Voters To Mark Choices Tuesday

Lynn County will open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 5 for voters to mark their choices in the General Election. Early voting continues through Friday, Nov. 1 for those who choose to vote early, with ballots available at the Lynn County Clerk's Office inside the Lynn County Courthouse. County Clerk Susan Tipton said early voting has been unusually heavy in this election, with 275 ballots marked in Lynn County as of Tuesday afternoon.

A wide slate of offices is up for debate, including several local offices which are all uncontested. H.G. Franklin is unopposed on the ballot for Lynn County Judge, and several incumbents are seeking re-election for their positions in the county, including District Clerk Sandra Laws, County Clerk Susan Tipton, County Treasurer Janet Porterfield, Pct. 2 Commissioner Mike Braddock, Pct. 4 Commissioner J.T. Miller, and Pct. 1 Justice of Peace, Teresa "Terri"


A hotly contested race for District Judge for the 106th Judicial District is underway, with Tahoka attorney W. Calloway (Cal) Huffaker on the Democratic ticket facing Republican Carter T. Schildknecht, who was appointed to fill the position of District Judge last year following the retirement of Judge George H. Hansard.

And, voters can hardly be unaware of the Governor's race in Texas, what with all the political mudslinging campaign advertising of Republican Rick Perry and Democrat Tony Sanchez, but there are also two other candidates on the ballot for Governor, with Jeff Daiell running on the Libertarian Party ticket and Rahul Mahajan on the Green Party ticket.

Four candidates are seeking the position of retiring U.S. Senator Phil Gramm, including the current Attorney General, John Cornyn on the Republican ticket, and former Dallas mayor Ron Kirk on the Democratic ticket, and two others. Larry

Election polls at 14 locations in Combest is seeking re-election as U.S. Representative, District 19, with no Democratic challenger but facing a candidate on the Libertarian ticket. State Representative Pete Laney (District 85) is seeking re-election. facing Republican challenger Judy Strickland, and State Senator Robert Duncan (District 28) is seeking reelection, unopposed by a Democratic challenger but facing a Libertarian candidate. Other races include Lt. Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller, Commissioner of Agriculture

IT MAY BE ABOUT time for me to give gin-soaked raisins another try at providing relief from arthritis. I tried that unusual remedy in 1996, and even wrote a column about it, pointing out that the results were inconclusive.

At that time, on the recommendation of Paul Harvey and couple of people I knew who had tried it, I went and bought some gin. While I was parked outside the liquor store on the strip south of Lubbock, nearly everybody I know in Tahoka rec-

If I try this again, since I now have a few more arthritic joints, I'm going to try to borrow somebody else's car for the strip trip (gin spin?). I wonder if the preacher would lend me his car.

Here is a repeat of part of what happened six years ago when Paul Harvey suggested a person should eat exactly 9 raisins a day after soaking them in gin for several days:

When I first started this experiment I had to abort it after about a week when I dropped the jar full of raisins on the kitchen floor, causing a mess of sticky raisins which had been soaked in gin and then sprinkled with little shards of glass. So I started over. (We didn't get it all cleaned up until the next day. We found two dead mice which had got so drunk they ran headfirst into the wall).

Then I ate nine raisins a day, just like they told me I should. I think I may have eaten 10 a couple of mornings, so this may

Neither my knee nor my finger seemed to have any arthritic problems during the months I ate the raisins. Nor have they bothered me in the month or so since. But that's the problem: Even before I started all this, they didn't hurt all the time.

So I can't really say whether it works or not. Incidentally, you can't taste the gin in the raisins. And I think I can safely say that nine raisins a day won't do you any harm.

But if you try it, be sure to keep the raisins in the refrigerator

Tahoka High School Listed In State's Top Ten High Schools

All towns tend to be proud of their schools - but Tahoka can now officially claim bragging rights about their high school, after THS claimed a spot in the top ten best high schools

in Texas, earning a five-star rating. Tahoka High School made the top ten list among Texas' highest ranked high schools, according to an article printed in the November issue of Texas Monthly Magazine. Tahoka's 2A school was compared among all other high schools in Texas, all of which were ranked according to four economic categories, as ranked by the National Center for Educational Accountability. THS received the ultimate five-star rating along with nine other schools in the Lower Middle Economic Group's Top Ten List.

"This is long-overdue recognition for our staff, students and administration for all the hard work they have done over the last several years," said TISD Superintendent Jimmy Parker. "We have always known our students are receiving a good quality education, and this five-star ranking is directly attributed to our staff and students," he added.

Rankings were based on a variety of factors, including student performance on the TAAS reading, writing, and math tests for the tenth grade; the school's success at educating two levels of students - proficient and low-proficient - as measured by junior high school TAAS tests; the promotion rate of first-time ninth graders to tenth grade; the percentage of low-income students at the **OUR BEST HIGH SCHOOLS**


school, which determines its economic grouping; and the percentage of students taking advanced-placement (AP) tests or SAT/ACTs (to qualify for five stars, a high school must have at least 15 percent of its students taking AP tests or at least 70 percent of its students taking SAT/ ACTs). One of the most important data factors was student performance on the state-administered end-ofcourse algebra test, in which Tahoka High School students performed

"Our school board is very supportive in funding our curriculum programs, such as TAAS classes and Advanced Placement (AP) classes and things of that nature to allow our students to achieve this success," said Supt. Parker.

More than 1,000 Texas high schools were ranked by Texas Monthly and the National Center for Educational Accountability. which can be seen online at Texas Monthly's website. www.texasmonthly.com.


Texas Monthly tossed out the state's traditional rating system. which is based on how many students score at least 70 on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tests, in favor of one with the tougher standard of "proficiency," meaning a grade of 85 or better. Also, unlike the state. Texas Monthly researchers recognized that low-income schools cannot be compared fairly with highincome schools, so the rankings were "tweaked" to account for economic disadvantages. Schools in poor districts (that is, those with the highest percentage of students on a federally subsidized lunch program) were compared only with other schools in low-income districts.

Some schools, including New Home and Wilson ISD high schools in Lynn County, were not ranked, possibly because the amount and type of data reported to the state may have been insufficient for ranking purposes. O'Donnell High School received a four-star rating.

Rainy Weekend Brings Seven Traffic Accidents

ported in Lynn County during the Thursday. past weekend, with the rain considered a contributing factor in most of them. Three of them were within a half mile of each other, from 4.2 to 4.4 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87.

The only accident in which any injuries were reported was about 6 p.m.. Sunday when four Tahoka teenagers were in a 1998 Chevrolet one person for theft over \$50 and Blazer which overturned about 4 miles south of Tahoka when the vehicle turned onto a muddy county road just east of U.S. 87.


Grandparents of the groom are Norris and Peggy Barron of Lamesa and Mrs. Blanche Franklin of Tahoka.


Roosevelt. McCord passed for 235 yards in the game. However, Roosevelt won the district game.





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

too much for the Tahoka Bulldogs to handle last Friday at Acuff as the Eagles gained more than 400 yards on the ground and scored five rushing touchdowns to win 35-7.

The loss left the Bulldogs at 3-5 for the year and 0-3 in the very tough District 4-AA. This week Tahoka will host the Post Antelopes.

Tahoka's only score of the game came on a 1-yard plunge by Matt Wells in the second quarter. Ben Stroope kicked the extra point, and the Dogs trailed 22-7 at halftime.

Tahoka QB Brandon McCord did complete 17 of 34 passes for 235 yards, but for the first time this season did not have a touchdown pass. McCord's vardage through the air put him past 2,000 yards for the season, according to Coach Wes Cope. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, however, has McCord's total passing yardage about 80 yards below 2,000

Roosevelt's rushing attack was although he is listed as the leader of Class AA passers.

Adrian Moore caught five of those passes against Roosevelt for 67 yards, and Josh Pridmore caught five for 62 yards.

Wells was Tahoka's leading rusher in the game, carrying 10 times for 46 yards. Trey Price gained 31 yards in 4 carries.

Wells also was named by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal as one of Class AA's players of the week for making 10 tackles on defense and recovering a fumble.







Dear Editor, ... Re: Tahoka Staff and Students Preparing For Rigorous TAKS Test

This year, Tahoka Independent School District's staff and students are making the transition from the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test to the more rigorous Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test. The new-assessment is based more closely on the state's curriculum, the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS).

TAKS will be more difficult than TAAS and will be based on the state curriculum that was developed after the TAAS tests were begun. The TAKS will test a broader and deeper amount of material than the TAAS

TAKS will test additional subject areas and two grade levels which weren't previously tested under TAAS, ninth and eleventh graders. Questions will be presented in new formats as well. Reading passages will be longer and more difficult and students will be required to use more skills such as marking "griddable items". Our students have not seen these kinds of items in previous test administrations

The State Board of Education has not yet set the passing standard for the test for this year. They are expected to set the standard in the next couple of months. In addition, there is not much information available on the new test. However, some Tahoka ISD teachers have participated in the development process in writing the new

Beginning this school year, the current third grade students will be required to pass the reading portion of TAKS in order to be promoted to the fourth grade. Students that do not pass on the first administration will be provided accelerated instruction and have an opportunity to take the test two additional times before the beginning of the 2003-2004 school year. Students who do not pass the exam will be assigned a Grade Placement Committee that will be composed of educators and the student's parent or guardian or other assigned representative. The committee will determine whether the student is retained or promoted.

Beginning with the 2004-2005 school year, fifth grade students will have to pass both the reading and math portions of the exam in order to be promoted. Tahoka staff members have attended specialized academies in reading and math in an attempt to have our students ready for the new TAKS test.

Formerly, high school students were tested at the EXIT-Level in the 10th grade. High school students will now be tested at the 9th, 10th and 11th grades with the 11th grade becoming the EXIT-LEVEL Exam. This year's sophomores will be the first graduating class to be required to pass the 11th grade EXIT examination. The EXIT exam will include a social studies and science test in addition to the math, reading, and

Again, parents of TISD students are strongly encouraged to become more involved in their student's education. The administration and staff of the district want to ensure the patrons of the district that instructional strategies and techniques are being utilized to help our students be successful. Our district has accepted the challenge of the new test and with the assistance of parents and community members, we will be successful. Respectfully.
