No Rate Increase In Tahoka City Taxes

City taxes for 2002 will remain the same as last year, with the Tahoka City Council voting unanimously to keep the current tax rate of 68.5 cents per \$100 of property value. The council met in regular session Monday night, approving a \$1.4 million budget for 2002-03 prior to voting on the tax rate.

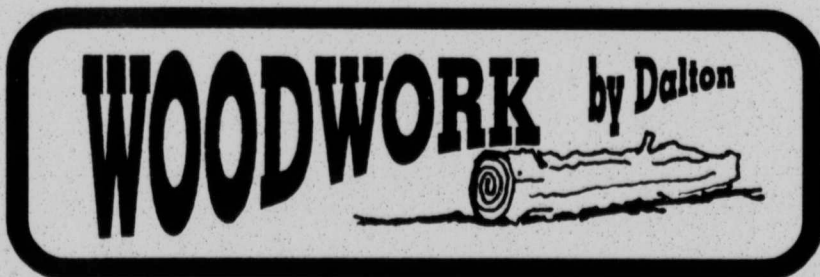
T-Bar Airport was again on the agenda, with council members approving a request from Don Chiles for electricity to his hangar (splitting the cost with the Chiles), and offering a contract to John Baker for usage of an airport hangar after the person who first had an option on the hangar declined. That contract will be considered at a future meeting. The license agreement with Glenn

Hogg for onsite manager was again tabled.

Joe Hays, CPA was engaged as the city's auditor.

City officials considered a request by Abel DeLeon to place speed bumps in the 2200 block of North 4th Street adjacent to Tahoka ISD, and city council members instructed City Administrator Jerry Webster to get cost estimates of placing speed bumps on all streets surrounding the school. The issue was tabled until further information could be obtained.

All council members were present at the meeting, including Jay Dee House, Ray Box, John Chapa Jr., Amy Preston and Clara Calvillo, as well as Mayor Mike Mensch and Webster.

DPS Officer Finds Cash In Fuel Tank

After Dept. of Public Safety Patrolman Jay Druessedow stopped a pickup on U.S. 380 about 15 miles from Tahoka Monday, he and another

officer noticed that one of the vehicle's two fuel tanks apparently had been removed and reinstalled.

After taking the vehicle in, bundles of cash totaling \$147,000 were found inside the tank, and an investigation into the source and purpose of the money is being conducted. The driver, a 30-year-old resident of Moran, AZ, is being held on traffic and other charges. His passenger, a 31-year-old woman from Moran, was not arrested.

Tahoka 'West Cope' Attack Crushes Morton 41-27

Forget about the famed "West Coast" offense so popular in professional football. Tahoka football fans are happy with their new "West Cope offense", a spread attack which new head coach Wes Cope installed, and which so far in two games has produced lots of yards and points.

With QB Brandon McCord, his receivers, and running back Matt Wells doing great behind a good blocking front line, the Bulldogs whopped Morton here last Friday, 41-27, after running up a 35-0 halftime lead and then turning the game over to the second teamers for most of the last half.

This Friday the Bulldogs will make a short run up U.S. 87 to Class AAA Cooper, which lost last week to a strong Lamesa team 29-8.

McCord, who completed 13 of 16 passes for 200 yards and four touchdowns, passed to Adrian Moore 5 yards for the first touchdown, as Tahoka took the opening kickoff and drove 67 yards for the score. Trey Price kicked the point and it was 7-0 with 5:55 left in the quarter, before Morton ever had the ball on offense.

Twenty-two seconds later, Tahoka had another touchdown, as cornerback Warren Baker intercepted a Morton pass and ran it back 37 yards for a touchdown. Price again kicked, to make it 14-0.

Morton made a couple of first downs after that, before the Bulldogs defense, led by linebacker Ben Stroope, halted the drive. Then the Tahoka defense scored again, as Brent Stone recovered a fumble in the Indians end zone after a snap went over the punter's head. The extra

point was no good, and Tahoka led 20-0 at the end of the first period.

Early in the second quarter, McCord and Price teamed up on a 45-yard touchdown pass play, as Price caught the ball in full stride about the 20 and sped into the end zone. After the point was missed, it was 26-0.

The next Bulldog scoring drive went about 80 yards, and featured a 30-yard pass to Michael Nance and a 20-yard run by Wells. Then McCord hit Nance for 10 yards and the score. Price's kick made it 33-0 with 7:14 left in the first half.

Tahoka's second team took over and with sophomore Zach Gutierrez at quarterback, the Dogs drove to the Morton 1 before losing it on downs. This drive followed an interception by Nance and return to the Indians 32. The thrust toward the goal featured a 14-yard run by Gary Gonzales.

After Morton took over at the 1, a holding penalty in the end zone gave Tahoka a safety. Gutierrez ran 21 yards to the Morton 23 as the half ended, 35-0.

In the third, Morton QB Calvin Johnson did most of the damage in a 93-yard scoring drive for the visitors, going 7 to score with 9:30 left. Jose Riverra kicked the point to make it 35-7.

Tahoka came back with an 88-yard drive, with Wells breaking away on a 41-yard run, McCord hitting Moore with passes of 24 and 11 yards, and then finding Baker on a 19-yard scoring strike. The extra point try was blocked. The third quarter ended 41-7.

With most of Tahoka's starters

out of the game, Morton scored 20 points in the last quarter to make the game seem closer than it was. One of the scores was on a 40-yard run by Johnson.

Wells gained 109 yards in just 10 carries, and also caught two passes. Gutierrez completed 2 of 8 passes for 35 yards and rushed 10 times for 59 yards. Gonzales gained 29 yards on 10 carries, and Landon Bartley gained 11 on 7 efforts.

Moore again was the primary receiver, catching six passes for 85 yards and one TD. Price caught 3 for 59 and a touchdown; Nance caught 3 for 65 and a touchdown. Baker had the other TD pass, 24 yards, and also ran back the interception for a score.

McCord was honored by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal this week by being named Class AA Player of the Week on the South Plains. The story Wednesday noted that in two games, McCord already has completed 36 of 52 passes for 432 yards, with no interceptions.

McCord gave much credit to his offensive line and his receivers, and also praised the defense.

And Coach Cope was quoted as saying that the quarterback is even better off the field. "His attitude is just amazing. No matter what is going on, good or bad, he always has a great attitude. He's a great leader for our team."

Commissioners Approve Tax Rate

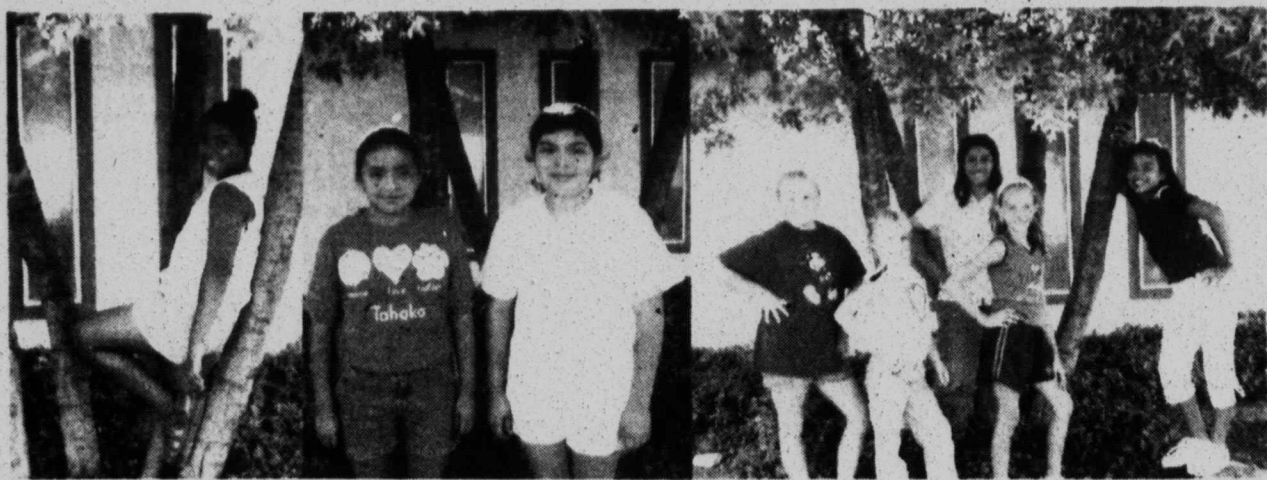
Lynn County Commissioners again approved the county tax rate for 2002 during their regular meeting held Monday morning, approving a 3.4 cent increase from 64.5 cents to 67.909 cents per \$100 of property value. All four commissioners voted unanimously on the issue, which was the first item on the posted agenda for the meeting.

In other business, commissioners decided to take no action for an indefinite time and hold any decisions regarding any proposed improvements to the old jail facilities, after information received indicated mounting expenses in making it habitable for other offices. For now, the building will remain uninhabited.

An agreement with South Plains Association of Government was approved regarding the South Plains Hazard Mitigation Action Plan, which trains emergency response teams in how to handle hazardous materials. SPAG contracts with many South Plains counties to offer the training, it was noted.

Monthly bills were approved as presented.

Present at the meeting were commissioners J.T. Miller, Don Blair, Don Morton and Mike Braddock, with County Judge J.F. Brandon presiding and Judge-Elect H.G. Franklin in attendance.

Library Receives Grant From Tocker Foundation

The City-County Library has been awarded a grant of \$7,039 from the Tocker Foundation for retrospective conversion of the library's holdings. The library received \$20,181 in funding from TIF (Telecommunication Infrastructure Fund) in 2001-2002 for the equipment needed for automation, the Tocker grant will complete the funding needed to automate the library.

"The Tocker Foundation has truly been a friend of the City-County Li-

brary," said Shirley Draper, Director of the library. "They have awarded us support since 1997, when we moved into our new building. The Foundation has funded equipment, shelving, furnishings and collection development and are now assisting with our future goal of automating the library. The Foundation partners with community libraries to meet the particular needs of the community. We thank them for their support and all they have enabled our library to do with their generous donations over the years."

The Tocker Foundation was established in 1964 by Phillip and Olive Tocker as a general philanthropic foundation and to help disadvantaged high school graduates obtain a college education. In 1992 the foundation board decided to focus grant distribution to small rural libraries in Texas, serving a population of 12,000 or less. Grants are distributed to assisting libraries to serve as community information referral centers and provide literacy and bilingual programs.

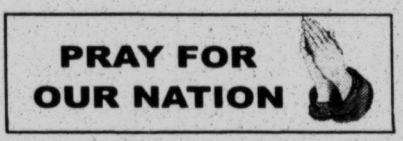

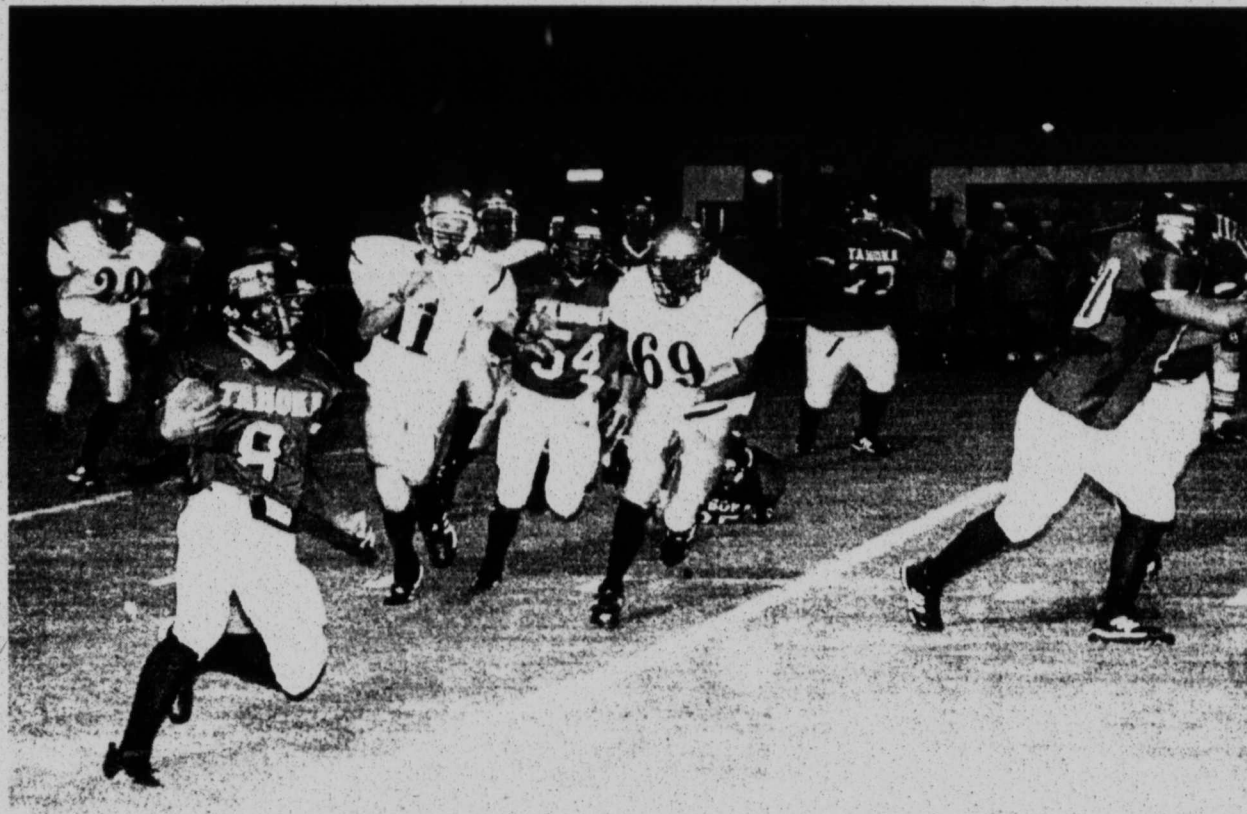

BBB Database Lists 9-11 Charities

It is hard to comprehend that the first anniversary of the terrorist attacks on the United States is being observed. In the aftermath of those terrible hours and days, your Better Business Bureau (BBB) as well as Bureau offices across the nation went into high gear collecting data on hundreds of charitable organizations that were (are) soliciting donations.

"As the anniversary is recognized, donors are seeking to understand how much money, clothing, goods and services were collected and how it was disseminated; they are now asking the charitable organizations to account for what was donated to them," states Nan Campbell, President and CEO of the BBB serving the South Plains of West Texas. "The response to the September 11 attacks was unprecedented, but not totally unexpected because Americans give and they give in many and large ways."

At last count, there were over 470 charities that had a fund raising effort in the wake of the terrorist attacks. The BBB of New York, in cooperation with the Wise Giving Alliance, have analyzed and published a national database of these charities which can be found at BBB New York's website: www.newyork.bbb.org; click on the Disaster Response button.

The BBB New York received information from 270 groups which had a combined total of \$3.018 billion in collections. Since the database includes grant-making organizations, such as the September 11th Fund, as well as groups it has funded, such as Safe Horizon, it is estimated that at least \$400,000,000 reflects duplicate

listing of the total donations. Total dispersed to date is \$1.9 billion. Some of the top groups in order of amount raised are:

- American Red Cross: Liberty Disaster Relief Fund (\$988,000,000 raised; \$590,000,000 dispersed)
- New York Community Trust and United Way of New York City: The September 11th Fund (\$501,000,000 raised; \$301,000,000 dispersed)
- Twin Towers Fund (\$150,632,809 raised; \$141,753,302 dispersed)

"We don't know if what happened on Sept. 11, 2001 was the catalyst, but our BBB office has set a new record in the number of local charity inquiries logged this year. In fact, local charities have the highest number of inquiries over any other type of business in the South Plains," Campbell stated.

Some of the lessons we all learned during this year are that donors need:

- to have realistic expectations about the kinds of needs generated by disaster, as well as about the speed, and ease of meeting them
- to read solicitations carefully
- to ask questions
- to think about what they want their contributions to do and to make their intentions clear

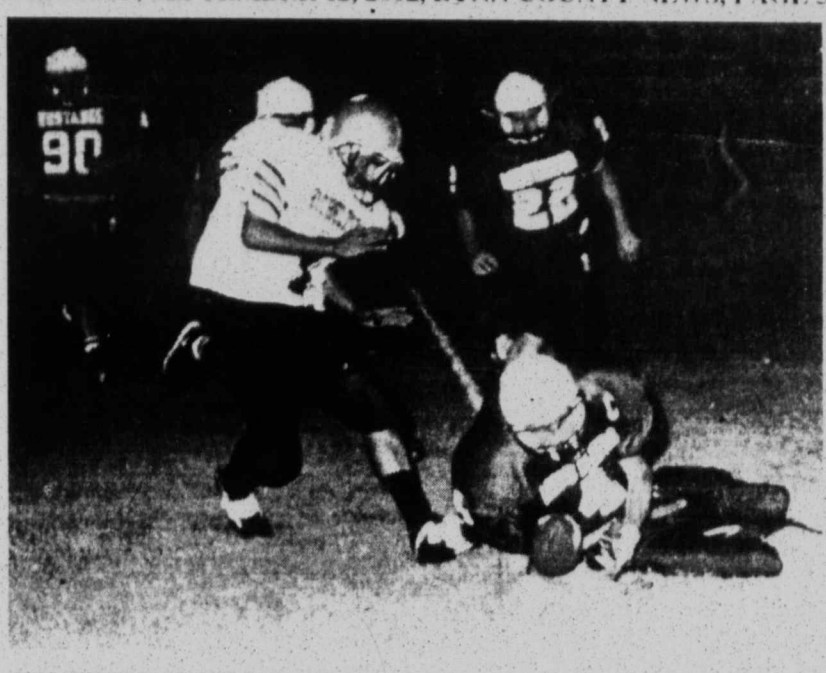

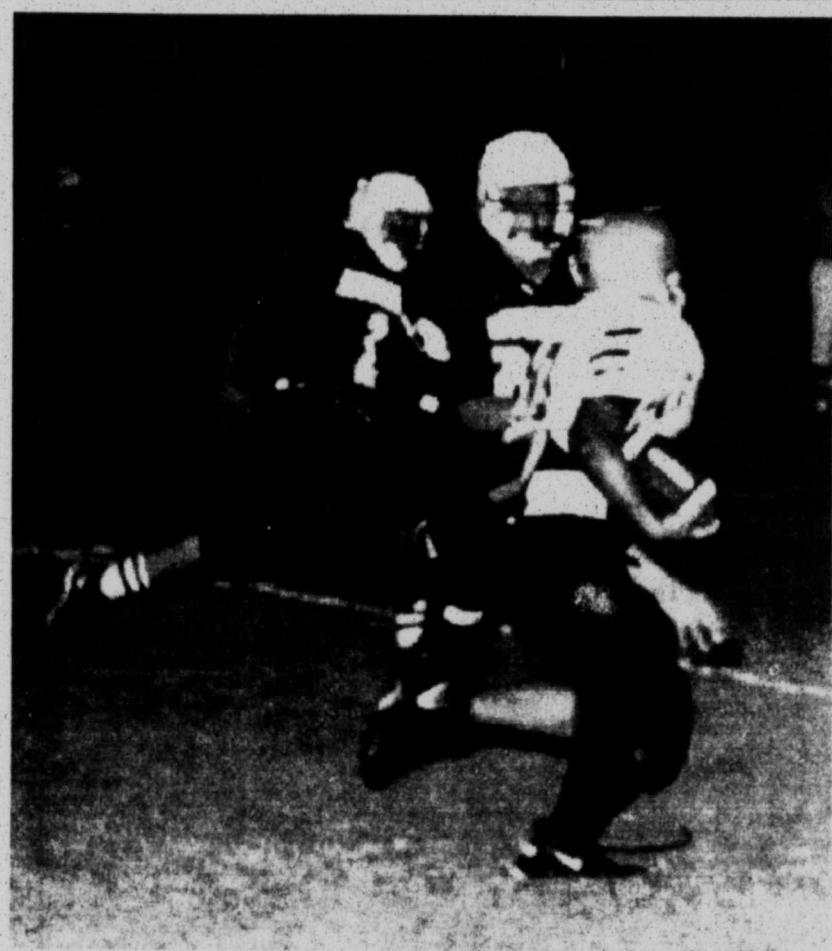

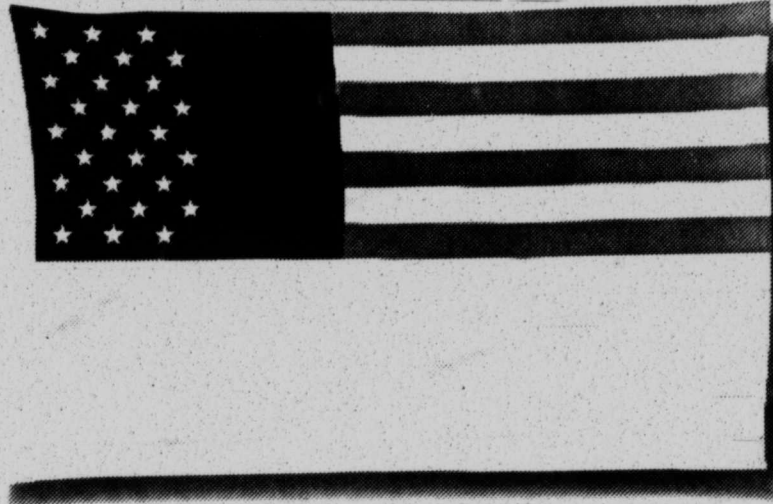

Supervise Children At Football Games

Officials at Tahoka Independent School District issue a plea this week for parents to supervise their children at school football games. The request comes after a young child was injured in an accident during last week's game, while playing with other children off to the side of the football stadium. The child was taken by ambulance to Lynn County Hospital, where the child received several stitches in his head, but is reportedly doing okay.

Children should not play underneath the stadium. Also, children who play unsupervised near the stands run the risk of injury to themselves or passersby. Children should also not play unsupervised at the top of the

stands, where one child was seen last week placing their foot on the top beam with the apparent intent of climbing up on the uppermost railing. Fortunately, a teacher noticed the child and rushed to prevent her from climbing up, preventing almost certain disaster.

"We encourage parents to supervise their children at the games, and to not allow their children to bring footballs or other toys to play underneath or beside the stands," said School Officer Jeff Foster.

"We will confiscate toys and send children back to their parents in order to ensure the safety of these children," he added.

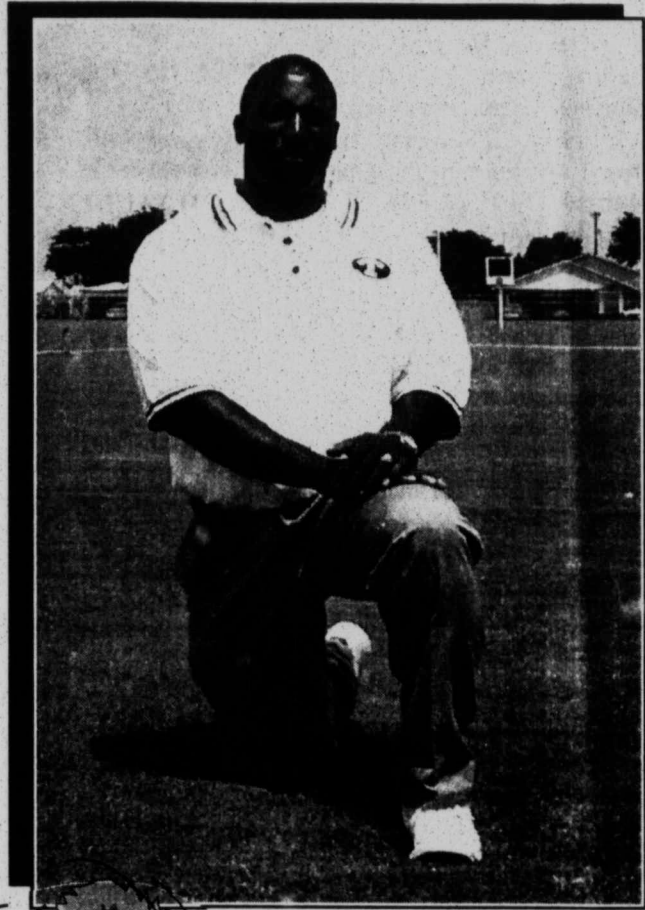

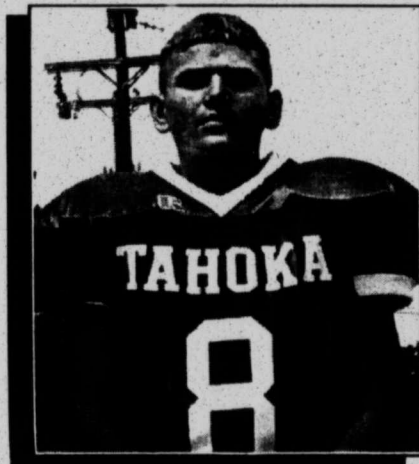

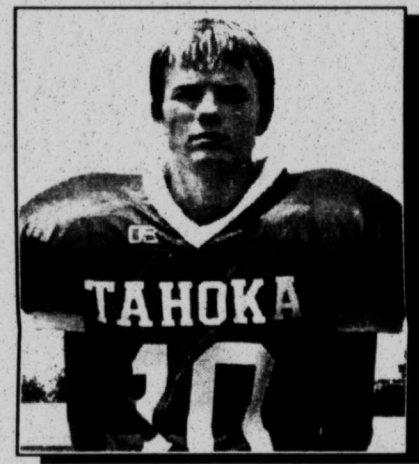

Soon after Loop's last touchdown of the night, the game was delayed for about 30 minutes during the third

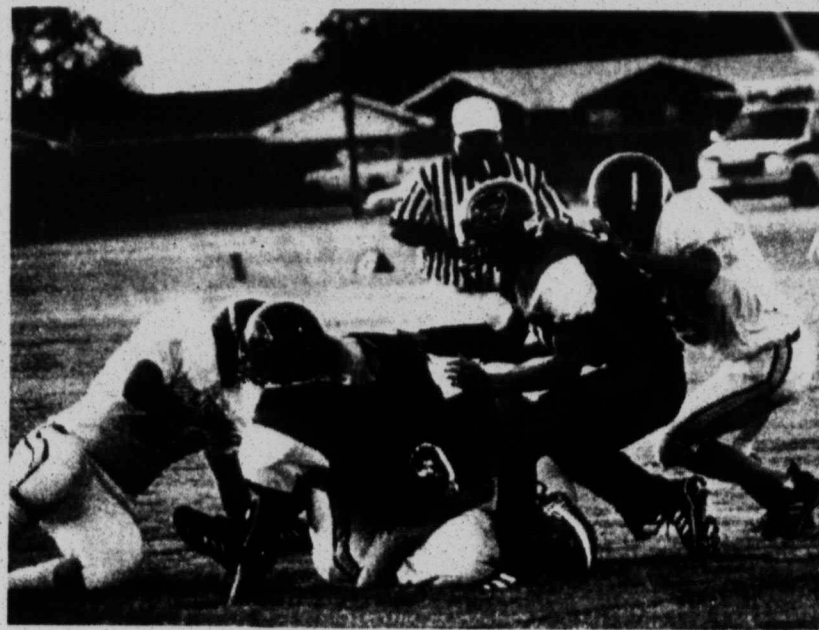

The last two scoreboard additions in the game were both made by Feaster. He had a 15 and a 45 yard run, and again kicked for both extra points.

The final tally showed that New Home had barbecued the Longhorns 60-14. Since their there was more than a 45 point difference, the game ended with the last touchdown of the third quarter.

The Leopard stats for the game were: 14 first downs, 26 carries for 310 yards rushing, 144 yards passing, and 454 total yards gained.

NRCS Unveils New Electronic Technical Guides For Conservation

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has unveiled the new electronic Field Office Technical Guide (eFOTG). This innovative technology supports the President's management initiative on expanding e-government and will support Farm Bill implementation and program delivery at the local level.

"Using this technology, we will be able to provide more timely information and data to more people nationwide than previously has been available," said NRCS Chief Bruce Knight. "This is a major step forward in providing conservation information and scientific and technological resources on the Web in an easy-to-use environment."

This project makes the scientifically proven and time-tested NRCS conservation technology available online to anyone who uses the technical resources in the FOTG. The old FOTG was a traditional, paper-based reference used in NRCS field offices to organize technical resources and activities for conservation, but the electronic technical guides make NRCS technical information available instantly to anyone with Internet access.

The electronic technical guides are linked to 8,000 NRCS web pages and external sites, including the latest material on the 2002 Farm Bill. Content includes data in technical handbooks and manuals, scientific tools that help generate conservation alternatives, conservation practice standards, conservation effects case study reports and other electronic tools for evaluating the effects of conservation technical assistance.

"The electronic technical guide will become a staple for America's farmers and ranchers in managing their land," said Knight. "Landowners, technical service providers, conservation planners, students and others can use the material on their home, school or office computers. The data will be updated electronically on a regular basis."

During May and June of this year, 10 states, including Texas, pilot tested the electronic technical guides. All states are developing electronic technical guides and have varying amounts of material currently available.

Explanatory Brief for HJR 2
HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable in a precinct to be dormant if the office has not been filled by election or appointment for a lengthy period and providing a procedure for the reinstatement of the office."

America Remembers

One year ago today, heroes were brought to the forefront of America. They didn't know they were heroes - they were merely men and women going about the daily tasks of life, when their lives were cut brutally short by the evil acts of terrorists. The victims of that day will never be forgotten.

Chronology of a Day of Terror: September 11, 2001

8:45 a.m. (all times are EDT): A hijacked passenger jet, American Airlines Flight 11 out of Boston, Massachusetts, crashes into the north tower of the World Trade Center, tearing a gaping hole in the building and setting it afire.

9:03 a.m.: A second hijacked airliner, United Airlines Flight 175 from Boston, crashes into the south tower of the World Trade Center and explodes. Both buildings are burning.

9:17 a.m.: The Federal Aviation Administration shuts down all New York City area airports.

9:21 a.m.: The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey orders all bridges and tunnels in the New York area closed.

9:30 a.m.: President George W. Bush, speaking in Sarasota, Florida, says the country has suffered an "apparent terrorist attack."

9:40 a.m.: The FAA halts all flight operations at U.S. airports, the first time in U.S. history that air traffic nationwide has been halted.

9:43 a.m.: American Airlines Flight 77 crashes into the Pentagon, sending up a huge plume of smoke. Evacuation begins immediately.

9:45 a.m.: The White House evacuates.

10:05 a.m.: The south tower of the World Trade Center collapses, plummeting into the streets below. A massive cloud of dust and debris forms and slowly drifts away from the building.

10:10 a.m.: A portion of the Pentagon collapses.

10:10 a.m.: United Airlines Flight 93, also hijacked, crashes in Somerset County, Pennsylvania, southeast of Pittsburgh.

10:28 a.m.: The World Trade Center's north tower collapses from the top down as if it were being peeled apart, releasing a tremendous cloud of debris and smoke.

10:45 a.m.: All federal office buildings in Washington are evacuated.

11:18 a.m.: American Airlines reports it has lost two aircraft. American Flight 11, a Boeing 767 flying from Boston to Los Angeles, had 81 passengers and 11 crew aboard. Flight 77, a Boeing 757 en route from Washington's Dulles International Airport to Los Angeles, had 58 passengers and six crew members aboard. Flight 11 slammed into the north tower of the World Trade Center. Flight 77 hit the Pentagon.

11:26 a.m.: United Airlines reports that United Flight 93, en route from Newark, New Jersey, to San Francisco, California, has crashed in Pennsylvania. The airline also says that it is "deeply concerned" about United Flight 175.

11:59 a.m.: United Airlines confirms that Flight 175, from Boston to Los Angeles, has crashed with 56 passengers and nine crew members aboard. It hit the World Trade Center's south tower.

1:04 p.m.: Bush, speaking from Barksdale Air Force Base in Louisiana, says that all appropriate security measures are being taken, including putting the U.S. military on high alert worldwide. He asks for prayers for those killed or wounded in the attacks and says, "Make no mistake, the United States will hunt down and punish those responsible for these cowardly acts."

1:27 p.m.: A state of emergency is declared by the city of Washington.

1:48 p.m.: Bush leaves Barksdale Air Force Base aboard Air Force One and flies to an Air Force base in Nebraska.

2:30 p.m.: The FAA announces there will be no U.S. commercial air traffic until noon EDT Wednesday at the earliest.

3:55 p.m.: Giuliani now says the number of critically injured in New York City is up to 200 with 2,100 total injuries reported.

4 p.m.: CNN National Security Correspondent David Ensor reports that U.S. officials say there are "good indications" that Saudi militant Osama bin Laden, suspected of coordinating the bombings of two U.S. embassies in 1998, is involved in the attacks, based on "new and specific" information developed since the attacks.

4:10 p.m.: Building 7 of the World Trade Center complex is reported on fire.

4:25 p.m.: The American Stock Exchange, the Nasdaq and the New York Stock Exchange say they will remain closed Wednesday.

4:30 p.m.: The president leaves Offutt Air Force Base in Nebraska aboard Air Force One to return to Washington.

5:20 p.m.: The 47-story Building 7 of the World Trade Center complex collapses. The evacuated building is damaged when the twin towers across the street collapse earlier in the day. Other nearby buildings in the area remain ablaze.

5:30 p.m.: CNN Senior White House Correspondent John King reports that U.S. officials say the plane that crashed in Pennsylvania could have been headed for one of three possible targets: Camp David, the White House or the U.S. Capitol building.

6:54 p.m.: Bush arrives back at the White House aboard Marine One and is scheduled to address the nation at 8:30 p.m. The president earlier landed at Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland with a three-fighter jet escort. CNN's John King reports Laura Bush arrived earlier by motorcade from a "secure location."

7:45 p.m.: The New York Police Department says that at least 78 officers are missing. The city also says that as many as half of the first 400 firefighters on the scene were killed.

8:30 p.m.: President Bush addresses the nation, saying "thousands of lives were suddenly ended by evil" and asks for prayers for the families and friends of Tuesday's victims. "These acts shattered steel, but they cannot dent the steel of American resolve," he says. The president says the U.S. government will make no distinction between the terrorists who committed the acts and those who harbor them. He adds that government offices in Washington are reopening for essential personnel Tuesday night and for all workers Wednesday.

9:22 p.m.: The fire at the Pentagon is still burning and is considered contained but not under control.

9:57 p.m.: Giuliani says New York City schools will be closed Wednesday and no more volunteers are needed for Tuesday evening's rescue efforts. He says there is hope that there are still people alive in rubble. He also says that power is out on the westside of Manhattan and that health department tests show there are no airborne chemical agents about which to worry.

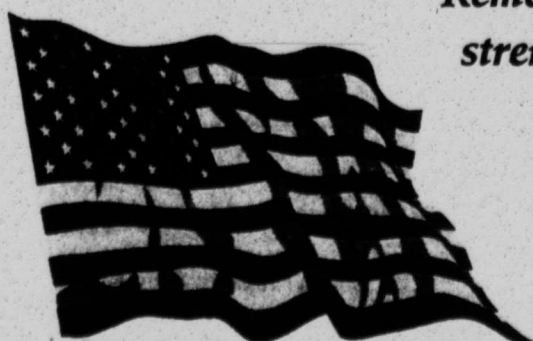
