Farmers Back To Harvesting County's 268,000 Acres Cotton

Lynn County cotton producers, interrupted with two weeks of rainy weather, are now back to long hours in the fields with cotton strippers to harvest the area's 2002 cotton crop. This year's cotton crop looks more promising than any in recent years for Lynn County, with 268,000 acres certified for the county. To date, approximately 50 percent of cotton acreage has been harvested.

Certainly, irrigated yields are better than in years past. Early estimates on the 73,000 acres of irrigated cotton are at a bale and a half per acre (750 lbs.). Many pivots have exceeded two bales per acre and the drip

systems have exceeded three bales in some cases.

The dryland crop of 194,000 acres is a little more varied, with estimates at two-thirds of a bale (320 lbs.) per acre.

The crop still needs a hard killing freeze on it to kill the leaves and help open the remaining bolls. Cotton in the western portion of the county is younger and many producers are having to spray this crop with harvest aids or wait on a killing freeze.

However, during the two weeks of rainy weather recently, harvest losses for the county have certainly cost the producers, in both quality and quantity.

Twenty-five percent of the crop was out of the fields before the weather shut down the harvest. Since then, area producers are seeing losses of 5 percent in weight and 3-cents per pound in quality.

Irrigated losses on the 32,000 acres that were affected by the weather are estimated to be \$600,000 in weight and \$720,000 in quality losses. Dryland losses for the 168,000 acres of cotton affected by the weather were estimated to be \$1.05 million in weight and \$1.26 million in quality.

"Altogether, we could see as much as \$3.6 million in production losses from the recent wet weather," said Bryan Reynolds, Lynn County Agriculture Extension Agent.

"Most of the gins are a week to two weeks behind, and some farmers are waiting on a good freeze to harvest their crops. We will be harvesting in Lynn County through Christmas, and ginning until after the first of the year," Reynolds predicted.

Three Traffic Accidents Occur

Tahoka Police Officers responded to three traffic accidents in Tahoka this week, none of which resulted in injuries according to reports.

One collision occurred at 12:45 p.m. last Wednesday, involving a 1996 Oldsmobile Ciera driven by Zach John Gutierrez, 15, of Tahoka and a 1988 Buick Park Avenue driven by Rosalinda Chavarria, 52, of Tahoka.

Three hours later that day, a 1996 Chevy Sierra driven by Frankie Lee Arriaga, 17, of Tahoka was involved in a collision with a 1996 Ford Explorer driven by Solana Helene Aguero, 17, of Tahoka, at North 5th and Ave. O at about 3:40 p.m.

And at about 3 p.m. last Thursday, a collision occurred at the inter-

section of Lockwood and the Hwy. 87 overpass, with the incident blamed on the view blocked by the rails on the overpass. Involved in the wreck was a 1998 Ford Sierra driven by Daniel Areas, 18, of Tahoka, and a 1991 GMC Sierra driven by Monica Sue Castilla, 21, of O'Donnell.

Police last week also apprehended two juveniles who were reported missing from Oklahoma, who were released over to the Lynn County Probation Office. David Todd Wright reported the theft of a tool box and chain, valued at \$290, taken from two vehicles on South 2nd Street sometime Friday night. Police also investigated a DWI and responded to a report of a man banging on

someone's door during the night which resulted in charges of resisting arrest and assault on a peace officer.

Added to the population at Lynn County Jail last week were three persons, arrested for theft by check, DWI first offense, and one for resisting arrest and assault on a peace officer.

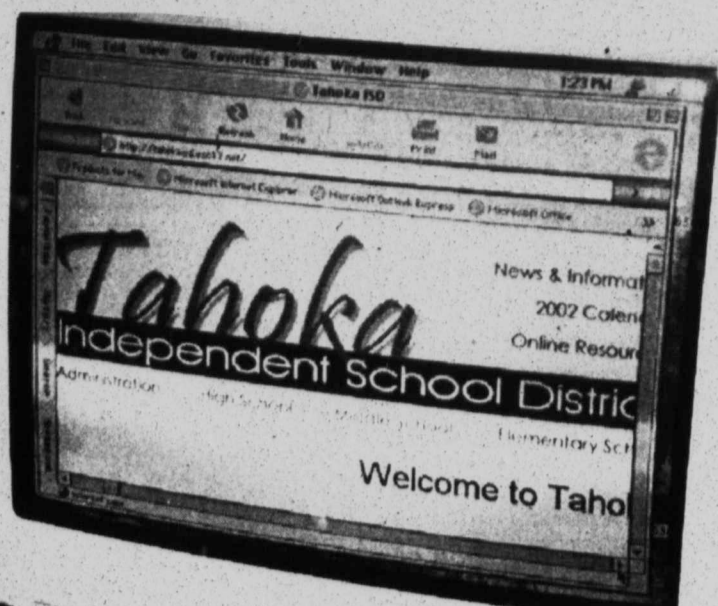

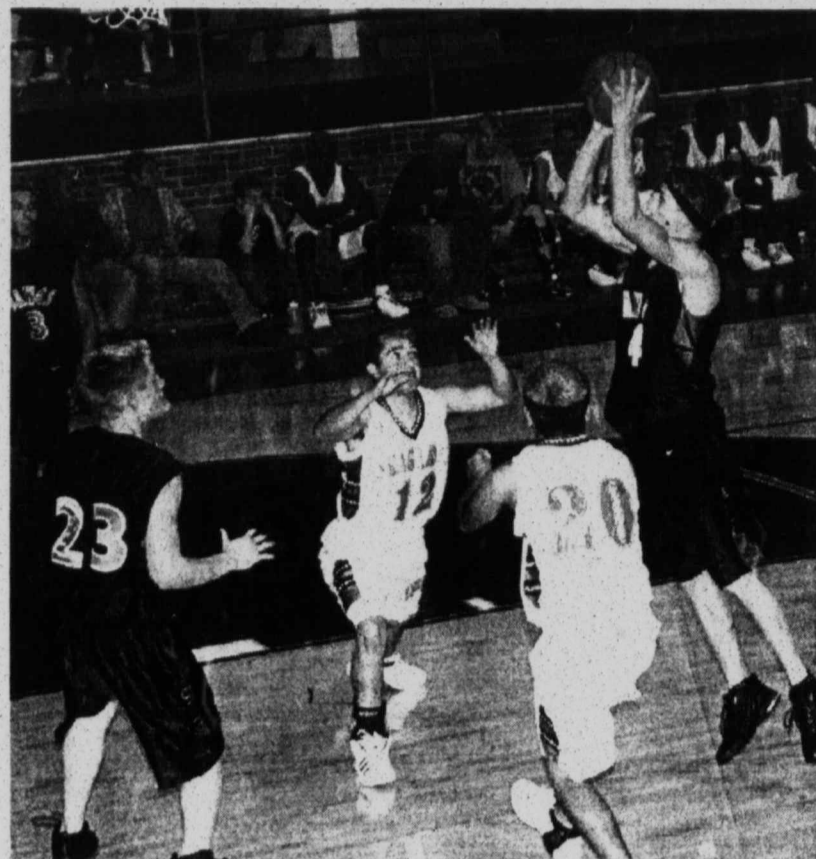
She died Tuesday, Nov. 19, 2002.

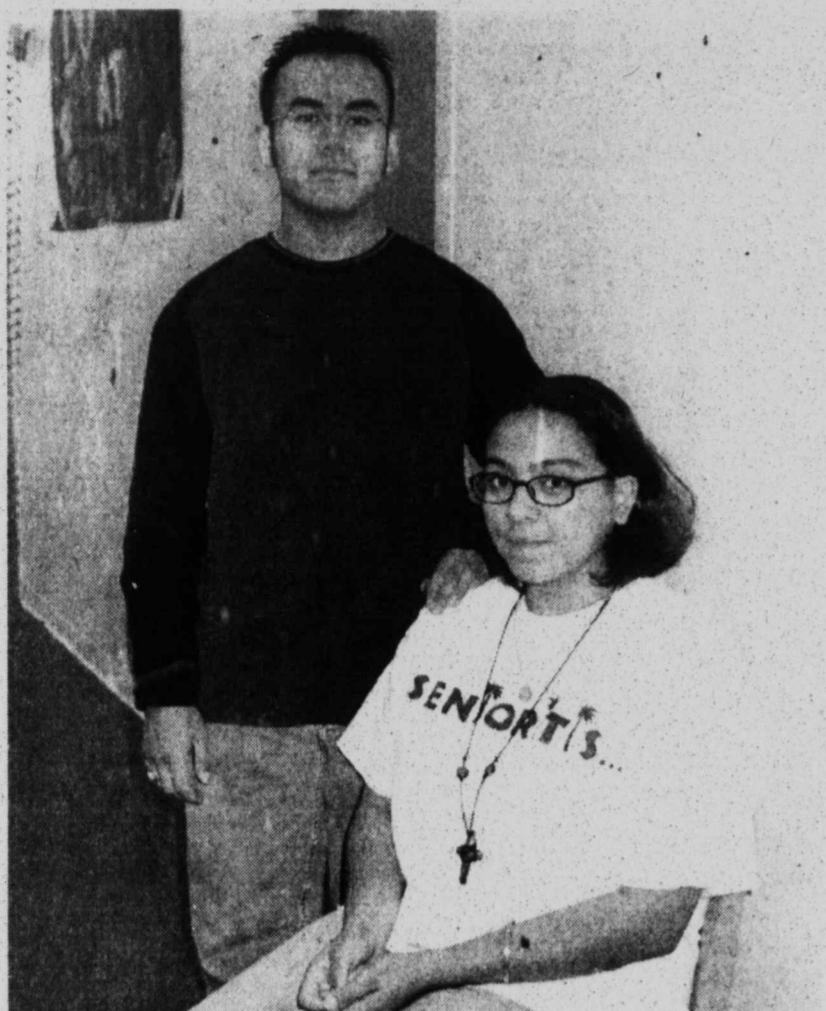

Pittman was also named the American Cycling Association State Champion for his age bracket.

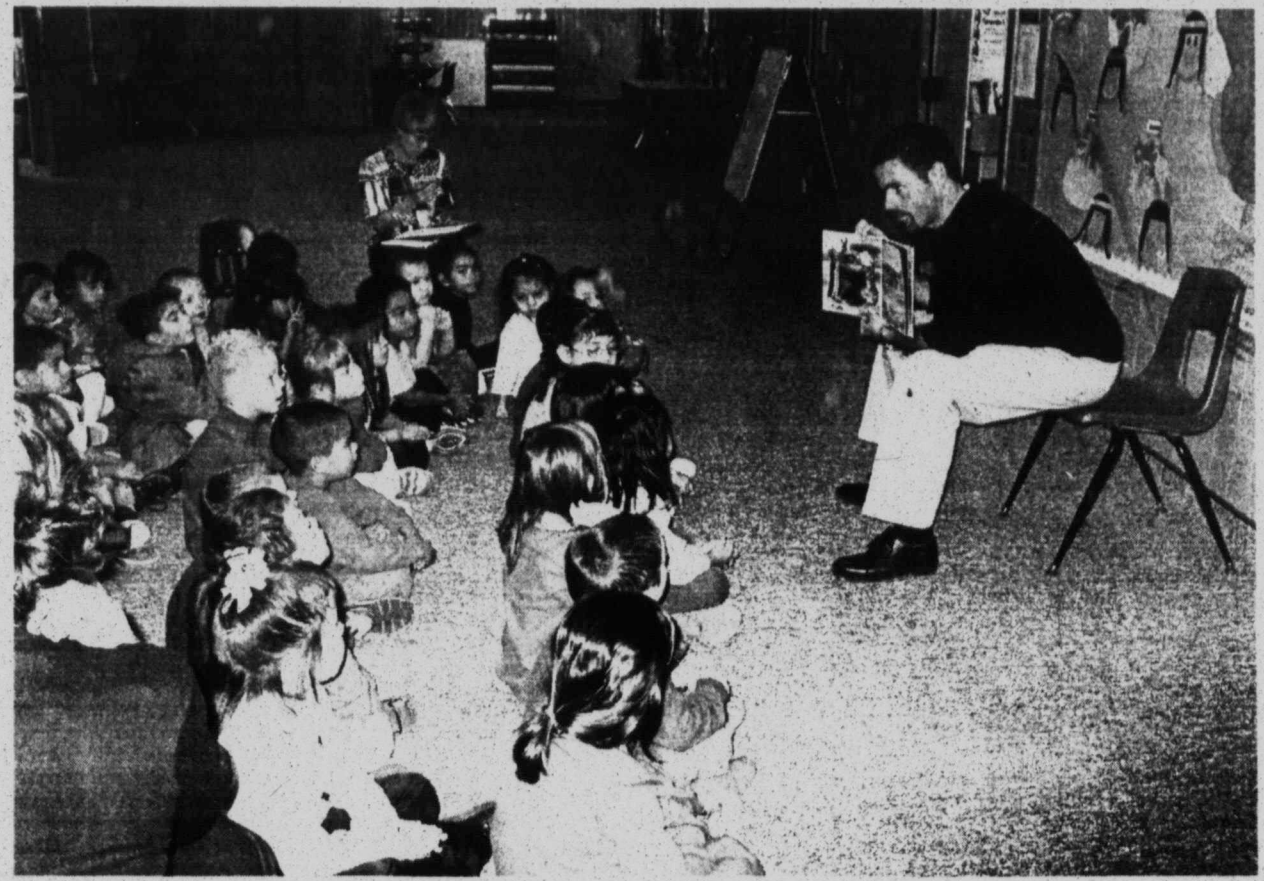
A sophomore at West Texas A&M University, Pittman is the son of Retha and Barry Pittman of Tahoka. He rides for T&C Racing.
