them to be especially watchful for suspicious symptoms and infections and to immediately report these to the local or state health department, 24 hours a

Following are some frequently asked questions that TDH has received recently and the answers about bioterrorism:

· What is bioterrorism?

Bioterrorism is the dispensing of disease microbes by individuals, groups or governments for the express purpose of causing harm for ideological, political or financial

· What are the chances that a bioterrorist attack will occur in my

No one really knows the chances, so it is important for cities, counties and the state to have plans in place to respond quickly. There is no need for panic, but is wise to be prepared.

· How many bacteria and chemicals agents do I have have to worry

Among the myriad chemicals and microbes from which to choose, only a few dozen agents are likely candidates. Fortunately, spreading them to cause maximum exposure and injury or illness is not a simple task.

· What about smallpox? Is there a vaccine I can get for me and my

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

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

Water District Begins Cloud Seeding Program

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is beginning its sixth year of the precipitation enhancement program. From April 1 to Sept. 15 the Water District will use airplanes to dispense silver iodide into suitable cloud systems to help increase the amount of rainfall on the High Plains.

"Precipitation enhancement is an attempt to stimulate clouds to generate more rainfall than they would otherwise by adding silver iodide as a seeding agent. The silver iodide provides additional nuclei that can allow more cloud moisture to be converted to large enough raindrops to survive the fall through the dry sub-cloud layer and reach the ground as meaningful rainfall," Beer said.

To analyze the effectiveness of the program, the Water District enlisted the help of Drs. Bill Woodley and Daniel Rosenfeld, two independent weather consultants with worldwide respect in the weather community. Drs. Woodley and Rosenfeld compared radar images of "seeded" and "non-seeded" clouds using elaborate computer software to match thousands of lines of data from these clouds.

Variables such as rain rate, rain volume and lifetime of the storm were all analyzed. When the scientists found two similar clouds, they compared the amount of rainfall that came out of the seeded cloud to the rainfall from the non-seeded cloud.

"The bottom line of Dr. Woodley's evaluation is a conservative estimate of \$30,293,600 benefit to the region. Comparing the cost of the program to this estimate resulted in a benefit-to-cost ratio of 17:1. We expect this benefit-to-cost ratio to increase since program expenses have decreased since 1999 and 2000. The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District continually assesses its program procedures to enhance effectiveness," said Beer.

The benefit to the High Plains of Texas comes from using less water from the Ogallala aquifer. Although the enhancement cannot make clouds, it can enhance what is available in the sky. Because of drought for the past few years, there have not been many clouds available to seed.

Precipitation enhancement is just one tool the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District uses in its long term goal of water management.

New Legislation Offers Tax Relief To Farmers

Executive Director for the Texas Farm Service Agency, there is new legislation that offers immediate tax relief through additional depreciation on farm equipment and property.

The most significant provision for farmers is a thirty percent additional first-year depreciation allowance. Signed into law by President Bush on March 9, the Job Creation and Worker Assistance Act of 2002 is retroactive to 2001 allowing capital investments from the previous year to be depreciated.

Under current law, farmers and other small businesses can immediately deduct up to \$24,000 of the cost of investment in qualifying machinery and equipment. This is scheduled to increase to \$25,000 by 2003. The remaining amount is depreciated under the Modified Accelerated Cost Recovery System (MACRS).

In addition to the existing expensing provision, the Act provides and additional first-year depreciation deduction equal to 30 percent of qualified property for investments made after Sept. 20, 2001 and before Sept. 11, 2004. Most depreciable farm property would be considered qualifying property, including farm machinery and equipment, crop storage facilities and single purpose agricultural and horticultural structures.

Since the provision is retroactive to 2001, farmers can immediately benefit from the change on their 2001 returns although they may need to file an amended return. For 2002, the amount of farm capital investment that could be written off is estimated \$1.8 billion as a result of this provision. This should reduce Federal in-

According to John Fuston, State come and self-employment taxes paid by farmers by over \$500 million. Annual tax savings in 2003 and 2004 are expected to be only slightly smaller at just under \$500 million per

To illustrate the potential benefits of this legislation assume that after Sept. 10, 2001, a farmer purchases a combine that costs \$100,000. The farmer would be able to expense \$24,000 under the section 179 expensing election. Under the new law, the farmer would then be allowed an additional first-year depreciation deduction of \$22,800, which is equal to 30% of the remaining cost (basis) of \$76,000 (\$100,000-\$24-000). Finally the remaining cost (basis) of \$53,200 (\$76,000-\$22,800) could be depreciated under the current depre-

This would permit an additional depreciation deduction of \$7,980. Thus, the farmer would be able to deduct a total of \$54,780 if the \$100,000 investment in the first year. This is an increase of \$19,380 as a result of the 30% additional first-year depreciation provision. Assuming the farmer is in the 15% Federal marginal income tax bracket, the Federal income and self-employment tax savings would equal \$5,400.

Fuston said, "Although this is not a farm program, our agency administers many programs to support farm income and we want to make sure that farmers are aware of this legislation so that they can take advantage of the tax savings." Fuston added that farmers should consult with their to increase by about 15 percent or accountant to discuss the application of the new legislation to their individual situation.



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

What would you do if your child asked for a goat?

You could look into 4-H, where kids can learn about raising everything from rabbits to steers. For many children, 4-H (the four are head, heart, hands and health) animal projects can be some of the most educational and rewarding experiences in life, but there are important factors you and your children should thoughtfully consider before taking

"Raising animals in 4-H almost always requires a commitment from the entire family, but it is a great way for parents and children to spend time together," said Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, a professor and extension swine veterinarian in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

"The three main considerations should be time, money and space." Whether they choose small or large, caring for an animal of any

kind requires time. "Children should understand that every animal must be fed, watered and cleaned up after usually twice a day. Keep in mind that some animals, like rabbits and chickens, can be kept in the back yard while larger animals are usually housed some distance away, which can substantially lengthen the daily time commit-

ment," said Lawhorn. Before purchasing an animal, discuss the project's financial obligations with a veterinarian, your County Extension agent or anyone who has raised animals, particularly the type of animal you are considering. Costs will include the purchase price, veterinary care, feeding, housing and transportation of the animalembark on a 4-H animal project," said Lawhorn, "you can know that you are helping your child develop practical skills they will carry with him or her all through life."

SUBJECT: QUARTERLY FLUORIDE NOTIFICATION

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has notified the City of Wilson water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL for Fluoride at 4mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 3.8 MG/L.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in the developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you. The City of Wilson has inquired about getting an Reverse Osmosis plant to deal with this problem and without the help from grants this system has been too costly to put in at this time. The City is also looking for alternative water supply sources.
