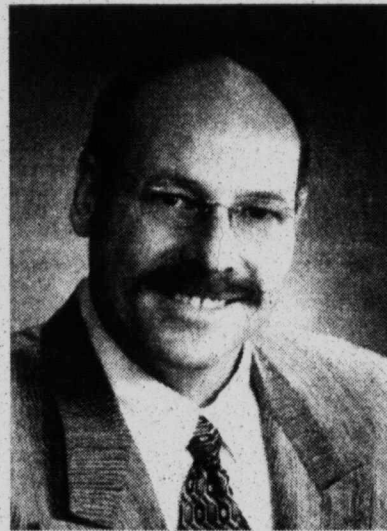

## Judicial Candidates To Speak At Public Forum

The two candidates for District Judge, 106th Judicial District, will speak at a public forum on Tuesday, Oct. 22, at 4 p.m. in the Life Enrichment Center, 1717 Main, in Tahoka. The public is invited and encouraged to attend this forum to hear each candidate speak. They are Carter T. Schildknecht, Republican candidate from Lamesa, and W. Calloway (Cal) Huffaker, Democratic candidate from Tahoka. Schildknecht was appointed several months ago to complete the term of the retiring judge.

This district covers four counties:

Garza, Lynn, Dawson and Gaines. Each candidate will speak for 10-15 minutes, then answer questions from the audience.

Phebe K. Warner Club of Tahoka is sponsoring this public forum.

Members encourage everyone to attend, meet the candidates, hear them speak and be prepared to ask questions. Barbara White will be the moderator. Bettye Green is the club president.

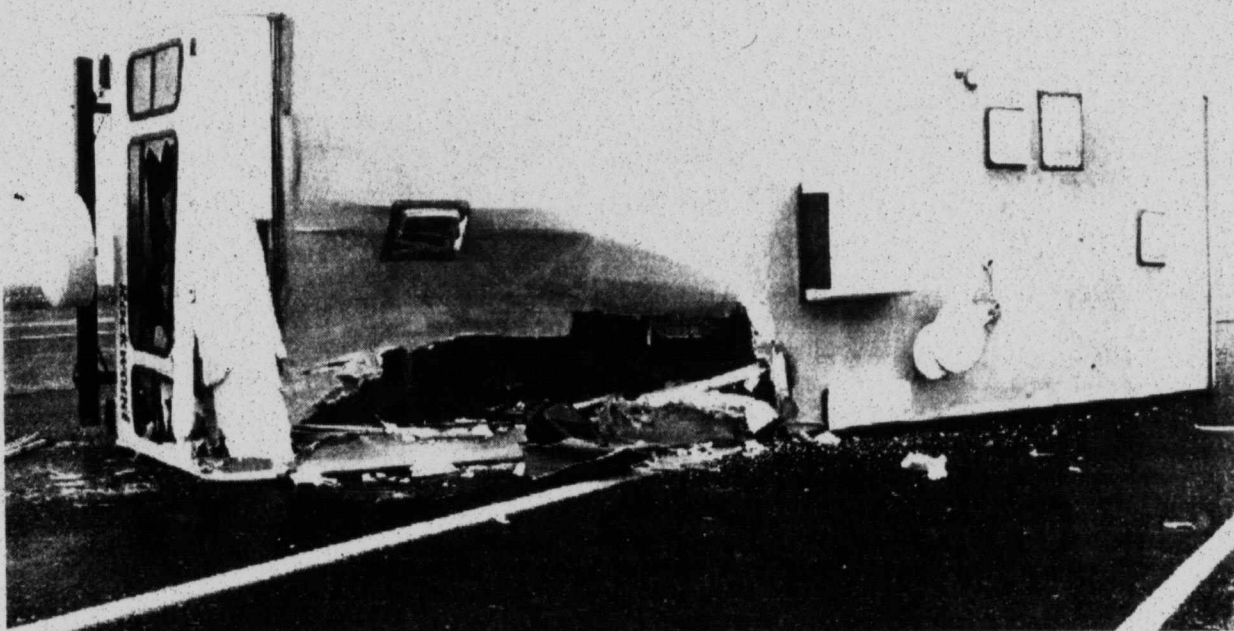
Election day is Nov. 5, and early voting begins Monday, Oct. 21, continuing through Nov. 1.

## County Contracts For Indigent Defense

Lynn County Commissioners Tuesday unanimously approved a contract for indigent defense in felony cases heard in district court, approving a contract shared by the four counties in the 106th judicial district. Gaines, Garza, Dawson and Lynn counties will share the cost in the \$60,000 contract approved with attorney Artie Aguilar, to handle the defense counsel for indigents for the 2003 calendar year.

Lynn County's cost-share of the contract is estimated at \$11,675 based on the number of indigent cases presented this year, but of course the actual amount will depend on the number of felony indigent cases presented in district court in 2003.

In other business, monthly bills were approved and commissioners discussed cleaning up the old jail building.

## Injuries Treated After Five Traffic Accidents

Five traffic accidents were investigated by officers in Lynn County during the last week, including one in the City of Tahoka. No serious injuries were reported in any of the accidents.

On Monday in the 1800-block of Main St. in Tahoka a 2001 Chevrolet pickup driven by Kevin Duane Elmore, 15, was involved in a minor collision with a parked 1994 Chevrolet pickup owned by James T. Wells of Tahoka.

North of Tahoka on foggy U.S. 87 last Friday morning, a Ford F-250 pickup driven by Truman Lesslie Bray, 63, of Lubbock was pulling a travel trailer when the vehicle jackknifed and the trailer, unoccupied, overturned and blocked both northbound lanes. A 1997 Ford Crown Victoria crashed into the top of the trailer, and wound up with part of the Ford inside the trailer.

Driver of the Ford auto, Dorothy Bush, 72, and her passenger, Jimmy Bush, 71, both of Midland, were taken to Lynn County Hospital emergency room by EMS ambulance, and were treated for injuries apparently not serious and then released.

On Oct. 9, about 4 a.m. an 18-wheeler driven by Brian Joe Soto, 21, of Idalou overturned about 2.8 miles north of O'Donnell on U.S. 87. The driver said he lost control of the 1995 International when he was trying to read some of his paperwork. He was not injured.

A 1998 Ford Taurus headed west on FM 2053 Sunday afternoon, veered into a ditch about 3.8 miles west of O'Donnell and struck a utility pole. The driver, Karen

Gardenhire, 39, of Rt. 5, Tahoka, was not injured.

On Oct. 7 a 1998 Peterbilt semi-trailer driven by Hector Perez Silva, 50, of Pacoima, CA, jackknifed on U.S. 87 about 5.8 miles north of Tahoka. Taken by EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital, Silva was treated and released.

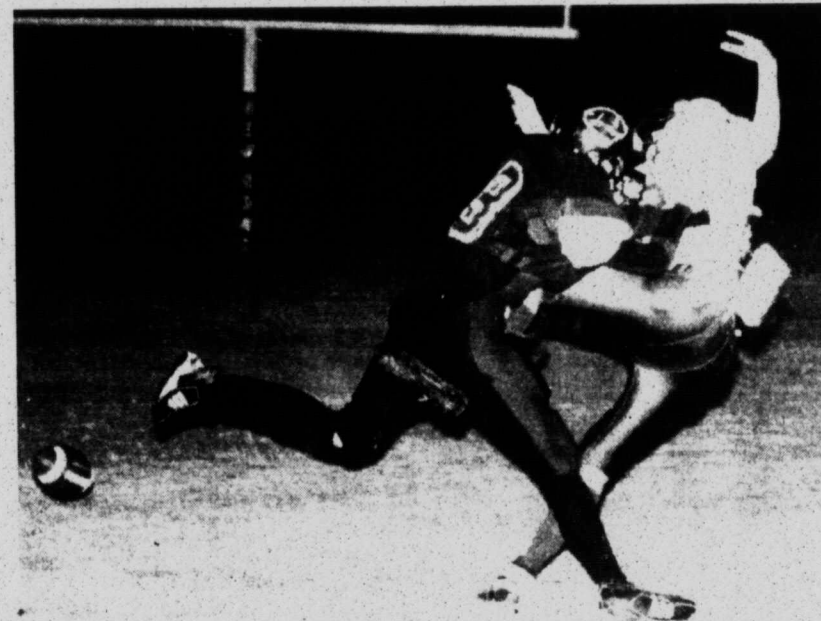
A sixth traffic accident was reported in Wilson Monday, but the investigation was by a Brownwood District unit, and no further information was available.

Two persons were arrested by Tahoka Police and jailed on charges of possession of cocaine and possession of drug paraphernalia. They were identified as Zeb Joseph Salmeri, 23, and Clifford S. Withers, 21, both of Denver, CO.

A 106th District Court jury in Tahoka Tuesday ruled that Larry Sanford, 61, of O'Donnell was competent to face an application for revocation of his probation on conviction of felony drunk driving. Presiding over the jury hearing was Judge Vann Culp of Midland.

Last week another district court jury here found Lester Murl Nixon of Lubbock guilty of felony DWI. Judge Carter Schildknecht assessed Nixon a five-year prison sentence, probated, plus 10 years of community supervision.

In jail during the week were five new inmates, on these charges: possession of cocaine, more than one gram and less than four grams, DWI second offense, warrant on burglary of a habitation, application to adjudicate on charges of impersonating a public servant, and DWI first offense.

**WOODWORK** by Dalton

BURLE PETTIT, former editor of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, wrote a piece recently about the beauty of autumn. I have mentioned before that I have a plaque in my office (given to me by a lady from Slaton who was a night person, too) which reads "If God Had Meant for Us to see the Sunrise, He Would Have Scheduled It Later in the Day."

And, of course, my Bible says "Can anything good happen before 9 o'clock in the morning?"

You don't think it says that? It is in the book of James, in my Bible. I pasted it in there myself, right over the part which says a person will be held accountable for everything he says (and presumably, writes). A man who writes a newspaper column cannot allow such stuff to be in his Bible.

Refreshments will be served.

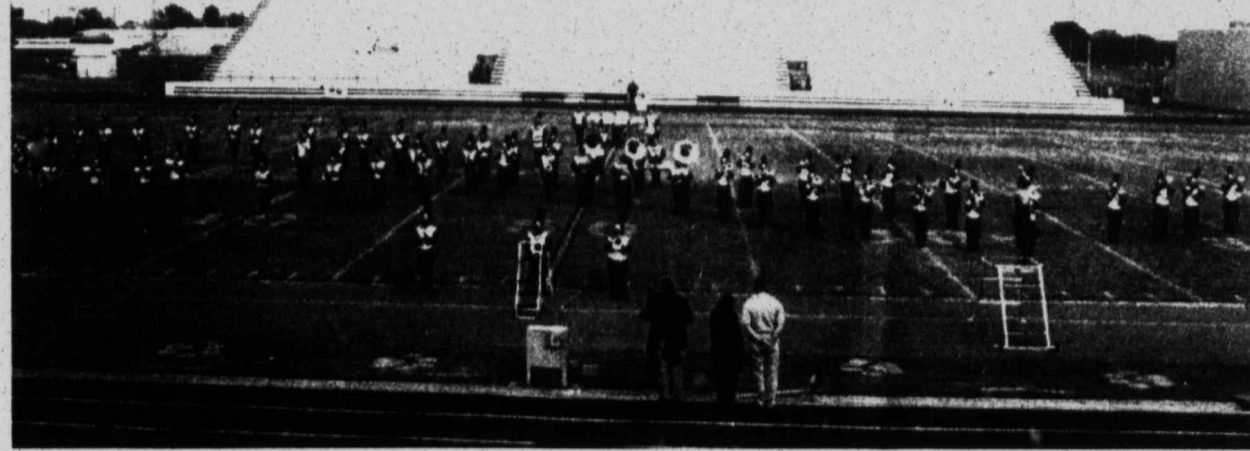

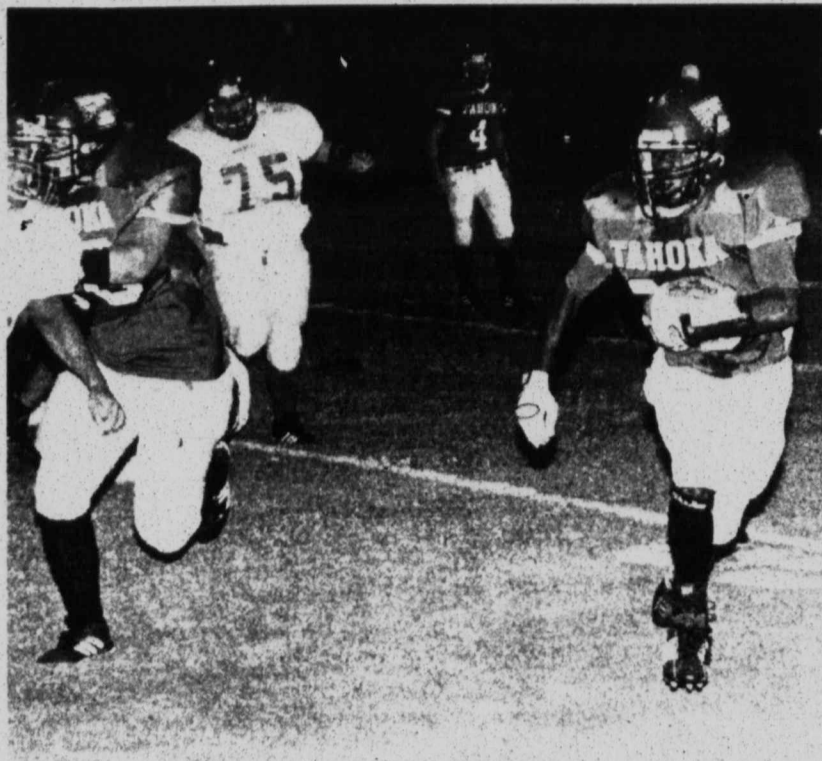

## Mammograms, Clinical Exams Best Way to Detect Cancer

Any woman, all women are at risk of breast cancer — particularly as they grow older. More than 80 percent of women diagnosed with breast cancer have no family history of the disease.

As with all cancers, early detection gives a woman the greatest chance for survival. And the combination of mammography and an annual clinical breast exam is still the best option a woman has for early detection.

Although mammograms have been criticized as having too many false positive results and being difficult to interpret, these breast X-rays are credited with saving lives.

"There are a lot of high tech tools to aid in screening for breast cancer that are being developed," said Claudia Himes, a nurse consultant for the Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). "But mammography is one tool that is still accessible and affordable for most women. Some of the newer methods may leave some of us out if we don't have insurance or other means to pay for them."

Women of all ages should talk with their health care providers about when and how often to be screened for breast cancer.

"The TDH recommends that women 50 and older receive a mammogram and a clinical breast examination every year," Himes said. "because most breast cancer occurs in women between the ages of 50 and 70."

A clinical breast exam should be part of a woman's annual physical. A mammogram can detect tumors as small as one centimeter — long before a woman would notice changes in her breasts. The exact causes of breast cancer are not known.

Breast cancer is the leading cancer diagnosed in women and the second most deadly cancer overall. An estimated 13,100 women in Texas will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year, and 2,600 will die from it.

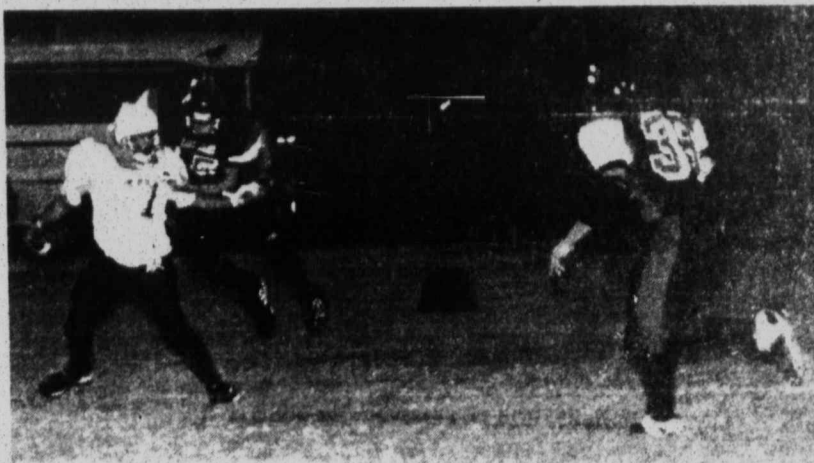
Himes emphasized that regular screenings — mammograms and clinical breast exams — are the key to catching the disease before it spreads throughout the body.

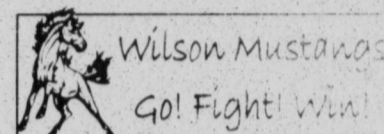

# Idalou Pounds Bulldogs 34-6

Idalou has about a dozen good players and one super player, and the mostly senior team obviously remembered last year's loss to Tahoka which ended their unbeaten string at that time.

This time, the Wildcats stayed unbeaten at 6-0, and with Tahoka tacklers unable to bring down big Shae Reagan, Idalou dropped Tahoka to a 3-3 season record (0-1 in district) by a score of 34-6.

Reagan, a heavy load for defenders at 6-3, 224 pounds, scored five touchdowns as he showed why he is right at the top of the list of Class AA rushers on the South Plains. He rushed for 197 yards out at Kelley Field.

Tahoka's only score was a 2-yard touchdown pass just before half-time, with Adrian Moore taking the pass from QB Brandon McCord, who threw his 16<sup>th</sup> touchdown pass of the year.

McCord's completion percentage was unusually low, only 10 of 39 passes with two interceptions, as he was hurried and harassed by the strongest defense he has faced so far.

It didn't help that five balls were dropped by receivers.

Reagan, a junior quarterback who would rather run than pass, scored the first touchdown on a 41-yard run less than two minutes deep into the game. Still in the first quarter, he scored again from a yard out, after Idalou took over at the Bulldogs 38 following an 18-yard punt.

It was 14-0 as the quarter ended with Moore taking an 18-yard pass from McCord. Good running by FB Matt Wells and Trey Price and another pass to Moore continued the drive down to the Idalou 32 early in the second. But Tahoka stalled and lost the ball on downs.

Reagan promptly dominated another drive, going 25 for the score at 5:14 in the second. Idalou missed the point, and it was 20-0.

After Wells recovered an Idalou fumble at the Wildcats 36 with 2 minutes left, Tahoka moved to its only score, with the biggest gainer a 28-yard pass from Moore to Warren Baker down at the 8. Price gained 6 to the 2-yard line, and McCord hit Moore for the TD with just 20 seconds left in the half.

Tahoka battled Idalou pretty much on even terms in the last half, but Reagan ran 15 for a touchdown with 3:17 left in the third. Tahoka then mounted a good drive which carried to the Idalou 15 on a 20-yard pass from McCord to Moore, but on first down from there, McCord's pass was intercepted by Jordan Stegemoeller of Idalou.

In the fourth, another interception stopped a Bulldog drive, and Reagan scored again, from the 7. Late in the game, McCord connected on three passes to give Tahoka a first down at the Idalou 12 with just 56 seconds left, but the Bulldogs lost the ball there on downs as the game ended.

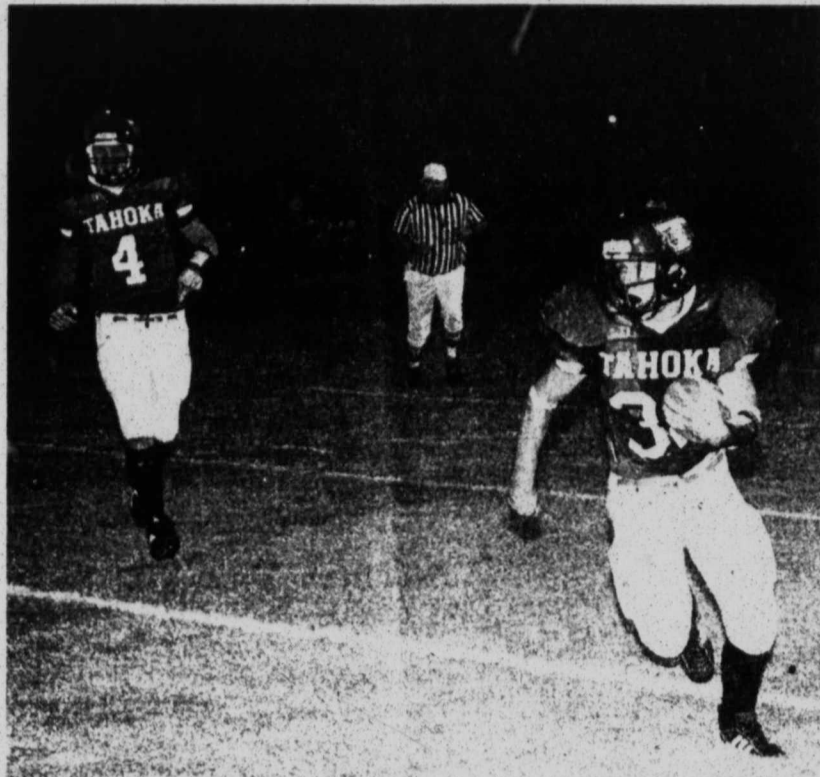

### Disaster Assistance Not Dead - Stay Tuned

Conventional wisdom indicates that politics will likely be the vehicle that gets Congress to turn the corner on Ag drought assistance.

Unfortunately, that wisdom hasn't yielded the knowledge of when and if the realities of politics will give a drought assistance package the boost it needs to become reality.

The only thing that seems to be getting clearer is the resolve with which supporters of an assistance package are willing to push the issue. Reports of meetings held this week between House leaders and an apparently dedicated group of drought assistance supporters could help tip the scales in this regard.

Reports indicate that the group made clear its feelings on including a drought assistance package to the long-term Continuing Resolution (CR) that Congress must pass so they can adjourn for the run-up to the November elections and keep the wheels of government turning.

The window to get that CR finished and out the door appears to close October 18, which is the date a CR agreed to on October 10 expires.

Producers can look for things to move much quicker next week on this front as leaders on both sides of the aisle look for an acceptable compromise on this and many other issues that will be tied to the Continuing Resolution that they will want finished before October 18.

The best advice for those watching the show is to stay tuned because there is surely more to come before the final curtain goes down.
