Indictments Name Suspects In Murder, Drug Cases Here

Lynn County officers this week arrested the second O'Donnell resident named in drug-related indictments returned by a 106th District Court grand jury last week. A former O'Donnell man now serving a life term in prison on an unrelated burglary charge also was indicted for capital murder in a 1998 death in O'Donnell.

Names of six persons indicted in seven felonies were released last week, but the names of seven others indicted by the grand jury were not released by the district clerk's office. District Clerk Sandra Laws explained that District Judge Carter Schildknecht had ordered that names of persons indicted but not yet arrested on those specific charges not be released to the media.

Names of those seven persons, obtained from other sources, are:

Ladd Lutrick and John Folmer, ages and addresses unknown, for theft of four-wheelers in the county.

Johnie Odell Goad Jr. and Roger Dale Martin, ages and addresses not known, for possession of cocaine.

Ismael Garcia, age and address unknown, possession of cocaine.

Johnny Paul Gonzales, 33, of O'Donnell, manufacture and delivery of a controlled substance. Gonzales was arrested during the last week.

Robert Miller, 33, accused of killing an acquaintance, Reynaldo Banda, 49, in O'Donnell in February 1998. Miller reportedly killed Banda by placing a plastic bag over his head and then dumping the body in a puddle on the street.

Lynn County Budget Hearing Slated Sept. 4

Interested citizens in Lynn County may attend a budget hearing Wednesday, Sept. 4 for the proposed 2003 Lynn County Budget. The hearing will be held at 9 a.m. in the County Judge's office in the Lynn County Courthouse.

Included in the proposal is a three percent salary increase for all elected county employees except for the four county commissioners. No salary increase is proposed for commissioners.

Commissioners voted to increase the county tax rate by 3.4-cents at a recent meeting, from 64.5-cents to 67.909-cents per \$100 of property value.

Written and oral comments about the budget will be accepted at the hearing. A copy of the complete proposed budget is available for inspection in the Lynn County Clerk's Office.

Tahoka Police investigated a report from Margaret Griffin Carter, who lives on Rt. 5, in the Draw area, that someone had driven a vehicle into the side of her 1995 Oldsmobile and left the scene. Damage was estimated at \$500.

Charlie James Strickland of Tahoka reported Wednesday that someone stole the tailgate off his Ford Ranger pickup. The tailgate was valued at \$300.

As of Wednesday, total jail population at Lynn County jail was 31, including six prisoners held for Dawson County. Jailed during the last week were five persons, including the two O'Donnell men on grand jury indictments in drug cases, one on a warrant for no liability insurance plus no seat belt and child under age 2 not restrained. Others were jailed on charges of public intoxication and application to revoke probation on conviction for driving while license suspended.

City's Tax Rate May Remain Same

It won't be official until Sept. 9 when city council members vote on the issue, but the word from City Administrator Jerry Webster is that the City of Tahoka won't be raising property taxes or rates for any city services this year.

Webster told *The News* that in budget talks the council has indicated they are not willing to raise the current tax rate from 68.5-cents, in spite of a loss of approximately \$230,000 in the tax base, mostly from utility decreases according to information from the Lynn County Appraisal District.

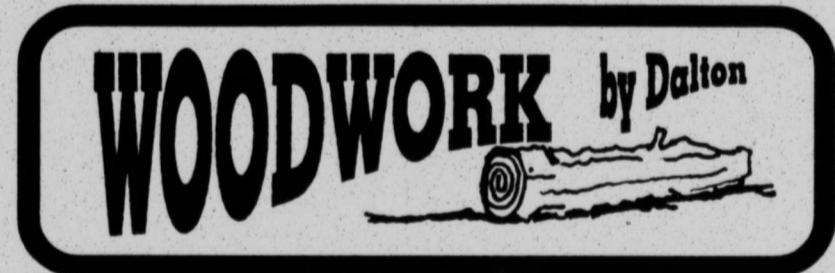
"At this time, the general consensus seems to be that we are not going to raise taxes and we are not considering raising water/sewer/sanitation rates for 2003," Webster said. "We are looking at essentially the same budget as last year, moving some funds around and figuring in employee raises ranging from 1-1/2 to 3 percent to align salaries with the average across the state for cities our size. It looks like we can make this budget work without raising taxes," he added.

According to information from the Lynn County Appraisal District, the effective tax rate for the city is 70.2 cents per \$100 of property value, which would be an increase of slightly more than 1-1/2 cents from the current rate.

The council is expected to vote on the tax rate at their regular meeting on Sept. 9.

Budget and airport issues were discussed at the council's Aug. 19 meeting, and city officials approved a hangar site at T-Bar Airport for Don Chiles, who is going to build a 60'x40' hangar on airport property. Chiles agreed to an annual lease of \$500 paid to the city, and after ten years the hangar will become the property of the airport. No agreement has been reached yet with Glenn Hogg regarding his position as fixed base operator/manager of the airport, Webster reported.

Present at the meeting were Webster and Mayor Mike Mensch, and all city council members, including Jay Dee House, Ray Box, John Chapa Jr., Clara Calvillo and Amy Preston.



THIS IS ALL ABOUT getting high, and how it's not as much fun as it once was.

I'm not talking about drinking or sniffing some weird substance. I'm talking about physically getting a long distance off the ground, as on an airplane or any of several other ways you could get your feet separated from terra firma.

Terra firma means solid ground, I think. What some folks seem to ignore is that the terra is a lot firma if you fall from some point above it.

We used to enjoy flying, and thought nothing about it, taking trips to distant cities and even other countries on occasion. Sure, we had heard about plane crashes, but we'd also heard about flying being the safest way to travel. And you sure get there quicker, if you don't count all those hours going to and from airports and tromping around terminals wondering where your flight or your luggage is.

Life gets more precious as one gets older and realizes he still hasn't done most of the things he intended to do in this lifetime. And while I still will fly to distant cities if time is the main consideration, I now feel uneasy about it, and prefer to drive, if I can.

I am reminded of Jerry Clower's comment that he didn't travel by plane because his Bible didn't guarantee his safety, explaining that "In my Bible, it says 'Low, I am with you always.'"

And humorist Bob Murphy quotes an old East Texan as saying he didn't fly in any airplanes or go on any cruise ships because "I'm not about to do anything that when you stop doing it, you DIE!"

Even lesser heights than going up in an airplane are much scarier than they once were. When I was a teenager, I once climbed the Jacksboro water tower, probably about 100 feet high. The last 20 feet or so was straight up on the ladder, and I was terrified when I looked back down and realized I was actually about four miles from the ground (well, it seemed that far and I was plenty worried, although I couldn't show it with the other guys around close).

I never did climb it again.

In more recent years, I have seen pictures of guys jumping around on girders hundreds of feet above the ground, and I never envied them their jobs. I also have read recently about mountain climbers getting killed and injured, and I'm sorry, folks, but I just can't work up much sympathy for anyone stupid enough to try to climb straight up the side of a mountain.

The same goes for those people who jump off mountains with hang gliders. It looks like fun, sort of, but I don't think that's the wise thing to do, especially by me.

I'll have to think about the merits of that, however. I certainly don't want to jump to a conclusion.

Lynn County Girls Sought For Festival Queen Contest

Lynn County girls in grades 9-12 are being sought for the Lynn County Harvest Festival Queen Contest, to be held during the Festival on Saturday, Sept. 21. The winner will be awarded a \$500 scholarship upon her graduation from high school and registration at a college or vocational school, and all contestants who sell at least 350 tickets will receive \$100 cash from the Harvest Festival Committee.

Queen contestants will sell \$1 chances for a \$1000 getaway vacation package, with the winner drawn the day of the Festival. The winner may choose their destination and time of travel.

Queen contest chairmen are Leah Taylor, 998-5142, and Byron

Norwood, 998-4768. A meeting will be scheduled soon for participants to receive rules and tickets.

Any girl attending high school and living in Lynn County may be a contestant, unless she is married, pregnant or a mother. Candidates must sell 150 tickets to qualify as a finalist. Finalists are interviewed by a panel of judges, usually on the Sunday afternoon preceding the Harvest Festival. Top finalists must respond to a question on stage during the Queen Contest the day of the Festival, with the winner determined by the judges. Three impartial judges from out of town judge contestants on several criteria, including personality, poise, appearance and intelligence.

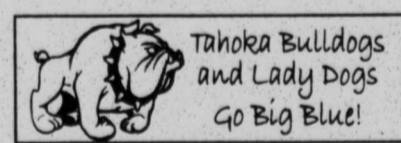
The Queen contest is usually held at 2 p.m. at the Festival.

Reserved Seat Football Tickets Now On Sale

Inform City If Not On City's Sewer System

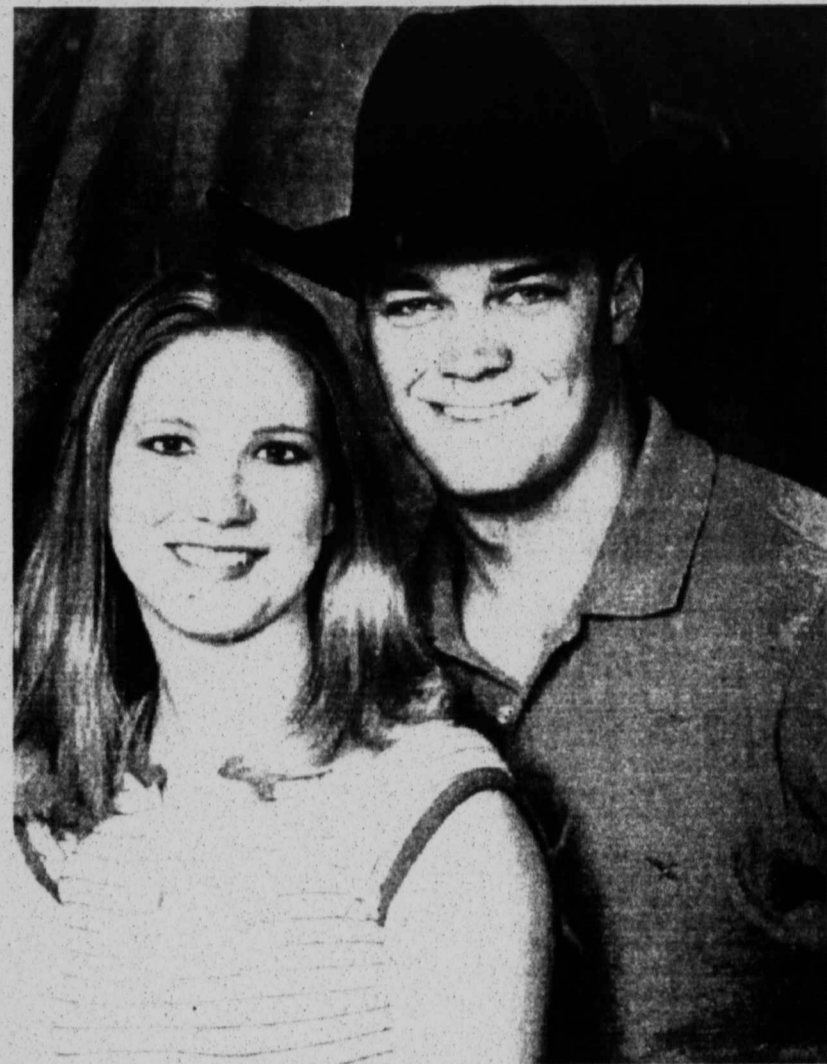
Tahoka citizens who live within city limits are being asked to contact City Hall if their homes are NOT on city sewer systems, City Administrator Jerry Webster said this week.

"We want to know which areas are not on city sewer systems, so we can look at getting grant funding to put in new lift stations to get all areas within the city limits connected to the city sewer system," Webster told *The News*.

He explained that the TCDP grant funding cycle is beginning next month, and one of the areas which is likely to receive funding is for city sewer systems. If citizens will notify City Hall (561-4211) if their home is not on the city sewer system, city officials can get a more exact location of which areas in the city can be considered for the grant project.

"Please call City Hall soon to let us know if you are not on the city's sewer system, as we don't want to miss this grant funding cycle," Webster said.

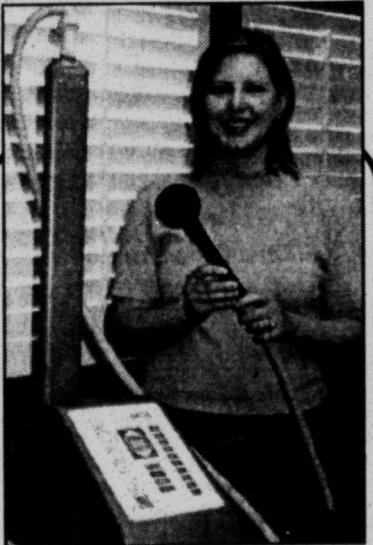

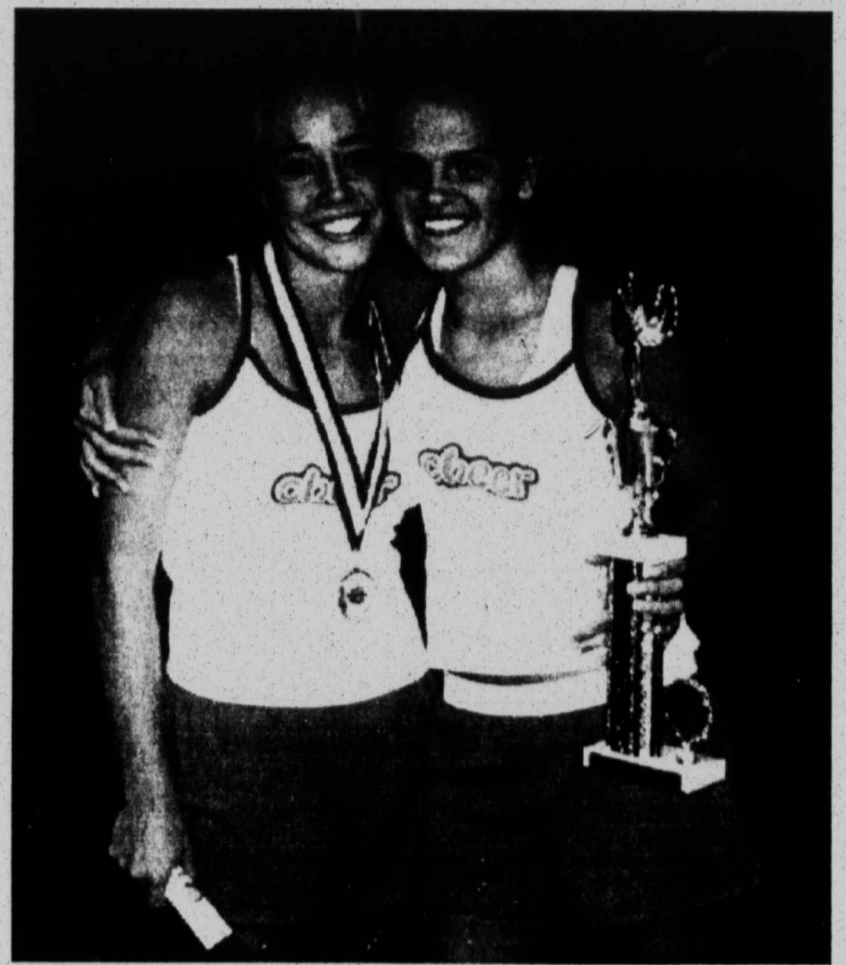
