I'VE OWNED more cars in my lifetime than anybody I know of, except maybe Jay Leno, who has 85 at last report, or Jerry Seinfeld, who reportedly owns 47 Porsches.

I've owned 60 vehicles, 59 of which I lost money on. I'm still driving the other one, and it now has more miles than any other car I ever bought new. I think I'm getting my money's worth on this one.

A couple of weeks back, an article in the newspaper supplement USA Weekend claims that the kind of vehicle you drive and the color of it tells a lot about you. It was written by Kathleen McCleary, and most of what she says is right on the money. Some of the findings/ opinions I would question, and there are some other generalizations which don't apply to many of us, perhaps because we don't march to the same beat as most folks in our age, income or social brackets.

For example, the article says that if you drive a red sports car you are assertive or aggressive and strong; you are a CEO or a wannabe, and it may be saying "I'm young; I'm sexy; I have money."

Well. There's a woman in Tahoka (whose name I won't mention yet because I haven't asked her permission) who surprised most of her acquaintances by going out and buying a new red sporty muscle car of the type usually associated with teenagers. This lady, who has not been a teenager for more than a half century, says simply that "I always wanted a car like this."

I once bought a new red 1969 Chevrolet pickup, and I also once owned a new Honda Civic which was a sort of rose-color, kin to red. Neither of these shouted that I was affluent or aggressive.

When my son was in high school, I bought him a bright orange Dodge Dart with about a million miles on it, but that was not for me. Orange now means you are "on top of the trends," according to the

The story said people who drive silver vehicles "ooze class." Yellow screams "Look at me!", which, said the report, is why you don't see it on family sedans. It said yellow shows up on expensive SUVs

and sports cars, and also says "I'm so rich I don't care what you think." White, a longtime favorite, is for people who like to blend in. Black means power and aggression, blue or green means conservative.

The article says women make 52 per cent of new car purchases and that they prize safety and reliability, and are more practical about cost than men.

"When men buy a car, the question is, 'Should I spend \$25,000 or \$45,000?' and when women buy a car they ask "Should I spend \$25,000 or just spend \$18,000 and put \$7,000 into a new kitchen?" "

Well, I can't totally disagree with that either, except the last part should have been, "Should I just spend \$18,000 and go out and buy 70 more pairs of shoes for my closet?"

Lynn Voters Turn Out For Tuesday's Election

Nearly half of Lynn County's registered voters marked ballots in Tuesday's General Election, agreeing in most cases with other voters in Texas in the big races. According to officials at the county voter registrar's office, Lynn County has 4,475 registered voters, but with some registration cards returned and held "in suspense" the county officially has 3,981 registered voters and about 47 percent of that number (1,861 voters) cast ballots, including 441 in early voting.

Lynn voters carried Texas Governor Rick Perry by 1,112 votes to 593 for Democrat Tony Sanchez, and State Representative Pete Laney (District 85) won by a big margin in the state as well as in Lynn County, with 1,197 votes to 434 for Republican challenger Judy Strickland.

Local attorney W. Calloway (Cal) Huffaker won big in Lynn County -1,354 votes to 383 - in the District Judge's race (106th Judicial District), but lost in the other three counties in the district to Republican Carter T. Schildknecht, who had been appointed to fill the judicial seat about a year ago when Judge George Hansard retired. Schildknecht won by a margin of 769 votes in the fourcounty district with a total of 4,931 votes to 4,162 for Huffaker.

Republican John Cornyn carried Lynn voters by 1,037 votes to 626 for Democrat Ron Kirk in the U.S. Senate race, U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R) had 1,271 votes to 76 for Libertarian challenger Larry Johnson. State Senator Robert Duncan, a Republican, easily carried

County **Audit Approved**

Lynn County Commissioners met last Monday, Oct. 23, hearing the 2001 audit report on county finances from Jim Kingery, who noted the county had a "clean" report. Commissioners unanimously approved the audit as presented.

In other business, Sheriff Jake Diggs met with the court seeking permission for John Benson, P.A. from Lynn County Hospital, to come to the jail and see to the medical needs of inmates instead of transporting inmates to medical care. Diggs asked that Benson be allowed to come to the jail at least one time per week at a cost between \$55 and \$75 per patient, noting that this would work better for the jail inmates.

"This would keep the inmates from leaving the jail for medical treatment, except in the case of an emergency or for treatment that could not be handled at the jail," Sheriff Diggs told commissioners.

Commissioners voted unanimously to approve the Sheriff's re- lance calls and two fire alarms.

Monthly bills were read and approved. No action was taken on a request from the District Attorney's office for office furniture.

Threat To Kill Girl Reported

Two teenage girls, students at Tahoka High School, were questioned by Tahoka Police after the father of one of the girls advised that his daughter had been threatened. One of the girls reportedly threatened to kill the other with a gun and there also was a report she had threatened to stab the same girl and one of her friends.

After talking with those involved and with witnesses, police turned the case over to juvenile authorities for prosecution.

In jail during the last week were seven persons, on these charges: driving while license suspended, possession of marijuana, grand jury indictment on burglary, DWI first offense, grand jury indictment on possession of marijuana, failure to appear, and public intoxication/disorderly con-

Total population of the county jail on Nov. 6 was 37 inmates.

Dispatchers at Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. processed 205 calls in October, including 93 for the county, 84 for the City of Tahoka, 10 for the City of O'Donnell, 16 ambu-

Tree Planting Ceremony Planned At County Courthouse Nov. 12

A heritage oak tree will be dedication that the state of Texas was planted on the grounds of the Lynn County Courthouse in ceremonies to be held at 2 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov.

The tree was grown from an acorn harvested from a live oak tree located on the site of Stephen F. Austin's death, near present-day West Columbia, Texas. Under this tree, a Texas Historical Monument marks the place where Austin died on Dec. 27, 1836. The property has been transformed into a service area dedicated to the memory of "the Father of Texas," a title give to Austin by General Sam Houston.

Stephen F. Austin, by most authorities, is considered to be the founder of Texas. Born in Austinville, Virginia on Nov. 3, 1793, he was placed in charge of the project that his father, Moses Austin, had started before his death in 1820. It was through Austin's tireless efforts and
