Hancock, Solorzano Play In All Star Game

Recent Tahoka graduates Blandon Hancock and Stephen Solorzano were selected by the newly formed Greater West Texas Baseball Coaches Association to play in their first annual All Star Game on Sunday, June 2 at Hays Field on the LCU Campus in Lubbock.

The All Stars, made up of players from 3A, 2A and 1A teams, were divided into North and South teams (schools north and south of Lubbock), with the South All Stars winning 15-12. Hancock and Solorzano were members of the winning team.

Hancock, son of Alecia and Eddie Hancock, played centerfield. He hit a double and a triple during the game to bring home five runs.

Solorzano, son of Diana and Roy Solorzano, played second base. He hit a single and walked.

The two helped lead the Tahoka Bulldogs to a 19-13 record before falling to Holliday in regional semi final action this past season.

Four THS Band Members Win Gold At State Contest

Four musicians from the Tahoka High School Band brought home the gold from state competition recently, capping off a year of award-winning events for the 50+ member band who has steadily improved under the leadership of director Carroll Rhodes in the past several years.

At the Texas State Solo and Ensemble Contest in San Marcos on Monday, May 27, the four state qualifiers from the THS Band, sophomore Crista Amador on flute and the clarinet trio of juniors Solana Aguero, Kristy Alvarez, and Jeanine Wilson all earned "Superior's" or First Divisions on their respective pieces.

To qualify to go to State a person must earn a "1" at Region on a class I solo or ensemble. In addition all solos must be memorized. At State approximately 40% earn III's or

lower, 40 to 45% earn II's, with 10 to 15% earning I's.

"This is the third year for the clarinet trio to advance to State and their first '1' and it was on an extremely difficult, contemporary piece," said Rhodes. "The judge even commented on the level of difficulty," he added.

Crista Amador, who was accompanied on the piano by Cheryl Clopton of O'Donnell, earned the first Superior by a Tahoka sophomore at State in over ten years, if not longer.

"To say that I am proud of these outstanding young ladies would be an understatement. They have put in hours upon hours of practice to advance to this level of competition and definitely deserve the recognition," said Rhodes.

Medical Problem May Have Caused Child's Death

The death of 4-year-old Alexandria Ramirez of Wilson possibly could be from medical causes, a Lynn County deputy investigating the case said Tuesday.

There was no evidence of trauma revealed by an autopsy, said lead investigator Miguel Reyna, who added that foul play has been ruled out at this time. Results of a toxicology test will not be available for a week or more, he said.

The daughter of David Ramirez Jr. and Lee Ann Garcia, both of Wilson, was found dead outside the home of her grandmother in New Home Saturday afternoon. She and her sister had lived with their grandmother since they were babies, according to the child's mother.

A Lubbock police report said the

grandmother was outside the home playing with the girls on a Slip and Slide water game. The grandmother went inside briefly and the other girl came in to say, "Grandma, Alex don't want to wake up." The grandmother ran outside to find the child lying on her back near a red wagon.

She took the child inside and performed resuscitation until officers and medical personnel arrived.

Reyna said "we will leave it to the professionals" to determine whether the child had a medical problem.

Two 18-wheeler trucks were involved in accidents north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 during a rainstorm Tuesday night. One of the accidents was compounded after a late model Pontiac Sunfire slammed into the jackknifed truck about five miles north, injuring two persons in the car. The older couple in the car headed south were taken to Lynn County Hospital by EMS ambulance, where they were treated for injuries not believed serious, although Tahoka Fire Dept. workers had to use the Jaws of Life to free the passengers.

Names of the truck drivers and the couple in the car were not available Wednesday morning, although the couple reportedly were from Andrews.

There were no injuries in the earlier jackknifing of a truck about 13 miles north of Tahoka. Officers were at the scene for awhile because the truck contained hazardous material. Reportedly none of the containers of chemical insecticide ruptured.

Police took a report from Carolyn Serrato of Tahoka who said a young woman took compact discs and video accessories valued at \$620 from her home in April.

About \$18 in cash was stolen from a 1999 Chevrolet pickup parked on Main St. downtown Saturday, and owned by Derek Daniel Stephens of Tahoka.

A warrant was issued for the arrest of a 31-year-old Tahoka man accused of striking his wife with his fist Sunday.

During the month of May dispatchers processed 242 phone calls, including 119 for the county, 101 for the City of Tahoka, 11 for the City of O'Donnell, nine for ambulances and two fire calls.

Jailed during the last week were two persons for driving while intoxicated, first offense, with one of these also facing a charge of subsequent failure to show liability insurance, one on a warrant for theft over \$50, one for simple assault and one for no drivers license plus no insurance.

Commissioners Approve Bid

Lynn County Commissioners met in routine session Friday morning. The group opened the one bid submitted for a maintainer for Precinct 2, submitted by Warren Cat. The bid was accepted of a trade difference of \$38,500, and approved unanimously.

Bonds were approved for several Lynn County officials, and monthly bills were approved. Judge J.F. Brandon gave commissioners a letter from the attorney's firm of Crenshaw, Dupree and Milam regarding litigation between the county and the surviving family of Francisco Montalvo, but no comments or action was made on the letter.

In order to clarify a recent news story which aired on a Lubbock television station, Poka Lambro officials would like to reassure customers that they are not closing their doors. Poka Lambro is, in fact, in very sound financial shape and remains clearly committed to their customers and the communities they serve, according to David McEndree, General Manager and CEO.

In regards to the news coverage, Poka Lambro PCS, Inc. did, in fact, sell their PCS licenses and related assets to Southwest Wireless, LLC over a year ago. At that time, Poka Lambro PCS, Inc. entered into a management agreement with the new owners — Southwest Wireless, LLC, to continue managing the sold assets under the direction of Southwest Wireless. Under the terms of the agreement, Southwest Wireless, LLC

assumed the trade name "Poka Lambro Wireless," which has been used to market PCS service in Lubbock, Midland, Odessa and Big Spring. On May 30, 2002, Southwest Wireless, LLC, dba Poka Lambro Wireless, issued a letter announcing the discontinuation of local wireless service in these cities.

The sale of Poka Lambro's PCS licenses will have absolutely no effect on the operations of Poka Lambro Telephone Cooperative, Inc. or any of its affiliate companies, including Poka Lambro Telecommunications, LTD dba Digital Cellular of Texas, Poka Lambro Telephone Company, Poka Lambro Fiber, Inc., POKA-DOT-COM, or Poka Lambro Communications.

"Poka Lambro plans to continue their 50+ year tradition of providing quality, state-of-the-art telecommunications services in West Texas," said McEndree. Poka Lambro Telephone Company has recently expanded by building new facilities in Tahoka to provide the residents there with a choice in local phone service providers.

"Digital Cellular of Texas just completed a conversion of its equipment to an updated technology. Several new cellular towers have been added with additional towers currently under construction. The staff is continually working to provide the best coverage and the best value possible for its customers." McEndree added.

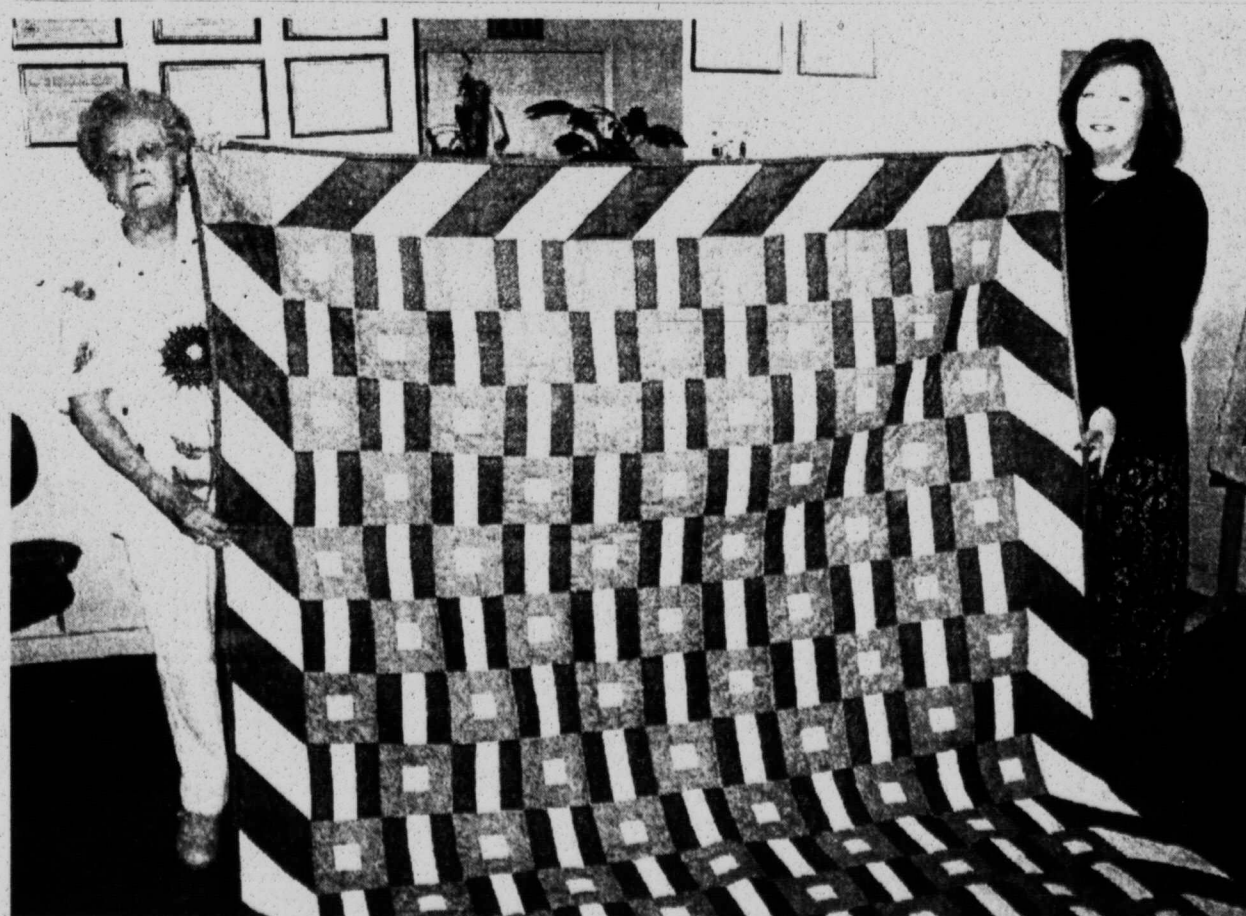

WOODWORK by Dalton

I PROMISED (threatened, implied) that this week I would write about yurts, which I had never heard of until a story appeared in the Lubbock A-J two weeks ago, saying how they have them in several places in the U.S., but maybe mainly in Oregon and Colorado.

Since I mentioned yurts as new to me, several people said they knew all about them, because they had one set up in the mall, or at the South Plains Fair (a couple of places I try to stay away from).

Anyway, a yurt, which somehow sounds like a growth which needs to be surgically removed, is actually a sort of house, or tent, or shelter. The story described them as "canvas-covered circular shelters, fashioned after those created by Mongolian nomads."

I've been to Lubbock lots of times, and to Dallas twice, but I've never seen any yurts. Or Mongolian nomads, for that matter.

Anyway, these shelters are being set up and offered for rent to vacationers in the Colorado State Forest, and Oregon started out with two yurts in a state park about 10 years ago. They are seen as options for vacationers looking for inexpensive ways of staying in the great outdoors.

"They're economical and you can take your whole family," said one Colorado State Forest official. "It's very cozy at night, and you can look up through the dome and see the stars."

Typically, said the story, yurts are built of canvas and wood, have a dome skylight, stove and beds. Supposedly they sleep half a dozen people for a total of less than \$100 a night for all. In Oregon, though, there are 177 yurts available this summer, in 19 parks, and most cost less than \$30 a night and sleep up to five. "They are popular with people who don't have RVs and don't want to go to the trouble of pitching a tent," said an Oregon official.

They usually are booked up long before summer, the story said. It's amazing how many people want to act like Mongolians.

A MINISTER in Tahoka mentioned from the pulpit two Sundays ago that he had been reading a magazine called *Charisma*. This sounded a little out of season to me. Santa Claus won't be around for about seven months. But Merry Charisma to you, too.

No Funding Yet For Proposed Fitness Center At Hospital

Rejections from possible sources for grants to fund a new physical fitness center at Lynn County Hospital have brought the hospital to the point of considering a new loan or issuing bonds for the project.

Hospital Administrator Dan Powers advised the governing board last Thursday that there still are some other options for financing the project, and indicated that hospital officials still are determined to build the center. The physical therapy department of the hospital recently moved to a downtown location to have more room for its growing program.

Several months ago, the idea of a separate building for the department was brought up, and many citizens of the community have expressed keen interest in such a facility. The tentative plans for the build-

ing would include a swimming pool, more exercise equipment and not only would house the physical therapy department but also would offer memberships to the general public who could use the equipment and pool.

Estimates of cost of the project already have increased from about \$750,000 to \$1.2 million.

Powers also reported that work has begun on installing a new sprinkler system in the hospital and that new high-speed computer access has been arranged through Poka-Lambro.

After the meeting, the board went to Lynnwood Assisted Living Center where they looked at a newly-furnished room which will be used for temporary care of adults whose families need relief from fulltime caring for a loved one for a day or longer. Daily rates are to be established, and the room also may be used by persons visiting residents when the visitors need to stay overnight or for several days.

Newly-elected hospital board member John Hawthorne was administered the oath of office by Carmen Chapa. Re-elected member Mike Rivas was not present.

Re-elected as president and vice-president of the board Thursday were Billy Tomlinson and Jerry Ford. Virginia Griffing was elected treasurer and Powers was chosen as secretary. Other board members present Thursday were Dalton Wood and Joan Knox.

Rules Listed For Tahoka City Pool

The following information regarding the Tahoka City Pool was provided by Suzanne Baker, on-site supervisor.

"Parents and caregivers, your children want to have fun at the pool. They do not want to worry about things like sunscreen, drinking plenty of water, or making sure they come home with the same towel they went with, etc. Here are a few things that will help make sure they can have fun, but also have a safe time while at the pool.

1. Write their name on everything they will be taking to the pool.
 2. Make them put sunscreen on. Better yet, put it on them at home before you bring them. That way you can make sure to get it on everywhere.
 3. Send plenty to drink and eat or the money to buy drinks and snacks.
 4. Children five and under OR any age who cannot swim well, must be accompanied by an adult.
 5. Read the following rules to your children and make sure they understand that they will be disciplined by a lifeguard when they break them. Examples of discipline may be sitting out, pickup up trash, or leaving the pool early.
- No Running.
 - Shower before entering the pool.
 - No diving in the shallow end.
 - No swimming in the diving area.
 - No pushing people into the pool.

- No rough horseplay.
- No glass containers.
- No eating or drinking in or near the pool.
- No intoxicating beverages.
- No smoking.
- No cursing.
- No pets in the pool area.
- Only one person at a time on the boards or slide.
- No floating aids in the main pool.
- No public display of affection.

The slide has a few rules of its own.

- Maximum weight for the slide is 250 pounds.
- No diving from the slide.
- No head first. Seated front position only.
- Children who cannot swim well must be attended by an adult.

If the weather is cloudy and there are chances of rain and you let your children come swim anyway, there will be no refund for having to leave early due to bad weather conditions. If the weather has been fine and suddenly takes a turn for the worse, they will be given a rain check if the pool has to close before 3:30 p.m.

If getting the most for your money is important to you, check into buying a season pass. The prices are \$50 for individuals, and \$100 per family. The daily admittance is \$2 for all ages.

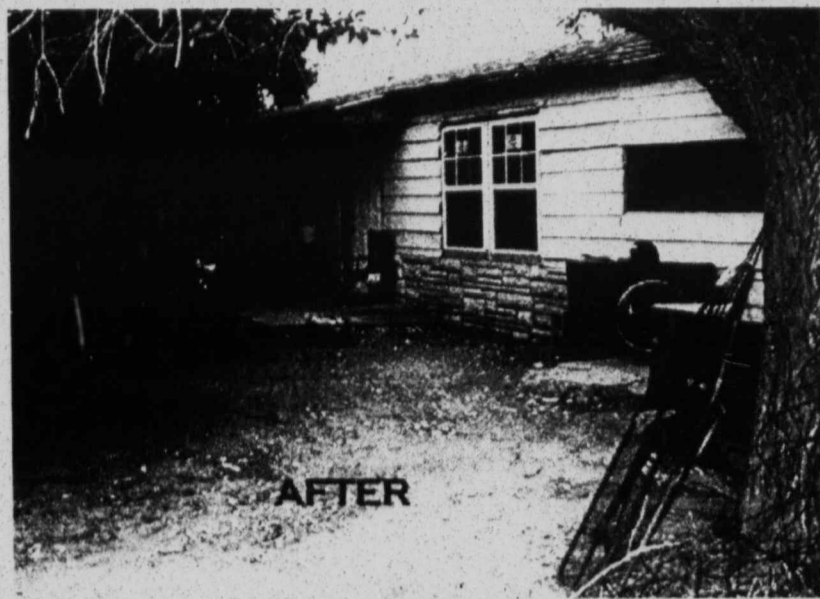

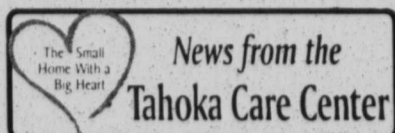

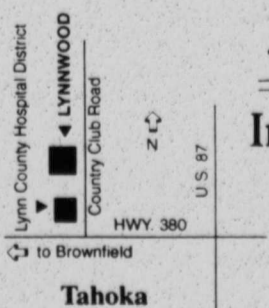
