

Muleshoe High School Principal David Jenkins recognized several track and golf students who advanced beyond district and represented Muleshoe "in a positive way."





> In the end, the Commission opted to accept BEE's cash offer of \$128,700 and the \$195,817 bid from Warren CAT, making the final price tag, once the old motor grader is sold, \$67,117.



City Council passes energy rate resolution

Muleshoe City Council met in regular session Monday, May 8, to discuss several resolutions and honor Muleshoe's water department.

Public Works Director Ramon Sanchez-Mora who brought with him several members of the Public Works Department to receive an award garnered by the water department in the 38th Annual Regional School -Abilene Big Country Drinking Water Contest for best groundwater in the 10,000 and under city population category.

To win, a city must have the purest drinking water sample collected by contest officials.

Mayor Black then welcomed Boy Scout Troop 620 to the proceedings.

After approving minutes of the last meeting, the Council approved a renewed franchise agreement with West Plains Mayor Cliff Black introduced Telecommunications and voted and approved to support the South Plains Hazard Mitigation Action Plan (MAP) which basically serves as the South Plains' definition of "homeland security" if disaster strikes on the South Plains. It also identifies what types of disasters are

likely in this area. According to City Manager David Brunson, signing and supporting the South Plains MAP will keep Bailey County eligible for FEMA money in the event of a disaster.

> Because of GRIP - the Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program - Atmos Energy is currently allowed to "buy any items they "need," from gas lines to big screen televisions," according to Brunson. "All at their discretion."

According to Brunson, passing the resolution set forth by the City will enable the City to set final rates by forcing Atmos to justify their rate increases to the Railroad Commission.

"I believe most of their rate increases won't be found to be warranted," said Brunson. "What the resolution does is tell Atmos we want information to determine if rates are justified.

Both Brunson and the Council feel Atmos is making "a real run" to increase revenue.

The Council also:

- Approved up to \$700 reimbursement for advertising the Cinco de Mayo celebration from the Hotel/Motel Tax fund.

- Approved \$1,619.25 in receipts from the Muleshoe Road Riders from Hotel/Motel Tax funds for the motorcycle rally.

- Passed a motion to accept an investment summary and financial statement for the quarter ending March 31, 2006.

- Heard from Brunson some "good news" regarding health insurance rates projected to not increase next year according to the TML Employee Benefits Pool of Levelland.

- Heard Brunson concerning the purchase of Cebridge Connections by Rapid Communications who have plans to make Muleshoe a regional call center and "improve service."

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

tracts representing 41,154.3 acres in Bailey County have been rejected for extension or re-enrollment by the FSA. There are 100,000 acres that have been rejected in the state of Texas, the 41,154.3 acres in Bailey County are almost half of the rejected acres.

This problem was brought to light in mid January 2006 when the Bailey County FSA Office received a report from rollment. Washington D.C. stating that there were many acres that would not be offered an extension or re-enrollment in CRP.

The Board approved renewing the school's contract with ARAMARK and thanked Thacker for her dedication to the success of the food pro-

gram. Trae McNeill then discussed a preliminary budget for next year which forecasts a possible deficit and sets aside monies for the purchase of a bus and suburban, construction and renovation, special requests such as computers and band instruments. band uniforms and allows for increases in utilities and fuel

costs for next year. Though possibly in a deficit situation, according to McNeill the budget will be helped by moving the cost of summer school and TAKS tutorials to the Federal Fund from the General Fund.

Preliminarily, 76-78 percent

of the total budget appears to be going to salaries next year, while eight percent will be used for contracted services, meaning utilities.

The Board also:

- Heard Superintendent Gene Sheets discuss the new school finance bill which most school boards and Sheets believe is nothing more than a "property tax relief" bill.

"They're not going to put any money into schools, Sheets said. "But they are going to 'allow' us to raise taxes locally at our 'discretion.' So, we'll get killed for it. It's called 'meaningful discretion."

If the new school finance bill passes, school districts can raise taxes up to four cents, then will be required to have elections which will be costly.

- Heard Sheets discuss the possibility of moving the start school date to the end of August due to the influence of the tourism industry and lobbyists.


Through Christ We Can "Get Over Ourselves"

It bothers me about me to realize how long it takes for even the Lord of the universe to get his truth through my thick skull. The problem is not on God's end of the equation; the problem is the thickness of what he's trying to penetrate.

For example, how much clearer could God get the Apostle Paul to put it?

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith-and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-not by works, so that no one can boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9).

Charles Dickens and his description of Jacob Marley, and from Robert Farrar Capon in his description of mortals like you and me, in the matter of accomplishing our own salvation, we are as "dead as doornails." That's what Paul is saying. It seems clear enough. Save ourselves? The very idea! We might as well try to start a nuclear reaction by rubbing two sticks together.

Maybe there's a better way to paraphrase Paul's words and the Holy Spirit's truth from Ephesians 2, but I think what God is telling us is simply this: "Get over yourselves!"

We can make two big mistakes regarding salvation.

Many folks are at least good enough that they make the more honest of the two. Do you? Maybe you look at yourself and think you're so bad you

can't be saved? Phooey! Lots of folks have been worse than you. You're not even all that good at being bad, so get over yourself. And besides that, you never met anybody who hasn't sinned and thus cut himself off forever from "salvation by perfect works." In that regard, we're all in the very same seat in the very same boat. Paul says it more than once in Romans 3-because we're so very thickheaded—"All have sinned!"

Ah, but then there's the less honest of the two really big mistakes: "Yeah, I've sinned, but now I'm religious, and I'm really good at performing all the right rituals just right." (Hmm. Is there a just right?) "Even if I make some mistakes elsewhere and you might or might not be wise to enter into a business deal with me, God's gonna be really impressed that I'm right on religion. That's gotta count for something." (Still counting, are you?)

That's been a very popular approach to pseudo-salvation for years. Check out the Pharisees in the New Testament—or in the 21st century. Jesus has never seemed very impressed by them. When he says, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees," he is saying with fire in his eyes, "Get over yourselves!"

The good news is that God's perfect Son died so that we can indeed get over ourselveshow bad we think we are or how good we think we are—and focus on the only One who is truly good. Then we're set free to serve him with joy. And we'll want to praise him and serve him with others who glory in the God who saves us absolutely, only, and always "by grace through faith."

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





Health fair... Continued from page 1 drinks for \$5.

Health services being provided at the fair will include: blood pressure and blood sugar checks, a medication review by a pharmacist (bring medications in a bag), an "ask the doctor" table, hospital auxiliary concession stand, information for diabetic and cardiac health, information on healthy diets, information on cancer and treatment options, information on hemophilia, mini-massages, and permanent emergency medical record cards for each

attendee. Among other things, the money raised will be earmarked for 10 computers, telephone system, fax machine, copier, digital video camera, VCR, 21" television, camera tripod, 1-2 bed units for practicing skills (includes hospital bed and bedside table), Manikin tracheotomy care and IV arm, suction machine and IV pump.

"The facility will also have to be renovated to fit some unique needs," said Heathington.

"We'll need a nursing lab facility, testing area for students, computer lab area separate from the ITV room."

ITV room items have been purchased and donated by WorkSource of the South Plains.

"WorkSource's total donation is probably more than \$60,000," said Finney. "We believe the other items we need can be purchased for another \$50,000 to \$60,000."

Finney is hoping to qualify for grants to re-carpet the building, make it handicapped accessible and other such projects.

The primary focus of Muleshoe's school of nursing will be on nursing education for licensed vocational nurses (LVNs) to transition to associate degree nurses with the purpose of providing an adequate supply of registered nurses (RNs) for rural hospitals.

"In five years, the need for nurses will be critical," said Heathington. "We can train our own nurses and get some kind of guarantee we'll have highly trained professionals staying in this area."

"The school will be essential to young student mothers who can't travel out of Muleshoe and those who can't afford to drive to school," Heathington added.

"We need the help of the community," added Finney. "We need you to show up at the health fair and show your support. We need the whole community behind this project for the nursing school to be a success."

Tickets for the Gator Giveaway are currently being sold around town and will be available at the fair. Organizers hope to sell 5,000 tickets. Thus far, about 1,500 have been sold.





